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

Sunshine Services "We're Here to Help"

Current 2023 Top 10 List of Scams and Frauds — Borrowed from Neighborhood Watch

1. Identity Theft, Phishing and Pharming—Usually a scammer sends an email, a text message or calls your phone and pretends to be some organization, company or person you trust. Scammers gain access to your confidential information, like social security numbers, date of birth and then use it to apply for credit cards, loans and financial accounts. Typically, the victim receives an email that appears to be from a credible, real bank or credit card company, with links to a website and a request to update account information. But the website and email are fakes, made to look like the real website.

- 2. Phone Scams This includes telemarketers violating the Do Not Call list, Robo dialers, scammers calling up pretending to be from a bank or credit card company. The National Do Not Call Registry (U.S.) or the National Do Not Call List (Canada) offer consumers a free way to reduce telemarketing calls. Scammers call anyway, of course, and they've even found a way to scam consumers by pretending to be a government official calling to sign you up or confirming your previous participation on the Dot Not call list!
- 3. Debt Collection Most of the complaints under this category involve debt collectors. Consumers tell of receiving calls

from harassing collectors who are threatening and will repeatedly call attempting to collect a debt. Other complaints that fall under this category involved credit/debit card fees, pay day loans, credit repair companies and unauthorized use of credit/debit cards. Some of these complaints involved hidden fees and billing disputes as well.

- 4. Fake Government Officials If you received an email, letter or phone call from a government agency (typically the IRS or FBI) and it instructs you to wire, Western Union or MoneyGrammoneysomeplace, or follow a link and enter information don't believe it! The U.S. government would never instruct anyone to use those methods to pay any bill or carry out a financial transaction, particularly with an overseas bank or agency.
- 5. Scam Text Messages It looks like a text alert from your bank, asking you to confirm information or 'reactivate your debit card' by following a link on your smart phone. But it is just a way to steal personal information.
- 6. Loan Scams/Credit Fixers False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront. Or a scam that promises to repair your credit for a fee.
- 7. Fake Prizes, Sweepstakes, Free Gifts, Lottery Scams You receive an email claiming you won a prize, lottery or gift, and you only have to pay a "small fee" to claim it or cover "handling costs". But before they can claim their prize, they are told they must send money to pay for administration fees and taxes. The prize, of course, does not exist.
 - 8. Internet Merchandise Scams You

purchase something online, but it is either never delivered or it is not what they claimed it was, or is defective. Online shopping, and other shop from home, such as catalog, mail and phone shopping scams are on the rise.

- 9. Computer Performance Scams: Equipment and Software Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix nonexistent problems.
- 10. Credit Bureaus and Related Credit Scams—Credit/debit card fees, pay day loans, credit repair companies and unauthorized use of credit/debit cards. Some of these complaints involved hidden fees and billing disputes as well.

I hope this list helps to keep you and your loved ones safe!

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Neighborhood Watch/Citizen Patrol

As the days and months go by, I keep discovering residents who don't know what Neighborhood Watch or Citizens Patrol is here in Sun City Roseville, so I am always ready to share information about these two programs.

Neighborhood Watch program helps to provide information about safety issues, scams, home safety and travel tips. Our Sun City Neighborhood is divided into Villages and Team Links. We have 13 Villages (34 Village Communicators) and 234 Team Links. Neighborhood Watch hosts, on a quarterly basis, speakers that bring information for ALL Sun City Residents to benefit from. When available, the Roseville Police Beat 7 officer will come to discuss the most recent activity and/or provide safety tips. The keynote speaker then presents a 45-60-minute program, usually including Q & A. Our next quarterly meeting being held April 10th at 10am in the ballroom. Our speaker will be Joe Dunham, Executive Director at Senior Care Villa of Loomis which will be very informative – "Understanding Dementia from a Safety Perspective", recognizing the signs and knowing how we can help friends, neighbors and family members in need.

Our Citizens Patrol program provide "eyes & ears" for our community. Our two marked vehicles go out 365 days a year, two volunteers per car watching for suspicious activity, open garage doors, burnt out street lights and house



lights, and provide visibility for 2-1/2 hours each night throughout our community. These volunteers are aided by our Shift Captains who volunteer 7 days at a time and provide guidance whenever needed.

I can't tell you how many times our Citizens Patrol drivers have been thanked by residents walking in the evening for what they do for our community. We hope that more individuals/couples in our community will be ready to volunteer to be part of these programs. The more we are involved, the stronger we are as a neighborhood. Our office is here to take your application to do Citizens Patrol and help watch out for our community.

Governmental Affairs Committee

The Davis-Sterling Act -

Ever wonder how our HOA is governed? Who determines the rules and guidelines?

Our Sun City HOA is just one of over 50,000 Common Interest Developments (CID) in California. We are governed by a set of guidelines known as the Davis-Sterling Act (DSA). All California CIDs must follow the guidelines in the Act.

The DSA provides guidelines for

governing and regulating various goingson within planned developments, such as budget preparation, dues increases, and election requirements. The Act also defines the authority of HOA boards as well as the limitations on their powers. Beyond that, it also protects homeowner rights.

When it comes to property use restrictions in HOAs, these are some of the subjects that frequently come up.

Commercial Use Restrictions. Homeowners associations can generally impose reasonable restrictions concerning the use of residential properties for commercial purposes. There are even zoning ordinances that exist to limit the commercial use of residential properties.

Architectural Restrictions. Certain architectural changes such as solar panels, satellite dishes, and EV charging stations are covered by the DSA. Under this law, HOAs can't prohibit members from installing such structures within reason.

Display of the U.S. Flag. Civil Code Section 4705 says HOAs can't forbid members from displaying the U.S. flag or limit them from doing so.

Political Signs. The Davis-Sterling Act does not explicitly tackle political signs, but it does say that HOAs can't prohibit members from displaying non-commercial signs. That said, HOAs could place reasonable limitations on signs such as size restrictions, placement, and materials.

Religious Symbols. Homeowners associations can't prohibit members from

displaying religious symbols. The exception is when it becomes a public health and safety concern, breaches the law, includes illicit or inappropriate images or language, or is an obstruction to entrances.

Street Parking and Towing. Since HOAs can regulate common area use, they can also regulate parking on private streets and HOA parking lots. This extends to towing vehicles provided there is a "no parking" sign posted in plain sight, among other requirements.

More information on DSA can be found on California Civil Code Sections 4000-6150.



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
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Safety First — Distracted Driving Impacts Our Roadways

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the latest data on distracted driving reveals:

- More than 400,000 motorists were injured in accidents caused by distracted driving and 2,800 deaths occurred as a result.
- Drivers reported being distracted 30% more often than when asked a year before.
- Distracted driving spikes at night between 6:00 pm and 11:00 pm.
- Distracted driving was a reported factor in 8.1% of fatal motor vehicle crashes.
- 42% of high school students in the U.S. admitted that they text or email while driving.
- Roughly 20% of injuries occurring in car accident crashes involve distracted driving.
- \bullet Drivers are distracted by their phones at least 10% of their driving time.

A ringing cell phone, fighting kids, or a spilling coffee cup: no one is immune from distractions. The average car weighs around 5000 pounds. When you mix distractions and a vehicle traveling down the road, you get distracted driving. Distracted driving can occur when something diverts your attention from the task of safe and attentive driving.

According to the Center for Disease Control – Injury Center, there are three primary types of distractions:

Mental or cognitive—when a driver's mind is focused on something besides driving. These can include talking to another passenger, thinking about something that is upsetting, road rage, daydreaming, or being under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.



Visual – when a driver looks at something other than what is ahead on the road. These can include looking for items on the floor of the car, checking and adjusting your GPS, changing the radio station, adjusting your temperature controls, taking in the view, or doing your makeup, and,

of course, texting or dialing on your cellphone.

Manual – when one or both hands are taken off the wheel. These can include eating and drinking, adjusting your child's seatbelt, smoking, searching through your purse or wallet, or turning knobs in your car.

There are things you can do to ensure you are driving as safely as possible. Here are some simple ways to minimize driving distractions:

- Keep your eyes on the road.
- Pull over to read directions.
- $\bullet \ Put your phone in \textit{``Do Not Disturb''} mode.$
- Keep your phone out of reach.
- Make all adjustments before driving.
- Don't reach for items while driving.Avoid phone calls, even hands-free.
- Stay focused on the road.
- Keep your emotions in check.

Distracted driving is a major cause of car-related injuries. Complacency can be a huge factor. Many accidents happen near or around your home due to your familiarity with the surroundings. Do your best to stay focused on the task of driving safely and you will be able to respond more quickly, be better positioned to think clearly when needing to respond, and likely spot a distraction before it becomes a problem.

Using Informed Delivery to Deter Mail Fraud

Each year, according to the United States Postal Inspection Service, Americans trust the United States Postal Service (USPS) with billions of letters and packages, and the vast majority of those arrive safely at their intended destinations.

Unfortunately, there are always thieves who will target the mail, and there are steps YOU can take to ensure your mail arrives safely to you, or to quickly find out if mail is missing so you can take additional action to deter any subsequent fraud.

Informed Delivery, a free tool offered to most US Zip Codes since 2017, sends an email containing images of the mail you should be receiving in your mailbox each day mail is delivered. Upon signing up through their website, USPS follows industry best practices to verify your identity, including the use of a mail-based verification letter.

If you discover that your mail has been stolen, report it immediately to USPS online at usps.com.

If you discover your mailbox has been vandalized, call the police department to



report it, then call your local USPS Office to inform them. Locate your nearest post office at usps.com

City Council Updates Four-Year Strategic Plan

In October 2019, the Roseville City Council held a public workshop to set the long-term vision for our City. The result was a four-year strategic plan that highlighted the Council's top priorities and gained consensus around the strategies aligned with each. The Council's strategic plan has remained relevant and an important policy document to guide budget decisions.

At the workshop February 21, the City Council reviewed accomplishments and milestones from the past year. The Council affirmed its priorities and looked ahead at the next several years—all while being mindful of the financial requirements, staff capacity, and timelines to tackle these priorities.

The strategies focus on timely efforts, whether specific projects like body-worn cameras or initiatives like making our community inclusive and welcoming. Each year, as Council does its annual update, the update workshop allows for the current council to weigh in, for completed projects to be removed, for new initiatives to be considered, and for new circumstances to be factored in.

Following is the Council's Strategic Plan with six priorities, which remained the same, and the updated strategies as determined at last week's workshop:

Maintain a safe and healthy community—

- 1. Ensure public safety service levels are maintained with facilities and staffing, and real-time crime monitoring, as the City grows.
 - 2. Continue City efforts to reduce

homelessness while collaborating and advocating regionally as appropriate.

3. Continue inclusiveness, equality and justice efforts for all in partnership with the

Remain fiscally responsible in a changing

- 1. Balance utility services and customer rates, given legislative mandates and rising
- 2. Seek ways to reduce pension liabilities to maintain high quality services.

Enhance economic vitality -

- 1. Advance sports tourism strategy, including soccer complex.
- 2. Support conditions that attract, promote and retain retail, commercial and industrial opportunities that have a positive fiscal impact
- 3. Consider strategic reserves and other funding for vacant storefronts, façade improvements, corridor rehab and other opportunities to adapt to changing economic
- 4. Implement Economic Development Strategy.

Invest in well-planned infrastructure and growth -

- 1. Reinvest in core neighborhoods.
- 2. Increase funding for CIP rehabilitation to prevent erosion of infrastructure.
- 3. Prioritize completion of soccer complex and crucial corridors.
 - 4. Maintain investment in water resiliency

and increase capacity of the electric utility.

5. Seek increased regional and local transportation funding and revenues

Support community engagement and advocacy

- 1. Remain focused on community engagement and education about City services and the budget.
- 2. Explore opportunities to engage $increasingly\,diverse\,audiences\,in\,relevant\,ways.$
- 3. Increase outreach to and engagement with younger populations.
- 4. Explore volunteer opportunities for employees.
- 5. Help county, state, and federal policymakers understand key City issues, including local decision-making.

Deliver exceptional City services —

- 1. Explore ways to strengthen code enforcement efforts, including graffiti and blight abatement.
- 2. Remain an employer of choice through expanded recruitment and attraction efforts, a focus on retention, and a strong culture.
- 3. Implement greater community-based and volunteer cleanups.
- 4. Implement a new and more efficient way to process increasing Public Records Act requests.

This consensus on policy direction helps guide the work of our 14 departments and 1200 staff members serving our growing city of 154,000.

The February 18th social dinner theme was "Share the Love". Eight-six members donated non-perishable food items that





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

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

What a meeting we had on March 6!

Our speaker was Tiffany Saathoff, Chief of Staff for our 5th District Assemblyman Joe Patterson. In an open forum format, Tiffany explained a few of the 23 bills introduced so far by Mr. Patterson. These include AB 229 relating to violent felonies by clarifying existing





language and adding felonies for human trafficking and domestic violence, AB 1260 - notice of parole release dates requiring 30 days advance notice and more details needing to be provided to local law enforcement and District Attorneys, AB 801 relating to student privacy and AB 802 requiring notification to parents of their right to examine school curriculum.

We also discussed a few new bills to which we are all opposed. Included here is AB 1078 which allows the state to mandate curriculum and prohibits the removal of any instructional materials or ceasing to teach any curriculum without prior state approval. Our various school boards have always had the responsibility of curriculum decisions while considering state recommendations. This bill in effect totally removes our local school board, and thus our, control on how and what we educate our children. Another mandate, AB 659, will prevent a student from advancing to the 8th grade if they do not have the HPV virus vaccine

The website leginfo.legislature.ca.gov provides information on all Assembly and Senate bills that have been introduced so far this year.

Individual group members brought up other issues for discussion. We talked about issues facing a few of our school districts, state mandates in general, fund raising, other member community activities and had a lot of laughs along the way.


We play cornhole at 3:00 Tuesdays on the Sierra Pines horseshoe lanes. You're welcome to bring a canine companion to improve your cornhole score!



his career, he worked at a food manufacturing plant and later moved on to pharmaceuticals. His last job before retirement was working for Gilead, a pharmaceutical company which made HIV medication and other life saving drugs, as well as cures for Hepatitis B and C. Dave ran the operations, worked on environmental health and safety, and made sure that none of the workers were exposed to toxic chemicals or that the environment was harmed in any way.

He first met Linda at a cast party when she was 17 and he was 19. They dated for a while, then drifted apart only to reconnect five years later, eventually marrying in

1984. They have a very loving relationship and enjoy being married. Unfortunately, they lost their only child, their son. Jason Tennies, at age 20. He was a college student and a remarkable musician. He was also a black belt in Karate and an incredible human being. After Jason's death, they decided to tell their story by making a feature length film about what happened

to their son. In the film they included many of the songs that Jason wrote. The film, "It's Dark Here" is available to watch on iTunes as well as YouTube (https://www.youtube. com/watch?v=Ye-Q80arIUk&t=2416s). It's named after a beautiful song written by Jason.

In dealing with the aftermath of the tragic loss of their only child, Dave and Linda made an all-out effort to get "It's Dark Here" released to the public. They were able to get it streamed on Hulu and Amazon Prime, but their ultimate success was having it used as a powerful training film for law enforcement officers in Southern California to assist them in dealing sensitively with difficult situations regarding mental illness.





Even though Dave and Linda will always grieve their cherished son, they have tried to move on and enjoy life as much as they can. Dave took a stone-cutting class in high school which generated a lifelong interest in cutting stones and making beautiful jewelry. Most of the time, he make jewelry for friends, but he has sold a few pieces at the Craft Fair here at Sun City. Linda paints for a hobby. She started with taking a class in watercolors, then branched out to acrylics. In particular, she loves painting faces and has several of her portraits hanging on the walls of their house, faces of people like Marilyn Monroe, Elizabeth Taylor, and Raquel Welch. She usually gives her paintings away, but, like Dave, has sold a few pieces at the Craft Fair as well.

Dave and Linda travel to Hawaii once or twice a year, but one of the couple's favorite things to do is go to Lake Tahoe and rent a boat for a day. 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Observations on Happiness Continued...

Last month's "Observations" was devoted to the subject of Happiness, something to which all, or most, people, I would assume, aspire. The column cited a Harvard study that followed people from college to old age and concluded that the key to being happy was to have an active social life.

Sorting through old magazines that had piled up recently, I came across a Time magazine whose cover said "The Secrets of Happiness Experts" and so naturally was intrigued. Inside the magazine I found several articles on Happiness and related subjects. The most pertinent, I thought, was one with the title "The Daily Habits of Happiness Experts." Okay, maybe the "experts" knew some things that we ordinary people didn't.

The article says: "The meaning of happiness is, to some extent, subjective. But nearly every expert we surveyed emphasized the same cocktail of ingredients: a sense of control and autonomy over one's life, being guided by meaning and purpose, and contacting with others." Contacting with others. So this was in accord with the Harvard study.

The article goes on to say that the experts had a handful of happiness habits in common. "Spending time with family outside of the house, and with friends in a nonprofessional setting, were big ones (there's having a active social life again)... Pursuing hobbies such as art, music, cooking, or reading were also universally important."

Other habits were getting a good night's sleep and exercising or playing sports. Finally, there's "basking in nature."

Okay, there's nothing startling in any of these habits but if, as the experts say, they promote happiness that's all to the good. The only problem for us senior citizens is that insomnia seems to come with old age and that most of us are beyond playing sports.

But wait a minute, what about money? The old saying of course is that money can't buy happiness. What do the experts say? The article is a bit ambiguous. It says: "Experts are divided on whether happiness can be bought. As author and podcaster Gretchen Rubin put it, 'Money can't buy happiness, but it can buy many things that contribute mightily,"

 $Fortunately, in\,my\,Googling\,I\,came\,across$ a study that attempted to find out the answer to the money and happiness question. In this study, a group of 200 people were given a one-time sum of \$10,000 they were to spend in three months, while a control group of 100 people didn't get any money. The findings, as is often the case with such studies, could have been predicted by any of us non-experts: yes, the people who got the \$10,000 ended up happier. It should be noted that households with incomes above \$123,000 didn't report a noticeable increase in happiness. I guess with that kind of income an additional ten grand didn't make that much difference. I know that if I was given \$10,000 I'd feel a lot happier.


Just a little more on the subject of happiness. I found another Time article to be of interest. It's title is "Happiness Isn't Pollyannaism. It's a Practice." The author is Judith T. Moscowitz. It starts by saying: "Looking at the world around us, happiness may seem an unattainable goal. As we move into the fourth year of a pandemic... there seems little reason to be happy. Indeed, results from the 2022 annual Stress in America survey indicate one-third of the respondents report that their stress... is 'overwhelming.'" A Stress in America survey? Who knew there was such a thing? I suppose that nowadays there's a survey on everything.


