Jim and Doris Merchant — From Cotton to Contentment

Jim Merchant grew up poor in Columbus, Mississippi, which is closer to Tuscaloosa, Alabama than anywhere else. He was poor, as in his daddy died when he was two and his mom worked three jobs to support him and his two brothers poor. As in, at age nine, he walked seven miles to pick cotton poor. A skinny little kid, he stuck with picking cotton, and then weeding the fields to ensure the next crop, until his high school years. There, he entered the work release program in which a teacher found on-the-job training opportunities through which students got class credits for working afternoons. That led him to learn office procedures at J. C. Penney, and, after graduation, more skills at Jackson Business College. But, the only job he could find was in the offices of the cotton mill. Armed with the fear that he would never get away from the Mississippi cotton business, and the blessing of his mother, he bought a train ticket. With twenty-five cents left over,

he set out for Stockton, where his brother was stationed in the navy.

When Jim de-trained in Stockton, he knew his brother would be at work, so he asked around, walked to an employment office, and walked out with a job. He started the next day in the payroll unit at a pencil making company. His boss gave him a two week project, which he finished in one. He moved around in the company until the man

who had hired him told him he was quitting to join a home building firm and wanted Jim to go with him. He agreed, but that firm folded under the weight of the high living habits of the two owners. Industry connections having been made, he was approached by the owner of Novato Building Supply and Mill Valley Lumber Co. He stayed at Mill Valley Lumber for over thirty years, moving up through the business ranks until he and Doris bought it.

Doris's childhood was in Novato, where she grew up in a picture book suburban lifestyle full of romping around with the neighborhood kids, riding bikes and skinning knees. After high school, she completed a two year court reporting school. She got on with the Drug Unit of the IRS Intelligence Division, now named the Criminal Investigation Division, documenting interviews of tax payers, or non-tax payers, by IRS agents. Some decades earlier, it was such agents who got the goods

Harmonicoots

Undaunted by the pandemic lockdown, the Harmonicoots are alive, well, and quite active. Our weekly Zoom sessions energize all of us. We enjoy catching up with each other's special interests. For example, Brian West shared his new sound equipment, allowing him to record his bass and chord background music ahead of time, then play the melody along with it on the chromatic harmonica.

We look forward to sharing the backstory of the songs soloists play. For example, Lou Leger performed "There's a Star-Spangled Banner Waving Somewhere," a patriotic anthem, written in 1942 by Paul Roberts and Shelby Darnell. Elton Britt's version sold more than one million copies, making the country music's greatest World War II hit. Gene Autry and Ray Price both recorded this song as well.

Belita Anatalio recorded "Moon River" on piano and then played the melody with it on chromatic. Singer Andy Williams' "Moon River" record sold a million copies. Belita also videotapes each Zoom session, giving the soloists the chance to review their own performances later.

"Fly Me to the Moon," performed by Coot Mary Ann Chittick, was recorded in 1954 by



Head Coot Bud Gardner in a Zoom session.

Kaye Ballard. Frank Sinatra's 1964 version, accompanied by Count Basie, was associated with the Apollo missions to the Moon. In 1999, the Songwriters Hall of Fame honored and inducted this song as a "Towering Song." This song was featured in the 2003 film, Down With Love.

Coot Bill Kimura gave a great rendition of "Nature Boy," a song first recorded by American jazz singer Nat King Cole in 1948. It later appeared on the album, The Nat King Cole Story. It was also recorded by Frank Sinatra and Sarah Vaughan. In 1999, it was awarded the Grammy Hall of Fame Award.

As our theme song states, the Coots are truly marching on.

Citizens Patrol/Neighborhood Watch Social Media Safety

Scammers read social media to build profiles on end users to garner identities and all the personal and financial matters attached thereto.

You should not help fraudsters who know, or learn, a little about you to figure out the rest. As you message back and forth, you may unwittingly provide names, information about residences and/or places of employment, phone numbers, places of birth, mothers’ maiden names, vehicle information—you get the idea—and vice versa. Let me give you a fictitious example: *Oh, Sally, it was so good to see your post. I am so happy for you. Jim seems like a catch. I am so excited about the trip Fred and I are taking to Disneyland at the end of June. This will be a graduation present for our grandkids, Matt and Amber (Jake and Annie’s kids). Can you believe Matt is going into high school? I think Jake wants him to go to Kennedy High, just because it is the “neighborhood” school, but Annie is leaning toward Saint Francis. She thinks that now that Jake got on with PG&E,*

they can afford the tuition. Amber will still be at Mission Middle School. Our neighbors, Kevin and Julie Brown, will feed the dog and cat. You can reach them on his cell, 916-555-1234 and I will give them your number. Please let me know if it is still 805-555-4321. Love you!

In addition to being cautious with messages, please review your social media account settings and profile stuff. Many companies offer to help you narrow your exposures. Please know that Facebook experienced a large data breach—50 million accounts—in September of 2018.

Just like email hackers, scammers harvest your social media contacts and ascertain your profile sufficiently to send messages in which they purport to be you. Your friends know you to be honest, which gives the scammers an element of credibility upon which they can base their fraud. As with email, if you get suspicious messages, reach out to the sender—not by replying—to alert them that their account has been infiltrated.

Find Out What's on the Ballot for Roseville Voters in November

Voting is one of the pivotal ways people can engage in their government. This fall brings several key differences from years past.

City councilmembers will be elected by district, instead of at large, for the first time. Roseville has five districts, three of which (1, 3, 5) are up for election this year. The other two (2, 4) are up for election in 2022. Find out which district you live in at Roseville.ca.us/FindMyDistrict

The districts for 2020 were developed based on 2010 Census data as is required by law. For the 2022 election, new districts will be developed by the Roseville Independent Redistricting Commission based on the 2020 Census data.

Measures on the Ballot —

This year's ballot will contain several amendments to the City's charter, which is essentially our city's constitution. A panel of residents formally reviews the charter every 10 years. The City Council appoints these volunteers to serve on the Charter Review Commission, which over the span of a year to get public input and to examine and discuss various amendments.

Over a thirteen-month period, the Charter Review Commission reviewed the charter to determine whether the document will adequately serve the community over the upcoming ten years.

After reviewing the Charter Review Commission's recommendations, the

Roseville City Council approved nine Charter amendment measures to be placed on the ballot. The full text of the measures can be found at Roseville.ca.us/election.

Voter Registration —

October 19, 2020 is the last day to register to vote in the November 3, 2020 election. A person, 18 years of age or older and not imprisoned or on parole for the conviction of a felony, may register to vote at any time. However registration for a specific election closes 15 days prior to that election.

Registration is permanent, and a new affidavit of registration is necessary if you have changed your name, address, or wish to change your political party affiliation.

To become a candidate for Council —

In order to run for seats in either District 1, 3, or 5, applicants must file election paperwork obtained from the Roseville City Clerk by August 7, 2020. If an incumbent does not seek re-election, the filing period will be extended to August 12, 2020.

Due to COVID-19 impacts, interested candidates must make an appointment by

calling 916-774-5200 in order to receive the required paperwork to appear on the November ballot.

Candidates interested in running for City of Roseville public office must meet the following requirements:

- At least 18 years of age
- Be a citizen of the United States and a resident of the City of Roseville
- Reside in, and be a registered voter in, the district in which they seek election at the time nomination papers are issued



From City of Roseville— Message from the Roseville Mayor

For all the emergency and crisis scenarios the City plans and prepares for, a pandemic is likely the least predictable crisis we face as a community. How long it lasts and how deeply its effects will be felt remain to be seen. We look forward to the point where we move from an active mode to the recovery phase. As we recover, we will integrate what we've learned to forge a new, stronger and better path forward.

Meanwhile with the recent rise in infection rates in Placer County and throughout California, we continue to deal with unpredictability. This increase influences other metrics that cause us to exceed monitoring levels. Last week, indoor operations of businesses including hair salons and barbershops, indoor malls, and gyms and fitness centers were closed until further notice, along with places of worship.

As health concerns result in tighter restrictions, the fallout on our economy, education system, and community continue.

Realizing our control lies in our response, the City of Roseville has been working extensively to create an environment that fosters as much success under these circumstances as possible. We opened up a supply chain to provide PPE to businesses and

nonprofits in Roseville, including distributing tens of thousands of masks. We're expanding the ability of businesses to hold activities outdoors, including adjusting policies that allow for temporary street closures and outdoor operations where not previously allowed. And we provided \$1.5 million in no-interest loans to Roseville small businesses at the start of April. It's an indefinite situation, and being able to respond to the needs in our community is key.

Perspectives vary widely on what's effective and what should be done. However, it's important to note that compliance with state guidance is a condition of state funding and reimbursement to local governments, as

well as a way to mitigate the spread that will allow more sectors of our economy to operate. We'll continue to work with our community to ensure we operate as functionally and safely as we can in this difficult, disruptive, and challenging time.

A welcoming community

Social unrest in the wake of George Floyd's death has compounded people's anxiety and frustration. In Roseville, we've received a much higher level of interest in our police policies along with continued strong support and appreciation for the dedication of our staff at the Roseville Police Department.

The RPD worked intensely to ensure that people could demonstrate and safely exercise their constitutionally protected rights. I deeply appreciate our officers' professionalism, which is even more visible during times like this.

Demonstrations were peaceful. Though emotions can run high, I want to commend our residents for the respectful behavior shown by nearly everyone expressing their voices.

As residents engaged in social media campaigns about police policies, the RPD communicated its policy alignment through direct responses, videos, and website articles. Last Wednesday, the City Council voted to add funding for body-worn cameras to the City's federal and state legislative platform. Consistent policy and funding throughout our state and nation will ensure this important tool can be effective for transparency.

We also have an opportunity to identify things we need to do or change to make Roseville a community that feels inclusive

to everyone. Our staff will be working with community partners to develop the framework to raise awareness, take stock, listen and learn from each other. The timing is important while people are focusing on this issue, recognizing that the challenges last beyond the headlines.

In closing

The feelings of uncertainty, anxiety, and frustration in our community are widespread. Questions remain about schooling, job security, the economy, social interactions, and how long it will be before we can resume life's activities in the absence of a pandemic.

It's clear we're facing more questions than answers for longer than we'd like. What we always have control over, though, are our actions and attitudes as individuals and how we treat each other as a community. It's helpful to remind ourselves that displays of aggression and impatience are within our control. And that kindness to ourselves and compassion to each other are values that will see us through this.

I look forward to the time when we begin rebuilding what we've lost and taking the best of what we've learned to forge a thriving path forward.



Executive Director Comments

One Step Forward, Two Steps Back... But We Are Moving Forward

By now everyone is aware that on July 12th the State of California required that Placer County close down dine in restaurants. This impacted both the Timbers Restaurant and the Sierra Pines Deli and was definitely a step back in our efforts to reopen our facilities as a result of the Coronavirus. The closure of our dine-in facilities will last a minimum of three weeks to August 3 but will be extended if progress on stemming COVID 19 cases continue to fall short of State parameters. Plans on reopening the Fitness Center have been largely finalized but the opening of the facilities will be delayed and coordinated with the reopening of the Timbers. The reopening of the Lodge, anticipated in Phase 4 looks to be much further out in the calendar year.

In the meantime, we continue to operate the Association on a basic level with over 50% of the employees continuing on furlough. Each department has been responsible with working with me and the Board on their reopening plans. The Pro Shop and courses remain open for both resident and public play but with restriction. This requires support from our Golf Course Maintenance Department which is nearly fully staffed. The Landscape Department remains very active maintaining the grounds throughout

the 1200-acre community; but currently with limited staffing. The Facilities Maintenance Department with reduced staff continues with maintenance of the facilities, cleaning and adjusting the physical layout of the facilities in response to the virus.

Both Timbers Restaurant and the Sierra Pines Deli remain open on a limited basis. The Fitness Center remains closed but is completing changes to their reopening plans and physical layout. Catering Department is busy rearranging events and dealing with cancellations but remains essentially inactive. The Accounting Department remains very active with the new fiscal year, dealing with the audit of the previous year, paying the bills, reworking budgets and monitoring our cash needs. Our Compliance Department is dealing with new homeowners, the recent Board Election, compliance and architectural review issues, communication in response to virus and resident concerns. Activities Department is also closed but helping to watch over Clubs and Groups, maintaining the monthly Courier publication and giving communication support.

One might say we continue to maintain the infrastructure of the Community in preparation of springing forward when we are

given the all clear. Part of that maintenance includes the major reduction of expenses to match our lowered revenue stream which has been impacted by over 50%. It also means maintaining the framework to revive our business revenue operations which have been so important to the financial strength we have seen over the last decade. I suspect there very well might be additional steps backward in the coming weeks, but we will optimistically continue to maintain basic operations while being fiscally responsible in preparation to the day we can smoothly move forward with full service for our residents and implementation of new projects and endeavors that will continue to improve the lifestyle of our Community. Be safe. Be optimistic.

Compliance Committee

While we are staying close to home in accordance with the latest state and county directives, we have taken this opportunity to "reacquaint" you with portions of our Governing Documents. One of the main reasons we all chose to live in SCR is beauty and amenities of our community. Our CC&Rs guarantee that these will remain in future years. This month will feature the following areas:

Temporary Political Signs: It is a busy political year so we will see political ads and signs in yards. Please follow the City of Roseville and SCR temporary political sign regulations. References can be found in SCR Design Guidelines, Section 3.04 (m) (iii) and City of Roseville Municipal Code, Section 17.10.180, summarized as follows: No individual sign shall exceed six square feet and not more than an aggregate of 128 square feet shall be maintained at any one time on a single parcel or lot; Temporary political signs shall not be erected more than 90 days prior to the election to which they pertain; They shall be removed within 10 days after such election.

Parking: In order to maintain the aesthetic environment that we all enjoy, on street parking is prohibited overnight. Commercial vehicles or vehicles bearing signage and/or visual graphics on the exterior shall not be parked within SCR, except for purposes of loading or unloading not to exceed four hours. This restriction does not apply to commercial

vehicles involved in construction activities during the time of construction. Also, no inoperable vehicles or vehicles not in regular use shall be stored on any lot.

Policy Resolution 2019.29 to clarify the CC&R's regarding Vehicle and Parking Restrictions (Section 8.13) was included in the recent Annual Discloser Statement mailing to all Homeowners and covers all Vehicle and Parking Restrictions.

Holiday and Special Occasion Decorations: Design Guidelines, Article II, Section 3.04 (i), outlines how long holiday decorations may be displayed: Holiday statues, artifacts and other decorative landscaping items are allowed two (2) weeks before and after Easter, Fourth of July and Halloween. For the winter holiday season, such decorations are allowed from November 15 to January 15. Displays for all other holidays are limited to the day before, the day, and the day after.

is retained and will not need to be reentered in the future.

There is a link to get help, if the sign-in name and password have been forgotten.

- After clicking on "Sign In" the Resident Website's Home page opens, which is the starting point for reaching all features.

- The Home page provides an important "life lessons"—recognizing the need to scroll. A web page may be longer than is visible on the device screen. You need to remember to scroll down to see the bottom of the page, and up to see the top.

- To recognize a "link" to other features, the viewer can move the cursor/arrow over an area. When the cursor/arrow changes to a little hand with a raised index finger, that is a clickable link to get to another web page. This is true anywhere on the Internet.

- The Home page has a menu bar beneath the photo banner. When you mouse over or click on any topic, you receive a list of links. Each link opens an informative web page.

As for the "Don'ts," computer designers wisely realized that during our learning process we might perform some actions that we shouldn't. Taking this into consideration they have built in on-screen alerts like, "Do you really want to do that?" which covers most severe actions. Also, every device has an "undo" function, which will undo the last action performed.

- For Window computers - hold Control key & tap "Z" key.

- For Apple computers - hold Command key & tap "Z" key.

- For smart phones and tablets, consult the user guides for "undo" instructions.




We regret that we were not able to meet during the month of July.

on Al Capone, but she never encountered any noteworthy bad guys. She later transferred to the Social Security Administration, where she documented disability claim hearings made before an administrative law judge, including some claims made by state prison inmates. Those hearings took her inside several state prisons. The IRS job had required commuting into downtown San Francisco, prompting her to seek the SSA job, as it facilitated her ability to move in with a girlfriend in San Rafael. It just so happened a former cotton picker resided across the street.

One evening, a visitor at Jim's place inadvertently backed into a tree in their front yard. To make it good, Jim replaced the tree




fence was built by the chief of police.

Birders

This month SCR Birders will prepare a new schedule of birding field trips that will begin in mid-September 2020 and end in mid-May 2021. The Belted Kingfisher is a large solitary bird that can be spotted near SCR creeks and ponds. It has a large blue-gray head, back, and chest band, powerful beak, and a white belly. The female Belted Kingfisher has an extra band (rust colored) across her chest. This bird



is usually seen perched or hovering over water and, when it spots a fish, will suddenly dive, head first, up to 50 feet, to catch its target. It will then fly up to a branch in a tall, dead tree to consume its meal. Kingfishers usually nest in tunnels they dig in the banks of creeks and ponds. These tunnels can be 3 to 15 feet long.



Tennis can be a great opportunity to relieve stress, socialize with others and provide much-needed exercise. Of primary importance is taking every precaution to help keep all participants safe. Because tennis does not require any direct person-to-person contact, players can enjoy the many physical and mental benefits that the game offers so long as they continue to practice physical distancing by keeping six feet apart from other players. Here are some reminders offered by the USTA and your Tennis Club Council.

Arrive as close as possible to play time. Avoid directly touching court gates, fences, benches, etc. Clean and wipe down your equipment including racquets and water bottles before and after play. Do not share racquets or any other equipment. Use new balls when beginning play. When playing, stay at least six feet apart from other players. Do

not make physical contact with others such as shaking hands or a high five. Avoid touching your face after handling a ball, racquet or other equipment. Maintain social distancing when changing ends of the court. Remain apart when taking a break and socializing. If a ball from another court comes to you, send it back with a kick or with your racquet.

After play, wash your hands thoroughly or use a hand sanitizer and leave the facility as soon as reasonably possible. Remember to be a team player by doing your part to ensure that everyone remains in a safe exercise environment, and don't forget to have some fun!

Gloria Pierrot-Dyer—From Allensworth to Roseville

I met up with Roseville resident Gloria Pierrot-Dyer at her business office in Citrus Heights. She wears many hats. She is the owner of Quintessential Quill where she runs an editing service. She is also an author of a book about Allensworth, California, the city where she grew up in a large family. She is a trained singer and church worship leader at the church her husband pastors in Citrus Heights, Living Word, and also writes songs. Her husband is bi-vocational meaning that, along with pastoring, he has a second job. He is a barber and owns two barber shops.

Gloria was born in Bakersfield into a large family. She had fifteen siblings and was number twelve in the birth order. In Gloria's childhood, her father made the decision to move the family to the outskirts of Allensworth and bought a sixty-three-acre farm. This turned out to be a wise choice since the large family obviously needed plenty of food. Her father believed that true riches belonged not to the man who has money but to the man who has food. He had grown up in the 1920s and 1930s where he saw the problems associated with the Great Depression. On the farm they raised cows, chickens, goats, hogs, guineas, and a huge garden full of greens, tomatoes, okra and sweet potatoes and other vegetables. They swapped with neighboring farmers for plums, peaches and nectarines and canned many items for the winter. Gloria remembers there was always lots of food including a huge freezer full of organically grown meat.

As a child, Gloria had farm chores including milking cows before she attended the two-room schoolhouse nearby. Allensworth School served grades one through eight. After graduating from there, she, like other teens from Allensworth, would take a bus to Delano High School. Delano was in the heart of the Central Valley of California known for its migrant workers and home of Cesar Chavez. Chavez was known as the champion for improving the conditions of the farm workers, and Gloria remembers attending high school with the Chavez children.


She has fond memories of her small town. She grew up in the 1950s when they had only one grocery store. The train stopped nearby and could be taken to Los Angeles. One of

her older brothers drove trains for Santa Fe Railroad for many years, and he would signal to the family as the train came through town.

After high school, Gloria attended California State University at Fresno, earning her bachelor's degree and teaching credential. She subsequently taught in elementary school and high school, got married, raised four children, and obtained a master's degree in Education, with a Language Arts credential at Sacramento State.

Two of the themes in Gloria's life have always been reading and writing. As a child, when her mother wanted to punish her, she would tell her she could not read for the rest of the day. Gloria remembers going to the traveling bookmobile to select books to take home and read, since the two-room school did not have a library of its own. She worked on her high school newspaper and the college paper. She has always been a good writer, and also works part-time, scoring essays for a company.

In writing her book, Allensworth: Two Tales of Triumph, Gloria drew upon her experiences growing up and her knowledge about the history of Allensworth. Allensworth was one of a series of towns founded by and for African Americans in the late 1800s to early 1900s. After slavery was abolished, many of the black people had difficulties during the post-Reconstruction period because of persecution in some areas of the United States. Most of the cities they started on their own to provide good places to live were in other parts of the United States, but Colonel Allensworth himself decided to start one such place in the Central Valley of California. Allensworth was one of



the smaller towns and was founded in 1906. It was the only town of its kind in California and the site became Colonel Allensworth State Historic Park in the 1970s. Three important events led to its demise after being a thriving town in the early part of the twentieth century. The charismatic leader, Allensworth, was killed in an accident in 1914. Then the Santa Fe Railway stopover was moved to a nearby town and the water supply dwindled and was diverted. Gloria's parents worked tirelessly in their lifetimes to see that the town of Allensworth and its story lived on for future generations.

Gloria describes Colonel Allensworth in her story, "Mrs. Allensworth's Bracelet." Set in 1910 and uses expressions from that era, the main character, Rosabel, muses on Colonel Allensworth's background and importance to the community:

"In fact, the Colonel had been a chaplain in the United States Army. Having been born a slave, after he was freed, he had joined the army, and had so distinguished himself as a man of excellent character and capabilities that he began a swift rise through the ranks, and was appointed to serve as chaplain of the 24th infantry, known as the 'Buffalo Soldiers' regiment. By the time he retired in 1906, he had become the highest-ranking colored person in the United States military. As a chaplain, Col.

Allensworth had been devoted to preaching and teaching biblical principles to his soldiers, and to encouraging and comforting them in times of need. He was highly regarded by his superiors as well as by the rank-and-file soldiers in the army. And now, as the town's leading citizen, he was universally admired as a true exemplar of what a man should be."

Author Pierrot-Dyer's book consists of three parts—the first story, "Mrs. Allensworth's Bracelet," takes place in the town in 1910 and involves a story about a young girl in an Allensworth family and her personal crisis about something she has done. The second part of the book is a novel entitled "Faith's Hope," and is a fictionalized account about a new resident to Allensworth who moved to the city on the train in 1925. The story centers around some unfinished business she left back in Los Angeles and the relationships she develops in her new town. Both stories are satisfying reads. The third part of the book is a song Gloria composed as a tribute to Allensworth, entitled "Ode to Allensworth." It can be sung to the tune of "Danny Boy," and states, in part:

"O Allensworth, you live on to remind us,
How far we've come,
And what is yet to be.

You lift our hearts to excellence and greatness.

You may seem small, but great dreams live in thee!"

Gloria reminds us that the struggles of black people in the United States have not always been easy but there is hope for change and a bright future. It is definitely a timely message even though the history of the town and its inhabitants date back over a century.

Gloria is working on a second book in her series on Allensworth. She and her husband moved to Roseville several years ago and love the quiet neighborhood they live in. They are close to freeways and parks and were able to use Maidu Community Center for weddings for two of their children.



Observations on This Virus Again

I've read that one of the effects of being in a prolonged lockdown is that you lose track of time. I can attest to this as it suddenly dawned on me that it was the middle of the month and so, time for putting forth another "Observations". With August approaching as I write

this, the matter of schools re-opening has come to the forefront. As with everything else today, this has become politicized with one party saying that students should return to classrooms and the other saying that this would be unsafe, for the teachers as well as students. I suspect that what will result will be part in-class and part online schooling. Beverly and I have two grandchildren who will be affected, and of course we're very interested in this. I wouldn't like to have to make a decision and can only hope that everything will work out.

What makes any decision regarding the virus so difficult is that it's so insidious. As we've learned, you can have no symptoms (asymptomatic) and still be infected and be able to infect unsuspecting others. You'd think that if people adhered to the rule of keeping at least six feet away from other people that would reduce infections. Since these are zooming way up, especially among younger persons, I guess many are not observing this rule. I suspect that this is, or was, true of young people going to bars, where it's hard to imagine keeping six feet away from all others. I also wonder if maybe that six feet rule isn't absolute and maybe it should be nine or ten feet. The question of wearing

masks has also become politicized, but here the answer should be evident. If Dr. Fauci and most other health experts tell us to wear masks why not do so? It's not like having to don a suit of armor, and at worst may be a little uncomfortable but it may help stop the spread of the virus and I think people on all sides of the political divide want that.

I also wrote last month that it didn't look as if there'd be a baseball season this year but players and owners finally reached an agreement and a 60-game season will start on July 23rd. There'll be a lot of testing and a lot of rule changes, among them that the National League will have a designated hitter and, in order to shorten games, any extra inning will start with a runner on second. Also, there'll be no spitting or chewing tobacco.

The NBA season will start on July 30th with 22 teams, including our Sacramento Kings, competing. All games will be played in a bubble at the Disney World resort near Orlando, Florida. As Florida is experiencing a big spike in the virus, I hope that no bug sneaks into the bubble and destroys the season. I've observed that it's impossible to keep up with events around the virus and sure enough, since I wrote the above, Governor Newsome has shut down almost the entire state of California so we here in Placer will have plenty of company. By the time this column appears in two weeks it's anyone's guess what the situation will

be, nationwide, in California and here in Placer. If re-opening led to a surge in cases then it would seem that a re-closing would lead to a decrease. However, nothing concerning this virus is certain. Hopefully, people will keep that social distance, six feet or even more.



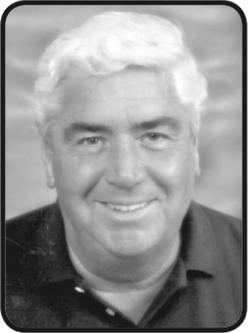
