By the time you read this, our night at Moska Barrell House will be over. I know this group and we had a good time. Now, for some words from the club's Safety Coordinator, me.

As we know, most bicycle injuries are not caused by collisions with cars. But such a crash can be more serious. Here's a list of what you should do if involved in one.

Wait for the law enforcement to arrive. You may not even realize how badly you are injured for several hours, or even days Be sure your version of what happened gets into the report. Tell the officers about all injuries, no matter how minor. Do not tell anyone you are "fine".

Go to the doctor. This is proof you were injured and will establish the extent of your injuries. Take photos of your injuries. Write down what happened and add to the account as you remember details and include the "progress" of your injuries. Don't forget to mention your feelings.

Keep evidence. Take photos of everything that was damaged: clothes, gear and bike. Don't fix anything.

Talk to a lawyer. I think there is a tendency, especially in seniors, to be a "settler". Don't settle for the insurance company's offer that covers just "most" of your expenses. Don't even talk to them before you seek advice from an attorney. You would be best finding a lawyer experienced in bicycle law, but that is not always possible. Seeking advice will not necessarily mean you will hire a lawyer to represent you, but paying for a consultation may be well worth the money.

Know the law. Knowing the law, yourself will make you a better and safer rider and will help level the playing field should you be involved in an "accident".

Their e-mails consisted of a question related to elderly people and an answer by someone. Most of the time, the questions were a little inane, such as "Does living alone make you feel lonely?" (I'd say that in all probability the answer is Yes) or of not much interest.

However, sometimes there's a question that does catch my attention and one such was what should elderly people NOT do? As an oldster, I was curious as to what I shouldn't be doing, and I found the answer to be interesting. Itwas by some lady, and it was that older people should not be moving around too quickly. It goes on to say that when you get out of that chair, do it slowly. When someone rings the doorbell, don't sprint as if the house is on fire. It isn't. You've got all the time in the world and that goes for driving too. And don't lift stuff. Old people should not try to pretend they're training for the Olympics. That ship has sailed.

What this boils down to is that the elderly should recognize that they are just that and accept their limitations, or otherwise they're courting trouble. I think this is wise advice and maybe it struck me as so at this particular time is that I violated what is the cardinal rule for old people, DON'T FALL and not recognizing my limitations was a contributing factor.

Heeding the admonition not to fall, as I'm

sure many Sun City residents will attest to, is not that easy. Almost everyone I know has fallen at one time or another. I Googled and found that about 36 million falls were reported among older adults each year, and these resulted in about 32,000 deaths. Each year, about three million older adults are treated in emergency departments for a fall injury. One out of every five falls causes broken bones or a head injury. And we know that a common result of a fall is a broken hip. All in all, pretty scary stuff, and I'm thankful I seem to have survived my fall with just a few scrapes and bruises.

Another don't for oldsters can be avoided, and that is to not climb on ladders. One statistic I saw is that 43 percent of fatal falls involved falling off a ladder. So, don't think you have to clean out your gutters every year. There are plenty of younger people advertising they will do it and it will be worth the cost.

Aside from these things involving physical activities to avoid another big don't for us seniors is don't fall for scams. According to something called the Elder Fraud Report from the FBI, losses from scams more than doubled from 2019 to 2021, reaching almost \$1.7 billion, a tidy sum. I remember that in my old neighborhood a smooth-talking guy talked a lot of people into some investment that would pay them a lot of money and also save them on taxes. Of course, it turned out too good to be true.

Nowadays, I think most scams come through robocalls and e-mails and sometimes I feel that there's a whole army of people out there trying to separate us oldsters from our money. The best thing to do with robocalls, the scam experts say, is not to answer them. If it's the rare real call, let that person leave a message. As for scam e-mails, never click on a link to something and if you're told you've won some kind of reward, you probably haven't.

There are undoubtedly a lot of other don'ts for senior citizens, like don't get too grumpy and ornery and don't expect things to be the same as when we were youngsters. I'd add don't watch the news on television because it's too depressing, but you have to know something about what's going on in the world so maybe watch a little bit and of course don't believe everything you hear, especially from the "experts."

A final don't I'd like to suggest, which applies to youngsters as well as oldsters, is don't become a slave to your iPhone, iPad, computer and other technogadgets. The trouble is that these devices have become so integral to our lives and make things so much more convenient that this is impossible not to do. For example, I'm writing this on my computer and will send it as an attachment to an e-mail. And when one of the technogadgets stops working for no reason, which they have a habit of doing. call upon your grandkids. They'll know what to do.

So, take things slowly, don't climb on ladders, watch out for scammers, and try not to fall.
