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# Pauline Watson – Keeping Careful Watch

Before she first joined Neighborhood Watch in 2007, Pauline Watson had never volunteered for anything, content to tend her garden and stay at home. But, she soon realized how much she had missed being around people and came away from the meeting with a renewed sense of purpose while SCLH gained a dynamic infusion of energy and leadership that's lasted for years.

Born in 1940, Pauline lived with her parents, one sister and five brothers in Woonsocket (Indian name for waterfall), Rhode Island, until she was twelve and the family moved to Massachusetts. She attended St. Claire's High School, an all-girls Catholic school. She recalls the nuns "having a fit" when the boys from the local all-male Mt. St. Charles Catholic High School would circle around in their cars during the lunch hour, flirting with the girls. "The nuns would tell us to stay six feet away from the fence," she says with a laugh.

Following graduation, Pauline got a job with Grace Holmes Club Plan in Ashton, Rhode Island, a catalogue company, typing address labels used to mail customers' orders. Five years later, in 1963, her bosses were sad to see her go because her typing accuracy was phenomenal. But, it was for a good reason. She married Andy Thibodeau on October 5, 1963, a week after he graduated from RI Radio and Electronics School. Immediately following the wedding reception, they left for San Jose, California, where a boom in electronics was taking place in Silicon Valley.

The couple lived off their savings for three months until Pauline applied for a position at San Jose College (now San Jose State University). On the day they planned to return to New England if no jobs were to be had, Pauline got the call she'd been waiting for at 5 minutes to 5 pm. She was hired as a (cont' on page 29)

Dull tools are a possible cause for injury as it takes more force to work with dull tools. We also use a cut resistant gloved hand when holding the wood and a thumb guard on the hand holding the knife. These are small inexpensive safety devices when carving. Other safety items are good lighting, attention to what you are doing, basic knowledge of carving cuts, give yourself room to work so arms and hands are not hindered, make sure your work is secure by firmly holding or clamping. There is no joy to a hobby if you injury yourself.

Astronomical Events for the Month of December —

Dec 8 - Mars at Opposition

Mars is closest to Earth at opposition when Earth passes between Mars and the Sun. By contrast, at solar conjunction—when Mars is on the opposite side of the Sun to Earth—the planet can be more than seven times farther away. Roughly speaking, Mars oppositions occur every 780 days (about 2 years and 50 days). At this time, Mars is the fourth brightest object in our sky: a fiery red light that has inspired fear and wonder throughout human history.

December 8: "Cold Moon" — In December, winter sets in and the Full Moon is called the Cold Moon. It is also called Long Nights Moon, and the Moon before Yule.

Dec 13/14: Geminid Meteor Showers — The Geminids are considered to be one of the most spectacular meteor showers of the year, with the possibility of sighting around 120 meteors per hour at its peak. Unlike most other meteor showers, the Geminids are not associated with a comet but with an asteroid: the 3200 Phaethon. The asteroid takes about 1.4 years to orbit the Sun.

Dec 21: December Solstice — The December solstice will take place at 21:48 UTC. Also known as the winter solstice, it is the shortest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere. In the Southern Hemisphere, it is the longest day of the year and is called the summer solstice.

Dec 22/23: Ursid Meteors — Catch the shooting stars of the last major meteor shower of the year, the Ursids, when it peaks in the night between December 22 and 23.

Dec 23: Super New Moon — This New Moon takes place very close to its perigee—the point on its orbit closest to the Earth.

#### **Bird Group** By Ruth Baylis

By now, you should have noticed our old friends the Bufflehead Ducks are back diving in our ponds, and Hooded Mergansers are making themselves more visible. A recent drive out west of Lincoln found thousands of Snow and White-fronted Geese and to a much lesser degree Tundra Swans. Looks like winter birding season is here, but I am sure that the waterfowl are also hoping that more rain arrives soon.



Our hummingbird speakers scheduled for out November meeting, Deb and John Kirkpatrick, again had to delay their presentation describing their efforts at rescuing and rehabilitating hummingbirds. We are not giving up, the presentation is now being rescheduled for spring. In its place, we featured a replaying of the recent PBS Nature Series program on Woodpeckers, "The Hole

Story". This is a beautifully photographed and illuminative video and if you have not seen it yet, I strongly suggest you look for a recording on your TV. Here are some facts about woodpeckers. Current count is that there are 239 species in all, worldwide except for Australia, New Guinea, New Zealand, Madagascar, and the extreme polar regions. The largest woodpecker, and noisiest, that we are likely to see in North America is the Pileated Woodpecker; crow sized at 16-19 inches long. Our smallest is the Downy Woodpecker, at only 5  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 6  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches. We see the Downy occasionally here in Lincoln Hills, but the Pileated prefers denser, old growth hardwood forests like in the Sierra. There it is more likely heard drumming, than seen. The most common woodpecker that we see locally is the Acorn Woodpecker with its white cheeks, and which you will see storing or removing its stash of acorns in holes in trees. They have an interesting social behavior in



many respects. They live in social groups of about 15 individuals occupying a territory which they aggressively defend, even against its own kind. Most woodpeckers prefer forests but a couple of species are exceptions. The Gila Woodpecker is found in the Sonoran Desert of the Southwest and carves its nest in the towereing Saguaro Cactus found there. The Andean Flicker lives in the treeless open alpine meadows of the Andes Mountains in Argentina "where no woodpecker should live at all". It carves out its nest in clay clifts. So now, have I piqued your interest in watching this excellent program?

We postponed our Gray Lodge visit, scheduled for Nov11, because the ranger there said that the usual masses of Snow Geese had not yet arrived. We hope by Dec 2, and after recent rains, things will be better. We did tour Vic Fazio Yolo Wildlife area in late October where the fields were still being flooded. There was enough water to attract many species but not in great numbers. Some of us also went on to the Woodland wastewater treatment plant, which again was not as productive as past visits. Total number of species sighted was 48, on the low side compared to past trips.

Below is a schedule of upcoming events. A complete schedule is available on our Bird Group website. Unless otherwise noted, our away birding trips meet for carpooling at the far western end of the Orchard Creek parking lot, near the fitness center indoor pool. For longer trips consider bringing lunch or snacks and water, although we sometimes gather at a restaurant for lunch.

• Dec 2, Fri, 8:00AM: Gray Lodge Wildlife Area, Gridley (Butte County). Gray Lodge is known for its large number of Snow Geese but has a great and plentiful variety of other waterfowl, shorebirds, songbirds, and raptors. It is not unusual to sight a Peregrine Falcon. This trip was rescheduled from Nov 11.

• Dec 12, Mon, 1:30PM: Monthly meeting, Kilaga Presentation Hall. Michelle Dodge will be speaking about bird migrations along the Pacific Flyway (which includes the areas we bird).

• Dec 16, Fri, 8:00AM: Sacramento and Colusa NWR. This is our annual all day trip to these refuges and they never disappoint. Very often we sight multiple Bald Eagles at Sacramento NWR as well as a Peregrine Falcon (no promises!). There is always a large array of species and quantities of birds at both refuges and it is not unusual to see a Eurasian Wigeon at Colusa NWR. We stop for lunch between the refuge visits.

Did you know The Lincoln Hills Cyclists have a website? Why don't you meander over there (lincolnhillscyclists.com) and check it out.

There's lots of good stuff right there on the Home Page. There's a button for the First Time Visitors. It might be helpful for veterans, too. It will take you right to a page of descriptions of each ride group. We have 10(!) different groups, so you should be able to find one or two to your liking, whether you're looking for a ride of the flat, 20-mile genre or a more challenging fast-paced, hilly sojourn. Ride an e-bike? Gotcha covered a couple of times over. Even those weird mountain bikers have a group.

Note: While the groups tend to contain a somewhat consistent roster of individuals, you are always welcome to jump from group to group depending on how you feel or where you want to go.

Also on the Home Page is a button to take you to the Official Ride Calendar (Instructions on how to use it are there, too.) Typically, Ride Leaders post a ride the afternoon before, including a downloadable-to-your-Garmin/ Wahoo/phone route. You can print a cue sheet, too. This allows you to study the course beforehand and decide if you feel like climbing Baxter. It helps the Ride Leaders to know who is coming on a ride, so sign up the day before.

Of course, there is an application form right there, too, if you're not a member. It's \$1 a month. Yikes.

Take a few moments to read "Cycling Safety", even if you have been riding with LHC for some time. Your author is also your Safety Coordinator, so I can affirm there is important information there, because I wrote most of it. Remember, the club requires a rear-view mirror and encourages bright clothing and day time running lights.

Now, you may be saying "I don't need no stinking By-Laws", but you do, and these are brief and well-written (and necessary for our standing with the LH Association). Take a gander.

Under the "More" button at the top right of the home page you will find the club roster. It's password protected. The password is ... oh, wait, I can't tell you that. If you're a member you can get the password and have access to everyone's name, emergency contact, phone and e-mail. The club encourages everyone to have your Ride Leader's phone number in your phone and I like to suggest you also have your buddies' numbers and emergency contacts, in case something happens on the road.

Also under the "More" button are the names and addresses of several local bike shops, albeit it is a little out-of-date because there have been many changes recently (thanks Trek). I think we should add every donut shoppe and public bathroom, too.

Did I mention there is a direct link to the club's Facebook page? (No, I didn't.) There's some fun stuff there, too.

There's more on the website for you to discover. It will be like a treasure hunt. You're retired. What better have you got to do (if you're not on your bike.)



#### **Oak Tree Lane**

Just outside of Lincoln, on Hwy. 193, there is a small road sign indicating Oak Tree Lane. Just a small road leading past the Catholic church to the Corporation Yard for Lincoln, where trucks and equipment are stored atop what was once an immense project to counter the USSR and defend our country during the Cold War. Most would never even know it was there, it is so inconspicuous, but fenced off.

What is buried there, at least most of it, is a decommissioned missile silo.

Three, actually, for the second generation of ICBM's that the Strategic Air Command held to deter any Nuclear threat from the then, USSR. The first of these devices was the Atlas missile, but it was not designed to be fired from a silo. The first silo-fired missile was the Titan One, a liquid-fueled, two-stage weapon with a large "throw-weight." This meant it could carry a large thermonuclear warhead at an intercontinental range to any point in the Soviet heartland. There were three silos in Lincoln, three in the Sutter Buttes and three outside of Chico. In the middle of each complex was a huge dome of reinforced concrete which housed all the fuels and

operational controls, living quarters and two massive diesel generators for power. The actual control area was at Beale AFB, underground as well, with secure communications to all three centers. The Titan One was in the silo, unfueled, but with the warhead atop it. The firing routine was to fuel both tanks, open the huge concrete blast doors, then lift the entire missile up on an massive elevator to await for the encoded "fire" signal from SAC Headquarters. This was a slow and very complex procedure. Too slow...

The irony of it all was, that as soon as they became operational, they were already obsolete. The dynamics had changed when solid-fueled rockets, such as Minuteman and and Polaris, made Titan response time too slow to be effective as a deterrent to Soviet attack. So all that concrete and steel, all the tanks, cables and power lines still remain buried to this day. The missiles themselves, without warheads, were removed but still used as boosters for satellite launches. All that expensive equipment was useless and the cost of removal was too great to consider and never figured in the budget process. We now know that other decommissioned silos are museums and some have been sold to the public as "disaster" bunkers.

How do I know all this? I worked 12/7 as a civilian "critical path" parts manager for the AMF Corporation installing the first silos back in 1962. I knew every inch of those silos...

The 2022 World Table Tennis Team Championships were recently held, it was a 10-day event. The event was shown live on the YouTube World Table Tennis channel. Matches and highlights can still be seen on this channel. Just search for "World Table Tennis" in YouTube to view them. These high-level Table Tennis matches are incredibly entertaining and amazing to watch!

36 Countries fielded teams for the 2022 event (32 men's teams, 28 women's teams).

The first World Team Championships were held in London in 1926 consisting of a Men's singles and doubles competition.

Baroness Swaythling donated the trophy for the first Men's Team competition and is still honored by having the Men's "Team" tournament bear her name as the Swaythling Cup.

It wasn't until 1934 that a comparable Women's team competition took place in Paris. The 1934 French Table Tennis Federation president Marcel Corbillon donated the trophy for the Women's team competition, the Women's "Team" tournament is still called the Corbillon Cup.

receptionist in the Business Manager's Office. In subsequent years she went on to become the secretary to the VP of Business and Financial Affairs until her retirement in July 2000, having spent more than 36 years in her career.

Divorced in 1984, Pauline was asked by a co-worker to join her at the Wutzit Club, a singles group, which held dances in a gym behind the University of Santa Clara. One night, in walked a tall, debonair, gray-haired man, wearing a yellow sleeveless sweater and snapping his fingers to the music. It was Frank Watson, and it was love at first sight. One of Frank's buddies leaned over to him and pointed out Pauline. "See that lady over there?" he said. "That's wifey material." Frank, who had been single for 20 years after a divorce, took a deeper look at Pauline and agreed. They started dating and despite a few break-ups due to Frank's concern about their 16-year age difference, they eloped to Las Vegas on Feb. 22, 1988.

Life with Frank was a breath of fresh air. Having no children of her own, Pauline became a stepmother to Frank's children from a prior marriage: Steve Watson who lives in Sonora with his wife and has three married children and Pamela Mason who lives in Santa Rosa with her husband and has two married daughters. Even though he was older, Frank was very young at heart and encouraged Pauline to cultivate a more active way of life. "He taught me to ski at Dodge Ridge, to golf and play tennis," she recalls. The couple also got into ballroom dancing. "It was a whole new life for me,' she says.

They enjoyed traveling to places like Canada, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, Montreal, Quebec, Halifax and many cities throughout the U.S., especially the East Coast where Pauline's favorite relatives lived.

Pauline and Frank moved to SCLH in 2005 on the recommendation of a relative who said it would be a great place to retire. During her years working at San Jose State, Pauline gained many organizational skills when she managed the University's Annual Employee Service Recognition Award Luncheon and coordinated various conferences for them.

Knowing this, when attending a National Night Out (NNO) event at the Village Coordinator's house, unknown to Pauline, Frank nominated her as the Mailbox Captain for their street. That was the beginning of Pauline's commitment to Neighborhood Watch (NW). "You can blame Frank," she says with a grin.

Pauline attended a reorganization meeting of NW in January, 2007, because volunteers were needed for certain positions. After learning what NNO entailed, she walked out of that meeting as its Coordinator. Four months later, NW Executive Director, Ken Sheehan, had a long discussion with her about their need for a secretary and based on her qualifications, Pauline was a great fit. As a Director, she oversaw several villages, a position which lasted 12 years. Frank was very happy for her. "I felt I had a newfound purpose," she says. "I could see where I could help."

One of her talents was her ability to recruit over 100 candidates for Director, Village Coordinator and Mailbox Captain positions. She continues to be a Village Coordinator for 6 villages with 23 "fantastic" Mailbox Captains, who secure and maintain residents' emergency contact information and forward alerts to them.

Throughout her years of volunteering, Pauline has been recognized for her

outstanding contributions to the community. For example, in 2009, she received the NW Spark Plug Award for her efforts as Editor in making it easier to navigate their website, in organizing potlucks and performing board social functions. Especially notable was her participation in SCLH's 10th Anniversary parade and in helping the Association assemble and deliver 6,783 green gift bags for both the 10th and 20th Anniversary celebrations.


She was honored at the Lincoln Hills Foundation Hats Off II ceremony in 2011 which cited her efforts making NW "the best in the city of Lincoln and a model for other neighborhoods that want the program." And she was also nominated for the SCLH Association's Wall of Fame in 2019, in recognition for making a profound impact on the SCLH community. The Wall of Fame praised "individuals who have helped grow our SCLH community, motivated others to get involved, and remained active in the causes that they believed in so passionately."

Sadly, Frank passed away last year at the age of 97 and is buried at the Sacramento Valley National Cemetery in Dixon. On February 22, 2022, on what would have been their 34th wedding anniversary, Pauline invited family and friends to a memorial where she displayed a large posterboard filled with photos of their courtship days and life together. At 2:22 pm, the group went outside and tooted horns in celebration.

Now Pauline fills her days tending to her beautiful garden, adding to her large milk glass collection which she began nearly 60 years ago, and working on jigsaw puzzles which she temporarily displays on her dining room table. She also volunteers as an AARP scheduler, setting up free appointments for individuals when tax time is here.

Someone once sent Pauline a card which read: "Congratulations! You're the kind of person who makes the world a better, brighter place." With her many contributions to SCLH throughout the years, she has, indeed, made our community a safer and more neighborly place.


#### The process...



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#### Make a Difference this Tax Season? Volunteer with AARP Foundation Tax-Aide in Lincoln! BY GARY STEER

Do you like talking to people, meeting new people, or working on the computer? For the past 21 years, volunteers have been participating in the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program in Lincoln. Volunteers are needed as schedulers to make appointments for our clients. No class is required; however, all volunteers must pass a ten-question ethics test. Schedulers return the client's phone call to set up an appointment time, explain what information to bring to their appointment, and log the appointments into a Google Calendar; schedulers must be computer literate.

Greeters welcome clients, review and assemble their tax records, make sure they have brought the necessary information so our tax preparers can complete their returns efficiently, and they manage the flow of clients being served. No computer experience is required to be a greeter!

Volunteers are especially needed as preparers to help the client prepare and e-file their returns. Even if you don't have accounting or tax preparation experience, becoming a tax preparer may be right for you if you have a knack for working with numbers. The free, comprehensive training and certification class for preparers will be held in January, 2023 in Roseville and Lincoln. Computer literacy is required to assist in providing our free e-file service.

All volunteers are asked to commit 4 hours in one day perweek during the tax-filing season, February 6th (January 15th for schedulers) through April 15th. Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are welcome; you do not need to be an AARP member or retiree to volunteer.
