It's one of many that Wendey brought back from Kansas and painted gold and silver to give to family members at Christmas so they could all have a lovely door stop.

Dave's dad worked in the aerospace industry and he and his sister and brother were brought up in Southern California. When the family home was appropriated by the government to build a freeway, they moved to Santa Clarita where Dave graduated from high school in 1971. After getting his A.A. degree, he joined the Navy where he served for six years, using the GI bill later to earn a degree in Mechanical Engineering from California State University at Northridge.

Both Dave and Wendey were born in



of Fame in 1963.

It was through Bud's "Writing for Publications" class at American River College that he was honored by the Robert C. Anderson Society of Journalists and Authors as the ``mostinspirational writing coach in America".

In 2000, Bud co-authored "Chicken Soup for the Writer's Soul" with Jack Canfield and Mark Hansen. After 40 years of teaching, Bud was named "Teacher of the Year" by the local Rotary Club and was chosen to deliver the graduation address at ARC.

But, it was in 2004 that Bud began to inspire people in Sun City as he started the Sun City Harmonicoots, the largest harmonica band in the country. Those that were privileged to learn the harmonica from Bud often heard him say "Let's have some fun" as he lifted the harmonica to his lips and inspired, coached, stimulated, and moved his audience to tunes such as "Hello Dolly" and his famous "train whistle".

On March 16, 2023, Bud Gardner entered eternal rest. The Sun City Harmonicoots were

invited to honor Bud at his Celebration of Life held at Sierra Pines on April 16th. As we lifted our harps up and closed our eyes, we all heard Bud say, "Now let's have some fun." And so, we did. RIP Bud Gardner, a coach, a mentor, a friend, a legacy. Harps Up!








Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.

Lincoln City Hall is located at 600 Sixth Street in Lincoln and is open 8-5, M-F.







### **Neighborhood Watch/Citizen Patrol**

Come to our next Neighborhood Watch Meeting June 12th at 10am in the Timbercreek Ballroom to learn about the Benefits of a Neighborhood Watch Program.

The primary intent of a Neighborhood Watch program are to report suspicious activity, reduce crime, and increase neighborhood safety. While beginning a Neighborhood Watch program is not a guarantee of crime reduction, studies show that neighborhoods with active Neighborhood Watch will experience an average of a 16-percent crime reduction.

Other benefits include:

- •An increased sense of responsibility and control. These programs help citizens feel empowered in their everyday lives, which can help reduce fear and may lead to an increased sense of personal security.
- Greater unity within neighborhoods. Regular meetings bring neighbors together to talk and get to know one another. This leads to a greater sense of unity within the neighborhood and can also bring neighbors together as friends
- •Improved relations with law enforcement. Crime watch programs increase contacts between neighbors and law enforcement, leading to more productive and comfortable relationships.
- Better community unity. Having something in common, like a Neighborhood Watch Program, brings people together and

builds community unity.

]•Improved quality of life. When crime goes down, the quality of life improves for residents. Safer neighborhoods mean happier residents and a better place to live.

Village Communicators — Village Communicators forward safety information received from the Neighborhood Watch Office to each of their Team Links. Team Links then forward to the assigned residents on their respective teams.

Team Links — Team Links are assigned 10-15 houses, and they should be directly involved with their immediate neighbors.

Neighborhood Watch Members (Residents of Sun City)

#### **Birders**

No birding field trips are scheduled for the  $months\,of\,June, July, and\,August\,due\,to\,the\,hot$ weather and full leaf cover on the trees making bird watching very uncomfortable and birds difficult to see. Avid SCR birdwatchers will continue to keep their binoculars and cameras handy for shorter walks, cooler temperatures, and occasional trips to other geographical areas with moderate temperatures during the summer months. SCR Birders will create a new schedule of field trips for the next season, September 2023 to May 2024, and post it to the Birders' Group web site in August 2023. In the meantime, continue watching birds in your backyard, neighborhood, and SCR community and improving your identifying skills by comparing your sightings with field guide illustrations/photos or birding web sites such as audubon.org.

A Tree Swallow is the only swallow seen year-round in California's Central Valley. The male bird has a bright metallic blue or blue-green head, back, and tail and is clear



white underneath. A female bird is dark and drab on top and white underneath. These swallows will be seen flying in large flocks over marshes, ponds, and streams that have wooded habitat nearby, catching insects on the fly and eating berries on trees and bushes. They like to nest in a hole in a dead tree or fence post

or find an empty nest box (sometimes taking over nest boxes intended for use by Western Bluebirds).

We hope to have another ride in Tahoe though much will depend on trail and road conditions in that area.


A Nominating Committee was selected and we'll announce a slate of candidates at our June meeting.

bought by Boeing) to work on a very special project—the Space Shuttle. That work lasted twenty years. "I had a lot of fun at work," he remembers, "but it was also stressful." When the Challenger broke apart in 1986, killing all seven crew members aboard, his fellow engineers suffered under the public scrutiny that ensued. Dave's team immediately sought to find the cause of the disaster, working 54-hour weeks for two years to solve the mystery. They were all relieved when they discovered that it did not involve the engine they had worked on but was due to the failure of an O-ring seal in the right rocket booster. During Dave's career, he worked on a pump bearing design improvement that greatly enhanced flight safety and mission success during the Space Shuttle Space Transportation System Program. For this exceptional work, he was awarded the Astronauts Personal Achievement Award in 1993 given to him personally by astronaut Steve L. Smith. He continued working for Boeing on other projects, retiring after 30 years with the company.

When Wendey's mother retired from selling real estate, Wendey moved from selling re-sale homes to working directly for the builders selling new homes. She was also recognized during her career in the real estate industry. She was awarded Sales Volume Winner by K. Hovnanian/Forecast Homes in 2005 for selling almost \$12 million in sales during the second quarter of that year in Southern California.

Over the years, the couple liked most to camp and fish in the eastern Sierras. They preferred places like Mono Lake, Lee Vining, Bishop, and Long Pine to pull in trout. Dave laughs recalling the time Wendey went to clean a huge, tagged trout that she had caught and all the men at the cleaning trough gawked at her trout which was much larger than the ones they had caught that day. They also camped up and down the southern California coast from San Diego to Pismo and the desert, Pahrump and Las Vegas.

Other than trips to Hawaii to visit family, Dave and Wendey have taken some trips simply because Dave's job brought them there. One





such time was when Dave worked temporarily at an engine test facility which bordered Mississippi and Louisiana. When the project ended, it was only a short drive to New Orleans where they encountered what they deemed the best cuisine in the world. They remember, in particular, the Red Fish Grille, and eating beignets for breakfast every day.

During another work trip to Wichita, Kansas, they took their RV and tow car to a campground near a Boeing facility where they spent three months in the summer heat. "It was so hot," says Dave, "that the AC unit in the RV only reduced the outside by maybe 20 degrees!" They remembered suffering through the heat and humidity which were in the triple digits most days.

Ultimately, they had to purchase a weather radio shortly after arriving because it was tornado season and Wichita is in Tornado Alley country. They experienced a close call

when the winds churned up to 90 miles an hour and they ended up in a shelter one night, avoiding a tornado in the area. Wendey was so happy to get back to California, she kissed the ground when they arrived home.

Another adventure happened in Lake country which had been touted in an article they'd read in Sunset magazine. "We call it the night of the bears," says Wendey. They were camping with family members, when a late arrival drove into the tent camp next door, leaving food on their camping table before going to bed. "There was a bear invasion," recalls Dave. He and Wendey were tucked safely away in their RV when suddenly they heard the tent campers yelling, "Don't come out!" They watched through their window as two bears ran back and forth raiding the food left out and wreaking havoc. Wendey started banging pots and pans, eventually scaring the bears away. Everyone vacated the campground the next day. After that trip, family members banned Wendey from buying Sunset magazines ever again.

For recreation, Wendey has fun with a group of ladies who play Pegs and Jokers and some Hand and Foot games. She also attends various events like the Art and Craft shows and the yearly garden tours given by the Garden Club. During the summer heat, she hangs out at the pool.

Recovering from a knee replacement which he had last year, Dave keeps busy taking Chloe for walks with Wendey around the neighborhood and going to the gym several times a week. He is also a member of a model flying club in Roseville.

Since moving to SCR in 2016, the couple feel truly blessed to enjoy their retirement years here. Every day they are grateful for what they consider another day in paradise.



## Roseville Industrial Park Update

The processing of the Roseville Industrial Park proposal is currently on pause while the project applicant, Panattoni Development Corporation, pursues additional public outreach.

The City will not be actively processing the application or preparing responses to the public comments regarding the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR), while Panattoni conducts its outreach.

At the conclusion of Panattoni's outreach, the City will notify all interested parties of the next steps. If significant changes to the project description occur, there is the potential for additional environmental analysis and the possible need to recirculate the DEIR for public comment.

The City will continue to update this project webpage and notify interested parties when new information arises. Subscribe to the project information list at Roseville.ca.us/industrialpark

"Panattoni Development Corporation is committed to work with Roseville and surrounding communities to plan for the future uses of the Philips Road site located in western Roseville," Panattoni said in a statement.

"As such, we plan to hold a series of "living room" meetings with residents in the surrounding neighborhoods. Our goal with

these meetings is for small groups to weigh in on appropriate uses for the site, given the city's economic development planning goals for this area of West Roseville. Our intent is to leave each meeting with a design that outlines a proposed vision of the site from the group.

We plan to start these meetings in mid-May and have them run at least throughout the summer.

Once we have completed all of our living room design meetings, we will schedule a larger community meeting to present the results of each meeting and discuss next steps.

# Roseville Parks & Recreation Programs and Services Honored

Roseville Parks, Recreation & Libraries recently received news that they are a finalist for the prestigious National Gold Medal Award for Excellence in Park and Recreation Management. Roseville is one of four finalists in the highly competitive population class of 150,001-400,000.

Founded in 1965, the National Gold Medal Awards program honors communities in the United States that demonstrate excellence

in parks and recreation through long-range planning, resource management, volunteerism, environmental stewardship, program development, professional development and agency recognition.

Roseville was a finalist in the 75,001-150,000 category in 2022 and won the Gold Medal Award in 1972.

Next up, finalists must create a 5 minute video showcasing their agencies. Agencies are judged on their ability to address the needs of those they serve by a panel of five park and recreation professionals. Judges are chosen for their considerable experience and knowledge in parks and recreation both locally and nationally.

This year's winners will be announced at the 2023 National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) Annual Conference in October.

Roseville Parks, Recreation & Libraries manages 81 developed parks, 300 acres of street landscaping, two recreation centers, three libraries, three pools, two golf courses, a Native American museum and 19 Adventure Club sites for before/after school childcare. It is also responsible for the management of just under 4,000 acres of open space/preserves which accounts for nearly 15% of the entire City.

The Gold Medal Awards are presented by the American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration (AAPRA), in partnership with NRPA.





### Market Update

The market has continued to enjoy the spring lift in prices, but that is not unusual even in bad markets. Only one year in the past 20 saw the median price fall in the January-April time frame and that was 2008. Prices overall continued to fall for another 5 years but still the January-April time saw the median price rise. For 2023 the median price rose 6.84% from January to April. I wrote last month about the increase in over 55 communities and how that supply had affected prices. There is another Active 55 community opening in Placer County between Loomis, Lincoln and Newcastle. Long anticipated Trilogy at Bickford Ranch, by Shea homes are releasing their first 60+ lots. This has and will draw a lot of attention because so many of the lots are view lots, with views of downtown, Folsom Lake and the Sierras. I expect buyers from outside the area to be particularly interested due to the quiet undeveloped nature of the land surrounding the new home sites and the low density of the development itself.
