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
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## From the Editors

#### **American Flag Etiquette**

Should the United States Flag or its replica be used: 1) as ordinary apparel; 2) for advertising purposes; or 3) as disposable paper napkins and plates? According to the federal government Flag Code, answers to the aforementioned questions are "no." United States Congress created the Flag Code in 1942 (Public Law 829; Chapter 806) as the guide for proper handling and display of the American flag and its replica. The Flag Code is not mandatory and does not impose penalties for misuse of the American flag and its replica, but it does formalize and unify the traditional ways in which American citizens and others appropriately respect our symbol of inspiration and pride while displaying and donning their patriotism.

The intent of the Flag Code guidelines is very clear: "No disrespect should be shown to the Flag of the United States of America." Yet, as we go about our daily lives, some of us notice that the guidelines are violated in many different ways. Those violations include but are not limited to:

Flying the American flag in darkness:

Flag Code states, "It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on building and on stationary flagstaffs in the open; however, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness." Retire your American flag at sunset daily unless you've illuminated it with adequate light through sunrise.

• Use of portable (picnic) chairs, umbrellas, ordinary clothing, shoes, purses, tote bags, blankets and disposable paper-ware that depict American flag replica: Flag Code states, "(The flag) should never be festooned, drawn back nor up in folds, but always allowed to fall free; the flag should never touch anything beneath it, including ground; (the) Flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything." Don't purchase and use any items that depict images of the American flag inappropriately. Let merchants know when they're violating the Flag Code, and explain why they should make good-faith efforts to stop.

## Neighbors InDeed — Who Are We?

When you call Neighbors InDeed and leave a message, your first contact will be with a volunteer from "Information & Referral" or, as we like to say, "I&R".

The I&R volunteers return your calls from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Each of us works from home on a dedicated

cell phone (916-223-2763) along with two reference manuals in a traveling tote bag. We also have back up from an I&R Monitor who has volunteered for that day of the week. The Monitor is available to answer questions, make any necessary corrections, or help with calls if there is a sudden increase in the number of calls. At the end of the day, each volunteer delivers the telephone and manuals to the next volunteer on duty.

During our work day, we listen to the messages and transcribe the callers' requests. We research the information needed to complete the request and then return the call. If it's an approved task, we may ask additional questions to make sure the caller has all the necessary parts for the Handy Helper to complete the task, such as batteries or light bulbs. If it's not a task that our Handy Helpers provide, then we will offer the caller



three referrals from our Resources Listing. After the return call is completed, we enter all required information into our computer database. Once the call is in the database, it is accessed by our Dispatchers, who then assigns the call to a Handy Helper. The Handy Helper will call the resident to set up

an appointment time.

You may be wondering why we never answer the telephone. The simple truth is that it's much more efficient to have the answers ready for you before getting you on the line. We have usually researched your request and have the information you need in front of us when we return your call. This saves time for you (waiting on the phone while we try to find something) and also saves time for us (we can be working on another call while you're leaving your message). We try to get back to each caller as quickly as we can, but some days, especially Mondays, we are very busy and there may be delays. Those are the days when a Monitor may step in to help with the call volume.

There are two I&R Coordinators who provide training and support for the volunteers. Our Monitors serve one day each week. Our great volunteers find it very rewarding to help

#### their neighbors.

If you like helping people, are comfortable talking to your neighbors on the telephone, are user-friendly with your own computer, and can work one day per month, give us a call at 916-223-2763. We'll call you back to arrange for an application packet to be mailed to you.

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## **From Your Placer County Supervisor**

I would like to step away from news about Placer County for a moment and reminisce about a man who had a positive impact on Lincoln and its community through the local newspaper.

Eldridge Franklin Trott was the former owner, editor and publisher of the Lincoln News Messenger back when Lincoln was a small town community with a population of


3,200 people. I am sorry to say that we recently lost Eldridge, but his legacy continues today, unfolding among the pages that report on Lincoln's near 50,000-strong community.

Local news connects our communities, and that for me is at the heart of what Eldridge represented.

Eldridge embedded himself into the community to get a sense of its pulse. He spent time getting to know people and cover everything from high school sports to local businesses and holidays.

Eldridge's reporting was a critical part of tightening the fabric of the community. Back in those days, our community was one big family, so appearing in the local newspaper carried a lot of weight, good news and bad.

I remember when Eldridge reported on our high school basketball team's success (I was an enthusiastic fan, not a member). Our



His reporting was more than news - he made people ponder life and our community's future.

The news media has changed Robert M. Weygandt a great deal since the paper was under Eldridge's helm. While today's press has its benefits of timeliness and availability

in print and digital form, just to name a few, the local print business landscape is changing. Many communities across this great nation are losing their local newspaper due to

revenue loss and competition, which is a shame. Our local papers are finding their way

through this change, sometimes not very easily, but they provide an invaluable service and I hope we all can continue to support them.

I really appreciate our local journalists who are following in Eldridge's footsteps by providing us with local news and information about our communities, helping us understand today's important issues. I know Eldridge would be very proud.



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### **Favorite Restaurants** BY MARTIN GREEN

The most recent outing for our LEO (Lets Eat Out) group was to Dickey's BBQ Pit in the Nugget Shopping Center. 701 Pleasant Grove Boulevard (off Fairway Drive) in Roseville. I believe Dickey's has been there for quite some time but Beverly and I hadn't been there before, probably because our BBQ place is Lucille's. Dickey's is an order-at-the-counter place, on the small side, seven or eight tables and seven or eight booths. We were there at one o'clock, and there was a line but it moved quickly, and once we ordered, our meals were delivered to our table at record speed. Drinks were at a machine. Paper towels were on the table, a good idea for a BBQ place.

Dickey's menu, which you picked up at your table shows all of their dishes under Meats, Plates, Sandwiches, Stacks, Tacos, and Sides on the front, and Drinks & Desserts, Kids, Family Packs and Catering on the back. The plates, which come with two sides and a roll, are listed as with one, two or three meats, plus a pork rib plate. I had the pork rib plate (four ribs) with barbequed beans and caesar salad. The four ribs were sufficient for lunch and afterward I, and everyone else in our group, went to the soft ice cream machine for the "free" dessert. The ice cream felt good after the barbeque.

I looked up Dickey's website and was

interested to find that it's the largest BBQ chain in the country, founded in 1944 by a World War II veteran, Travis Dickey, and based in Dallas, Texas. The website says that all meats are slow smoked onsite just as in 1944. There are 85 locations in California, second only to the 136 locations in Texas. I'd say Dickey's is a pretty successful operation. It's open daily, 11 AM-9 PM. The phone number is 916-367-7700.

It so happened that we went to Lucille's a few days after going to Dickey's, on a Saturday night. It was a belated celebration of our son Michael's birthday and our daughter-in-law Laura's (our son David's wife) birthday. This was the first time we'd gone to Lucille's for dinner and, for some reason, I thought it would be less crowded than at lunch when there are always many kids present. I was mistaken, so I recommend making a reservation and being prepared for noise. As for a comparison between Lucille's and Dickey's I'll let readers make their choice and I'd be interested in your letting me know. Oh, yes, Lucille's is at 6628 Lonetree Boulevard, Rocklin; the phone number is 916-780-7427.

March seemed to be a month for family celebrations. Soon after our Lucille's dinner, Beverly and I joined her brother Tommy, and sister-in-law Bette, for dinner at McCormick and Schmicks to mark their 58th anniversary. We hadn't been to this restaurant for a while as they'd taken my favorite dish, calamari steak, off their lunch menu. Also, this was the first time we'd gone to McCormick and Schmicks for dinner.

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We were seated in the section with curtained booths. The menu confirmed that this is a pretty pricey restaurant, probably the reason we hadn't gone there for dinner before. However, they do offer a "Sunset Dinner" daily, 3:30-6, three courses - appetizer, entrée, and dessert, for \$25, which is quite reasonable. Appetizers include mixed greens or caesar salad or clam chowder; entrees include rock fish, chicken marsala, shrimp scampi, grilled salmon, stuffed shrimp, fish and chips, salmon rigatoni, shrimp pomodoro and beef medallions; desserts are chocolate mousse, chocolate cake or crème brulee. I had the clam chowder, stuffed shrimp and crème brulee; very satisfactory. As it happened, Beverly had found a coupon for an appetizer. There was a calamari "Fritto" on the menu, so I ordered that. Unfortunately, it consisted mostly of tentacles, much inferior to the old calamari steak.

McCormick and Schmicks is in the Fountains. The address is 1194 Roseville Parkway. The phone number is 916-960-4875. If you go there for dinner, unless you want to splurge, I recommend the Sunset Dinner.

No e-mails this month, but I did get a phone call. Unfortunately, the slip of paper I recorded the call on mysteriously disappeared (something that's been happening more often lately). Fortunately, I remembered the restaurant - Susie's Country Oaks Café. If the lady who called me reads this, please e-mail me. Meanwhile, online information about Susie's shows it's a breakfast and lunch place; hours, Monday-Friday are 6AM-2PM; Saturday, 6AM-3PM, and Sunday 7AM-3PM. It offers the full complement of breakfast dishes - omelets, waffles, pancakes, etc., and for lunch, burgers, sandwiches, soups, and salads. Breakfast specialties include countryfried steak, eggs florentine, eggs benedict and southern scramble. Lunch specialties include steak sandwich, grilled chicken and meatloaf. Susie's is at 500 Cirby Way in Roseville. The phone number is 916-786-0274.

Our friends Martin and Jan Wolf drove us to the Red Lobster for our annual lobster meal. The restaurant's menu, as it often does, had changed since our last visit and the dishes that included lobster were pretty expensive, but you could order a Maine lobster tail separately, along with another lunch dish, which is what Beverly and I did. The Red Lobster lobster is never as good as those we've had back east but it's okay and suffices for the year. The biscuits are always good. Our Red Lobster is at 6231 Sunrise Boulevard in Citrus Heights. The phone number is 916-726-6694.

Finally, from time to time, I get an e-mail announcing an event at the Flower Farm in Loomis, usually too late to mention it here. But this time the event is a Mother's Day brunch, Saturday and Sunday, May 11th and 12th, 9 AM-2:30 PM. The number to call for a reservation is 916-652-5661. The Flower Farm is at 4150 Auburn-Folsom Road in Loomis.

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
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#### LH Photography Club

Courtesies to Those with Low Vision

These simple guidelines will help avoid potentially embarrassing situations and those of us with low vision will appreciate the effort to make us feel more comfortable.

• Greet us by name and identify yourself, i.e., "Hi, Jane. It's Sally."

• Speak directly to us, rather than through someone else.

• Speak in a natural conversational tone. It is not necessary to speak loudly or to overenunciate.

• Feel free to use words that refer to vision. We also use the words "see," "look," etc.

• If you think we need assistance, ask first. Simply make the offer and let it be our decision. • When walking with one of us, offer your elbow so you can guide.

• When giving us directions, be explicit; i.e., "the door is to your right."

• Be calm and clear about what to do if you see us encountering a dangerous situation. Say, "Stop," rather than "Watch out."

• When walking with us identify terrain, i.e., an upcoming curb, a hole in the sidewalk, a low hanging tree. Let us set the walking pace.

• To help when dining with us use "clock" reference to identify where items are located, i.e., "water is at 1:00, coffee is at 3:00."

• Guide dogs on duty with us should not be petted or distracted.

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
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


#### **Bird Group**

BY DON BAYLIS

May brings birding to a new phase for the summer. Now we enjoy the breeding birds around us, both year-round residents like hummingbirds, robins, mallards, Canada geese and wrens, adding the summer transients like Swainsons Hawks, warblers and orioles. We also have to adapt our viewing from open ponds and lakes to leafy trees and shrubs.

Bird migrations can be both predictable and variable, as was seen this year. Every year, Swainson's Hawks migrate north from central and south america through the desert community of Borrego Springs, east of San Diego. Most years, tens to hundreds of these hawks are seen daily passing north in early March. This year, the annual hawk watch set for March saw only a few hawks through all of March, and they were about to give up. Then the first week of April, up to 500 hawks a day were spotted, probably due to great feeding opportunities along the way. Closer to home, White-crowned Sparrows leave us about April 15. We saw dozens of these sparrows feeding and bathing in our yard all day on the 13th. We did not see any on the 14th, it was time to migrate.

Every year we walk the 12 Bridges Trail, a City of Lincoln trail from Coyote Pond to Twelve Bridges Middle School. This year



on March 22 we saw 51 species, a fairly representative count over the last few years. Our other trip was a walk through Traylor Ranch in Loomis, just off of Sierra College Blvd. After rain delays, the trip was on April 12. This time, it was decided to begin on the western entrance on Delmar Ave. Wandering the trails, with the trees beginning to leaf out, allowed us to identify 30 species, which included both departing winter birds like White-crowned Sparrow and Yellow-rumped Warbler, plus summer birds like the Western Kingbird. An unexpected and uncommon sighting were 3 Whimbrel in a pasture.

Our regular meeting on April 8 featured John Garfein's photographic tour of Cuba featuring old cars, the Cuban people, and the birds he saw.

Our May 13 presentation will be from Sean McLaughlin, a Lincoln Hills resident. His presentation topic is "Climate Change, Science and You", dealing with conservation biology and the impacts of climate change on birds and other wildlife.

Our June 10 presentation will be Lori Dieter from Gray Lodge State Wildlife Area.

Day trips are planned as follows —

• May 10 is our yearly trip to Spenceville Wildlife Refuge and Waldo Junction east of Marysville. In this area, once part of the Camp Far West and Camp Beale military training areas, we have spotted Lazuli Buntings, Common Yellowthroats, Lewis's Woodpecker, and Ash-throated Flycatchers. This is a partial day trip, but usually lasts into the afternoon.

• May 24 will be the inaugural walk at Boulder Ridge Park. This park is in Rocklin, but borders the southeast corner of Lincoln. Most of our walking will be in Lincoln. The area is on a ridge separating Clover Valley from the flatlands, and is several hundred feet above Lincoln Hills. The open oak woodlands are mostly unchanged from ranching days, and if the weather is clear, views will include the Sierra, Mt. Diablo, and the Coast Range. This is a mostly level walking tour on dirt roads and trails.

Detailed bird lists for all trips are available on our web site, lhbirders.org, along with photo galleries of each trip by our photographer members. Our programs are held in KS Presentation Hall at 1:30 PM on the second Monday of the month. Day trips leave from the Orchard Creek parking lot west of the pool at 8:00 AM unless otherwise specified. I've driven by the Griffith Quarry building in Penryn many times but it didn't interest me till I went on a hike arranged by Tess Devenish, Vice President of our Hiking Group, and avid hike leader. She arranged a docent led tour with Cliff Kennedy, a lifelong resident of Penryn and historical advocate, he gave us a very personal glimpse of what went on in 1864.



Walking trails through the 23-acre park wander around the ruins of the first polishing mill built and the lower and upper views of the quarry hole. Printed trail guides are available in the museum. It's a wooded area and you can see the path of the railway, however; the tracks are gone now. Picnic tables are spread around the grounds and it would be an excellent area for a picnic. Magnificent views of the foothills! At most, hiking distance is about 3 miles. Cliff said, "You really can't get lost". The land and buildings were donated to Placer County in 1976. Enid passed away in April of that year. The Griffith family quarried granite until about 1906. The Museum is in the only building to exist and is located in what was the office of the Penryn Granite Works. The museum is open Saturday and Sunday from Noon to 4 pm.

We have another Saturday outing this year, on June 8, Eugene O'Neal Historic Site in Danville. Going west towards the bay area seems to be easier on a weekend. Check the website.



Felicity Huffman paid a mere \$15,000 to get her daughter into USC, which I thought was better known for its football teams than for being elite; but others, the just plain wealthy people, paid half a million dollars or more, which is incomprehensible. No college is worth that kind of money. Those plain wealthy people must have had a few million lying around and didn't know what else to do with it. Also, it came out that one of the California colleges has a sailing team. What's next? Polo? Wine tasting?

P.D. James and Ruth Rendell: These two English mystery writers are among my literary heroes, or I should say heroines, not only because of their writing ability but because, being an aged writer myself, of their longevity. Some time ago, I downloaded a work by P.D. James called "A Time to be Earnest," which is kind of a year's diary, and for some reason, I was recently reminded of it and quickly read through it. At the end, James writes, "Tomorrow I shall be seventy-eight and, by the time this fragment of autobiography is published, I shall be within sight of my eightieth birthday. If seventy-seven is a time to be in earnest, eighty is a time to recognize old age, accepting with such fortitude as one can muster its inevitable pains, inconveniences, and indignities and rejoicing in its few compensations."

A few years after I retired, when I was a youngster in my sixties, Beverly and I went on a tour of Britain, starting with a week's stay in London at a B&B near Holland Park. We noticed that in the local bookstore that, not P.D. James but her good friend Ruth Rendell, was giving a reading of her latest book in a few days. Our B&B landlady recommended a restaurant just about next door to the bookstore (best fish and chips in London) and on the night of the reading we had dinner there and then proceeded to the bookstore. Ruth Rendell was a pleasant-looking, dark-haired, woman who

read in a soft voice. After the reading, we spoke to her and found out she was about to go on a book tour of the United States. At the time, I was freelancing for the Sacramento Bee and I told her I could write her up if she was going to be in our area; unfortunately, she wasn't.


She did tell us that her good friend P.D. James lived nearby, close to Holland Park, and it turned out that we'd passed her house every time we'd returned at night by Tube to our B&B. If her cat was on the doorstep we'd know she was at home. We passed P.D. James' house several times after that but the cat, whose name as I learned from reading that diary was Polly-Hodge, was never on the doorstep. If she'd been on the doorstep, I don't know and shall never know, if I would have had the nerve to knock on the door. I also regret that I never had the nerve, even if Polly-Hodge wasn't on the doorstep but might have been occupied elsewhere, to knock on the door. Well, that's my P.D. James, Ruth Rendell story. I'll just add that P.D. James lived to age 94; Ruth Rendell regrettably died at age 85.

Dave Barry: Another of my literary heroes, not for his longevity, but for his writing a weekly humor column from 1983 to 2005, which is 17 or so years. As someone who's been writing a column, trying to be mildly humorous for about the same period of time but monthly, I can only say I'm awestruck. I recently came upon an article by Barry in the Wall Street Journal and discovered he is getting somewhat old, although a mere 70. The article says that at this age he's going to emulate his super-friendly and always happy dog Lucy and

try to make new friends and connect with old ones. I don't have a dog, but like Barry, I've been feeling the same about connecting or re-connecting with people from my past. I've found that isn't too easy, the problem being that most of these seem to have already passed on. Among my regrets is that I didn't try sooner. So it's never too early to reach out to old friends you've lost touch with and perhaps forestall those regrets. And I'm glad that Dave Barry is still around and still writing.



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## **Neighborhood Watch**

The Neighborhood Watch partnership with Lincoln Police Department has helped to keep Lincoln one of the 15 safest cities in California. Review the incidents below to look for things you can do better to avoid being a crime victim.

Recent Lincoln Hills Scams — A male resident and a female "scammer" were chatting on "Google Hangout" App which is similar to Facebook. The woman mentioned that she needed to pay a hospital bill with "Amazon Gift Cards." The scammer sent checks to the resident to be used to purchase Gift Cards. As soon as the resident deposited the checks, he purchased Gift Cards and sent pictures of the cards to the suspect. When he did that, the suspect stopped payment on the checks but the resident was out over \$3,000.

If you are confronted by the "Grandmother Scam," ask the caller for the child's middle name and then check in with the child's parents. Also, scammers can make anything show on your caller ID including your own phone number! DO NOT answer those calls.

The aggressive door-to-door salespeople claiming to be with "PG&E Energy Consultants" are not legitimate. If they come to your home, call PG&E at 1-877-660-6789.

On March 12 a resident in the 900 block of Dogwood Loop in Village 15 lost a bicycle through an unlocked side garage door. In the same week, another resident in the same village lost a bicycle as well. The front and side garage doors should be locked at all times you are not using them.

On April 3 at 2:30 PM, a resident in the 700 block of Castleberry Lane in Village 16C was having work done on his home and the front garage door was left open. During that time the suspect was seen running from the house carrying two boxes. The suspect then jumped into a vehicle and fled. Later, the resident discovered the thief had removed two jewelry boxes from the master bedroom closet. Prior to that theft, the workers on the house had seen two Latino men in a white pickup and several others driving up and down the street looking at open garage doors. The homeowner believed the thief was in the house less than a minute. The suspect had a beard and was wearing a hat, and their car was red. Unfortunately, sometimes people drive through our community looking for easy targets. Report any suspicious people right away and get a license plate number if possible. If you have jewelry or other valuables that are not in a safe, do not keep them in usual places.

Between 04/06/2019 and 04/07/2019 someone smashed windows on two vehicles parked in the driveway of a residence in Village 3A in the 500 block of Sawmill Court. The loss was keys and other small items. The police made a report.

Social Security Number Scam — A nice sounding professional call from the government reports your Social Security Number has been suspended, and with a little bit of information, they will reactivate it for you. Sounds okay, right? Wrong!

This is a common phone scam that people have been receiving lately. A caller or robocall will pretend to be a government official and state that your Social Security Number has been suspended or deactivated due to fraudulent or criminal activity. The fraudster will then ask you to call a phone number to clear up the situation by simply providing some personal information. The fraudsters are trying to trick you into providing information such as your birth date, bank account numbers, social security numbers and other sensitive information.

While the initial call may sound scary, rememberyour Social Security Number cannot be suspended or deactivated. Below are a few tips to protect you from this phone scam and other variations of this scheme.

• Your Social Security Number cannot be suspended or deactivated.

• The Social Security Administration will never threaten to arrest you.

• Never give out or confirm your personal information over the phone, via email, or on a website until you have fully verified who is asking for the information. Contact government agencies directly using phone numbers and website addresses you know to be legitimate.

• Remember the government normally contacts people via postal mail. Unfortunately

mail scams are a common occurrence as well, and the same security precautions should be used with postal mail. Mail should be scrutinized and information validated before calling a phone number or visiting a website listed on the letter.

• Do not trust a name, phone number, or email address just because it sounds connected to the government. Fraudsters use sophisticated tools such as fake caller IDs and email addresses to impersonate government officials.

Should you receive a scam phone call, do not provide any information and hang up immediately. You can report the call to the Federal Trade Commission at www.ftc.gov so they are aware of current phone scams taking place.

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
