In Dan Larsen's garage is a verdoro green 1969 Pontiac GTO that he has owned since it was new in 1968. It has only 84,416 miles on it, is in great condition, and Dan uses it occasionally in his community service work and for display in his car club, Rods and Relics. Not too far away from the car, the garage surpasses "mancave" designation and reaches museum-level status with glassed-in displays of 1,287 metal car models, magnets, marshmallow Peeps, and solar-activated plastic toys. Wife Carol makes sure the collections stay out of the house, and Dan ensures that they are neat, organized and logged with a little bit of obsessive-compulsive disorder mixed in.

Dan was born in St. Louis and lived in the area until he was sixteen. He has a picture in his garage of a Soap Box Derby race he participated in when he was twelve. His love of driving and vehicles started early when he learned to drive, at twelve, on a farm tractor in a rural area of St. Louis. He had an F150

He started his career with Kaiser Aluminum and retired as Account Executive from Bemis Packaging Company where he was an outdoor industrial sales representative and covered both California and Nevada.

Carol's trajectory to the Bay area was very different. She grew up in upstate New York in the town of Binghamton. When she was in her early twenties, she and a friend decided to move to California, and they drove out together. They had no jobs lined up and she had never visited California before the trip. Over the years Carol developed her interviewing skills which led to her favorite position with Charles Schwab Co., Inc. in San Francisco. There she worked for fifteen years and retired as Director of Professional Development. She



Lincoln Hills Holds First Amateur Radio Field Day

How did it go? Quite well, for the first time ever, according to the participants. In the fifteen year history of the Lincoln Hills Amateur Radio Group it had never held an Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL) sanctioned Field Day. Field day has been held

every year since 1933 by thousands of radio operators all across North America on the last weekend of June.

In the past, ARG members did not think they were entirely up to the task, so they joined other amateur radio groups in the valley to participate in this public service event. Feeling they may be missing out members challenged the ARG to hold its own fun event at the

Lincoln Hills Sports Pavilion.

"Field Day is amateur radio's open house. Every June, throughout North America 40,000 Amateur Radio Operators set up temporary transmitting stations in public places to demonstrate amateur radio's science, skill, and service to the community. It combines public



service, emergency preparedness, community outreach, and technical skills, all in a single event. It remains the most popular annual event in amateur radio."-ARRL

This year the ARG had four stations with temporary antennas set up to participate in a quest to see how many other amateur operators they could contact in four different

radio bands, 80 Meters, 40 Meters, 20 Meters, and 15 Meters, using various modes: Morris Code, Voice, and Digital.

Each station was battery powered with solarpanels to charge spent batteries, demonstrating reliable emergency communications was possible when not connected to the power grid, which is often down in emergencies.

The Sports Pavilion was an ideal location with wide open spaces for the construction of temporary antenna farms on the north lawn. The shelter

provided shade for the operating stations, the operators, and visitors. But, more importantly, it was a central location encouraging citizens to drop by and observe the operators contact station across the nation. One couple from Pennsylvania was amazed when operator Gary made contact with a station near Pittsburgh while they were watching.

The most distant station contacted was one in eastern Russia, southeast of Moscow. The most distant state reached was





Pennsylvania.

The tennis club came by and was given a demonstration as were multiple dog walkers." Not sure we made any converts of the dog walkers," said Walt, but they were interested in what we were doing. Two ladies who were former amateur radio operators came by to share their Field Day stories.

One old-time amateur radio operator came by to see some of the latest digital equipment, much different from the powerhungry glowing power tubes of the past. Transistors amplify the signals today using battery power.

With the tally of contacts in each band and mode submitted to the Amateur Radio Relay League, the ARG concluded the first Field Day as a huge success and started planning how to improve next years event.



I know when I first started dabbling in Mixed Media there were words and terms that I heard others talking about and I had no clue what they were talking about. Well, lets look at several of these terms and shine a little light on them.

Do you know what found objects mean? Everyday objects we walk by daily that are perfect for making art marks. Reusable items such as plastic knives, combs, brushes, straws and stirrers can be used to create the simplest of organic marks, such as lines, circles, dots and scratch marks. Pieces of bubble wrap, cardboard tubing, fruit netting and sponges will each leave an unusual imprint when coupled with paints, cotton swabs, gift

cards, droppers all have the ability to create singular marks within a piece of art. Heavy-duty plastic cards are a great repurposed tool. Dipped in paint, the edge of the card can be used to make lines. These are just a few examples of "found objects."

Great lesson on using

Another interesting Mixed Media term is ephemera. Simply put, ephemera is paper items that were originally meant to be discarded after use but have since become collectibles. Think about show tickets, ticket stubs, playing cards, postcards, paper money, lottery tickets, post its, old maps, old flyers and old book pages. and more. Ephemera is almost always paper-based and is often written or printed items.

Several companies offer manufactured ephemera products. Tim Holtz is notorious for his ephemera inspired creations.

One final term we will look at is Artist trading cards, commonly referred to as ATCs. These cards are miniature pieces of art that are traded around the world. Artists create, trade and collect art at organized "swap" events, either in person or online. The only official rule for ATCs is the size: 2-1/2 inches by 3-1/2 inches. Now that the light has been shined on some terms, go out and find some found object to play with in your art and maybe put some ephemera items on it too or maybe make some ATC projects.

Hope to see everyone during our informal time this month.

I'm excited to share that the highly-anticipated Placer County Conservation Program recently reached a major milestone and is closer to becoming a reality.

The purpose of this program, which we fully expect to become a national model for local, state and federal cooperation, is to conserve

our uniquely rich natural resources while facilitating continued smart and sustainable development.

As long time resident of the rural Lincoln community, I understand that Placer County's scenic, natural landscape and popularity as a place to live, work, play and learn has created a great demand for growth.


How we balance protecting our quality of life while maintaining land development is perhaps our most important responsibility as a community.

With the PCCP, we have a plan to permanently conserve more than 47,000 acres of our precious open space and agricultural land in western Placer County and streamline the permitting process for locally-approved development projects.

More than 15 years in the making, it is now available for public review.

Back in June, the PCCP and accompanying environmental impact study were published in the Federal Register by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

On the same date, the county released the program's draft environmental impact report, which is now available for public review and comment through Aug. 20.

From the very beginning, we were committed to achieving the most comprehensive conservation plan possible, one that would maximize protection of our natural resources while streamlining local, state and federal permitting processes.

What's more, the PCCP would be the first regional conservation plan in the United States to include endangered species permitting both for terrestrial species and fish species, as well as comprehensive wetlands permitting protecting these species and wetlands, forever.



I hope all Sun City residents who are barbecue lovers will read this column. Bob Boggs e-mailed: "I would like to put in a mention for Back Forty Texas BBQ Restaurant, which is at 1201 Orlando, just a block from the Riverside exit heading south on Hwy. 80. I am sure that they have probably been mentioned here many times but when my wife and I ate there last week I enjoyed my meal so much that I thought well, I would just drop you a line. I think that every time we eat there, but for some reason never get around to writing about it. We always seem to order their Early Bird Special and we both get the pork ribs which come with your choice of two sides plus a choice of bread. My wife chose the coleslaw and potato salad while I chose the beans and fresh corn on the cob. Other meats are available on the Early Bird Special, each with a different price. Every time we go there, which seems to be every two months or so, I think to myself that these are the best pork ribs that I have ever tasted. Succulent! Wow! Wonderful! Everything that I want in a BBQ restaurant. I just wish that they were closer."

There's an enthusiastic recommendation. Beverly and I have been to the Back Forty but it's been a while so I was glad to be reminded. The Back Forty website states: "Our concept is simple. Use only the freshest, finest ingredients, use only authentic Texas recipes, and treat our guests with good old-fashioned southern hospitality." The menu, in addition to barbecue, offers appetizers, salads, and sandwiches. "High Noon Lunch Specials" include bbq chicken plate, tacos, chopped beef sliders, and burgers. There's also beef ribs, beef brisket, tri-tip beef, and prime rib. The menu also has gluten-free items. There's a statement that "We don't bake BBO in an oven; "we slow smoke our meats for hours in our custom Southern Pride rotisserie smokers. This gives our meat a red appearance and may make you wonder if they are fully cooked... Trust us! They are fully cooked." There are other interesting things on the website which I'll try to get to next month. The Back Forty phone number is 916-726-4040. Sorry, I couldn't find the restaurant's hours.

Here's another BBQ recommendation, just as enthusiastic, from another Bob, Bob Schroeder: "Our favorite restaurant these days is LBB Gastropub & Smokehouse in Loomis, at the corner of Taylor and Horseshoe Bar Roads. They serve the best barbeque around. One of the offerings is the meat sampler, and you can get one, two or three meats for \$16, \$23 or \$28. The meats offered are pulled pork, brisket, tritip, bratwurst, ribs, and chicken, and they are all delicious. We've been there many times but I didn't tell you about it before because they were very busy and it was often hard to get a table. But they've expanded the restaurant so that problem is now solved.

"Other dishes include a pulled pork sandwich for \$12, Cuban sandwich for \$14, bratwurst sandwich for \$11, and a half rack of St Louis Style smoked ribs for \$19, plus a variety of sides and salads. They serve great craft beer from their nearby Loomis Basin Brewery (hence the LBB name). The place has a lively and pleasing atmosphere and everyone seems to enjoy it. Good service, too."

The address of LLB Gastropub is 3640 Taylor road; the phone number is 916-824-1527. Hours are Wednesday & Thursday, 11 AM-9 PM; Friday and Saturday, 11:30 AM-10 PM; Sunday, 11:30 AM-8 PM. It's closed Monday and Tuesday.

In the June "Favorite Restaurants" review of the Japanese restaurant *Mikuni Kaizen* at the Fountains, I noted that Beverly and I were both fans of bento boxes and would be sure to try it out. We recently went to Mikuni with our friends Jan and Martin Wolf and all four of us did order bento boxes. I had the teriyaki chicken with crispy potstickers and the other three had the chicken teriyaki with California rolls. The bento boxes also came with a good helping of rice. I liked mine and the otherswere satisfied with theirs. Maybe the potstickers made the difference.

The Fountains Mikuni is a pretty large place, fronting on the main street of The Fountains with its back on a parking lot. Martin Wolf turned into Reserve off Roseville Parkway and, as the main street is usually full, parked in the parking lot. There's no rear entrance so we had to walk around to the front. Once inside and seated we found the restaurant was crowded with staff members busy serving everybody. Our meals were as usual in Japanese restaurants nicely presented and the portions were generous. Beverly and I both took about half of our bento boxes home for a second meal.

I got a takeout menu, which featured mostly tapas (which I thought were only found in Spain), followed by sushi rolls. The address of the Fountains Mikuni is 1017 Galleria Boulevard; the phone number is 916-780-2119. Hours are lunch, Monday-Friday, 11:30-4; Saturday and Sunday, noon-4; dinner, Monday-Thursday, 4-9:30; Friday and Saturday, 4-10; Sunday, 4-9. As noted in June's column, Mikuni is a local chain; there's a restaurant in Roseville at 1565 Eureka Road.

Bob Boggs's e-mail also stated that he could hardlywait "to try the new *Fourk Kitchen*' restaurant in Lincoln. It is at 825 Twelve Bridges Drive just two traffic lights west of Hwy. 65. I have read they offer a four-course, fixed-price meal at \$44 a person, not including wine, which for many of us here in Sun City means a 'special occasion' meal. I am hoping to try it sometime in July and will report back."

The 'Fourk Kitchen' website says they take reservations only, are open four nights a week, Wednesday-Saturday and seat 24 persons a night. Happy hour starts at 5:30; you should arrive no later than 6:15 for dinner. There are four set courses that change monthly. That sounds like a different and interesting dining experience and I hope Bob will give us a report on it. Bob mentioned still another restaurant in his e-mail, in the Napa area; more on that too next month.



The speaker for September will be Ji Hye Park. She is the Head of the Sutter Lymphedema Clinic and she should provide us with some invaluable information.



Guests will enjoy viewing "The Chateau" in 12 Bridges. This 3700 sq. ft. semi-custom home situated at the end of the cul de sac pays homage to Tuscan design with Mediterranean flair. The interior of the home features a total of five bedrooms. The floors, lighting, wallpaper and tiling were all redone by the owners, Gina and Corey Farina, with each room designed to create its own unique personality. Their creative spirit manifests itself in this charming abode. The backyard is where the magic begins! Take a page from the Amalfi Coast or Mallorca; the stunning ambiance of a Mediterranean villa grips you the moment you enter. With its Las Vegas like entertainment center, barbecue, fountain, fire pit, overarching deck and 8 foot deep hand built pool, it is simply magnificent! The adjacent roses, fruit trees and plant varietals bring a sense of soothing tranquility for the perfect balance.

A charming piece of Lincoln History will be found in this two story craftsman home built around 1900. It holds a wealth of Lincoln history. Originally owned by the president of the first bank of Lincoln, and later by county supervisor, Charlie Wilson, it is surely a home that saw its share of entertaining. surgeries were performed.

Because of its many halls and would spaces; the current owners, Jessica and Tim Sprinkles, fondly call their home the "Winchester Mystery House". They have decorated it in a way respectful

of the era. All the original built ins are filled with books and vintage finds, and most of the decor comes with its own story of heirloom, heritage, or plain old Goodwill. This is a real historic gem!

"Vista de Madera" means view of the woods; but take one look at this lovely Catta Verdea home and you will see that it's so much more! This 5,610 sq. ft. home has 4 bedrooms, 5 1/2 baths, a bonus room, library and 4 car garage. It was completed in December 2018 by local builder Reynan & Bardis Homes who are known for creating distinctive homes and communities that carefully enhance the surrounding areas.

This home has many upscale amenities and a well designed floor plan. It is a smart home equipped with a state of the art security system, lighting, climate control and entertainment options, all controlled by a house iPad. The views are unmatched and one truly has the feeling of being "on top of the world". Owners Jamee and Darren Horning have made this exquisite home their own with

art collected on their travels.







Nesting season is mostly over in our area. Hope you have enjoyed watching all the nestlings and fledglings. The quail chicks, ducklings, and goslings have been most visible and enjoyable to watch but invariably a few of the chicks fall into our storm drains and cannot always be rescued. Thanks to the Wildlife Heritage Foundation, who provide screens

to cover many of our drains, many such tragedies have been averted.

It was a quiet morning birding on the Monte Azul trail in late June, only sighting 22 species, until a pair of eagles were spotted sitting on a cell phone tower near the water tanks above Boulder Court. We had plenty of time to observe them sitting and in flight, resulting in much discussion and research to determine if they were immature Bald or immature Golden Eagles. The birding experts that we consulted leaned toward immature Bald Eagles. Our walk along Auburn Ravine near the dog park two weeks later was very productive. We sighted or heard 33 species, an impressive new high for

this location. There were a couple of unexpected sightings, namely our first identifiable sighting of a Hutton's Vireo, and a flyover by a White Pelican. The

Fishing Group

I recently returned from a fantastic trip to Twin Bridges Montana, a fly fishing mecca. Twin Bridges is what Louis & Clark discovered as part of the Corps of Discovery Expedition (it wasn't known as Twin Bridges then) sponsored by President Thomas Jefferson, also known as the Lewis & Clark Expedition. Their mission was to go out and find the Passage to the Pacific Ocean. You'll have to read the book to find out what happened.

I found my self sitting in the guides boat looking up at a hill which Lewis allegedly climbed to the top to get his bearings. It's kind of cool really to be there looking at a bit of history.

Now, I'm not saying they discovered this part of America. It was already there. And it wasn't a fishing Mecca then either. By making a trail for the known "civilized" world of America those fellas help create this fishing hole for generations to enjoy. How it became THE place to fish, I haven't discovered. I presume it was a slow process. Today as I imagine it was back then, it is a great place to fish.

White fish are the predominant fish, natural as anything there at the time. Rainbows and Browns were introduced later by some entrepreneur. I suppose he or she were fishing people and wanted something to catch that was more spectacular then a White fish. I also found out in this trip there isn't a real catch & release policy or area, and spin fishing people fish here too, and take a few fish home. These



rivers are not stocked.

Montana has about 900 thousand citizens where as California has about 10 billion (a joke) so don't contact me with the census data. Montana reminds me of the Bay Area when I was growing up. You could see for miles and easily look at the mountains, no cars or people walking or riding a bike, just a lot of open space and not many people.

Montana has many streams and rivers to choose from to fish. Many of them make up the mighty Missouri River by flowing into each other down stream and then becoming part of the Mo. Our guides took us down parts of the rivers we fished such as the middle or lower part of the Jefferson or the Beaverhead. I forget which one Lewis chose to get to Oregon, but it was the right one. Otherwise their trip would have been a bust.

The methods of fishing are different in the rivers. At times, we used "BB's" to bounce off the bottom while our flies were tied a few inches above and the Leader was attached to a bright Orange/Red or White indicator (aka Bobber).

As the boat moved swiftly downstream, it was our job to keep our eyes on the Indicator. If it slipped below the surface, immediately RAISE your ROD to set the hook? Fish On! On the other rivers (Big Hole, Madison, etc, we used what is called a DryDropper. The floating fly, a Chernobyl bug with bright White wings let us know if a fish grabbed our hook. The bottom fly is the Prince Nymph Jig hook, a bright blue apparition of some kind of bug that dwells in these rivers of Montana. If you were extremely lucky and the great rainbow grabbed your top fly, an explosion of water and excitement will be displayed. Your adrenaline is pumping, your aches and pains disappear, and you forget you're an old guy or gal for a few minutes. Even your guide is stoked, and if it is a 20+ inch bow or brown, then even more celebration can happen. High fives all around.

Now, I just mean to give you a bit of an insight to fishing. It can be anywhere in the world or just a few minutes from home home in California. Even if you are my age, 78, and just beginning to mature into the excitement of fishing. It beats sitting home and doing nothing for the rest of your retirement life.

Keep your interest in fishing high. Go out when you can even for an hour or for the trip of a life time.

SCLH WRITER'S CORNER....

Stage Three, or Two, or One!

It has been over a year since my husband passed away - actually, one year two months and twenty-one days. know because I went through every one of those days - and I am finally at stage five in the grief process, according to all I have read and been told. I think I have it all

The therapists, of course, have their opinions about what one goes through after the loss of a loved one, and they each write with their own authority of how people process grief. When I read some of these writings it makes me wonder if these writers have ever lost someone, or if they are merely expressing what they have been told by another therapist who read something once in a college class, a long time ago.

Denial. Anger. Loneliness. Bargaining. Acceptance.

For me, I missed a few of the stages. There was no denial. I knew it was coming, and I didn't bargain, either. The doctors were very clear in their explanations of my husband's medical condition. His time had come. But there is loneliness. Fifty-two years with someone and then nothing...

Then there is that one stage called anger. That one I definitely felt, and it lasted quite a while. It started out when one day I happened to think of something Tom had done which really ticked me off. Don't have a clue what it was now, but that one thing reminded me of something else

he had done which I didn't like, which reminded me of another thing, and A begat B and B begat C and on and on it went. Fifty-two years of stuff!

If you are a male, you probable will not understand this at all and think I am just some vindictive female. But a tip to all males, in the brain-file of all women there is one folder for stuff-husbands-do-which-ticks-me-off.

In the past when I wanted to tick Tom off, I would dredge up one of those old items from my brain-file and hit him with it right out of the blue. He would look at me with this look of, "What in the blankity-blank are you talking about?" (Tom had quite a vocabulary.) So, then I would have to go through the long process of reminding him of when and where he had done some terrible misdeed, which had almost destroyed my feelings. All the while trying to make him pay attention to what I was saying, as he had already forgotten the subject of our discussion, which was not onesided. So, I filed that away in that favorite folder, and went on with our new topic of discussion.

No, perhaps you can understand why the anger stage took me a while to navigate. I could dwell on each transgression as long as I wanted, I could beat it to death. I didn't have to change the subject until I blankity-blank wanted to. (Every so often, one of Tom's favorite words slips into my mind.) Then one day, I reached the end of the file and I closed it.

I called my friend, told her what I had done, asked her if I was weird, and she said to me, "Do you feel weird about it?"

"No, not at all."

Then you're not weird," she said.

I looked at those five stages of grief and decided I was ready for the last one, Acceptance.



The following are some examples of these 'Senior Rules'. Rule 1.a.5: A ball sliced or hooked into the rough shall be lifted and placed on the Fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into the Rough with no penalty. The senior player should not be penalized for tall grass which ground keepers failed to mow. Rule 6: There is no penalty for so-called "out of bounds". If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior player deserves an apology, not a

penalty. Rule 8.K.9(S): Advertisements claim that golf scores can be improved by purchasing new golf equipment. Since this is financially impractical for many senior players, three strokes may be subtracted from the gross score for using old equipment. Rule 9.k.34(a): If a tree is between the ball and the hole, and the tree is deemed to be younger than the player, then the ball can be moved without penalty. This is so because this is simply a question of timing; when the player was younger, the tree was not there so the player is being penalized because of her age. Following the tournament all players gathered in the golf course tent for a Seniors Rule' lunch and awards. All awards were determined by random drawings. The tournament provided much enjoyment and many laughs for those who participated.





Observations on Some Articles

Road Map for Retirement: The full headline for the Wall Street Journal article by Carol Hymowitz is "Looking For a Road Map for Retirement? Good Luck" and its message is that, as she concludes: "There is no single road map or retirement plan, only the ones we construct for ourselves." Before that conclusion, Ms. Hymowitz, a fairly recent retiree, notes that "many of my baby boomer generation can expect to live to 85 or 90, which gives us 15 to 20 more years between midlife and frail old age than prior generations. The question is what to do with those years."

Ms. Hymowitz, a journalist, started free-lancing but writes that after back-to-back assignments, she realized that she was working as hard as before she retired. This struck a chord as after I retired I became a freelance writer, for two papers; I also worked at a volunteer center and became president of my swim and tennis clubs. I too realized I was working as much as before retiring and cut back. She also writes that she's "intentionally leaving time to meander and loaf," something that as I've become older and older I find myself doing more and more.

The Case for Doing Nothing: This brings us to the next article, you've just read the title, by Olga Mecking in the New York Times. She writes that it's time to stop running from place to place and laboring over long to-do lists just to show how busy and important you are. There

are good reasons for this; such busyness can lead to "burnout, anxiety disorders and stress-related diseases.." Instead, she recommends doing---what? Nothing. Evidently, the Dutch (Ms. Mecking is from The Netherlands) have a word for it---niksen. Niksen is defined, sort of, as being like a car whose engine is running but isn't going anywhere.

Well, I guess that without knowing it I've been practicing "niksen" the last few years, i.e., doing nothing or certainly not much, and I definitely feel as if I haven't been going anywhere. One of the ways of practicing "niksen" is to just sit and gaze out the window and this has become one of my favorite activities. Niksen is supposed to improve your creativity, better your problem-solving, and enable you to see more clearly. I'm not sure if it's done any of these things for me but I'm glad to find out that both of these writers endorse meandering and loafing and if my wife Beverly asks why I'm sitting around doing nothing, I'll refer her to these two articles.

Nora Ephron and The Alternative: I've written about Nora Ephron several times before. In addition to writing the movie "When Harry Met Sally" and writing and directing movies such as "Sleepless in Seattle," "You've Got Mail and "Julie and Julia," Ephron wrote many articles worth reading, some on the subject of aging. One of these articles was "Considering the Alternative," as in "Sure

it's bad to be old but consider the alternative" something we've heard in our retirement community many times.

Ms. Ephron, says two things in this article that have stayed with me. One is that "the honest truth is that it's sad to be over sixty. The long shadows are everywhere---friends dying and battling illness. A miasma of melancholy hangs there, forcing you to deal with the fact that your life, however happy and successful, has been full of disappointments and mistakes little ones and big ones. There are dreams that are never quite going to come true, ambitions that will never quite be realized. There are, in short, regrets." The other is: "Why do people write books that say it's better to be older than younger? It's not better." Now that's, as the saying goes, telling it like it is.

But the primary reason I bring Ms. Ephron into this "Observations" is something else she wrote, two lists, written, I believe, when she knew she had a terminal illness---"What I Won't Miss" and "What I Will Miss." The "What I Won't Miss" list includes e-mail, technology in general and bills. This, of course, led me to think about things I wouldn't miss. The first thing that came to mind were those robocalls that have become a daily intrusion into our lives. The second thing is the requests for donations that make up most of my daily mail. These come from organizations I've contributed to but always want more, and more, plus organizations I've never heard of but have somewhere gotten my name and put it into their computers. Then, like Ms. Ephron, I won't miss the bills that make up

the rest of my mail.

After this, I won't miss going to airports and having to deal with those security lines, one of the biggest waste of taxpayers' money around, and then the airplane flight itself, in a seat that barely allows you to move, a narrow aisle, a tiny restroom and inedible food, if any food at all. I also won't miss paying my taxes, knowing the many things, like so-called airport security, they'll be wasted on. I won't miss those cable so-called new shows where people from opposing parties shout at each other, interrupt each other and in between utter inanities. The same goes for all of those TV pundits, none of whom know anything but make solemn pronouncements anyway. As for television, in general, I won't miss shows with obligatory sex scenes, characters whose every other word is an obscenity, kids who are supposed to be cute, zombies, werewolves, vampires and human beings who are even weirder. I don't watch "reality" TV but I won't miss it anyway.

Okay, that's enough of my "won't miss" items. Possibly more in the future. I'll end this column as you knew I would---time for "some".

Around June 28, an unknown person passed a counterfeit \$100 bill at a garage sale in Roseville. His description was a male with a ponytail hairstyle. The subject became very aggressive and angry when the resident hesitated in accepting the \$100 bill. Finally, the resident accepted the money which did turn out to be counterfeit. If you are confronted with a similar situation, call 911 and have the police respond. Marking pens that detect counterfeit bills are available online, so it would be wise to get one before you have your event.

One of our residents recently received a text message that said the resident's account had been locked out and to call the bank.

The resident called the number listed and gave the "alleged bank employee" personal information to clear the lock-out. The resident became suspicious and called the bank's 1-800 number. The "Scammer" had already tried to get into the resident's account. Fortunately, the resident's daughter had transferred all the money in that account to another just before the incident.

On July 1, a resident in the 1800 block of Glenbrook Lane reported that when he was away from his house between 2:00 PM and 10:00 PM, an unknown person entered his residence and stole numerous pieces of jewelry. 


