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Gene and Karen Cochran — Staying Fit and Having Fun

Imagine sitting in your backyard, with a spectacular view of the open space and golf course, watching a blue jay chasing a squirrel, turkeys roaming through your patio and a deer nipping at your roses. Sounds idyllic, doesn't it? That's what Gene and Karen Cochran experience most fair-weather days in retirement at Sun City Roseville.

Gene grew up in the Rose Garden community of San Jose, California, a middle child between two sisters. He was active in sports as a kid, participating in water polo and swimming, and earning MVP of the league for his JV basketball team at Lincoln High School.

Karen's father was the director of the Bakersfield YMCA and a fitness fanatic. He designed a gym in the family garage using cables, springs and weights, and worked out every day of his life until he died at age 93. Karen spent every summer at the Y camp from the age of six weeks on. She learned how to shoot guns and a bow and arrow, ride and

care for horses, and do many arts and crafts. "I never needed someone to win a teddy bear for me at the fair," she recalls, "because I was always the better shot."

The couple met at San Jose State University (SJSU) where Gene belonged to Phi Sigma Kappa, the fraternity across the street from Karen's AXO sorority house. Many of Karen's friends married many of Gene's

friends. "We're all still friends to this day," says Gene, who meets every Wednesday for lunch with eight to ten of his fraternity brothers who live in the area. Karen has lunch with the wives of Phi Sigs once a month.

During their time at SJSU, Gene served food and worked in the kitchen at Karen's sorority house. Additionally, he drove a school bus and managed an apartment building. On one of their first dates, Gene picked her up with a bus full of kids, and after leaving them at their destination, they continued on their date. "I quickly learned," says Karen, "that life with Gene would be full of surprises and fun." The couple will celebrate their 59th wedding anniversary this year.

Throughout their married life, Gene's entrepreneurial spirit led him to many business opportunities. He had an accounting consulting practice, but dabbled in many other businesses as well. He was CEO for a (cont' on page 29)

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

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
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SC Harmonicoots



There will be frequent times when that work will impact our access to facilities. As a convenience, the Association has plans to use several methods of communication to keep residents well informed. The Resident Website, www.scres.org, will be a main source for those

We encourage all residents to become familiar with the Resident Website's Home Page, its Announcement Area, and also, its Strategic Plan Information link at the bottom of the Home Page. If you are not able to use the internet, we strongly suggest that you ask a neighbor or SCR friend to keep you informed, as project information is posted.

Resident Website Hints

- 1. Postings on the "Home Page" these postings will keep us aware of construction alerts and progress. However, there is more to the Home Page. To take advantage of it all, you need to remember to "scroll" down. The icons at the bottom of the screen are maintained to provide quicker access to the most popular web pages on the Website.
- 2. Contact Us Located in the "Contact" menu or on a smart phone screen it is included in the "hamburger" button in the black menu bar. At the center of this web page is a round button containing an envelope image, which links to an email form pre-addressed to staff. When received by the Association it is directed to the department that can respond to your
- 3. Staff Directory also located in the "Contact" menu, provides staff names (the name links to the person's email address) and their work phone number.
- 4. Governing Documents Our $community \, rules \, and \, regulations \, are \, constantly \,$ being revised to agree with current laws and government regulations. The latest versions can be found in the "Document" menu, then by scrolling down the "SCR Resource Documents" screen to "Governing Documents."
- 5. Board of Directors Video Recordings Improved - The "Closed Caption/Subtitles" function has been added to recent meeting videos, as a convenience for residents. It can be turned on by the "cc" link at the bottom right of the video screen.

- 6. Past Board Meeting Video Recordings can be accessed from the menu bar "Board & Committees" to the Board of Directors link. Any date printed in light green text is a link to that recording's website.
- 7. Electronic Mail Consent Form -California allows Homeowners Associations to email communications/documents, normally sent by US mail, to those homeowners who have given consent to receive them electronically. This saves the Association the expense of printing and mailing. (This does not include Election Balloting Materials.) The link to the "Electronic Mail Consent Form" has been added below the Home Page, Announcements area for your convenience.

The Brown Act — The phrase "Brown Act" is commonly used when referring to government meetings. What is the Brown Act and how does it apply to Sun City?

The Brown Act was enacted in response to public concerns over informal undisclosed meetings held by local elected officials. City (cont' on page 5)

councils, County boards, and other local government bodies were avoiding public scrutiny by holding secret "workshops" and "study sessions." The Brown Act solely applies to California city and county government agencies, boards, and councils.

Meeting Requirements per Brown Act

• Applies to any gathering of a quorum of a legislative body to discuss or transact

business under the body's jurisdiction.

• Teleconference meetings may be held under strict conditions (e.g. as a result of

the State Coronavirus social distancing health order)

- Public time must be set aside for public
- Meetings must be held in nondiscriminatory facilities
 - All votes must be cast in public
- Closed sessions are only permitted for specified purposes such as to discuss

litigation, real estate negotiations and labor negotiations.

- Public has a right to attend meetings without registering
- Materials provided to a majority of a body, unless exempt, must be provided to members of the public
- Time must be set aside for public
- Closed session actions must be reported
 - · Agendas of regular meetings must be

posted 72 hours prior to meeting

- Special Meetings require 24-hour notice to members and the media
- · One-hour notice in case of work stoppage or crippling activity
- Closed Session agendas must be
- Special procedures permit proceeding without an agenda in an emergency

California State Publication

Since SCR has 7 board members, no more than 3 members can be present when discussing SCR affairs outside of a regular meeting.

Violation of the Brown Act may result in:

- 1) Criminal penalties (e.g., fine of up to \$1,000 or imprisonment in state prison).
- 2) Permanent disqualification from holding any office in California.
- 3) Additionally, any contract made in violation of Gov Code Section 1090 is void.

SCR is not a government entity but functions just like a city. The SCR Board follows the Brown Act. Similarly, all SCR committees follow the same Act as well.

Compliance Committee

In March, the Compliance Committee will begin our planned community wide canvass for houses, garages and fences needing paint/

The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) approval is required to repaint the exterior of your home, even if you are

repainting same color. Complete instructions for repainting are shown on the Application for Exterior Painting House, Fence and/or Gate (Appendix E in the last section of the Design Guidelines). Only colors from the pre-approved SCR Exterior Paint Palette may be used. Each house must have at least one Trim Color for contrast. Garage doors must be painted to match either the House Base Paint Color or House Trim Color. The Color Palette book can be obtained in the Timber Creek Administration Office.

Since we have had quite a few storms lately, we realize that many fences are still in need of repair and Paint. The guide lines mentioned in this article are to refresh everyone with the current updated Design Guidelines, which are available for your review on the Sun City Roseville Website (scres.org) under Documents, Governing Documents and then Design Guidelines. Also, there is an excellent article on the Website under ANNOUNCEMENTS and titled ARC Department: Storm Fence Repair Information. It gives you all the information you'll need on how to handle the repair/replacement of a wooden fence, such as how to work with all affected neighbors in attaining bids from licensed Contractor's or Handymen. The materials required for repairs are specified in Design Guideline, Article 111, Section, 3.02(e)(xi)(A). Fences must be repaired or rebuilt using the original type and style of wood materials. The required color is Kelly Moore Dusty Olive K18-2. Any visible hardware should be painted the fence color. ARC approval is required for the repair/rebuilding of the fence.

When thinking about painting, it's a great time for owners to learn about SCR's Design Guidelines and how to find the specific information they're looking for. Our Sun City Community continues to highlight its beauty when all of us comply with the required guidelines.


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Roseville Junction Entertainment Destination Taking Shape

Roseville Junction are taking shape. The entertainment and hospitality destination is slatedfor290Conference Center Drive, adjacent to the Galleria mall and Highway 65.

"Roseville continues to grow into a regional destination that's attracting businesses and visitors.

The addition of Roseville Junction provides even more amenities which are important to strengthening our economy and workforce," said Melissa Anguiano, City of Roseville Economic Development Director.

Electric Pickle

Construction is anticipated to begin in 2023 on Electric Pickle, an entertainment complex with nine pickleball courts, a two-story indoor-outdoor bar and restaurant, and lawn for live music and outdoor gatherings.

A summer 2024 opening is estimated for the approximately 8,000 square foot venue. Roseville will be the second Electric Pickle location in the nation.

Fieldwork Brewing

A 20,000 square foot outdoor venue at Roseville Junction will feature modular containers surrounding an open area planned

for concerts, artisan events, and small festivals. Fieldwork also has plans for a beer garden.

Hotels

Two hotels totaling approximately 250 rooms are planned for Roseville Junction, Caption by Hyatt Roseville and Hyatt House Roseville. Other lodging is planned near the

More businesses will be joining Roseville Junction in the future.

The purchase-and-sale agreement for the previously City-owned site was approved by City Council in 2020. Proceeds from the \$4.8 million sale went to the City's Strategic Improvement Fund, with a portion helping spur new economic development initiatives. The businesses joining Roseville Junction are consistent with City Council's vision for the property.

A Neighborhood Watch program as we have here is Sun City, is a group of people living in the same area who want to make their neighborhood safer by working together and in conjunction with local law enforcement to reduce crime and improve their quality of life.

Neighbors keeping an eye out for each other and reporting unusual activity to the police, build a stronger community and neighbor relationships.

What is Neighborhood Watch to You? It creates comradery and a sense of safety within the small groups throughout Sun City called "Teams". We have 234 teams throughout Sun City. Are you receiving an email with information regarding, safety, scams, helpful hints for your home security, etc. every 6-7 weeks?

If the answer is No, maybe you would be willing to step up in your area to be the Team Link? We have many residents who have been involved either as a Village Communicator or a Team Link for several years and some are looking to pass the baton.

Being a Team Link is not hard to do. The duty of a team link is to forward information to the residents on their assigned team. The process is simple. I send an email to 34 Village Communicators—who then forward it to



their assigned Team Links, who then forward it to the residents on their individual teams. While this system is somewhat cumbersome, we like that it tends to keep groups of residents knit together. Keep in mind, the only emails you forward to your team will be the ones received from this office directly to the Village Communicators/Team Links – For Distribution.

At minimum, you set up a group email address and thus forward email as you receive it from your Village Communicator (which I would supply to you). I send such emails about once per month. Any other tasks you assume, such as organizing get-togethers in your neighborhood, is very much appreciated by your neighbors, but is not required.

"We're Here to Help"

There is no clearly defined age when you become a senior citizen. Some people might consider themselves seniors when they retire from the workplace, sign up for Social Security or begin to spend their retirement savings, but others aren't ready to call themselves a senior citizen yet. We here at Sun City Roseville see this as a 55+ active community but here are milestones to think about.

- 1. Qualifying for Medicare.
- 2. Social Security eligibility.
- 3. Receiving senior discounts.

- 5. Changes in health.
- 1. Qualifying for Medicare: There are specific ages when you qualify for various types of retirement benefits. In some aspects society makes it very clear when we become senior citizens.
- 2. Social Security Eligibility: Benefits can begin as early as age 62 or as late as age 70. If you have paid into the Social Security system and are eligible for benefits, you can receive a reduced payment when you turn 62. To receive your full benefit, you can wait until you reach your full retirement age, which is usually age 66 or 67.
- 3. Receiving Senior Discounts: If you feel short on cash or want extra perks, you may enjoy the promotions that are directed

to seniors. Anyone who is 50 or older is eligible to become an AARP member and qualify for AARP discounts. Some businesses start offering discounts to customers when they reach age 55. If you look for deals for seniors, you can find them at certain retailers, restaurants and grocery stores. Hotels, car rental agencies and airlines might offer discounts too. Ask about a senior rate with your cellphone provider and pharmacy to see what is available.

4. Stepping Away From Work: After you retire from an extensive career, your family and friends may consider you to have reached senior citizen status. The transition might bring on a feeling of meaning and purpose. As you move away from the office, you may have a sense of gratitude for the years you were able to work and your ability to now pursue a passion.

On the other hand, you could be compelled to take on a part-time job to bring in extra income. You might also try out a new business or look for a position in an area you've always found interesting. Retirement often brings the freedom to decide how and when you would like to work.

5. Changes in Health: Medical conditions such as arthritis, hypertension or hearing loss may cause you to feel like you have crossed the senior citizen line. It's hard to feel young when you are being fitted with a walker or hearing aid. In addition, feeling fatigued or ready for bed by 9 p.m. might be an indicator you are getting older. And seniors, remember We're Here to Help!

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

Birders

In between the rainy and windy weather at the beginning of this year, SCR Birders were treated to perfect bird watching weather at Gray Lodge Wildlife Area near Gridley. Here we identified 36 species of resident and migrating birds, including hundreds of

Snow Geese resting in a field next to the road leading to Gray Lodge. Among other species seen were: White-fronted Goose Bufflehead, Doublecrested Cormorant, Green-winged Teal, Northern Harrier,



Phainopepla, Sand Hill Crane, and Bald Eagle.

Unfortunately, two field trips scheduled for the first two months of this year, to the Lincoln Water Treatment Facility and the Cosumnes River Preserve, had to be cancelled due to rain or flooding. The Birders schedule for the rest of this season's birding field trips will be reviewed to accommodate the substitution of cancelled trips for future planned trips. Residents listed on the Birders' email roster will be notified by eBlast of any resultant changes. For more information, contact either Janet Zeitman at 916-771-5235 or Janet Morelli at 916-782-6393.

A highlight of a recent field trip, to Gray Lodge, was the sighting of a Bald Eagle (our National Bird) just as Birders were leaving to return to SCR. This bird is most common in Alaska, more common in the North, and common to rare over much of the rest of the West. It is very large (length 31",

wing span 80", and weight 9.5 lb) with a white head and tail and a yellow bill. The juvenile Bald Eagle is dark with white on the underside and will acquire adult plumage in four to six years. During breeding season the bird will feed mainly on fish; during the winter, it will also eat injured waterfowl and carrion. It makes the largest stick nest of all raptors sometimes weighing a ton or more!

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
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Safety First — Home Repair Scams

Did recent winter storms blow down your fence, cause your roof to leak, or flood your home? Are you just getting ready to get started on some overdo projects around the house as spring is here? Whether you are planning on performing some routine maintenance on your home,



There are several ways scammers advertise and try to take advantage of people. Here are some ways scammers will try to get your money:

- Solicit at your door or randomly call you offering to fix a problem you didn't know you had.
- Advertise that they can fix roof leaks, install windows, or furnish your roof with solar panels for a low price...but you must act now.
- Pressure you to make a quick decision or offer to provide financing.
- Demand all or a large down payment and then never complete the work.
- Do sloppy work or make the situation worse then stop responding to you or disappear.
- Say they have material left over from a previous job that they will sell you cheaply, if you commit today.

Steps you can take to protect yourself and your home:



- Ask solicitors, vendors, or contractors for references, and license and insurance information.
- Confirm a Home Improvement Salesperson (HIS) registration or contractor's license is valid and current by searching the Department of Consumer

Affairs Contractors State License Board: https://www.cslb.ca.gov/OnlineServices/CheckLicenseII/CheckLicense.aspx

- Try to get written estimates from three different companies/contractors – this helps to make sure the pricing offered is within a standard range.
- Take time to make an educated decision.
- Do not pay by cash, direct wire transfer, or load funds onto gift cards.
- If hired, try to make sure the contract clearly states the services being provided, the materials to be used, and estimated time of completion.
- Never pay more than 10% deposit. That's the legal max allowed in CA.

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Observations on Happiness

Everyone wants to be happy, right? In fact, the Declaration of Independence says that we Americans have the inalienable right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Some time ago I ran across a Wall Street Journal article on a Harvard study on happiness. That paper, like many other things in the house, has disappeared. However, I was able to Google an article on this study. It tracked the health of 268 Harvard sophomores starting back in 1938. Interestingly, one of those sophomores was John. F. Kennedy. In the 1970's 456 Boston inner-city residents were added to the study.

So, what did the study find out about happiness? The study director says: "The surprising finding is that our relationships and how happy we are in our relationships has a powerful influence on our health. Taking care of your body is important but tending to your relationships is a form of self-care, too. That, I think, is the revelation." Or, as the article's headline put it: "Harvard study, almost 80 years old, has proved that embracing community helps us live longer, and be happier."

So, as with many such scholarly studies, this one concluded what most people would instinctively feel anyway, that it's good to have friends and family. I also wonder if those who are more sociable are extroverts who are happier than introverts (like myself) to begin with. Let's say that it probably goes both ways. Of course as we get older our circle of friends and family dwindles, or, as Casey Stengal said, Most of the people I know my age is dead. At any rate, it's a good idea to keep in touch with friends and family as much as possible and as long as possible.

Out of curiosity I Googled to find out which countries in the world were the happiest and found out that there's a World Happiness Report. It's based on an annual survey of about 150 countries and issued by the United Nations. In 2022 for the fifth year in a row Finland was ranked as the happiest country. To quote, "The Nordic country and its neighbors Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Iceland all score very well on the measures the report uses to explain its findings, healthy life expectancy, GDP per capita, social support in times of trouble, low corruption and high social trust, generosity in a community where people look after each other and freedom to make life decisions."

Another study on why the Nordic countries are the happiest says that Nordic countries experience "high levels of social trust toward each other which play an important role in determining life satisfaction." This correlates with the Harvard study finding that embracing community makes us happier. Where does the United States stand in the ranking of world's happiest countries? Sixteenth. This would seem to indicate that although we Americans have the inalienable right to the pursuit of happiness achieving it may not be that easy.

In connection with this last I recalled a line from a Greek play that I read in college (boy, was that a long time ago!): "Call no man happy who isn't dead." A pretty gloomy assessment but off the top of my head I could think of a lot of reasons why you couldn't be happy as you go through life. When you're a kid you have to fit in with the "gang." When you're a teenager you're at the mercy of your hormones. When you're a grown-up you have to get a job to earn a living and hope you don't get a bad boss. Then when you have a family, you have to contend with all the problems that brings, like having teenagers in the house. Then when you get to retire, and the kids are gone, you eventually have to contend with all the aches and pains of being old.

I did a little more Googling and found that besides all of the above there may be a scientific reason why people can't be happy. According to this article "Humans are not designed to be happy or even content. Instead, we are primarily designed to survive and reproduce... $A \, state\, of\, contentment\, is\, discouraged\, by\, nature$ because it would lower our guard against possible threats to our survival." Further on, the article says that "happiness, being a mere construct with no neurological basis, cannot be found in the brain tissue."

The author of this article would no doubt agree that "No man is happy until he is dead." Notwithstanding all of this, I think that it's still possible to achieve some happiness, or maybe just contentment, in life. Maybe the key is to not pursue happiness as such but to do the best you can, try to do some good and, like the Nordics, help out others. Oh, and keep your friends and family close.
