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
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Bob and Renelle Jorgenson — Savoring the Sweetness of Life

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

The Foundation and Sunshine Services Relationship — A Bit of History

Caregiver Relief/Individual Care

After the Foundation was created Lew Ritter, then president of Foundation, contacted the SCR nurses group seeking support for the creation of the caregiver relief program. The Nurses group declined-citing personal legal responsibilities concerns.

The Foundation supported the establishment of the Caregiver Relief Program but did not want to administer it. So a volunteer group of coordinators was established by a group called Sunshine

Foundation invited interested caregiver agencies to interviews. They then selected agencies for residents to choose from. In the beginning there were five agencies. Foundation asked Sunshine Services to handle the administration of the new program. The new Caregiver Relief Coordinators interviewed residents to establish their eligibility. Eligible residents selected the agency among the several agencies listed on their list. The residents only paid a minimum amount and the agency submitted a bill to the Foundation for the rest of the payment. The Caregiver Relief Program was officially launched in 2001.

Today, The Caregiver Relief program

continues to run in that same manner except there is only one outside agency servicing our residents and qualified residents are eligible to receive 4-12 hours of service per week.

Golf Courses Web Pages: Also in the "Amenities" menu, the link to "Timber Creek & Sierra Pines Golf" now has a right-side link (bump out) to "Resident & Member Golf Information". That web page is maintained to provide the golf course information a resident may seek, including "Upcoming Golf Cart Inspection" dates.

Important Website Hints —

• Forgotyour Resident Website Password? You will need to click on the login screen link, "Forgot password". The new password that you enter must adhere to the following:

Contain 12 characters or more Use both upper and lower case letters Contain at least one number

Contain at least one of the following characters: #?@\$% $^$ &*-

To avoid this problem, it is strongly suggested that you keep a secure, written record of all your passwords.

- When entering a new password, you may be prompted to identify yourself as "Not A Robot", by choosing a certain object in several pictures. This feature, known as "reCAPTCHA", is common for many websites. It is used to keep automated software (bots) from engaging in abusive activities on the website. It helps keep our Resident Website information more secure.
- The instructions on our popular "Classified Ads" feature now contains a reminder that ads can be renewed to appear for longer than 14 days, if a request is submitted before the 14 day deadline, using the original confirmation email.
- A "Contractor & Vendor Referral Resources" link has been added to the "Hamburger Button" (far right on the black menubar). It provides external links to websites that offer referrals and ratings for such services.

Activities Events Schedule —

To plan your entertainment and trips for the coming months, take advantage of the

Activities Department web page, which can be accessed from the "Community" menu in the black menu bar or by the button at the bottom of the Home screen. Scrolling down, at the right side are the ACTIVITES AT-A-GLANCE links (light green text) to the next four events. Directly above this area is the link to the "Activities Calendar", which contains information about all the future activities. On the calendar, by clicking on the title for a particular date, you can access the details for this event.

Now that we are in a new year and all the festivities have subsided, it is time to get back to basics. For us at GAC, that means keeping abreast of new laws and letting you know what they are.

What's new in 2023? Here are a few:

- Minimum wage increases to \$15.50/ hr. (SB 3)
- Increases the share of paid family leave provided to lower-income Californians.

Extends increase in benefits from 55% of wages to 60% to 70% depending of income. In 2025, the bill requires an increase of the benefit to 70%. (SB 951)

- -Prohibits law enforcement agencies from using the DNA collected from a sexual assault victim from being used in the investigation of unrelated crime. (SB 1228)
- Provides free phone calls to people detained in Calif prisons and jails. (SB 1008)
- Limits the use of creative expression, such as rap lyrics, as evidence in criminal cases. (SB2799)
- Sets up a section on the state Attorney General's office website to report stolen items. (SB 1700)
- -Gives law enforcement the ability to keep those in custody who are accused of organized retail theft. (SB 2294)
- Prohibits disclosure of a person's immigration status in open court in a criminal case by any party unless approved by a judge. (SB 836)
- Allow pedestrians to jaywalk (or cross the street outside of an intersection) without being ticketed, as long as the crossing is done when it's safe to do so. (AB 2147)
- Boost housing production and affordability by turning unused retail space into homes and communities. (AB 2011)


or a Sporting event. Call myself or Shirley Conzelmann if you would like to host a table. It really is a fun event.




Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.



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



Birders

Audubon leads a Christmas Bird Count (CBC) every year, between the middle of December and the first week of January, in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Latin America and the Caribbean. The results of this count are used by researchers, biologists, wildlife agencies, ranchers and farmers to study the long-term health of bird populations,



strategies to protect birds and their habitats. The December 2022 count was the Audubon's 122nd annual CBC, the longest running science survey in the world.

SCR Birders regularly participate and are $assigned \, to \, counting \, the \, number \, of \, birds \, within$ the boundaries of SCR on the assigned day

(December 29 last year). Despite the cold, wet weather, they identified 60 species for a count of 1828 birds. Although the species count was nearly the same as recent years' counts, the number of birds was significantly higher. The most counted bird, by far, was the Cedar Waxwing (447) with the American Robin (146) and White Crowned Sparrow (142) in second and third place. Eight species came in with only one sighting each.


On February 2, Birders are scheduled to go to Cosumnes River Preserve near Galt. The last time Birders visited this site, they identified 34 species, including the Northern Pintail, Northern Shoveler, Gadwall, White Pelican, Marsh Wren, and Lesser Yellowlegs. This trip should take 4-6 hours. Another trip

in February will be to the Julie Partansky Pond in Davis on February 16 where 32 species were recorded the last time the Birders visited, including the Ruby-crowned Kinglet, American Coot, Wood Duck, Song Sparrow, and American Wigeon. This trip should take 4-5 hours. The first trip in March will be on March 2 to Veterans Park in Roseville. 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

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
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Cycling Group

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From City of Roseville: Persistent Rainfall Allows Roseville to Store Water in Underground Aquifer for Use in Drier Times

As California experienced significant rainfall to start the New Year, the City of Roseville began storing water in the groundwater basin using specifically designed groundwater wells.

The heavy atmospheric rivers bringing much-needed rain meant Folsom Reservoir quickly gained a substantial amount of water, and releases were needed for flood control.

Instead of those water releases being lost, Roseville captured an initial water surplus of nearly 60 million gallons from the reservoir to store within the underground aquifers for future use. These aquifers can hold twice the volume of water as Folsom Reservoir.

"Because of our investments in groundwater management more than two decades ago, we are reaping the benefits to start this New Year by accessing water that would be lost otherwise and banking it locally for later," said Sean Bigley, assistant director for Roseville's Environmental Utilities. "Over the past two years, we banked more than 325 million gallons of water and used it to manage drought conditions."

Just a year ago, Roseville banked enough water to fill 160 Olympic-sized pools. Later in 2022, that water was used as drinking water supplies to reduce reliance on Folsom Reservoir.

Using Folsom Reservoir water to replenish the groundwater basin provides multiple benefits, including:

- Capturing water that would have been lost for local use
- Banking water in "underground reservoirs"— like a savings account— to use in a coordinated fashion depending on water conditions and alleviating surface water supplies when surface water is scarce
- Actively replenishing to ensure a healthy groundwater basin as required by state law and as a good steward of our water resources

Depending on the need to create additional winter flood capacity at Folsom Reservoir through the rainy season, there may be more opportunities for the City to store water in the aquifer.

Roseville's actions are part of a regional strategy to adapt the Sacramento area's water system to climate change by storing—or "banking"—excess surface water underground during wet times for later use during dry times.

"Now is the time to be banking this water as this storm series rolls through," said Jim Peifer, Executive Director of the Regional Water Authority, which represents nearly two dozen water providers serving 2 million people in the Sacramento region and is leading efforts to develop the Water Bank. "Roseville is doing its part to build a reliable water system."

Safety First — **Safe Winter Driving Tips**

Winter, without a doubt, is the most dangerous season for driving. Snow, fog, ice and strong winds can all cause hazardous driving conditions. Preparing yourself, and your vehicle, before heading out onto the roads is key to arriving safely to your next destination.

Prepare your vehicle before you travel — Lower outdoor temperatures lead to lower tire pressure. Ensure that your tires, including your spare, are at the vehicle manufacturer's recommended inflation pressure. If you don't know what that is, it's usually on a label on the driver's side door frame. It's best to check tire pressure when the vehicle is cold. (It has not been driven for at least 3 hours.)

Also, check the status of your tires at least monthly, as well as before each major road trip. The tread depth should be at least 1/16th of an inch, and the tread and the side walls should be free of any cuts, bulges or cracks. Make sure to also check your spare tire. If you find any damage, take your vehicle to a professional for evaluation.

On a regular basis, check your vehicle:

- Batteries, along with the charging system, to make sure they're operating efficiently.
- Lights- headlights, turn signals, brake lights, emergency indicators and even interior lights- are all operating.
 - Fluids, make sure that you have

enough engine coolant in your system, and your windshield fluid reservoir is topped up.

• And... make sure your gas tank is full and be cautious when it drops below 50% full. For electric vehicles, make sure they are fully charged. Always have a plan for where you can

recharge them on your journey.

Prepare yourself and your family — It's a good idea to carry jumper cables and a flashlight in your trunk, along with flares or other kinds of emergency markers in case of a breakdown.

If you're likely to encounter snow or ice, pack a snow shovel, broom and ice scraper. Inside the vehicle take blankets, a cell phone, car charger, water, food and any prescription medications.

Prepare your route — Check the weather forecast for your journey. If it looks bad, think about delaying until the weather improves, or going before the worst weather hits.

Make sure you let someone know what route you're taking and when you expect to arrive. Call them when you do arrive.

Your driving style — Driving conditions are likely to be more dangerous. Leave a good gap between you and the vehicle in front. Avoid sudden acceleration, especially when pulling away from a stop. This will reduce the risk for wheel-spin especially on ice and after rain.

Most of all, SLOW DOWN! In poor conditions, speed is never your friend.


