# Hugh and Pana Wilder—Sun City Swimming

Hugh and Pana Wilder have lived in Sun City Lincoln Hills for two years. Both former teachers and current avid athletes, the couple share passions for both physical and mental fitness while enjoying the excellent facilities in Sun City.

At one point in Hugh's younger years, Hugh's father was working at Ohio State University. A competitive swimmer himself in college, the father recognized Hugh's early interest in swimming and arranged for lessons from Yoshi Oyakawa, the 1952 American Olympic Gold Medalist in backstroke. Yoshi was a student at Ohio State at the time. Hugh and his older brother both took to swimming, joining YMCA and summer teams, beginning a lifetime of competition in the backstroke for Hugh and Yoshi. Hugh would go on to break some of Yoshi's records as they both competed in National and World Masters Championship meets later in life. Masters swimming holds competitions for adult athletes, separating

competitors by five-year age groups.

But before Hugh became part of the World Masters he was a backstroke swimmer in high school and college. He attended Denison

College in Ohio and majored in Philosophy. He met his wife Pana in Shakespeare class. Philosophy, Pana and swimming were his three passions. At Denison, he was a four-year NCAA All-American college champion.

Hugh started competitive swimming again in Masters competition in 1990 and continued until 2018. In 2017, Hugh was inducted into the International Swimming Masters Hall of Fame. His childhood instructor, Yoshi Oyakawa, also competed in the Masters for many years. Hugh would come along later and beat Yoshi's records for the same age bracket. During his Masters career, Hugh set twenty-five Masters world records in six age groups (45-49 through 70-74). Six of these world records still stand. At World Masters Championship meets since 1992, Hugh won four gold medals, one silver and three bronze.

Before Pana and Hugh met at Denison College, Pana grew up in the Chicago area. (cont' on page 21)



to feature both women and men in the cast. While it first appears to be an open and shut case, as the jurors begin to dig



more deeply, we witness their emotionally chargeddebate. Guilty? Innocent? We shall see!"

Empire reviewer William Thomas praised the movie version (the script of which is almost a verbatim repeat of the theatrical script) for its "development of character and plot without resorting to the big stunts, grandiose locations or special effects." Amidst the "prejudices and neuroses" of the jurors, Thomas dubbed the movie "a screenwriting masterclass...a jury room thriller."

The cast members are excited about bringing you – the audience – into their jury deliberation room as they discover that the personal experiences, points of view, and deeply-seated biases of each juror make



for "angry" exchanges in deciding the fate of a young man accused of murder. The accompanying photo shows four of our jurors (MaryBeth Quallick, Tim Tatum, Richard Fitzmaurice, and Tom Quallick) sorting out their differences





After trash arrives at the facility, the bags are opened and the trash moves along a series of conveyer belts where employees remove items that can be recycled or composted.

We were told on the tour how this strategy doesn't rely on individual consumers to clean and sort trash, instead assuring that each bag of trash collected is sorted. WPWM sells recyclables to third party companies that process it. They can respond quickly to changing market conditions by adjusting what the sorters collect.

Many of us left feeling how it was good to know that they are on the job turning our trash into treasure.





Astronomical Events for the Month of May

May 5: Flower Moon — May's Full Moon is known as the Flower Moon after all the

flowers that bloom around this time in the Northern Hemisphere. Other names include the Planting Moon, and the Milk Moon, while some named it the Hare Moon. Native Americans called it Budding Moon, and Egg Laying Moon.

May 5–6: Eta Aquarids meteor shower
The radiant, the point in the sky where the
Eta Aquarids seem to emerge from, is in the
direction of the constellation Aquarius in the
Southern sky. The shower is named after the
brightest star of the constellation, Eta Aquarii.
The Eta Aquarids is one of two meteor showers
created by debris from Comet Halley.

May 15/16: Earthshine (Observe the unlit part of the Moon as a dim glow)

The Waxing and Waning Crescent Moon phases in April and May are the best time to see earthshine, where the unlit part of the Moon becomes visible. It is also known as Da Vinci glow.

May 22/23: The Moon, Venus, and Mars The Moon passes between the planets Venus and Mars in the evening sky.



son, his wife and their two children live in Flagstaff, Arizona. Both sons followed in the family tradition of marrying their college sweethearts.



The color of courage was pink when I walked across the Tower Bridge with our daughters, one in a sassy breast cancer survivor shirt. The color of courage was red in February when I wore the pin for heart disease, my

friends' and my own. The color of courage was green last May, like the ribbon imprinted on the grey tee shirt in my closet, the shirt I didn't wear.

The color of courage is green for mental illness, but its ribboned shirts are fewer in number. How can this be? Isn't a brain as important as a heart, a lung, a kidney? Isn't the courage to fight its disease as important? Not yet?

Why do we say "Joe is Bipolar" but not "Frank is Diabetes?" Why is Joe defined by a disease? Why do depression and addiction imply character weakness? Why is brain pain less likely to elicit a card, a flower, a hug? Why do obituaries say "unexpected death" when the truth might be suicide? Is it because we fear what we don't know? Or do some of us fear stigma?

In December 2012 I wrote an article about the late Dr. Howard Liebgold and his wife in this paper. A Kaiser doctor, Dr. Liebgold had suffered from severe panic disorder. When his 21 year old son committed suicide because of his own undiagnosed panic attacks, Dr. Liebgold changed his focus to psychiatry. His grief and courage led to awareness and treatment, his own and that of countless others. He called himself Dr. Fear (False Exaggerations Appearing Real). Remember his license plate?

Have you ever seen the dark, blank stare of a homeless person you don't know or an Alzheimers' patient you do? Have you seen







## **Market Update**
