She's had articles published in the National Business Education Association's magazine, Business Education Forum.

Her drive for excellence and, yes, that winning attitude brought her state and national honors. In 2000, she was selected as an outstanding high school teacher in the University of California, San Diego's Teacher

Central Air Conditioners/Gas Furnaces

Sun City Lincoln Hills residents will eventually be thinking about replacing their homes' aging heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems. But which brands are the most reliable? Consumer Reports researched this reliability question by sending questionnaires to their members about central air conditioners and gas furnaces. Their members responded by digging out the receipts for HVAC repairs; entering the dates, costs, and descriptions of these repairs into the questionnaires; and sending them back. In fact, they returned 23,997 completed questionnaires on their central air conditioners and 36,348 completed questionnaires on their gas furnaces. This represents more than enough data to reach statistically sound conclusions about reliability.

The results are shown in the following

rankings for "predicted reliability" of 21 brands of air conditioners and 25 brands of furnaces:


Lead actor Richard Fitzmaurice's portrayal of John Stone is a tour de force. Richard quips,

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Contributing to Saving Lives in Sun City Lincoln Hills—*The Lincoln Hills Foundation*

The Lincoln Hills Foundation (LHF) funds solutions and programs that enhance the quality of life for the senior residents of the Lincoln community. The LHF, an all-volunteer 501(c)(3) nonprofit in Lincoln Hills that designates every donation dollar to grants for programs and services, has been focused on the well-being of seniors since 2001. Currently, four of our programs are focused on enhancing the safety of our senior residents.

Project Lifesaver

The LHF was one of the initial funders for Project Lifesaver which began in June 2021 through the Lincoln Police Department (LPD). Project Lifesaver is an international search and rescue program designed to locate wandering, missing persons diagnosed with Cognitive Disorders and return them safely to their caregivers.

Combining state of the art locating technologies, innovative search and rescue methods and community policing, individuals prone to wandering can be located quickly. A personalized, lightweight battery-operated wrist or ankle band is provided that emits a silent radio frequency 24 hours a day. When the wearer goes missing, the caregiver immediately notifies 9-1-1. A specially trained search team from LPD responds using a mobile locator to find the missing person. Search times have

been reduced from days and hours to minutes, saving deployment time for searches, as well as protecting the lost person.

This program is provided at no cost for those living in Lincoln and through a grant from the LHF, a number of the locator bands have been designated for use by qualified SCLH residents. Within five weeks of the program starting in 2021, a SCLH resident went missing and was found a mile from home within 24 minutes. Currently, five out of the eleven clients in this program are from SCLH. Since the program's inception, there have been five successful recoveries of Lincoln residents.

Automated External Defibrillators for the Lincoln Police Department

Since 2014, the LHF has provided 10 AEDs for patrol vehicles and the police station.

During a cardiac emergency, an AED is a sophisticated, yet easy-to-use, medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm.

All LPD officers, emergency medical technicians, firefighters, and other first responders are trained and equipped to use

an Automated External Defibrillator. Police vehicles are on the road 24/7 and often arrive at a scene earlier than the Lincoln Fire Department. LPD, with the help of the Foundation, continues to work towards outfitting each of their patrol vehicles with the equipment necessary to respond and react to sudden cardiac events to residents throughout Lincoln

Training in CPR and AED Usage

Many cardiac events occur in a public setting—like Sports Plazas, gyms, pools, trails, golf courses, or the grocery store. In fact, there have been two lives saved by SCLH softball players trained in CPR/AED and utilizing the AED machine in the Sports Plaza.

Key personnel in SCLH lodges and fitness centers are trained to provide CPR and usage of the AEDs strategically placed in public areas. Two of our own residents experienced cardiac events in the Fitness Centers and are alive because of staff CPR training and these valuable machines.

Most cardiac arrests occur at home. The Lincoln Hills Foundation underwrites part of the cost for SCLH residents who enroll in the American heart Association CPR/AED classes provided through the Association's WellFit Department.

Upcoming sessions are on November 11, 2022, and February 8, May 10, and August 9, 2023. Watch for WellFit's announcement of the classes in the Compass. Sign-ups are through resident website https://sclhresidents.com. This class may be the most important one you ever take.

Neighborhood Watch

The LHF supports Neighborhood Watch (NW) of SCLH. Neighborhood Watch's Mission is to: Strengthen neighborhood ties; Increase personal safety and security awareness; Be the "eyes and ears" of the Lincoln Police and Fire Departments; and encourage emergency preparedness.

In collaboration with local police and fire, NW continually strives to provide a safe place to live for residents. More than five hundred resident NW volunteers provide vital safety and security information to more than 10,000 SCLH seniors through the NW website. Go to http://sclhwatch.org, for the full list of their activities.

As part of the Association's New Resident Orientation program, NW provides new residents of the community with a Welcome Packet that includes ideas and resources to enhance safety. Residents are encouraged to share emergency contact information in the event that the resident ever needs assistance.

The Lincoln Hills Foundation is committed to the mission of funding programs that enhance the quality of life for seniors. We are pleased to collaborate with such strong partners to bring greater safety and security to our residents.




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

Vision Classifications

Few people are totally without sight. Most people who are classified as "blind" actually have remaining sight. Thanks to developments in low vision rehabilitation, they can make good use of what sight they have and improve their quality of life.

Anyone with non-correctable reduced vision is visually impaired. The World Health Organization uses the following classifications of visual impairment.

When the vision in the better eye with best possible glasses correction is:

- 20/30 to 20/60 near-normal vision
- 20/70 to 20/160 moderate low vision
- 20/200 to 20/400 severe low vision
- 20/500 to 20/1,000 profound low vision
- no light perception total blindness

There are also levels of visual impairment based on visual field loss (loss of peripheral

In the United States, any person with vision that cannot be corrected to better than 20/200 in the best eye, or who has 20 degrees or less of visual field remaining, is considered legally blind.

Visual impairments take many forms and exist in varying degrees. Visual acuity alone is not a good predictor of a person's vision problems. Someone with relatively good acuity (20/40) can have difficulty functioning, while someone with worse acuity (20/200) might not have any real problems performing daily activities.

also included on our itinerary. And of course there were the ever popular cocktail hours, potlucks and BBQ's.







Catching Donaldson Trout on Lake Amador — The authors never been a big fan of hatchery fish or better known as "round tailed" rainbow trout that are planted throughout the West, it has been said that Donaldson strain rainbows of Northern California's Lake Amador are extremely cool "truck trout."

These trout are a unique blend from some of the best attributes of rainbows, steelhead and cutthroat. Natural trout mature in 4 years and weigh about 1.5 pounds, Donaldson's mature in 2 years and can weigh in at 10 pounds. You get a super-fast growing, hard-fighting fish that's



acts more like a wild then a hatchery. This trout was the brain child of Lauren Donaldson,who in 1932 at the University of Washington, began selective breeding program to create a "Super Trout." His goal was to produce a fish with enhanced size, strength, faster maturity and superior reproductive progress than its natural counterpart. At the conclusion of the

The "bite" wasn't red hot that day and he and his friends did catch a few of the Donaldson's that he was "downright" impressed. The fish fought well, they burned line and jumped quite a bit. They are very nice looking fish. The fins and tails are in better shape then a typical hatchery "bow" and they were real silver in color - not the usual grayish of a hatchery. He and his group didn't eat any, but felt they would taste pretty good based on how fat and firm they felt and looked.

Bird Group

Happy days, multiple bird group activities to report. Since last months article, we have had two birding trips and one monthly meeting. Additionally, our winter migrants are beginning to arrive, with sightings of flickers,



warblers, white-crowns, and various waterfowl.

Effie Yeaw was a school teacher and environmental educator in the Sacramento area in the 1950's. In 1955, she began leading natural history walks in an area known as Deterding Woods, located along the American River in Carmichael. She helped lead citizen groups in preserving and developing access to the river though what became known as the "Parkway". In recognition of this work, the area known as Deterding Woods became the Effie Yeaw Nature Center and Nature Area. We visited and walked a trail on September 29. The wooded bench above the river that we walked appeared to us to be ideal for water and woodland birds, but less so to the birds. We did get 27 species, compared to 36 in 2019. and added California Gull, Northern Flicker, White-crowned Sparrow and Yellow Warbler.

On October 14, we visited the Lincoln Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. Six carloads of us went on an expanded tour of the plant's basins. Historically, we toured the storage ponds on both the east and west sides of Fiddyment for waterfowl and shorebirds. This

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

year, we were able to expand to include the farmland/overflow fields on the west side, so were able to search for meadowland birds, and also for the woodland birds in the oaks ringing these fields. We identified 44 species, which is above average for an October trip. (The treatment plant is difficult to compare to all previous years, as some trips were in February, a peak time for migrants, and some trips were expanded to include Catlett Road all the way to Sutter County.) None the less, this is a higher species count than September of 2011, 2012, 2014 and 2015. See our website under Lists to see the details sightings of all trips.

At our meeting on Monday, October 10, we had Brian Gilmore of California Fish and Wildlife speak to us about the work of the state Nimbus Fish Hatchery, located where Hazel Avenue crosses the American River.

This hatchery deals with migrating salmon and steelhead trout, and additionally attracts many birds. The hatchery was built to mitigate the Nimbus dam, which blocks the fish from migrating to the shallows upriver. In the wild, the salmon do not survive their spawning, so the hatchery mimics nature and butchers the salmon, harvesting the eggs from the females and "milking" the males to fertilize the eggs. The fertilized eggs are then raised into young fish, which are then released into the river flow to go to the sea to mature, then return years later to spawn and continue the cycle.

An update on speakers for our coming meetings. Our November speaker had to delay her presentation until spring, but we will have a meeting to entertain and educate you about birds and nature. Details are being finalized as I write. On December 12, Michelle Dodge will be speaking about bird migrations along the Pacific Flyway (which includes the areas we bird).



Future day trips are already scheduled. We should have visited Vic Fazio/Yolo Bypass on October 28, followed by Gray Lodge State Wildlife Refuge on November 11, a walk along Ferrari Pond on November 25 (Black Friday after Thanksgiving), and Sacramento and Colusa NWR on December 16. The away trips will leave from the Orchard Creek parking lot, but the Ferrari Pond walk will start from the Fishing Pond parking area on Ingram Parkway. Any visiting family and friends are welcome to join us, and additional parking is available on Gold Nugget Circle

Our programs are held in KS Presentation Hall at 1:30 PM on the second Monday of the month. Most day trips leave from the Orchard Creek parking lot west of the pool at 8:00 AM unless otherwise specified. Cycling Group

Cycling in some of Europe — My wife and I recently rode bikes several times in Amsterdam. Quite an experience. People of all ages bicycle often in Amsterdam and their clothing ranged from nice suits and briefcases to flowing skirts or shorts. They go to work, stores and parks on their bikes, even in the winter, except for the worst days. Bike etiquette

in the Netherlands is very different than here. No one says "on your left", or almost anything else. Instead, if a rider is about to make a turn, he/she points in that direction beforehand, and everyone behind is expected to adjust to enable a safe turn. Many bikes have bells, but they were seldom used. I was told that ringing a bell means something aggressive like "get the hell out of my way".

One is expected to ride to the far right unless passing. Almost no one uses mirrors or helmets. Mopeds and motorized scooters are allowed on almost all bike lanes. So, one can be passed by a fast moped any time and/ or have one coming in the on-coming lane. In addition, there are many bikes that have a large storage area built into the frame, and it may have groceries in it. Riding was often a tight squeeze. This was not only true on bike lanes, but worse and more complicated on many $narrow \, roads. \, I \, rode \, several \, miles \, on \, such \, roads$ and encountered all of the above-mentioned vehicles plus cars, vans and motorcycles. The narrow roads were wide enough for a small car going in one direction and a bike going in the other. With so many different vehicles moving so close together at so many different speeds, with no helmets or mirrors, and very little verbal communication, it's amazing to me that anyone is alive in Amsterdam. However, I didn't see one accident. Perhaps the most amazing thing is that the general population is highly aware of people riding bikes and are $vigilantly\,looking\,for\,bikes\,whenever\,they\,drive$ cars, trucks, mopeds or motorcycles. Cycling

Neuropathy Relief Is Possible




Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.

This damage is commonly caused by a lack of blood flow to the nerves in the hands and feet. Every part of the body relies on blood via blood vessels, for oxygen and nutrients. Without it, the body begins to lose function.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.

As shown in Figure 2, as the blood vessels that surround the nerves become diseased, they shrivel. This prevents the nerves from getting the nutrients necessary to survive. The nerves begin to degenerate and no longer conduct sensation adequately.

When these nerves begin to "die" they cause you to have balance problems, pain, burning, pins and needle sensation, and other symptoms.

is part of the culture in Amsterdam.

Bikes are different there too. I saw no Specialized, Felt or Trek bikes, Instead, there were many brands that are not generally sold in the USA, especially Gazelle, Batavus, Babboe and Van Moof. Very few bike riders use road bikes, unlike many riders in the SCLH Club. When we did see a sleek road bike, it was typically ridden by a youngish man who was vigorously exercising. Most bikes were what we often call "cruisers", but some were "e-bikes" or "pedal assist bikes". Lots of bikes were configured to provide substantial room for a child to sit and/or haul goods. Tires were fairly big with plenty of gripping tread. The chains of almost all bikes were totally enclosed to keep the chain clean and prevent



clothes from getting caught in the chain or getting in contact with it. Many bikes had racks above the rear wheel and/or the front wheel and most had multiple gears and disk brakes. Gears were usually inside the rear hub. An accompanying picture shows a bike that has a "rubber" belt instead of a chain. That is becoming more common in Europe. I was told that belts last a very long time, but not forever. They were only on bikes with one chainring and one gear on the back wheel, with gears inside of the back hub. One brand of bike is Van Moof. It is a pedal assist bike. You can see in the picture that the frame tubes are not big and it is not obvious that it has a battery. The battery is in top tube. The front hub has a motor in it. The back hub has gears within it. Disk brakes are on both wheels. Pretty sleek and relatively light.

The infrastructure of roads, sidewalks and trails for cyclists is tremendously different than in the USA. Bike lanes are everywhere and

heavily used. Surfaces were typically asphalt or fairly even cement blocks. Almost all bike lanes were in very good condition. Bike lanes often cross other bike lanes and/or streets and they are usually well marked. Various symbols on the pavement show who has the right of way. Triangles with the point pointing towards you, as you approach, mean that you need to yield to cross traffic. If the triangles point away from you as you approach, you have the right-of-way. Some symbols mean that cars must stop and you have the right of way. Another means just the opposite. All train stations and airports were very bike friendly. The train station near us had bike racks for parking more than 2,000 bikes and it is far from the largest train station. See the picture showing just one of the long rows of double decker racks that make it easy to put bikes up top by having part of the top rack slide down to enable easy installation of one's bike. Both short- and long-range trains have spaces for bicycles. Rental bikes are available by the hundreds at stations and elsewhere. Pictured is the rental bike that I used, which was a typical orange rental bike. It had three speeds and was comfortable and fine for general transportation. Escalators at train stations and airports don't have steps. Instead, they are flat and enable a bike to be easily roll on it. A picture of that accompanies this article.

Gasoline cost about \$9 per gallon when we were in Amsterdam and France. That's quiet an incentive to ride a bike. Parking a car is often hard to find and expensive too.

We also had a little bit of bike experience in Paris. We stood at the Arc de Triumph and watched vehicles of all kinds going around Le Etoile. That's the round-a-bout where the Avenue de Champs Elysees comes in. Bicyclists and moped drivers were speeding around the 8-lane-wide circle with cars, vans, motorcycles and commercial trucks. Often bikes were riding in between 2 lanes, with a truck on both sides, and the bike rider trying to move to the outside lane to exit onto a street. It looked like a suicide mission! But, oh what a glorious place to die.


LH Swimmers and Water Walkers Club

We are also thankful that we belong to a club that promotes the enjoyment, and benefits of water exercise, with the accessibility of pools for all residents.



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
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






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Just Call Me A Veteran

Recognition Program. And, in 2003, she was one of four teachers nationally to receive the JEA's Medal of Merit, which recognizes educators who have made substantial contributions to JEA and to scholastic iournalism.

As stellar as her teaching career was, it pales in comparison with the magnitude of what Alyce accomplished at SCLH. She and her mother. Helen (past director of the Women's Nine Hole Golf Association) formed the first 9-hole ladies golf group at Lincoln Hills in 2001. It was no easy task.

"As with any new golf course and golf organization," says friend and fellow golf enthusiast, Darlynne Giorgi, "there were many, many obstacles and challenges which Alyce diligently worked through with perseverance and dedication."

It was only the year before that the Pro Shop even allowed the ladies to play together. Finally, the Lincsters (combining "Lincoln" and "links") was formed and had their first general meeting in September of 2002. Alyce was elected Captain of the group, a position she held for four years.

Over the years, Alyce created and/or chaired at least 25 Lincster tournaments such as the Home/Home, GoAwayGals, Adam/Eve, Rally for a Cure, Tin Cup, Punch Bowl, Grandmother's, Charm Girl, Boobie Tournaments and the County Fair Invitational. The Boobie Tournament was started to raise money to support research on breast cancer when several members of the Lincsters had been diagnosed with breast cancer. Their subsequent yearly Breast Cancer Tournaments were called "Rally for the Cure" and donations benefitted the Susan G. Komen Foundation to help find the cure for breast cancer. This year, the combined tournament with Lincsters and the Lincoln Hills Lady XVIII Golf Group raised \$45,800. Awesome, right?

Alyce also created and/or chaired such events as the Big/Little Sister Program, Annual LH Parade, digital Newsletter, Rules Seminars, Auction, Guest Days, Night Stalkers (night golf), Golf Swap and The Avengers. Tournament donations went to such organizations as Corena Green, Lincoln High



School Girls' Golf and several cancer-cure programs.

In addition, Alyce has been on the Lincster Board nearly every year in various positions. She's also served on the Women's Nine Hole Golf Association Board between the years 2008-22 as Secretary, Team Play Director, Communications, Corena Green, Photographer and Open Days Director.

How did Alyce end up in SCLH? She and her mother, Helen, who had belonged to Del Rio Country Club, Modesto, and had introduced Alyce to golf, took a tour through both Sun City Roseville and Sun City Lincoln Hills. When Helen saw the golf course, she was sold on SCLH and became the fifth person to move here. At the time, the Lodges weren't built yet and there were only two 9-hole golf courses, but her mother envisioned how everything would expand and flourish and knew she'd made the right choice. Alyce bought a house, too, in 1999, but had to commute back and forth to her job in Cupertino to finish her 31-year career in teaching before retiring permanently in 2000. Not to be left out, her brother moved from Colorado to Lincoln in

Bridge, Mah Jongg, and, of course, golf, a sport that lends itself to connecting with people and forming lasting friendships. In SCLH, Alyce has found the perfect environment for her retirement years. "Everyone's close, friendly and supportive," she says.

With her outgoing personality, strong leadership, and winning attitude, Alyce Stanwood has created a dynamic and lasting legacy in our community.

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
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LH Tennis Group

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

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

You will then start receiving "Alerts" to help keep you informed—sign up today!

Be the "eyes & ears" of the Police & Fire Departments: If you see something, say something. This is true for reporting unusual activity. You can now report a crime (police report) immediately on line directly to the Lincoln Police Department. Go to www.lincolnca.gov/en/living-here/report-a-problem. Continue to be the "Eyes & Ears" for the Lincoln Police and Fire Departments and always make a police report of a crime first, before making an incident report to Neighborhood Watch. There are three ways to report an incident to Neighborhood Watch after obtaining a policy report.

1. Make an online report: go to schwatch. org and click the Report an Incident button. (It's OK for a Mailbox Captain to write the report for someone else.) We need a name and phone number of the victim so Barry Johnson can contact them to get first-hand information. WE NEVER USE NAMES IN OUR ALERTS.

Vehicle vs. Pedestrian Alert: A Tragic incident occurred in Lincoln Hills early Tuesday morning 9/27/22. The 93-year-old resident was found deceased in the street. There is an ongoing investigation according to Chief Matt Alves that could take up to 30 days to complete. Residents should be mindful while driving as well as walking. Take the extra few seconds to look all around every time you back out of your driveway. Check twice to be sure when reversing your vehicle as residents may be walking nearby. If you are a walker and your eyesight has declined, try to get a walking partner, or walk on the Orchard Creek track. Don't be distracted with your phone. While wearing ear buds, be careful before leaving the sidewalk. If possible, leave one ear bud out to allow hearing traffic. Being more alert while driving or while walking could be lifesaving.

Phone Call Scam: A resident received a phone call from a scammer asking whether they had approved two very large charges. When the resident said they had not, they were "transferred" to the "fraud department" where a scammer asked for name, social security number and email. They were told that their personal information was used to launder money. Then they were "transferred" to "federal investigators" in Texas. The "US Marshall" gave his badge number and indicated

that it could be checked on the website. Meanwhile the resident's spouse checked the Internet and found that there is no website to check a badge number. They hung up but the scammer called back twice, getting more threatening each time. The resident called their bank and set up additional security with the credit bureaus.

Money Sending Scam: Beware of those tricking victims into sending money via apps such as Zelle or Venmo. Scammers have been known to request payment via Venmo for an item advertised for sale online. If this happens to you, you may not get your money back, so reserve third-party payment apps to those you know and trust

Apple Computer Scam: A resident was using her computer when it froze. A popup appeared saying Apple found a security problem and to call the number on the screen. She was normally careful, but this startled her so she called the number. The scammer told her there was a \$47,000 purchase on her account and that she needed to report it to fraud department. They gave her a number to call, answering "fraud department." They proceeded to give her more instructions and asking more questions, but she became suspicious. She told them she would call them back. Instead, she went to her bank and learned everything was fine. This was an elaborate scheme but was finally avoided by not giving in to the fear.

Geek Squad Email Scam: An aware resident received an email from what looked like Best Buy Geek Squad. The email stated that the annual premium for Geek Squad services had been renewed at \$413 "against your registered account." The email went on the say "the transaction will soon be reflected in your bank statement. If you did not authorize this charge, call 808 649-2957." The area code of 808 made her suspicious. The current legitimate toll-free numbers are 800, 888, 877, 866, 855, 844, and 833. The resident printed out the email and took it to Best Buy where they told her that they had updated their name and the logo. It was a scam. The logo for now still includes Geek Squad, but the name is different. The new name is "TotalTech."

Tip of the month: If you decide to answer a call and the person is unknown to you, just hang up!

Make a Difference this Tax Season? Volunteer with AARP Foundation Tax-Aide in Lincoln!

Do you like talking to people, meeting new people, or working on the computer? Are you looking for a rewarding opportunity to make a difference in your community? Each year, April 15 is widely met with feelings of pressure and anxiety. Some people sweat, many procrastinate – and a few simply deny it. Almost four out of five people who turn to AARP Foundation Tax-Aide are 60 or older, and household incomes aren't high. For many of them, a tax refund could mean they won't have to choose between paying for groceries and keeping the lights on. For the past 21 years, volunteers have been participating in the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program in Lincoln. We need additional volunteers to join us to help taxpayers complete their 2022 federal and state income tax returns in Lincoln during the 2023 tax-filing season.

Volunteers are needed as schedulers to make appointments for our clients. No class is required; however, all volunteers must pass a ten-question ethics test. Schedulers return the client's phone call to set up an appointment time, explain what information to bring to their appointment, and log the appointments into a Google Calendar; schedulers must be computer literate.

Greeters welcome clients, review and assemble their tax records, make sure they have brought the necessary information so

our tax preparers can complete their returns efficiently, and they manage the flow of clients being served. No computer experience is required to be a greeter!

Volunteers are especially needed as preparers to help the client prepare and e-file their returns. Even if you don't have accounting or tax preparation experience, becoming a tax preparer may be right for you if you have a knack for working with numbers. The free, comprehensive training and certification class for preparers will be held in January, 2023 in Roseville and Lincoln. Computer literacy is required to assist in providing our free e-file service.

All volunteers are asked to commit 4 hours in one day per week during the tax-filing season, February 6th (January 15th for schedulers) through April 15th. Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are welcome; you do not need to be an AARP member or retiree to volunteer.

To volunteer or for more information about becoming an AARP Tax-Aide volunteer in Lincoln for the 2023 tax season, please e-mail yorke1946@gmail.com with your name, address, and phone number. Also, please indicate if you are interested in being a scheduler, a greeter, and/or counselor (preparer). We have a need for bilingual speakers. 
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
