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Charlie Baughman — Into Cruising and Cuisine

When you're approaching Charlie Baughman's house, you'll notice a box near the front door which reads: "Dues: Hiking, Dance, and Drama." That's because as Treasurer of these three clubs, he makes it easy for the members to turn in their club dues without having to ring his doorbell or have to come back because he's not home. His thoughtfulness is genuine. It's just how he rolls.

Born in Hollywood in 1938, Charlie grew up with one younger brother in the San Fernando valley. He and his friends used the back lot of Republic Pictures—a studio which made all the early westerns with actors like Tom Mix and Gene Autry—as a playground. They swam in the Los Angeles River before it was cemented over and went crawdad fishing. Charlie remembers the 1950's as the best time with no restrictions. "It was a great, innocent time," he recalls.

His family vacations were spent camping in California state parks, especially Yosemite

which they visited every year. "I saw the real fire fall there," he says. He backpacked with his dad in the Sierras and even hiked Mt. Whitney.

In his junior year at North Hollywood High School, Charlie joined the Navy Reserves to avoid the draft. After graduating in 1956, he went to Alaska because he loves being in the great outdoors. Six months later, he was called

to duty and served eighteen months in the Navy but vowed someday he would return to Alaska. As part of his service, he spent nine months in Cuba, building housing units, sampling rum drinks and spending time on the beach.

When he got out of the Navy, he decided to go back to school, eventually earning a B.S. in Business Administration from the University of Redlands. It was during that time that he got re-acquainted "with the girl down the street," Karen Banks. She had been his neighbor when he was younger, but he pretty much had ignored her until she finally caught his eye. He proposed to her in front of his buddies at Bob's Drive-In and they got married in a church wedding in 1959.

His career years began in the field of Healthcare Administration. He first worked at Prudential, writing business letters and contracts, then he made a series of moves to at least seven other companies as the (cont' on page 25)




Drama Club





Want To Know More about SCR Finances?

At the beginning of each month, an information sheet titled "Financial Statements Summary, Fiscal Year 2023/2024" is available in the Lodge, either on the Courier magazine distribution table or in hanging slots at the right of the Lobby Monitor's Desk. This two-sided sheet contains finance information for all our departments and our accounts for the prior month and since the beginning of the fiscal year.

Now, you can view this form on the Resident Website, www.scres.org, at the Finance Committee's webpage. To access this webpage go the "Board & Committees" menu at the top of the Website's screen, to "Committees", to Finance Committee. Or vou can use the search field to find "Finance

Committee". At the right side of the Finance Committee's webpage, click on the link "Monthly Financial Statement Summary".

Another resource would attend the monthly Finance Committee meeting, which is open to all SCR homeowners. It meets the Monday before the Friday of the Board of Directors' monthly meeting, in the Spruce Room at Sierra Pines at 1:30 pm.

New "Leadership Academy" Link — Sun City Roseville's Vision statement is "To continue to be the PREMIER Active Adult Residential Community in Northern California". That description reflects on all the facilities and activities that are available to our homeowners. I truly enjoyed being President of the Needle Arts Club for three years, I hope to see all of you in the general meetings and at the planned events.



Birders

Scheduled birding field trips have been completed for the months of September 2022 through mid-May 2023 and will resume again in mid-September 2023 when the daytime temperatures start to get cooler and the trees begin to lose their leaves. A new schedule of trips for field trips between mid-September 2023 and mid-May 2024 will be available on the Birders' Group web site in the later part of August 2023.

SCR residents are welcome to participate in these birding field trips – no birding experience is necessary. Just bring a pair of binoculars or a good camera and wear comfortable shoes. About a week before each scheduled trip, an email will be sent to all residents who have asked to have their email address added to the Birders' email roster. The email will describe the upcoming trip and special instructions such as the meeting place, time, duration, car pool fees, and park or trail fees. The Bewick's Wren (pronounced like "Buick") is a common songbird found in dry thickets and open woods of the west. It is a

relatively large, slender wren recognized by its white stripe over its eye and a long tail with white bars that it wags



sideways. Its long, narrow curved-down bill is used for scavenging on the ground and picking in crevices for insects and spiders. Overall, the bird is brownish with pale gray underparts. Nests are built with sticks and lined with feathers, leaves, grass, and sometimes shed snakeskin. These nests can be found in any available cavity, including woodpecker holes, tin cans, mailboxes, and coat pockets.

Table Tennis Group

Table tennis is a game of interpersonal relations. It is also a game of skill using a paddle to hit the ball with various angles and degrees of force. Skillful shots are rewarded by praise of players. Sometimes shots are made that are lucky rather than skillful. Since it is a game of skill rather than luck, apologies are often given where luck appears involved.

The most common reason for an apology is when a player hits the ball and it clips the net or the edge of the table resulting in a score. This is seen more as winning the point by luck rather than skill. At that moment, the player will raise the hand, the index finger, the racket, or just say, "Sorry."

Under the rules, a player is allowed to hit the ball with the hand holding the racket or hit the ball with the edge of the blade and the rubber. However, an apology is appropriate when a player hits the ball with anything other than with the rubber of the paddle. These shots off of the rubber have unpredictable effects, often earning lucky points by chance. An opponent may ask what happened. The player gives an explanation and apologizes.

While playing, a player may miss a serve. There is no need to say, "Sorry," but many players do because this is winning a free point without earning it. The opponent may be upset, so it is good to extend a word that you are sorry.

Easy shots are sometimes missed during play. Saying, "Sorry" is appropriate because the point was not earned.





Cornhole

It's easy to toss a less-than-one -pound

bag of beads (corn kernels in the old days) to a board 21 feet away, which is the senior distance. The challenge is to do so more accurately than the other players. Tossing a bag offers great lessons in physics.

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Safety First — Simple Summer Security Steps

As the weather warms up, the number of people outside at night increases. More people outside in the dark also means more people with intent on burglarizing vehicles and houses.

Roseville is a fairly safe community, leading some to believe that car or home burglaries don't happen here, so for some it is not a habit to lock doors and windows.

Unfortunately, unlocked cars and houses are easy pickings for those with ill intentions. Although there is not an epidemic of vehicle or home burglaries in Roseville, the community is not immune to it.

Simple steps to take to deter vehicle burglary:

- Always lock car doors. Individuals will check to see if a car is unlocked if they are looking for an easy opportunity to burglarize.
 - Windows are completely rolled up.
- Stow valuables out of view from anyone who can look through a car's windows. Anything left in plain view increases the odds of a burglary.
- Park in well-lit or high traffic areas if possible

Simple steps to deter a home burglary:

- Always lock all doors and windows at night and whenever you leave the house. This includes the door leading from the garage into the house.
- Blinds/curtains installed to obscure view into house

- Dowel in track or security rod for sliding lass doors
- Side and back gate latches secured with padlocks and kept locked when not actively in use
- Bright exterior lights installed around the house and lit when dark or with motion sensors

Make these simple steps a habit! If you use an e-calendar, set up a "9pm Routine" reminder. If you use a paper calendar/planner, write it in on your daily schedule.

If your car or house is burglarized, call and report it to the police department at 916-774-5000 option 1.

If you see someone or something suspicious in your neighborhood, call us and let us know! Use 9-1-1 if it's an emergency or a crime in progress, or 916-774-5000 option 1 if not.


body's 'go to sleep' hormones" and you'll sleep through the entire night and wake up fully rested and chipper.
