


volunteers to help. To offer to help and/or to RSVP to the luncheon, call Verity at 916-719-8906. The food and beverages are provided.

Without prompting she will all too often remind me of items I should want to buy from Amazon based on previous purchases either by me or my wife. Instead of merely answering a question, she will also offer to tell me bad jokes, suggest I should inquire about the current humidity and offer random questions from Jeopardy.

This is more than a little creepy coming from a voice inside a plastic disk from locations scattered throughout my house.

And then there are the times she will completely bollix a question. For example she gave me the physics behind the workings of mirrors rather than the age of Helen Mirren. Even worse on some occasions she can get downright cheeky. A recent, simple inquiry— "Alexa, what was the name of the guy who was always on the covers of those cheap romance novels in the 1990s with the long blond hair?" It was a simple enough inquiry that should have netted me a one word answer—"Fabio". Instead I was told in a clearly condescending tone "I have no idea what you are trying to ask." A repeat of the question resulted in crickets. A third try got me "You need to restate your question". Of course I had no choice but to shout "Hey little lady you're the one in a stupid box not me; don't forget I can unplug all of you any time I want!" Lately this can happen on multiple occasions in a day.

Learning to coexist

AI offers other critical if sometimes frustrating improvements in our lives. Realistically neither I nor my wife can effectively vacuum under the sofas, beds or dressers in our home. That's a job for Roomba the robot vacuum. "Buddy", the name we have given this machine, can do a marvelous iob of getting to those places either we cannot or would be risking injury damage if we tried. Like other AI, of course, sadly "he" is only as effective as the humans who need to clear the room of dangling wires and loose small items on the floor (robot choking hazards) as well as set up the appropriate invisible walls to prevent robot wandering. Despite our best efforts, too often I have found myself running down the hall trying to capture a runaway vacuum bent on wanton destruction in "unsafe" spaces or watched my wife struggle to remove an electric cord lodged deep in Buddy's gullet.

Been there, done that?



As I careen toward the latter chapters in my life, it is clear the far wiser choice should be to embrace more of such technology, not less. It is hard to conjure up any argument that could refute the fact that the lives of so many seniors are made easier, richer and more productive by the Artificial Intelligence of today and that of the future.





Some interesting numbers in the over 55 market in Roseville and Lincoln. In Lincoln there are (as of June 12th) 21 homes active, available listings, 46 homes are under contract and 16 of that total are new builds that came onto MLS via the builder. In 95747 there are 27 active available homes and 26 under contract, with no new builds in the numbers. That makes sense in the Lincoln has several new over 55 communities. But builders don't list all their available homes and or lots so the numbers can get skewed.
