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

Joseph Campbell, renown author of The Hero's Journey, once said, "A hero is someone who has given his or her life to something bigger than oneself." Sun City Roseville has had a hero living among us since 2018. His name is Greg Morgan and he'll deny six ways to Sunday that he's a hero, but, in actuality, he is.

Born in 1957, Greg was raised with six brothers and one sister in Southington, Connecticut, a small, rural town with apple orchards and a nearby ski area. He got into skiing when he was 12 and aggressively competed throughout the state until his love for music won out and he became a trumpet player. His passion for music brought him to Los Angeles at age 18, but when the band he was invited to play with broke up, he journeyed to Sacramento and joined the Freelancers, a Drum and Bugle Corps. For the next three years, he'd march with the Freelancers for half the year, then return home to Connecticut for the other half.



When it was time to get a real job, Greg began driving trucks for Lucky Stores, which he did for 22 years. He also taught music on the side, got married and raised two sons. Steven, who lives in Sacramento, is in the medical profession and Brandon, who works for a graphic printing and design company, lives in Rocklin. Although the marriage ended after 25 years, Greg is on amicable terms with his former wife and sees his sons regularly. "They come over for dinner all the time," he says.

In 1992, Greg met a member of Ski Patrol, who invited him to go skiing. Once he got a glimpse of Greg's skill on skis, he urged him to join Ski Patrol, which involved first aid, avalanche control, rescue work, chair evacuation, and emergency medical treatment. This part of Greg's multi-faceted life lasted 22 years.

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

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


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Fine Arts Club

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

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
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Boomer Generation

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City Distributes \$350,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds to Area Non-profits

The City of Roseville received \$17 million in one-time funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 to assist with City and community needs. The Roseville City Council allocated \$1 million of these funds to the Roseville Grants Advisory Commission for distribution to the Roseville community over three years.

The first year of grant awards from the ARPA funding \$350,000 was approved by the City Council at its November 3, 2022 meeting. The Grants Advisory Commission reviewed the grant applications and made funding recommendations to the City Council using the current commission guidelines which follow the City Council budget priorities.

The following are the organizations and their projects or programs funded in the first round of grants from the ARPA funds.

In order to distribute this cycle's ARPA funding prior to the end of the calendar year, an off-cycle grant application and review process was developed. Non-profit programs awarded funds in the regular FY 22/23 grant funding cycle were not awarded duplicate funds. Priority was given to applications that requested \$20,000 or more for one-time programs or projects, and operational support for new programs or expansion of current programs.

The remaining \$650,000 in grant funding will be distributed over the next two fiscal years. The Center for Digital Government is a national research and advisory institute focused on technology policies and best practices in state and local government.

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Easier Access to City Finances and Budget Now Available

Expanding on the City of Roseville's relaunched open data portal, Open Roseville, the City has launched Open Budget with detailed data dedicated specifically to the City's budget and finances. "Open Budget is a cornerstone of our commitment to transparency. It will give our residents a better understanding of the City's revenues and spending in a user-friendly, interactive and informative way," said Dominick Casey, Roseville City Manager. "This is important because as a full-service city with our own utilities, Roseville's financial data is complex," he added. "This site allows anyone to look at our budget and spending from the highest level down to individual line items with graphical displays that best suits them."



"Roseville has a AA bond rating in due partially to extremely high-level of professionalism and integrity the City displays in publicly developing the budget and tracking our spending", said Dennis Kauffman, Roseville Chief Financial Officer and Assistant City Manager. "Open Budget is the next step in making the City's financial data easily accessible to the public."

Initially, three City budgets dating back to Fiscal Year 2020-21 will be available. Data from the current fiscal year's budget will be updated quarterly. Open Roseville launched in December 2021. An interactive Capital Projects Explorer with an easy-to-use dashboard tracking city capital projects, costs, timelines, photos and maps is scheduled to be available in early 2023.

His presentation included some key points in staying safe:

- Sleep with your bedroom door closed
- If your house is on fire, get out as quickly as possible because a flashover can happen in less than 3 minutes
- When cooking, make sure you are not drowsy from meds or other substances. -- Always stay in the kitchen while broiling, frying or grilling food
 - Wash the fan and hood filters to avoid

grease build-up.

- Do not use your oven or stovetop to heat your home.
 - Clean your home dryer vent
 - Do not store 2 butane tanks together
- When staying in a hotel, never stay above the seventh floor because ladders do not reach above 7 floors. Always be aware of your exit route.

Hey, Watch Your Cans!

Let's face it, seeing trash and recycle bins out front each week is not attractive but we to do it in order to get our trash picked up. We try to minimize the negative effect by managing the timing for putting the trash out and back. Unfortunately, some neighbors 1) put their cans out way too early, 2) pull them back way too late, or 3) don't put them away correctly, that is, they end up in front of the gate – not behind it.

Last year the Compliance Committee did a trash can canvas and identified well over one hundred trash cans out of compliance. Most were just not stowed properly, a very simple homeowner responsibility. As a result, association resources were spent sending out letters, performing reinspection's, and then sending more letters for those that still did not comply.

The Design Guidelines, in Section 3.02(r) and Appendix C, state that trash bins are to be completely hidden from view when stowed. A little tough to do in some cases. The convention is to move them to the curb no sooner than 24 hours before and returned to the storage area no later than 24 hours after pickup. Ideally, put them out the evening before pickup but put them back soon after pickup.

Open space lots face an additional hurdle to comply with the stowing of the cans. They don't have the solid fence to hide the trash cans from view. They must build a trash enclosure, hide them by vegetation or store them in the garage. Refer to Exhibit C in the Design Guidelines, for the "Trash Enclosure Specification" information. The problem here is that on open space lots the trash cans can be seen to various degrees.

The Compliance and Architectural Committees have met and are implementing changes to mitigate the problem. These are: 1) allow some exposure of the trash receptacles but not to not exceed 20% (versus the current zero percent), 2) allow painted lattice to be attached to tubular steel gates and fences on lots where necessary; 3) have the trash enclosure be located farther back along the side of the house behind the side door, and 4) eliminate white as a color for the enclosures. Hopefully, these changes will help.

The message here is that we all need think about how we manage our trash cans.

That is, be timely by not putting them out too early and not leaving them out beyond what is reasonable. It helps with community ambience and, also, curb appeal. We constantly have home sales in progress and would appreciate potential buyers not seeing errant trash cans on display. Perhaps, you can even be a good neighbor if you see your neighbors can(s) out late, help them out and put them away for them.


around the ponds and afterwards, going to a local restaurant for lunch. This trip should take about 6 hours.


Gary Pyle and his partner Al Appo from

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
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

Greg's excellence in first aid. She offered him a part-time job at Sutter working as an emergency room tech. "I got more excited about first aid, seeing the doctors and nurses working," he says. So, he went to school for two years to become a licensed paramedic and began working for a 911 ambulance in Stockton.

Then in 2014, he applied to become a Critical Care Flight paramedic. This involved flying in a helicopter with a nurse

as part of a team of rescuers. After spending another year getting a critical care certification, Greg jumped into a job that he considered "the greatest job in the world." He and his team might, for instance, land on a freeway and provide transport to higher care facilities for crash victims. While in the air, they would manage the complete care of the person, be they adults or children or even women going into labor. "We're like an ICU only in a helicopter," Greg says. "I pinch myself every time I go to work. I'm so lucky to be able to help people."

His most memorable rescue was with a critically ill seven-year-old boy whose family was unable to get high level care for him. Greg and his partner immediately flew the boy to Sutter Hospital in Sacramento. It was a short trip, but a critical one because the child was septic and had no discernable blood pressure. By the time they got him to Sacramento, he was nearly in cardiac arrest and was put on a machine that took over all his bodily functions. The boy spent nearly a year in the hospital, but, miraculously, survived. When he went to Greg's base in Marysville for the first time, Greg and his team took him on a helicopter ride so he could experience what he had missed before. Greg looks forward to his reunion visit every year. Another activity

he enjoys is taking his



dog, Rusty, a therapy and certified service dog, to visit chemo patients at the Cancer Infusion Center at Rideout Hospital in Marysville. Seeing them reaching out to pet his dog and talking to them about their own pets is very rewarding, but heart-wrenching, for Greg. "I cry every time I leave the place," he admits. "But it's my way of giving back. I volunteer to give happiness to people."

This year Greg received a plaque honoring his 20-years of service in Emergency Medical Systems. He works two days a week, and the shifts are 24-hours each. But Greg's stamina is strong and his love for his line of work keeps him energetic and committed.

Greg moved to SCR in 2018. He had a friend who lived in the first Del Webb community in Phoenix and when he visited, Greg knew he'd want to live in a Del Webb community because he loved golf and an active community. He's a member of the Men's Golf Club, the Pickleball League (playing with an elite group of players who compete against top-notch players in other communities), Boomer's and Bocci. He gets calls all the time from people who want him to join their clubs and groups, but he's had to turn them down because full-time rescue work is his top priority.





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Keep Online Purchases Safe this Holiday Season!

Yes, that wonderful time of year is rapidly approaching and we're sure many of you can't wait to get clicking online, or don your virtual elbow pads to get hunting for bargains at the mall.

While we all wish for an enjoyable holiday shopping experience, we know there are criminals out there who have

a clear desire to spoil your fun. Just as we find more advanced ways to catch criminals, they create new ways to steal your hard earned money. But... there are precautions you can take that will help from becoming a victim.

While shopping online:

- Create strong passwords that are difficult to guess. Include numbers, capital letters and special characters like !?&a. Don't use the same password for all your logins and if you have to write them down to remember, keep the list locked away somewhere at home.
- Only shop and pay at reputable sites that have a URL starting with https://.
- Never use a debit card to shop online. Credit cards have more added protections.
- Validate who emails are really coming from. If you click on the sender's name, you'll often see that the email is actually not from Target, Walmart or Amazon.
- · Avoid opening emails that suggest you've won a prize. You haven't. Never click to open a file from someone you don't know. It could contain a virus that takes control

of your computer and sends all your private data to a criminal.

Protect those packages:

- Once you've ordered items, make sure they're not stolen before they make it inside your house.
- Track your packages and encourage delivers are placed in a hidden area.
- If you're going to be out of town, don't order items to sit on your front steps, have it delivered to a trusted neighbor or use a service like Amazon locker.
- If you're away from home for an extended amount of time, ask USPS to hold

If you believe you're a victim of package or mail theft, file a report on the Roseville Police Department website: www.roseville.ca.us

Whether you shop in stores or online, it's really important to frequently check your bank and credit card accounts. If something appears in your account that you don't recognize, immediately call your bank or card issuer.

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

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

Astronomical Events for the Month of December

Dec 8 - Mars at Opposition

Mars is closest to Earth at opposition when Earth passes between Mars and the Sun. By contrast, at solar conjunction—when Mars is on the opposite side of the Sun to Earth—the planet can be more than seven times farther away. Roughly speaking, Mars oppositions occur every 780 days (about 2 years and 50 days). At this time, Mars is the fourth brightest object in our sky: a fiery red light that has inspired fear and wonder throughout human history.

December 8 - "Cold Moon"

In December, winter sets in and the Full Moon is called the Cold Moon. It is also called Long Nights Moon, and the Moon before Yule.

Dec 13/14 - Geminid Meteor Showers

The Geminids are considered to be one of the most spectacular meteor showers of the year, with the possibility of sighting around 120 meteors per hour at its peak. Unlike most

other meteor showers, the Geminids are not associated with a comet but with an asteroid: the 3200 Phaethon. The asteroid takes about 1.4 years to orbit the Sun.

Dec 21 - December Solstice

The December solstice will take place at 21:48 UTC. Also known as the winter solstice. it is the shortest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere. In the Southern Hemisphere, it is the longest day of the year and is called the summer solstice.

Dec 22/23 - Ursid Meteors

Catch the shooting stars of the last major meteor shower of the year, the Ursids, when it peaks in the night between December 22 and 23.

Dec 23 - Super New Moon

This New Moon takes place very close to its perigee—the point on its orbit closest to the Earth.
