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## Mary Jordan — Pieces of Mary

Mary Jordan's first book was published in the fall of 2022. Her book is titled "Pieces of Mary." It offers a personal and intimate look at the disjointed mental health care treatment of a registered nurse who has sixty years of field experience. Chronicling her life as it turned upside down when diagnosed with bipolar depression at the age of seventyeight, Mary presents her harrowing story of mental illness treatment in our "broken mental health system of care." Mary had three medical hospitalizations as a direct result of complications from the care she received in the inadequate and limited services available in today's for-profit healthcare system. Chronicling her experience as a patient, Mary's memoir demonstrates how "access to the patient-centered care model has been left behind." Now in her early eighties, she has reclaimed her life and wants people to benefit from what she has learned, sometimes the hard way. She states in her book, "In keeping with

the 11th Tradition of Alcoholics Anonymous to protect my identity as a recovering alcoholic I am writing under a pen name."

Mary Jordan has resided in Lincoln Hills for over twenty years. The house that Mary is

currently living in is her third in Sun City. She explained that she has been fortunate in her involvement in owning real estate over the years. The current home she has, much like her, has been through a total replenishment, both inside and out. The previous owners had the home for a while and were in declining health, so by the time it came on the market, Mary was able to purchase it and give it a new life. A bright and welcoming home, it is her happy place.

Mary's life started out in a family of eleven children. She was the fifth oldest and second of seven daughters and sister of four brothers. The family were renters in a fourplex flat in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The house was a three-bedroom, one-bath railroad flat with both parents present including an alcoholic father. Mary at the age of seventeen enrolled in a nursing training program. After Mary completed her training program in nursing

Our beginner class began in February and is in full swing. The next beginner group will start in January 2024.



The Lincoln Hills Astronomy Group (LHAG) will hold its general membership meeting on Wednesday, March 1, 2023, in the Kilaga Springs Presentation Hall. The meeting will begin at 6:45 PM and include a presentation by guest speaker Tim Pinkney, NASA Solar System Ambassador, who will present and overview of "Artemis, the first three missions".

The LHAG meetings are open to all Sun City Lincoln Hills residents at no charge for up to three meetings. If residents choose to join the LHAG, they must remit an annual membership fee of \$15.00 per household.

The CIG is a sub-group of the LHAG and focuses its meetings through lectures and discussions on astrophysics, the branch of astronomy concerned with the physical nature of stars and other celestial bodies. The CIG meetings are currently led by guest speaker Charles Hunt, retired astronomy and physics professor at American River College. Interested parties are welcomed to join in the often lively and multi-layered discussions about the origin and workings of our universe.

For the March 20 meeting, Professor Hunt will give a crash course in nuclear physics as you explore what makes stars shine. Zero in on the Sun, working out the mass it has consumed through nuclear fusion during its 4.5-billion-year history. While it's natural to picture the Sun as a giant furnace of nuclear

bombs going off non-stop, calculations show it's more like collection of toasters; the Sun is luminous simply because it's so big.

The TIG is another sub-group of the LHAG and open to all SCLH residents and guests. Most sessions ("star parties") involve members who set up their telescopes for viewing solar system planets/moons and other interstellar deep space objects. LHAG residents are welcomed to join these sessions and experience the fascinating Universe through a telescope. These sessions also allow participants to bring their old or new telescopes and learn how to set up and use them to view the Cosmos.

The TIG Star party telescopes are set up prior to sunset in the upper tennis courts of the SCLH Sports Pavilion. The next star party is scheduled for Tuesday, March 21st (sunset at 7:40 PM). Future star party dates can be found on the LHAG website at www.lhag.org. Star party sessions are subject to weather and seeing conditions.

Observations on this date will take place during a new Moon, allowing improved observations of prominent interstellar objects such as the Planet Mars, Orion Nebula, Andromeda Galaxy, Pleiades and Beehive star clusters, the beautiful double star of Aldebaran, and many open and globular star clusters.

March 7: Full Moon – "Worm Moon"

The March full Moon is known as the Worm Moon, and it was originally believed this was due to the earthworms that would appear in the soil at this time. However, more recent research has indicated that some Native Americans gave the Moon this name when beetle larvae could be seen emerging from trees.

March 20: March Equinox — The March equinox is the first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere and the start of fall in the Southern Hemisphere, by astronomical definitions.

March 21: New Moon — Dark nights a

few days before and after the Moon reaches its New Moon phase on March 21 are the best nights to do some night sky watching.



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

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


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#### **Bird Group**

March is here, and our feathered friends (and their observers) are getting ready for spring. Birds are pairing up, whether for raising a new family here, or migrating to distant grounds first. Migrating birds who winter here often arrive in flocks, then split apart for the winter. Now, many, such as Cedar Waxwings and Northern Flickers, are gathering together to feed up before heading north or into the mountains to breed.

I have two outings and one meeting to report on. The first outing, perhaps our longest driving trip, was into the foothills east of Stockton, and the second was a local walk in the 12 Bridges area up a new trail east of Coyote Pond.

For many years, we have traveled south to the town of Linden to head into the foothills. This is a sparsely populated area, and so often provides us with views of shyer raptors and open area birds. The afternoon brings us to Copperopolis Reservoir and Salt Spring Valley Reservoir, with waterfowl and surrounding woodland birding. Our trip this year was on January 27, and the recent storms seemed to reduce our numbers to only three carloads, which proved handy when our normal return route was blocked by storm damage. We did view 44 species, which is on the lower side of average for this trip. Highlights included Lewis's Woodpecker, Ferruginous Hawk, Loggerhead Shrike, Osprey, Burrowing Owl, and Common Goldeneye.

On February 10, great weather and a local trip brought out a large crowd for Coyote Pond and Upper 12 Bridges/Whistler Pond walk. Historically, we have combined Coyote Pond and the walking path along South Orchard Creek to 12 Bridges Middle School. New trails east of Covote Pond have been installed by the city of Lincoln to serve the new homes in the area, and this is what we explored. In terms of species, we got 53 species, very similar to the previous walks. This despite the exchange of riparian woodlands and vernal pools for open valleys and additional ponds. Less common observations were of Hooded Merganser, Common Merganser, Common Gallinule, Wilson's Snipe, and Acorn, Downy and Nuttall's Woodpeckers.

Our February 13 meeting was a photo show of Sal Acosta and Suzanne Hutchinson's trip to the penguins last fall. This extensive trip,



with 3500 miles of ocean travel after 8500 miles of air travel, included landfalls at the Falkland Islands (and its penguins), then South Georgia Island (and its penguins), and finally multiple stops on the Antarctic peninsula, returning to Ushuaia, Argentina. They viewed 8 species of penguins, plus albatross, skuas and other sea birds that skim the sea surface, landing only to breed.

On March 13, Dr. Vickie Joseph, renowned avian veterinarian, will speak on "Rehabilitation of the Fledgling Golden  $Eagle". She plans to bring a Golden \, Eagle \, with$ her. On April 10, Deb and John Kirkpatrick will speak on "Hummingbirds and Fun Facts". She also hopes to bring rehabilitating hummingbirds.

Scheduled birding trips are: February 24, car pool to Bridgeway Island Pond in West Sacramento, where we usually see Cinnamon, Green-winged, and Blue-wing Teal, plus other waterfowl. March 10 is scheduled for Bobelaine Wildlife Preserve. Bobelaine, owned and managed by Audubon, is a low island in the Feather River just off of Highway 99. This involves a hike along trails in mature woodlands, which is flooded in very rainy years by the river.

Our programs are held in KS Presentation Hall at 1:30 PM on the second Monday of the month. Most day trips leave from the Orchard Creek parking lot west of the pool at 8:00 AM unless otherwise specified. Moderate/strenuous, mileage TBA.
- 3rd Thursday, April 20. Buttermilk Bend/Point Defiance. Another great site for wildflower-watchers. Trek along a grand bend of the South Yuba River and marvel at the restored covered bridge, then continue on a scenic loop to Lake Englebright. Easy 2.5 miles OR moderate 5.5 miles.

You can also enjoy lots of Spring flowers right here in Lincoln Hills! Walkers meet at 8 AM every Wednesday at different trailheads for invigorating 2½-3-mile treks. Call Walking Group Coordinator Debbie Schryver, 916-666-1741.

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
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Neighbors InDeed — Sounds in the Night... Smoke Detectors

The "chirping" or "beeping" sounds of a smoke detector always seem to happen in the middle of the night. If you don't have a ladder or can't use one to change the batteries, you won't be able to sleep and your pets will suffer anxiety and ear pain from the sounds.

You can prevent this from happening by replacing those batteries every year. Make a  $note\,on\,your\,calendar\,when\,you\,replaced\,them$ the last time and then mark your new calendar with the next replacement date. Or use the same scheduling method that you use for other tasks such as changing the furnace filter or having the garage door lubed. When it's time to replace them, buy a new 9-volt battery for each alarm unit, then call Neighbors InDeed (NID) and we will change the batteries in all the units. Batteries should all have the same expiration date, otherwise they will expire at different times and will begin chirping. (You should also replace the battery in the carbon monoxide (CO) detector at the same time.)

Smoke and CO detectors have a 10-year life expectancy. Some experts recommend that we start thinking of replacements in the 8th year. If you're not sure of the age of your alarms, ask NID to check them for you.

The California Building Code requires

that smoke detectors be hard-wired with a battery

backup and that CO detectors are required in homes with gas heating or appliances. NID recommends using a BRK First Alert (Model 9120B) smoke detector with an Alkaline battery backup or a BRK First Alert (Model 9120LBL) with a 10-year Lithium battery backup. Batteries are included in both models and they are available at Lowes and through Amazon. For a CO detector, NID recommends the First Alert plug-in type, also available at Lowes and Amazon. These units have a backup battery that also "chirps" when the battery needs changing. You can simply unplug them to change the battery - no ladder needed.

If you call NID (916-223-2763) to replace your smoke alarms, we will advise you of the options available and then install the new ones for you once they've been purchased.

As always, please remember that we will never answer the phone. If you leave us a message at 916-223-2763, we will return your call as promptly as possible between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Remember, paying by check is FASTER for Wednesday rounds. Drop it in the basket on the counter. A member's solution: "I write checks for several weeks in advance and keep them in my purse. Then, I only have to remember to chip in my \$1 for the Putts!"

Club News — The bunker renovation looks awesome. If you've been on the course lately, you have seen the "retaining walls" and the new liner and drainage system. There is even sand in a few bunkers! Note that if the bunker is still under construction, play it as "ground under repair." Work is expected to be completed by early to mid-March.

The new carts are here! As you drive, you may notice that your cart stops if you are too close to a green. They are equipped with a Geofence app, which does not allow an approach to a green or tee box to be closer than 30 yards, and it ensures that you stay on the cart path when passing every tee box. Handicapped players can adjust the Geofence to enforce a 15-yard distance, but not for everyone. If you stray, the cart beeps and switches automatically into reverse until you are back in the correct boundary. You can still use the neighborhood streets to get to a tee, but not external streets like Sun City and Del Web, except in marked

crossing lanes. Use the cart path to return to the clubhouse after a round. The system is a work-in-progress, please be patient.

Private cart owners must now sign a Golf Cart License Agreement and provide proof of insurance before they can use their cart at Lincoln Hills. Duly registered cart owners will receive a sticker as proof of registration. If you are using a club cart, you must sign a liability waiver before you can get the keys. The plan is to have a volunteer hand out the waivers. To streamline this step, the driver of a club cart should:

- •Obtain the waiver before checking in
- Write the cart number on the waiver
- •Turn in the waiver when you pay the green fee to receive the kevs

Lincsters Wednesday Play — We have reinstated the use of Course Marshalls to help players keep up with the group in front of them. Volunteer Marshalls help us keep track of the pace of play. As the Marshall drives the course, she displays a flag as she passes each group: green (you're ok), yellow (speed up), and red (your group is at least a hole behind, pick up the you really pace!). She will not engage the groups directly. It's a gentle reminder to speed up the pace of play (if you need it).

Carts must leave the staging area promptly at 12:45 for a shotgun start of 1:00. Do not tee off before 1:00.





### **Mary Jordan**

at the age of twenty, she worked in Massachusetts and then moved to New York for four years. She was drawn to California for the weather and originally moved to the Bay Area (Sunnyvale, Los Altos) in 1968. Because she was trained as a nurse, she discovered she could work anywhere. She married in California and had one child. Eventually, she divorced but remained close to her daughter in a co-parenting arrangement.

As she pursued her young dreams, including completing associate, bachelor and master's degrees in nursing, she always promised herself she would not follow in her father's footsteps of alcoholism and for many years she was able to keep her promise. But, the genetic disease of alcoholism reared its ugly head after the birth of her daughter and the divorce from her husband. She discovered she had moved from a woman of social drinking to a woman of problem drinking to a woman of alcoholic drinking.

Hitting bottom in 1984 at the age of fortythree, she joined Alcoholics Anonymous and has been sober now for thirty-eight years. Even during her recent bout with mental illness, she did not return to drink. In fact, many of the principles she learned in AA supported her during her bout with deep depression and were integrated into her healing mentally.

Her daughter's family always was and is a large part of Mary's life. Mary is known as Nana. She lives near to her daughter, son-inlaw and three grandsons to maintain close relationships.

Mary has been involved in nursing for more than six decades now. Before moving to Lincoln Hills, she lived in the older part of Folsom and even started a drug and alcohol treatment program in two houses—one for men and one for women. When that became financially difficult to continue, she moved to a small house in Sun City.

Mary's unique background as a nurse, recovering alcoholic and someone who struggled with mental illness led her to write her book after a new medical diagnosis developed



late in life.
Mary struggled with
depression and was
seeing a psychiatrist
and on medication
when she realized
her depression was
worsening and she
needed more help. Her
outgoing personality
faded, she was not
keeping contact and

connections with her daughter and her grandchildren and also her own siblings. She lost her appetite, stopped taking care of personal hygiene, had difficulty sleeping, and wasn't leaving her house. It was when she started having suicidal thoughts that she had never experienced before that she decided to go the hospital. Her experience from the hospital stays and mental health facilities eventually led to a different diagnosis. Instead of a deep depression, she was actually suffering from a bipolar depression and had been taking the wrong medications. Once her medications were changed, she no longer felt suicidal, but it took some more medication changes and another hospital stay before she could eventually return home to a full and active life.

In the process, she came to believe that the mental health system in the United States is fundamentally broken and definitely needs some major changes. It was her healing from her disease and the problems she saw along the way in her recovery that led to her writing her book. The book is both a personal memoir and an exploration into our health care system

and its treatment of mental health. Writing the book was a learning experience and she felt like it was necessary because she wants other

> people to understand the difficulties in our current system. She references Elizabeth Rosenthal's book entitled "An American Sickness." Rosenthal points out that three of her ten rules for the dysfunctional medical market are: 1)More treatment is always better. Default to the most expensive option. 2)A lifetime of treatment is preferable to a cure. 3) There is no free choice. Patients are stuck. Jordan in her book highlights how her experiences navigating the mental health system prove the validity of these dysfunctional rules.

Ontheotherhand, Jordan's experience with Alcoholics

Anonymous over decades of sobriety helped her immeasurably during her difficult days of depression. Many of the guidelines in AA help with many aspects of life and there is no financial charge in AA.

After Mary's bipolar diagnosis, she realized she had misunderstood the illness for years. There are actually four different kinds of bipolar: Bipolar I (alternating periods of mania and depression), Bipolar II (alternating depressive episodes and hypomanic episodes, but not full-blown manic episodes.), Cyclothymic disorder (hypomanic symptoms and depressive symptoms, but not hypomanic episodes and depressive episodes), and other (bipolar disorder symptoms that do not match the three categories listed above). Medications used for treating depression are not the same and may not work for those with bipolar disorder. In Mary's case, she also had a reaction to one of the common bipolar medications and it landed her in the hospital for the second time.

Mary saw bright spots in her journey. She refers to "Coinsigods" which are "coincidences" that actually point to a divine power's involvement and care in human lives. She is thankful for her daughter, son-in-law, three grandchildren, AA sponsors and friends, and her nursing connections. She enjoys her renewed health and her community in Sun City. As you walk up to her house, engraved rocks in the yard read "joy" and "forgiveness." She has renewed joy and has forgiven those in her life like her father and his difficulties with alcoholism. Her book can be purchased on Amazon and Barnes and Noble. It is featured in the Roseville Barnes and Noble. Mary hopes that her story will encourage and inform. I agree that it does.

#### Life Isn't Always Fun

I wasn't surprised there were so few responses to Ron Petitt's courageous letter "Loneliness Can Kill" in January. In February there was just Geoff Capell's two sentence compliment on page 17. It might be because Ron described two things few people will talk about here in SCLH—loneliness and suicide.

This place is promoted as resort living for the active adult, a Disneyland of amenities for the last chapter of life. It helps if you are outgoing, are ready with a joke, or laugh easily as the fun types make friends. Well, maybe not real friends. What do we call all those people we know who people our lifestyle choices—the regulars at the games, the clubs, and the entertainment?

It's great to recognize a fellow line dancer, or a poker player, but will they notice when you haven't been there for months because of a loss or a serious diagnosis, or even death. It takes more than casual chit chat to make real friendships.

Ron talked about suicide, another taboo subject here. I've never seen it listed as a cause of death and the suicides that regularly occur are only discussed informally if at all.

Some people object to using the word suicide so you can apply to the State and two doctors might decide you are terminal and give you a potion. It's called Assisted Dying as if the label makes it more acceptable than the method you create yourself.

Ron Petitt describes well how loneliness and unbearable grief causes old people to consider pulling the plug when we can't wait for God to do it. It is often physical health issues too—chronic pain, dementia destroying our relationships, or expensive treatments robbing our children of their inheritance. There's nowhere to talk about any of this except maybe a therapist, but be careful. If you admit you are considering suicide and have a plan, the gurney may arrive to take you to the inpatient unit for some drugs and cognitive behavioral therapy.


Doctors who make their money with procedures and treatments are going to espouse the value that life is good at any cost. I know someone who had eight years of chemo off and on and her doctor was all for it. There's no good time to give up. I suggested to the Association we need a forum on death. No one would touch that one. Ron did in his remarkable letter and at least Geoff and I read it



Batteries were not being charged when the fire broke out. The Fire Department advises every resident to have at least one fire extinguisher for immediate access with an "ABC" rating to cover all types of fires. Check your extinguisher for the expiration date or red/green indicator. Shaking the extinguisher monthly keeps the powder from being compacted.

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

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
