Nancy Whitaker - A Community Icon

Herman Melville, the renown American novelist, once said, "We cannot live only for ourselves. A thousand fibers connect us with our fellow man." Resident Nancy Whitaker, _ is someone who exemplifies that extraordinary ability to connect with humanity in ways that significantly improve the fabric of our lives.

Nancy was raised in a small rural town in Indiana with two brothers and three sisters. Her mother was a stay-at-home parent, while her father founded an Aluminum Foundry in Winchester, Indiana, in the early 1940's. His business extended to a second foundry in Red Key, Indiana, along with a small shopping center, a group of apartments, and a warehouse in nearby Muncie, Indiana.

After graduating from high school in 1960, Nancy enrolled at Mills College in Oakland, California, and obtained a degree in Chemistry and Biological Science four years later. Then she was awarded a scholarship to Indiana



University Medical Center to do graduate work in the field of Biochemistry. In the summer of 1964, she interned at NASA, Ames Research Center, in Sunnyvale, California, working for

the Exobiology Division, then moved back to Indiana to attend IU.

However, when she felt torn about staying in Indiana, she released her scholarship, moved back to Oakland and married Nelson Pickering Willetts in the winter of 1964. Since he was working on an MBA from the University of California, Nancy became the sole breadwinner, working at Kaiser Foundation Biological Research Laboratory in Richmond, California. A year later, she accepted a job as a lab technician at NASA in their Biological Adaptation Division which researched single cell organisms living in extreme environments.

Then Nancy received an offer to start a doctorate program in Chemistry at the University of Maryland, with the understanding that she would eventually return to NASA. Two years after divorcing her husband, she did return to California and continued to work on


The first of two episodes in each show is from the radio show, "My Favorite Husband," (later aired as a television show) that featured superstar Lucille Ball. In our episode, directed




Oh My. 2022 is now over. We've had a great year. We finally got back into dancing and getting together with fellow dancers and friends. We've had a year of dancing and practicing





Astronomical Events for the Month of January

January 3,4-Quadrantids Meteor Shower
The Quadrantids is an above average
shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at
its peak. It is thought to be produced by dust
grains left behind by an extinct comet known
as 2003 EH1, which was discovered in 2003.
Unfortunately, this year the nearly full moon
will block out most of the fainter meteors.

January 6 - Full Moon

The Moon will be located on the opposite side of the Earth as the Sun and its face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Wolf Moon because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled outside their camps. This moon has also been known as the Old Moon and the Moon After Yule.

January 21 - New Moon

The Moon will be located on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.







Bird Group


December and January are usually the busiest dates on the birding schedule, and this season is no exception. Two birding expeditions will be reported on in this article, with two additional events to go in December. The Sacramento NWR, Christmas Bird Count, and the January Staten Island Sandhill Crane trips will be covered in the February article.

December 12 was the December regular meeting, featuring Michele Dodge with a photo tour of the Great Pacific Flyway. Michele lives on the American River, and her talk centered on that location. Her photos and talk showed the pair of Bald Eagles who nest in the Orangeville area, where they have had seven years of successful nesting, and lay 2 eggs on Valentines Day. Other birds featured were Phainopepla, Bullocks Orioles, Osprey, herons and egrets. An amazing set of bird photos from our region.

The January 9 meeting will feature Cliff Feldheim, speaking on "California Trout Organization — Impacts of Water Management on Fish, Birds and Wildlife. For the February 13 meeting, "Birding at the End of the World — Falkland Islands, South Georgia Island, and the Antarctic Peninsula" will be presented by Suzanne Hutchinson and Sal Acosta, reporting on their November trip.



On the Friday after Thanksgiving, about 15 birders gathered at Ferrari Pond to check out our shore and water birds. This year, with the ongoing drought and lack of early rain, we did not include the Salt Pond (although there are water and birds there now). Despite the reduced scope of the ponds, it still was a success with 40 species spotted. This is well within the range of previous years and did have some surprises. We saw several dozen Ring-necked Ducks, the first sighting in 10 years on this outing. We also saw 4 Wilson's Snipe (a record number), and a Sora for the



The following week, on December 2 four carloads journeyed north of the Sutter Buttes to Gray Lodge State Wildlife area for our annual trip. The weather cooperated, providing a pleasant, sunny day amidst rainy days. The birds also cooperated, with 77 species viewed, an all-time record count. Over the previous ten trips, we had a total of 102 species, of which we saw 74, plus spotting White-breasted Nuthatch, Savannah Sparrow, and American Avocet for the first time on this trip. Sightings of Downy Woodpecker, Wilson's Snipe, and American Bittern were also uncommon over the years. With the nice weather, birds were scattered and ponds were not carpeted with Snow Geese and White-fronted Geese, but there were more than enough to view,. Ponds bordering our route to Gray Lodge provided most of the shore birds seen, along with Tundra Swans.

Scheduled birding trips are Staten Island/ Cosumnes on January 13, leaving at 8:00 AM. Subsequent trips to be announced via email and the web site.

Our programs are held in KS Presentation Hall at 1:30 PM on the second Monday of the month. Most day trips leave from the Orchard Creek parking lot west of the pool at 8:00 AM unless otherwise specified. Please check Events on our sclhbirders.org and your email for updates and weather cancellations. Bird lists for each trip are posted on the website under Lists.





Saved by the Ball: A Story of Baseball as Medicine

When an individual's will to survive is being severely tested, sometimes the most unexpected of events can dramatically change that trajectory.

3:00 a.m., September 26, 2019

The loud thudding sound my wife Sherry heard was my body ramming headlong into a wall in our home. The force of my collision broke a toe on my left foot.

As it turned out the broken toe was the least of our worries.

It was the day after my 73rd birthday and though I had been running a fever between 103 and 104.5 degrees for two days, the advice nurses Sherry contacted on three separate occasions consistently advised her that there was nothing to freak out about, a little more Tylenol and some rest should fix me up. But the sound of my body slamming squarely against that wall changed all of that. Sherry had seen and heard enough. After finding me leaning, disoriented against the wall she contacted 9-1-1. Soon I found myself surrounded by EMTs at the top of the eighteen-step staircase leading to my front door. A gurney was not an option and there was no way I could walk down. It was decided that placing me on a chair and carrying me, Roman Emperor style, was the best solution.

Luckily I was too fever crazed to sense the humiliation.

Determining that I had pneumonia was the easiest tasks for the doctors during my tenday hospital stay; finding a way to successfully treat it was far more elusive. Six different antibiotics were tried and failed. Various scans showed the infection roiling through my right lung while the fever persisted. With each passing day despair engulfed both Sherry and me. The nightly ritual of Sherry leaving me alone in my hospital room was taking an increasingly heavy toll.

Enter the 2019 MLB Playoffs.

Despite being residents of Northern California since 2011, my wife and I remained diehard Washington Nationals baseball fans. As lifelong D.C. area residents we were dedicated fans. We even traveled to Florida in March to see our team in Spring Training, a journey that continued after we moved to California

Being a fan of the Washington Nationals

is not an easy mission. From 2005-2011 they were among the worst teams in baseball. When the club became good—four division titles in six years—the playoffs were a nightmare. Not awful terrible; rather they were just good enough to be soul-sapping terrible. For example in the deciding game of the first round of the 2012 playoffs they squandered an early 6-0 lead as well as one of 7-5 entering the ninth inning.

They lost 9-7.

During those "good" years they never won a playoff series. Consequently Sherry and I had few delusions about Washington's chances in 2019 as a lowly wildcard team in the National League postseason. Our low expectations of the team were on par with our less than positive outlook for my health. But we reasoned the one-game winner-take-all contest would at least serve as a three-hour break.

Sadly the television in my room could be charitably described as 1980s quaint. It hung from the ceiling in the far corner of my room and had a volume limit that could barely surpass the nightly ruckus of the hospital's hallways. Watching at home Sherry would give me her input of the event by phone. The 2-0 deficit in the 8th inning was no surprise. Only six outs remained before yet another first-round elimination.

What is this?

While the Nats loading the bases in the bottom of the 8th should have been encouraging, such diabolical teasing by the baseball gods had happened to us too many times before. But then Juan Soto, a 19-year old rookie, smacked a single to right that should have tied the game. But then something bizarre occurred.

The ball bounced away from the opposing right-fielder and a third, tie-breaking run scored. Sherry shrieked into my ear; I coughed then shrieked as well. Miraculously Washington held on to win. A glorious surprise to be sure. This victory had qualified the team to play the LA Dodgers, owners of the best record in the league, in a five-game series. Despite the low chance of success, at least we now had a nearly nightly distraction from the events punctuating my daily life in the hospital.

A Familiar Script with a Surprise Twist

Washington lost two of the first three games of the series but, hey, this was the second round of the playoffs, pure gravy for a victory-starved D.C. fan. Even better news was on the way. My doctors decided to send me home with two new, powerful antibiotics. While Washington again faced elimination at least now Sherry and I could watch the game together.

After a full day of monitoring my

temperature, taking pills, testing my blood oxygen level and moderate walking within the house, baseball time in the evening was a welcome relief. Remarkably Washington won the next two games; the Natswere moving on to the first Championship Series in their history.

The daily battle with pneumonia was taking an emotional backseat to the craziness of the MLB playoffs.

The next two weeks was filled with positive benchmarks. My fever disappeared, the side effects of my meds were survivable and our baseball team flourished. They flattened the St. Louis Cardinals in four straight games and a World Series against the best team in the American League, the Houston Astros, was up next.

"Now this REALLY is all gravy", I told Sherry sharing my sincere belief that it was wonderful if not miraculous that a Washington baseball team was in the Fall Classic. After all the last time a team from D.C. won the World Series was 1925. The teams split the first six games setting up a decisive game 7.

These games had become a wonderful distraction. Mornings were spent reading the voluminous news stories in the Washington Post detailing the previous night's game while the evenings were spent in front of the tube. The medical toil of each day was reduced to a palatable bridge from the morning dispatches and the evening telecasts.

The final game was a classic. Trailing, as usual 2-0 in the late innings, Washington's Howie Kendrick—a man who could have easily been elected Mayor of the city in a landslide hit a homer that clanged off the right field pole. As he rounded first base Fox's Joe Buck calmly announced "And the Washington Nationals take the lead." Remarkably three years later when I see replays of that moment I still get

When the final out was recorded in Washington's 6-2 victory Sherry and I sat speechless on the couch. It took at least a minute before we could mount even a muted response. We watched in near silence as the new champs celebrated on the field. We had followed these players for years, traveled thousands of miles to see them play and now they were at the pinnacle of their domain.

For some this entire saga may make little or no sense. But for the two of us there is no doubt about one component of the story. The mental pain resulting from the life-threatening battle that had been fought to conquer my pneumonia had been kept at bay by the joy of watching "our" guys win a most unlikely championship.

Two Roads Diverge

From that nadir of late September, 2019, my health has been steadily improving. By March of 2020 I was declared cured. Despite the threat of COVID-19, my medical chart has been spotless.

For our beloved Nationals, however, life has not been so kind.

In 2020 and 2021 they finished last in their division. In 2022 they were by every measure the worst team in all of baseball. As one Washington sportswriter stated, "These guys are not only bad, they are even hard to watch." People ask me how can you still so passionately care, why do you torture yourself day in and day out rooting in vain for the lousiest team in MLB?

The answer is actually quite simple.

When I was mentally at the lowest point of my life, the Washington Nationals were there to help me through, allowing me the breathing room to regroup emotionally and affording me the strength to take on and conquer what had been an extraordinarily rough physical patch. Now they are at the low point of a three-year decline, a time when they could certainly use all the support anyone could muster for them.

When you think about it, it is the least that I can do.



LH Table Tennis

Olympics and Table Tennis—Table tennis first became an Olympic sport in the 1988 Seoul Olympics.

Olympic table tennis currently consists of four events: men's singles, women's singles, men's team, and women's team, and was expanded for the 2020 Tokyo Games to include mixed doubles, thus bringing the number of events to a total of five, with each event competing for a (gold) medal. Singles matches are best-of-seven games, with the first player to 11 points (by a margin of two points)

winning each game.

Teams consist of three players and team matches consist of four singles matches and one doubles match, each played as best-offive games.

Only three men and three women can qualify and be fielded from each Country. The maximum number of players who can play in the Olympics is 86 men and 86 women.

The format for the singles tournament is 64 individual players, with no more than two from each Nation, and the team tournament consists of 32 teams, 16 men's and 16 women's

In order for only the best play in the Olympics, all players must participate in Olympic qualifying events.

For the 16 teams, one team in each continental qualification event, Africa, Asia, Europe, and Oceania will qualify. Two teams will qualify from the Pan America qualifying event. Nine teams will qualify from the World Team championships, and one team is automatically qualified from the host country.

Singles and the 16 Mixed Doubles teams follow a similar qualification process

In singles, all events follow a knockout (single elimination) format. Each match consists of the best four out of seven games to 11 points, where the winner must win by at least two points. Players have two serves in a row, except when the points score reaches 10 all, after which the serve alternates each point. At the end of each game the players will swap sides.

The Team competition is held in 2 stages.

The teams are divided into groups of 4 and each group of four plays a round robin. The following stages are knock-out rounds. The first-place teams of the round robin flights proceed to the next knock out round and eventually play the semi-finals and finals for the gold and silver medals. The second-place teams of each group and the semi-final losing teams continue on to play knock out rounds for the bronze medal.

Olympic Table Tennis was most recently played at the 2020 Tokyo Summer Olympics which took place in 2021, with the following results: Men's Singles: China Gold & Silver, Germany Bronze, Men's Team: China Gold, Germany Silver, Japan Bronze, Mixed Doubles: Japan Gold, China Silver, Taipei Bronze, Women's Singles: China Gold & Silver, Japan Bronze, Women's Team: China Gold, Japan Silver, and Hong Kong Bronze.

The 2020 Tokyo Countries represented were: Australia, Brazil, China, Chinese Taipei, Croatia, Egypt, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Hungary, Japan, Korea Republic, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Serbia, Singapore, Slovenia, Sweden, and USA.

The 2020 USA Men's table tennis Olympians were Kanak Jha, Nikhil Kumar, and Zhou Xin. USA Women's Olympians were Lily Zhang, Liu Juan, Wang Huijing.

Our table tennis sessions here in Sun City look a lot like the Olympics we also Here in SCLH, the Lincoln Hills Table Tennis Club (LHTTC) look a lot like the Olympics! We also play women's men's, mixed, and singles table tennis, just like the World Table Tennis Championships!

We play indoors where it's nice and cozy these cold days. We play on 7 tables, beginner to advanced. We play on a drop-in basis. Reservations are not required. Please wear non-marking tennis shoes. Loaner paddles are available.

Play times are Sunday 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM (except the first Sunday of the month when play starts at 12:30 PM), Tuesdays, 6:00 to 9:00 PM, and Fridays 8:00 to 12:00 PM.

We occasionally set up a Newgy Robot table tennis ball machine on Fridays to use for intensive training and practice.





her doctoral thesis. In 1977 she finished her research which was the study of the oxygen requirements of an enzyme of a lipid desaturase, found in a yeast, to possibly relate it to early evolution of life on earth. She had successfully completed the work for her graduate degree and was awarded a Ph.D. from the University of Maryland.

Life as she knew it





was never the same after Nancy met the love of her life, Larry Whitaker. When they met in 1973, Larry was 31, an electrical engineer, recently graduated from Stanford University, and President of Halcyon Communications, a budding telecommunication company. "From the time I first met Larry my life became a living dream," recalls Nancy. They married in a backyard ceremony in April 1974.

In time, Larrywas able to successfully place Halcyon Communications on the American Stock Exchange and their life became a mix of business and pleasure. They were able to travel around the world, conducting business but sight-seeing throughout Europe, Asia, and the far East. They cruised to Singapore, Japan, Indonesia, Bali, Australia and New Zealand.

During these years, Larry's children,

Deborah and Clayton came to live with them. Nancy embraced parenthood and remains close to them and their children.

1989 brought a series of crises. Larry had surgery for a thyroid tumor, his chief engineer in India passed away, and the Loma Prieta earthquake occurred, centered just 11 miles from their house in Silicon Valley. They decided to move.

After moving to Cool, California, they bought acreage, built a large home, and acquired a small herd of Arabian horses. Larry started a small electronics company, VLL aboratories. "I became very active in the company," recalls Nancy. "I became the VP of finance, office manager, receptionist, and technical writer." When their main contract was cancelled, they closed the business, sold the ranch.

and eventually moved to Sun City Lincoln Hills in 2003.

Over the years. Larry's participation in the Cameron Park Rotary Club got the couple involved in a humanitarian project in Vladivostok, Russia. Prior communication with the newly formed Rotary Clubs in that region indicated there was an epidemic of hepatitis, type B, among a majority of the health care workers. Although she was not in Rotary, Nancy collaborated with Larry to find a source for funding to purchase enough vaccines to vaccinate at least the youth in the area who, if they were born with hepatitis B, would likely develop liver cancer and die at a young age, like 30 or so.

The Rotary project was able to buy 83,000 doses of vaccine for something like 25 cents per dose, whereas at normal cost would have been around ten dollars a dose, beyond the budget of Rotary International. The project's aim was to enlighten Russia, which had stopped the health care in that region because of the collapse of the Soviet Union, to promote vaccination, thereby improving their medical practices.

Nancy, recalling the success of the project, says, "Recent pictures of Vladivostok reveal greater development in the infrastructure, like bridges to the islands that we took a ferry to for a picnic held in our honor."

Once they moved to SCLH, the couple got involved with Neighborhood Watch and other clubs while Nancy, recognizing Larry's leadership skills, urged him to run for Board of Directors, a position he held in 2004.

Along came 2008 and a financial crisis throughout the United States. Richard Pearl, currently Treasurer of Lincoln, led a committee to investigate the City of Lincoln's finances. Nancy and Larry were called upon to assist him, so she became the recording Secretary and wrote the section on the Lincoln City library. Together they compiled documents from the committee and presented their findings to the Lincoln City Council, but their efforts were ignored. Nancy thought, "There went a year's worth of work." But the information collected was valuable to the residents who learned more about the operations of the city. And, in time, the city adjusted its financial management and avoided the possibility of bankruptcy.

Meanwhile Larry devoted much of his time to producing websites, first for Neighborhood Watch—the alerts he created are still going out today—and then for the City of Lincoln, a product that lasted for about two years until the city budgeted for their own website.

"There is so much more that I could say about the incredible character of my dear husband," says Nancy. "But I summarize our relationship to say it was exciting and rewarding. He took exceptional care of me for more than 47 years." A charismatic dynamo, Larry piloted his own plane, skied, sailed and enjoyed a 36-hour day, taking Nancy with him on a whirlwind journey through a life of achievement and contribution to humanity.

Sadly, she lost him to pancreatic cancer last year, and SCLH lost what his company newsletter once described as "the dreamer, the doer, the visionary."

Currently Nancy continues to enjoy social activities at SCLH and is planning trips to Europe and Panama with relatives and friends.

"Sun City Lincoln Hills is a perfect place for people of our age," says Nancy, "especially if vou've lost a loved one."

Webster's dictionary defines "icon" as a person widely admired, especially for having great influence or significance in a particular sphere. Nancy Whitaker is, indeed, a cherished icon in our community.


2023 Tax Season is Here!

Lincoln AARP Foundation Tax-Aide volunteers are ready to assist you with your 2022 tax returns! This 40-year-old program provides free income tax return preparation and counseling for low to middle-income taxpayers with special attention to those 60 years and older. This joint IRS and AARP Foundation administered program is staffed by volunteers from Lincoln who are trained and IRS certified each year to ensure they know about and understand the latest changes and additions to the U.S. tax code. These returns will be filed electronically (e-file) with the IRS and California Franchise Tax Board. which allow clients to have their tax refunds deposited directly into their bank accounts within two weeks. Nationwide, volunteers are using computers to complete and e-file approximately three million tax returns to meet the April 15th, 2023 filing deadline for 2022 income.

This service will be available by appointment only this year at Granite Springs Church, 1170 E. Joiner Parkway. People can make income tax preparation appointments by calling 916-258-5065 beginning January 16, 2023. The Intake/Interview Sheet is required of all clients and may be downloaded or completed online (locations will be provided when your appointment is scheduled). This form is also available in the Orchard Creek Lodge lobby, Kilaga Springs library, Lincoln City Hall Lobby, and Granite Springs Church.

Interested people can also call 1-800-AARPNOW to obtain the location and hours of other Tax-Aide location near them.


As we look forward to an exciting year it is important to remember that the real work of our tennis club volunteers goes on behind the scenes. We represent tennis players to

LH Swimmers and Water Walkers Club


Club member Hagai Narkis has come a long way, since his first swimming adventure, at the age of six, in untreated pool water at a local kibbutz in Israel. "Since the water was used for irrigation, it was common to swim alongside frogs and other wildlife creatures," he says.

He continued his swimming throughout elementary school and high school, and adds, "I was never a fast swimmer, so I focused on long distance events, such as 1500 meters in the pool and 3.5 K in open water. This helped me to develop endurance and love for the water."

Narkis and family moved to Lincoln Hills in 2006, with the lap pool at Kilaga Springs being a motivating factor. He has been a club member since its inception and serves on the Steering Committee.

Today he spends 2 hours at the gym, 5-6 days a week, alternating between the workout room and the pool. Swimming gives him a chance to relax after his gym activities, and the water eases his joints and muscles. He also uses aides, such as paddles and kickboards which help him focus on form and maintain muscle strength and flexibility.

Narkis suggests new swimmers should start by viewing swimming videos online. (Swimming and water walking videos are available to club members in the Club Drop Box.) Once a swimmer is able to complete a few laps, the Swimming and Water Walkers Club



offers free mentoring sessions to club members. These sessions, are usually scheduled at the Kilaga Springs pool, the first week of the month.

"These experienced club mentors can give one advice on how to improve style, with proper breathing techniques, and proper arm motion or kick", adds Narkis. He plans to continue his swimming activities for a long, long time.

This service is FREE to Lincoln residents. Citizen RIMS provides direct access to current information. It allows the public to view near real-time mapped incidents and more. Lincoln residents can view police incidents and sort them by date range and incident type, view lists of vehicles reported stolen, access 30-day history of arrests and daily 24-hour media bulletins summarizing incidents. Lincoln residents can subscribe/ enroll to receive daily or weekly Lincoln PD email alerts and much more. The website is a great tool for residents to review and obtain current information on what is happening in their neighborhoods and provides links to Vacation Home Checks, Directed Patrol Requests, and Security Camera Registration. Note: A Link to the Lincoln

Police Department "Project Lifesaver" (a special watch-like wearable device for those loved ones who may wonder) is also available through the Sun City Lincoln Hills Neighborhood Watch website under Security/ Resources as "Project Lifesaver."





Observations on Sports...

I've written in this space how happy I was to see the resumption of sports after an interruption due to Covid. Readers will also know that I closely follow the fortunes of the San Francisco 49ers and our own Sacramento Kings. As an old New Yorker I also keep track of the football Giants, once a proud franchise but of late a dysfunctional operation. I'm happy that the fortunes of both the 49ers and the Kings are, at least of this writing, on the rise. The Giants surprised their fans by somehow getting off to a good start this year but have now gone back to their customary losing ways. At least they may have achieved the level of being mediocre instead of being terrible.

The 49ers have been up and down the last fewyears. Quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo took them to the Super Bowl a few years back, then a series of injuries, including to Garoppolo, set them back the next season, then last season Garoppolo took them to the playoffs. For all of Jimmy's efforts, this season the quarterback reins were supposed to have been passed to a youngster named Trey Lance, who suffered a season-ending injury in the first game. Luckily, the 49ers had kept Garappolo around and he stepped in and the team was doing well until Jimmy too suffered a season-ending injury.

Enter a rookie QB named Brock Purdy, who led the 49ers to a win over Miami and then, most recently, to a resounding win over

Tom Brady and his Tampa Bay Buccaneers. So, the question is: were those season-ending injuries to Lance and Garappolo the best things that could have happened to the 49ers and will Brock Purdy be the next Tom Brady and lead them to a Super Bowl win? Time, and the rest of the season, will tell.

The Kings, as all fans know, haven't been to the NBA playoffs in 160, no, 16, years and this season, with new players after some trades and a new coach (still another one) were touted to have a fighting chance. Then they started the season by losing their first four games, then righted the ship and started winning and looking like a good team, and now on an Eastern road trip have stumbled a couple of times again. That, and their best player, De'Aaron Fox, has been hurt. So, Kings fans, like 49er fans, have high hopes but also lingering fears.

So, why is all this so important? First, sports offer a welcome diversion from a world that, to put it mildly, has gone off the rails, and not just because of Covid. Readers will not need me to go into detail but can just tune into TV news at any given time. Secondly, sports give us sports fans an outside interest, teams that we root for; we live and more recently mostly die, with their wins and losses. But what I think is most compelling about sports is its unpredictability, the unexpected emergence

of players like Brock Purdy, the miracle upsets by teams that have no right to win, the feeling when watching that anything might happen.

One more thing, in sports it's the players' skills and characters that matter, not where they come from, who they know, what influence they have. I remember that when I played handball at MacCombs Dam Park, the center of handball activity in the Bronx, we had judges, lawyers, college students, garment district workers, mailmen, even a movie critic. It didn't matter, what mattered was how well they played and how they comported themselves. Were they pros or loudmouths, good winners and losers or braggarts or crybabies?

This is not all. I did a little research, i.e., Googling, and it turns out that watching sports is also good for you. A British study found that "half of respondents (49%) believe that cheering on a team is good for their mental health. Some 51% of men and 46% of women surveyed felt this way. One in two people say that watching a sporting event helps them socialize more with family and friends. More than a third of respondents (35%) feel included as part of a community."

The study concludes that "We can see from these results how essential the presence of sports has been, improving socialization with friends, bettering mental health, and making fans feel part of a tight-knit community."

And this is not all. Science researchers have found that watching sports "hits it out of the park for boosting cognitive health. One scientist explains: "when we're watching sports we begin to begin to place ourselves in


the athlete's shoes thanks to mirror neurons primarily found in the right side of the brain. The activation of these neurotransmitters allows spectators to generate similar hormone production such as feel-good dopamine, which helps with mood regulation. The brain stimulation explains why sports fans get booked."

Many artists sing the song "Help Me Make It Throught the Night". Nightime can be the worse part of the day. Climbing in to an empty bed, next to your partner's side, is traumatic. 

Market Update

The market has obviously changed, and Sun City, while being unique, is not impervious to the overall dynamic of the market. If one were to look at the closed sales from March through June, versus September through December there is roughly a 25% drop in the number of closed sales. While interest rates greatly affect the first time home buyer because they generally put very little money down meaning that interest rates play a much larger role in slowing down this segment. The same is not true in Sun City where buyers usually have large down payments and or pay cash. So there are additional forces at work. One is the inability of sellers who want to move into Sun City to sell their existing home at prices they want. Another is a huge increase in the number of options for those who want to live in an Adult Community. New home builders caught on to the demand and as a result supply of available homes in Adult Communities has shot up. Giving buyers many more choices.
