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Marcia Van-Wagner — Upstate NY to SCLH

Marcia Van-Wagner lost her husband, Larry Wilson, four years ago this month. The couple was featured in an interview in Sun Senior News in 2006. They were some of the first people to move to Sun City Lincoln Hills and Marcia still lives in the same Fremont model home with a casita (or cottage) that she and Larry purchased in 2001. Life can bring many challenges and different stages and, when Larry died, Marcia entered a period in her life like no other she had previously experienced. For the first time, she started to live alone. She finds that she loves it.

The story of how Marcia and Larry landed at Sun City Lincoln Hills in the first place is interesting. They took a cruise over the period of the Christmas and New Year's holidays during the Y2K transition from 1999 to 2000. Their table mates were from Sun City Roseville and invited them for a visit the following summer. Marcia and Larry visited, found out about Lincoln Hills, bought a home

in the next month. Both couples remained fast friends. While Barney and Larry have both passed away now, Joann and Marcia are still soul mates and attend B Street Theater

together in Sacramento.

Before Marcia and Larry's move to Sun City over twenty years ago, they both had careers in the Army. Marcia was in the Nurse Corps and Larrywas in the Dental Corps. They met in 1986 and married in 1989. Larry also had a dental private practice and that came to a crashing halt in 1996 when Larry became paralyzed as a result of a skiing accident. Larry made the best of it, especially in Sun City. His gregarious nature endeared him to many as he visited and conversed with people from his wheelchair. The handicap made the couple very active in accessibility awareness in the community. When Larry died in 2018, in addition to his friends from far and wide, forty staff members attended his Celebration of Life since he had been such a fixture there and so friendly. They were surprised like many others to discover that Larry suffered from dementia before his death since his friendliness had

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

No on Measure G

Western Placer Unified School District's proposed Measure G would place an unprecedented and expensive annual assessment on Lincoln homeowners if passed in November. WPUSD's proposal opens the door to assess local homeowners based on a sliding scale of \$54 for every \$100,000 of a home's taxable value in lieu of current and less expensive flat parcel assessment.

The school district explains typical homeowners would pay about \$235 annually; however, the annual assessment is more like \$324. Both estimates are excessive and inappropriate. Of nine parcel assessments currently on Lincoln homes, seven are for education: 1) WPUSD (total annual amount \$166.08; highest parcel assessment \$44.62); and 2) Sierra College (total annual amount \$46.68; highest parcel assessment \$38.62). This proposed creative financing strategy would place an unreasonable burden on the shrinking middle class, including elderly homeowners with fixed incomes.

As Lincoln and South Placer County increase population continuously, aforementioned school and community college district, along with city and county governmental agencies, plan to use our homes as their ATM revenue stream unless stopped by voters. Vote no on Measure G.



Make a Difference this Tax Season? Volunteer with AARP Foundation Tax-Aide in Lincoln!

Do you like talking to people, meeting new people, or working on the computer? Are you looking for a rewarding opportunity to make a difference in your community? Each year, April 15 is widely met with feelings of pressure and anxiety. Some people sweat, many procrastinate – and a few simply deny it. Almost four out of five people who turn to AARP Foundation Tax-Aide are 60 or older, and household incomes aren't high. For many of them, a tax refund could mean they won't have to choose between paying for groceries and keeping the lights on. For the past 21 years, volunteers have been participating in the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program in Lincoln. We need additional volunteers to join us to help taxpayers complete their 2022 federal and state income tax returns in Lincoln during the 2023 tax-filing season.

Becoming a volunteer is easier than you think! Volunteers are needed as schedulers to make appointments for our clients. No class is required; however, all volunteers must pass a ten-question ethics test. Schedulers return the client's phone call to set up an appointment time, explain what information to bring to their appointment, and log the appointments into a Google Calendar; schedulers must be computer literate.

Greeters welcome clients, review and assemble their tax records, make sure they

have brought the necessary information so our tax preparers can complete their returns efficiently, and they manage the flow of clients being served. No computer experience is required to be a greeter!

Volunteers are especially needed as preparers to help the client prepare and e-file their returns. Even if you don't have accounting or tax preparation experience, becoming a tax preparer may be right for you if you have a knack for working with numbers. The free, comprehensive training and certification class for preparers will be held in January, 2023 in Roseville and Lincoln. Computer literacy is required to assist in providing our free e-file service.

All volunteers are asked to commit 4 hours in one day per week during the tax-filing season, February 6th (January 15th for schedulers) through April 15th. Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are welcome; you do not need to be an AARP member or retiree to volunteer.








Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.

On October 5, 2022, at 6:45 PM, in the Kilaga Springs Presentation Hall, National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Solar System Ambassador, Tim Pinkney, will give a presentation on Exoplanets - the latest update from the NASA files on the Exoplanet Exploration Program. 



Astronomical Events for the Month of

October October 8 - Full Moon

This month's full Moon is known as the Hunter's Moon. Traditionally, this would be the time when people would hunt and stockpile food for the coming winter months.

October 7 - Draconids Meteor Shower.

The Draconids is a minor meteor shower producing only about 10 meteors per hour. It is produced by dust grains left behind by comet 21P Giacobini-Zinner, which was first discovered in 1900. These meteors can be seen mostly in the Northern sky.

October 21, 22 - Orionids Meteor Shower.

The Orionids is an average shower producing up to 20 meteors per hour at its peak. It is produced by dust grains left behind by comet Halley, which has been known and observed since ancient times. Meteors can be viewed mostly in the Southern sky.

October 25 - New Moon.

The Moon will be located on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

RV group here in Nehalem. Several years ago we had a better timed RV trip, mid June, to Montana where we visited many of the National Wildlife Refuges. That trip was awesome! This trip, we have missed the horrible heat and smoke in Lincoln, but still have had our share of smoke from fires in the Northwest. All and all, it has been a good trip covering the Snake River, Lake Wallowa, Grand Coulee Dam, the North Cascades, and a barely visible Mt. Saint Helens through smoke. We had no visibility to Mt Rainier and Mt Hood because of the smoke. Only birds of mention would be White Pelicans, Stellar's Jays, an American dipper, Ospreys, Great Horned Owls, White-crowned Sparrows, and Black-capped Chickadees. Especially interesting was watching the bright red Kokanee Salmon spawning in the Wallowa

We did miss a very interesting September meeting of the Bird Group, which I hear had a great turnout including more new members. Matthew Matthiessen gave an outstanding presentation on dragonflies and damselflies. These insects fall into an order of flying insects called Odanata, of which there are 116 different species in California including one that is endemic only to San Francisco. Matthew also showed photos of his trip to the Pantanal in Brazil. This area, home to 460+ species of birds and 236 mammalian species is the world's largest tropical wetland area. The beautiful Hyacinth Macaw can only be found here.

Members of our steering committee met recently and came up with a tentative schedule for walks and trips for our new season. Below is a schedule of activities for the next couple of months. A complete schedule is available on our Bird Group website. Unless otherwise noted, our away birding trips meet for carpooling at the far western end of the Orchard Creek parking lot, near the fitness center indoor pool. For longer trips consider bringing lunch or snacks and water, although we sometimes gather at a restaurant for lunch.

- Oct 10, Mon, 1:30PM: Monthly meeting, Kilaga Presentation Hall. Stephanie Ambrosia, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, will talk about Nimbus Fish Hatchery, its operations and impact on nature/birds.
- Oct 14, Fri, 8:00AM: Lincoln Wastewater Treatment Plant, Fiddyment Rd. Wastewater treatment plants are often gold mines for waterfowl, and sometimes raptor, sightings. The Lincoln plant is usually quite productive.
- Oct 28, Fri, 8:00AM: Vic Fazio/Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area, Davis. Hopefully the fields can be flooded this year to welcome returning waterfowl, which can be very abundant here.

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


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
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LH Swimmers and Water Walkers Club

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
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In Memory — James D. Pirkle Jr.

Marcia has always liked to stay busy and when she moved to Sun City, she became a director on the LH Foundation Board and continues to serve. She was one of the founders of Neighbors Indeed. In 2011, she decided to run for the Association Board of Directors and was successful. She served for a total of six years during 2012-2019—first for four years, then a year off, then two more years. She had excellent mentors and became the President of the Board for her last year of service. She still assists in the background as

one of the "Old Guard," a cadre of former board members with experience. She spends about forty hours a week volunteering in her local community.

When Marcia reminisces about her work life, she recalls her time in civilian work as a pediatric oncologist nurse. Her favorite time in the Army as a nurse was when she deployed to Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, during the First Gulf War, as Chief Nurse of a overseeing a thousand-bed general hospital. She likes to be challenged and the experience gave her great satisfaction.

Marcia also teaches a series of classes several times a year-Going Out in a Box, Getting Your Stuff Together and a class about end-of-life options. She has taught these classes since 2006. Going Out in a Box deals with how to develop plan B and why it is so hard to plan for the future. Getting Your Stuff Together includes a 145-page manual called Legacy Ledger that explains how to organize your documents for life and death. The third class helps the attendees to imagine their best death and face end-of-life decisions that people often do not want to discuss like what happens when someone outlives their money. She loves teaching and updating the classes and she knows they have assisted many people.



Marcia describes herself as a geographic orphan since none of her immediate family members live nearby to Lincoln Hills. When she first moved to California from Portland, Oregon, she had only visited twice before once to Disneyland and once to San Francisco. She has a daughter that lives in Portland, a son in Cincinnati and a sister in Arizona. Luckily. she visits them, and she has a great social support system that she has developed in Sun City. She believes that the most important thing for a healthy senior life is to have friends. Her pandemic pod social group met on Zoom every Sunday during the lockdown since they were not able to meet in person.

Marcia has always enjoyed traveling and since Larry's death in 2018, she has started to take solo adventures. She put eleven thousand miles on her car in a cross-country driving trip in 2021. One of the stops was Cincinnati where her son married for the first time at the age of fifty-one. Carts 60' and Handicap Flags 30' From Green!!

The Course Care Committee met and here's some long awaited information.

The 2022 Course Care Committee consisting of Bob Schoenherr, Dan Guth, Tom Horan, and Brian Fox met with Chad Bennett on August 16, about general course conditions, and plans for improvement from Columbia Hospitality (this is copied from Bob's email dated August 17. Additional comments were provided by Dan and Brian at the meeting.)

During the meeting, Chad was adamant about asking us to be sure that "Course Care" is first-and-foremost in all of our communications with members. It should be mentioned on every email, every tournament, every flier, etc. We are open to giving Chad a column in the LinksLetter each issue. We will be sure to make "Course Care" a very visible program from here on out.

• A. First Focus for improvement plans are the Bunkers. The Architect has made preliminary drawings for reducing/reshaping/ eliminating many of the bunkers and improving drainage. Next step is to obtain quotes from construction companies to complete the work. The plan is to start the project within the next couple of months depending on weather conditions. The goal is to reduce the number of bunkers and/or the size of the bunkers by 50%.





• B. The Agronomy team is actively hiring skilled workers (including course mowers) to get our team to where Lincoln Hills would like to have it to fully maintain the golf course.

Skilled workers (including course mowers) are competitive right now.

- C. Bridges The bridges throughout the golf course are always part of the conversation but no major renovations or work is anticipated until the bunker renovation is complete. If there are safety concerns with the bridges, those get addressed right away on an ongoing basis.
- D. Lincoln Hills has signed the contract for a new cart fleet with scheduled delivery by

November but with supply chain challenges ongoing, there is no guarantee on the delivery date. They will have lithium batteries and include "geo-fencing" to keep the carts out of certain parts of the course, like close to greens. (Can we make all private carts have the same app??). Driving too close to the greens, teeboxes, par-3's, and beyond the CART Signs is a big problem. This continues to be challenging with Private carts and we need your help to keep carts away from the greens to make sure approaches stay in great shape and free of damage caused by golf carts. There have been suggestions to have a "Wall of Shame" with pictures of violators. Since many violators are residents and have their own carts, they won't be hard to identify. Maybe post pictures on Facebook, Bulletin Board, website? The golf course has the starters, Marshall the golf course throughout their shifts to help monitor this and try their best to keep carts away from the greens.

- E. Pricing of green fees, annual Membership fees etc. 2023 will be known within a few weeks. Increases are expected.
- F. We asked that the tee boxes be mowed more often, and that divot sand be made available in boxes near all restrooms on the courses. They are making sand and seed more available.
- G. As both MGCLH and the Club are interested in Course Conditions, it is important that both entities continue to communicate to all players the need to replace divots or

use sand, fix ball marks on the greens, and keep carts 60 feet (Handicap 30') away from all greens.

The MGCLH Board would also like to share this video for your viewing pleasure. Remember this is our golf course that we love to play on. Let's take care of it.

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

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
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Voices of Lincoln Poetry Contest Attracts 91 Poets from 51 Cities in 13 States and 5 Countries

The 18th Annual Voices of Lincoln Poetry Contest was very successful again this year. The theme of the contest was "People Are... Everything." We had five new and exciting categories to challenge a poet's imagination and creativity. These included the following: "People Are Funny" "People Are Amazing" "People Are World Changers" "People Are Unreasonable" and "People Are Unpredictable."

The July 21th entry deadline attracted 91 poets. Poets submitted 202 poems in the five categories. Poets came from 31 California cities and from Grover, CO; Meriden, CT; Atlanta, GA; Barnstable, MA; Westfield, MA; Ann Arbor, MI; Carson City, NV; Merrick, NY: Rochester, NY: Canal Winchester, OH: Dayton, OH; Gallatin, TN; Denton, TX; Mansfield, TX; Hampton, VA; and Milton, WI. International submissions were received from London, England; Medellin, Colombia; Tel Aviv. Israel: and Thornhill, Ontario, Canada.

The heat increased in August and so did

Alert-burglary-8-25-22: One of our residents reported that some unknown person(s) entered his residence on the 100 block of Whitehall Lane at or around 1:30 AM. Entry was gained by cutting the screen on an open window in the rear of the house. The perpetrator(s) had apparently gained entry into the backyard by climbing over the locked front gate. Nothing has been reported missing at this time. (V3B backs to golf course, Stags Leap Ln & Hwy 193, entrances are Truchard off Stags Leap, Sawmill off Wagon Wheel)

Alert-theft 8-18-22: Catalytic Converter from a Honda vehicle parked in the Orchard Creek parking lot. This theft occurred between $3:\!30$ and $4:\!30$ PM. If you have any information about this theft contact the Lincoln Police Department at 916 645-4040.

Alert-attempted gas theft-8-14-22: An attempted siphoning occurred on Cupola Ct. The resident reported his gas cap was off, but no gas had been taken. (V38C backs to open space, Parkside Drive & Spring Valley Pkwy, entrances are Stepping Stone & Pebblestone).

Alert-gas theft 8-7-22: Early morning a resident in the 900 block of Yosemite Lane noticed and reported that half of his gas tank had been siphoned. He had just filled the tank the day prior and had parked in his driveway overnight. A police report was made. (V14 backs to golf course, Sports Plaza & open space, entrance is Ingram Pkwy).

Alert-vandalism-08/07/22: Resident parked in the 1900 block of Hidden Hollow Lane reported a smashed driver's window. Nothing was taken from the vehicle. (V31C backs to golf course & Spring Valley Pkwy, entrances are Coldwater Ln & Hidden Hollow Ln off Spring Valley).

Alerts-three fraud attempts-August 2022: There were three attempts to defraud three of our residents. In one case an alleged

"Collection Agency Representative" came to the residents home and tried to collect on an account that was not the resident's. In the second case there were fraudulent charges on the resident's account. In the third case the resident received a false invoice claiming the residents owed money on a fictitious purchase. The residents were all very alert and were able to stop the fraud attempts

Alert-suspicious solicitors (two): One was described as a White male, in his 20's, about 5' 6", & clean-shaven. The second was described as a Latin male, 20 +/- & also about 5' 6". These solicitors have returned to this home in the 2700 block of Blackhawk Lane before but left after hearing dogs barking. (V35B backs to open space & Twelve Bridges Drive with entrance being Eagles Peak off Rossi Lane). Always be aware and alert and don't open your door to strangers. Talk to them through a security screen door, closed front door, or side window. Once you open your door, you lose that physical barrier of protection. If the solicitor becomes confrontational or aggressive, call the police immediately. Non-emergency call 916 645-4040; Emergency: dial 911 or text 911 with your location.

New scam FYI: A very alert resident reported that she received a text message that her Venmo account had been disabled due to a billing problem. Message said to click on the link within 48 hours or the account would be permanently suspended. Venmo accounts are attached to a bank account and used to send or receive cash. She called Venmo directly instead. They never send text messages, only email and there was nothing wrong with the account. Venmo asked for a screenshot of the message. This New Scam Alert also applies to other cash transfer accounts such as Zelle, Paypal, etc. Do not click on links in texts or emails if you have not requested anything. Always go directly to the source. If you are not sure a phone call, email, text or letter could be a possible scam, call a friend or relative and ask for their opinion. Taking a little time to be sure could save you money and/or your identity. Take the time, or better yet, just hang up!

Thefts from garages are way too common. Open garages allow access to your home. We strongly suggest keeping your front garage door completely closed when not in your garage. Open even a foot could leave enough room for opportunist thieves, skunks, snakes, and mice/rats. If your garage is too hot, consider purchasing an insulated garage door when your current door needs replacing. Installing a security screen door for your side door could allow cooler evening air to enter your garage, without leaving your front garage door open.

Tip of the Day: When a scammer calls, don't worry about being rude or embarrassed. Scammers want your information to steal your money or identity. Just hang up!




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

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Observations on This and That

The memory that the clothespin triggered was of the time before washers and driers when clothes were hung out to dry in the sunshine.

When I read this in Kevin's e-mail my own memories were triggered. As readers know, I grew up living in a Bronx apartment building during the Depression years. Our apartment was on the third or fourth floor in the back of the building. As I recall it, our clothesline was hung to an apartment in the back of an apartment building across the way. I don't recall if our end was on our fire escape or next to a window, but it must have been someplace where my mother could reach it.

Our clothesline and others hung over the backyard of our building and the building across the way. We kids never played in these yards; they were the realms of the building janitors. I remember that every now and then a man, usually in ragged clothes, would come into our back yard and sing and our mother would give us a penny wrapped in paper to throw down to him. I guess during those depression days even a penny had some value.

I wondered what people living in the front of apartment buildings did about their clotheslines and could't think of anything. I know they were't hung from the front windows as I'm sure I would remember that. I asked my younger sister, who has a better memory than I, and she couldn't't remember either. Anyone out there who has an explanation please e-mail me (mgreensuncity@yahoo.com).

Another memory that came back was of the washboard that my mother used to clean our clothes. I also remember my father sitting on the sill to clean a window and worrying that he would fall out. He never did but it's something I would never do. Other memories somehow came back. I recall the meat grinder that my mother let me use to ground up meat for her. I think I've mentioned here my memories of the iceman coming around in his horse-drawn cart and putting a block of ice in our icebox and the coal truck delivering coal down a chute to the building basement. Then there was the "dumbwaiter" that we put our garbage bags in, to be delivered down a chute to the basement where I guess the janitor did something with them. Such was living in a Bronx apartment way back when.

Sports: I'm writing this on the Monday after the first week of the NFL and the men's final in the US Open tennis tournament, so I spent a Sunday immersed in sports. The 49ers, who should have started with a routine win of the not-exactly-powerhouse Bears, won in all the statistics except the final score. They were undone by penalties and turnovers, $especially \, penalties. \, The \, new \, quarterback \, was$ Trey Lance, who wasn't too impressive and I'm sure the "experts" who were calling for him to replace Jimmy Garoppolo will now call for bringing Jimmy back. One thing I noticed was that tight end George Kittle wasn't playing and he makes, I think, a big difference. 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
