The Handy Helper Coordinators will provide information packed tips on home maintenance, including advice on smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors, furnace filters, thermostats, sprinkler controllers, garage door maintenance and programming, electrical issues, and much more. Ten-year (and now 20 year) replacement items will be addressed. A question-and-answer session will follow the presentation. Check out our website: www.neighborsindeed.org.

Summer is arriving, here are a few past suggestions to stay cool and water wisely.

Indoor Temperature Control



- Reprogram your thermostat to its summer setting. Set the AC high in your "comfort zone" at 78–80 degrees. You'll adjust and still feel comfortable.
- Keep your furnace filter clean for efficient air circulation.
- Open your windows in the evenings to
- Use your ceiling fans to circulate the air during the night and day. Make sure the fans

are in the DOWN draft position to push cool air down (turning counter clockwise).

Outdoor Irrigation

- Water 2-3 days/week and minimize the watering time duration. During heat waves, you can provide additional water by hand in the morning.
- · Set your timers for early morning watering for less evaporation.
- · Prevent wasted runoff onto sidewalks and gutters by adjusting timers and sprayers to retain water on your lawns, plants and trees.
- Check and repair drippers, sprinkler heads, severed sprinkler lines, leaks, drippers going nowhere, etc.
- Cover your watering valves to protect them from sun damage.

The Players will present "12 Angry Jurors" June 8-9 at 7 PM and June 10-11 at 2 PM in Presentation Hall. The play, based on the classic movie "Twelve Angry Men," (starring Henry Fonda), features both women and men in the


cast. While it first appears to be an open and shut case, one juror refuses to make a snap judgement and insists the jurors dig deeper (that is, do their job).

The film has been lauded for its impact on the genre of courtroom drama. Audiences will see that the play is intense, and the message is timeless. Rogers Ebert's film review said, "It's a crash course in those passages of the Constitution that promise defendants a fair trial and the presumption of innocence."

When asked about their roles, three cast members had this to say:

Mary Beth Quallick says her character "has deep-seated prejudice, leading to an unjustified anger and vicious rage, tainting the jury deliberations."

Ken Reiss described his character as "a thoughtful, deliberate man who wants his fellow jurors to look at the evidence logically and consistently. The stakes are high since this trial is about a capital crime, with a death



sentence quite possible."

Julie Africa added, "Being on the other side of the curtain (she's acting, not directing this time!) is both fun and challenging! The audience should ponder what they would do in this jury's place. Would they have the courage of their conviction?"





Woodcarvers Club



LH Astronomy Group

On Wednesday, June 7 at 6:30 PM in the Orchard Creek Front Ballroom, the LHAG will co-host, with the SCLH Community Forum, a special program and presentation by Astro Imager Ken Crawford titled "The Pursuit of Star Streams - Going Deep for Science from My Backyard!". This is Ken's personal journey showcasing how he evolved from taking "pretty" pictures of interstellar objects and formations from his backyard to finding himself working with world-wide professional astronomers in the pursuit of "Star Streams." These rivers of stars help in our understanding of how galaxies form, merge and evolve. This special presentation is open to all SCLH residents at no charge.

LHAG Cosmology Interest Group (CIG) this sub-group focuses its meetings through lectures and discussions on astrophysics, the branch of astronomy concerned with the physical nature of stars and other celestial bodies. For the June 19th meeting (6:45 PM in the Fine Arts room of the Orchard Creek Lodge and open to all SCLH residents), discover the fate of solar mass stars after they exhaust their nuclear fuel. The galaxies are teeming with these dim "white dwarfs" that pack the mass of the Sun into a sphere roughly the size of Earth. Venture into quantum theory to understand what keeps these exotic stars from collapsing into black holes, and learn about the Chandrasekhar limit, which determines a white dwarf's maximum mass.

LHAG Telescope Interest Group (TIG) —This sub-group is open to all SCLH residents and guests. Most sessions ("star parties") involve members who set up their telescopes for viewing solar system planets/moons and other interstellar deep space objects. The next star party is scheduled for Thursday, June 15th, 2023. The Sun sets at 8:30 PM.



Whimbrel. It is unusual, but not unknown, to find nesting flickers in the Sacramento Valley. Whimbrel sightings are unusual, so they were likely migrating through.

On May 12 we drove out McCourtney Road to Camp Far West Lake and Spenceville Wildlife Management Area. While 31 was a low species count, we were not disappointed. First off, near the entrance to Camp Far West campground was a Bald Eagle nest with an adult eagle feeding 2 chicks. The Osprey nest that we have observed for years at the entrance is now abandoned, but we did find two more occupied nests, one farther up the road and the other below the dam. Also below the dam was a Great Blue Heron rookery. Other sightings were Say's Phoebe, Yellow Warbler, and Lawrence's Goldfinch.








Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.



Market Update

The market has continued to enjoy the spring lift in prices, but that is not unusual even in bad markets. Only one year in the past 20 saw the median price fall in the January-April time frame and that was 2008. Prices overall continued to fall for another 5 years but still the January-April time saw the median price rise. For 2023 the median price rose 6.84% from January to April.

I wrote last month about the increase in over 55 communities and how that supply had affected prices. There is another Active 55 community opening in Placer County between Loomis, Lincoln and Newcastle. Long anticipated Trilogy at Bickford Ranch, by Shea homes are releasing their first 60+ lots. This has and will draw a lot of attention because so many of the lots are view lots, with views of downtown, Folsom Lake and the Sierras. I expect buyers from outside the area to be particularly interested due to the quiet undeveloped nature of the land surrounding the new home sites and the low density of the development itself.
