

"This is my dream house! I want to live here!" This was the exclamation from the young granddaughter of a friend upon seeing Kathy Druge's house for the first time. A resident of SCR since 1997, Kathy has used her tasteful sense of décor to create a beautiful, comfortable environment for herself and her white Persian cat, Peppermint.

Born in Oakland, California, in 1944, Kathy was raised in San Lorenzo with two brothers and one sister, all twenty years older than her. Kathy's father was killed in a train accident when she was only ten years old, so growing up with just one parent and no siblings in the house made for a lonely existence. When she was nine, she learned to sew, eventually becoming skilled enough to make all her own clothes. This was also the time she got into quilting, creating her first one for her doll, never having seen a real quilt before.

After graduating from San Lorenzo High School in 1961, Kathy married Ken Bauer,

Dial-A-Ride is now Arrow and is a shared ride transit service that operates within the city limits of Roseville. Anyone can use Arrow and passengers are transported in small buses that are ADA compliant.

Ride reservations can be made seven days

in Hayward and one in Auburn and took care of horses, chickens, cows, and more. She even raised Collies. "I've always been into kids and animals," she says.

Kathy's first marriage lasted 19 years, until she met Dan Druge, who had gone to the same high school, but was five years older than her, so they were never in the same classes together. She remembers seeing him once back in high school, thinking "Wow, I've never seen anyone like him!" Dan owned the Grass Valley Ford dealership and came into the auto parts store where she worked. It was love at first sight. "My life began when I met Dan," she recalls. They were married on June 26, 1981.

After their wedding, the couple lived in a chalet in Cascade Shores in Nevada City. Their lives were filled with fun and adventure: snowmobiling, fishing, and traveling. 

We'll continue to improve the golf courses, offer up the Leadership Academy training to members interested in elevating



# **Neighborhood Watch/Citizen Patrol**

As I travel thru our community in my car or golf cart, I can see on a daily basis, people driving their cars and golf carts and not obeying the rules of the road. Not Stopping at STOP signs, or yielding to traffic can definitely cause an accident. Even in our "safe" community, we still have rules of the road to follow. Slow down and stop at the Stop Signs so no one ends up getting hurt. Just recently, we almost had a head-on collision with a golf cart and a car!

Unfortunately, many use our longer streets, i.e., Del Webb Blvd, Sun City Blvd, Timberrose, Buckskin, and Rose Garden and a few others as their own personal speedway. STAY ALIVE AT 25!

Excerpts taken from Roseville Police Department:

· According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the latest data on distracted driving reveals:

• More than 400,000 motorists were injured in accidents caused by distracted driving and 2.800 deaths occurred as a result.

• Distracted driving spikes at night between 6:00 pm and 11:00 pm.

• Roughly 20% of injuries occurring in car accident crashes involve distracted driving. • Drivers are distracted by their phones

at least 10% of their driving time.

• Three primary types of distractions:

• Mental or cognitive - when a driver's mind is focused on something besides driving. These can include talking to another passenger, thinking about something that is upsetting, road rage, daydreaming, or being under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.

• Visual-looking at things other than the road. This could include dropping something on the floor, changing music channels, controls in the car or Texting/dialing your cellphone.

• Manual – when one or both hands are taken off the wheel. These can include eating and drinking, adjusting your child's seatbelt, smoking, searching through your purse or wallet, or turning knobs in your car.

Complacency can be a huge factor. Many accidents happen near or around your home due to your familiarity with the surroundings. Do your best to stay focused on the task of driving safely and you will be able to respond more quickly, be better positioned to think clearly when needing to respond, and likely spot a distraction before it becomes a problem.

This is best achieved when residents become involved in the Board of Directors, Committees, activities, and events When you are required to enter your that govern and enhance the day-to-day life style. Also, it requires effective avenues of communication between residents and the Association. At times such communication might relate to a minor suggestion or comment.

An enhancement has been made to the Announcement page of the Resident Website, www.scres.org, to provide for such a situation. A "Suggestions" icon has been placed below the Courier/photo icon. To submit a suggestion, click on this "Suggestions" icon. The next screen explains the submission form requirement, which includes a limitation of 200 words. Therefore, it is best to be as brief and clear as possible.

Scrolling down on this webpage you will find the route that each submission will take.

To continue, you need to click on this webpage's "Suggestions" icon, review the instructions provided, click "Register" to confirm your email address, and finally click "Next" to reach the form. All personal information has been entered on the form from the SCR Data Base. You need only add your statement to the "Suggestion Submission" box, then click "Next", review the form, make any required changes, then click "Confirm."

This new Website feature is part of the Association commitment to improving communications with its residents, and by doing so, achieving its vision and thereby maintaining the value of your "share" of SCR.

email address on the Resident Website login screen, be aware that some devices may automatically capitalize the first letter of your email address. For your login to be accepted, you will need to erase the "capitalized" letter and replace it with the lowercase of that letter.

The first time that you login at the Resident Website, www.scres.org, you need to decide on a "password." It is important you write down your password, and maintain that document in a secure place, should you need to login again at some future time.

If you forget your password, click on the "Forgot password" link on the login screen. You will be asked to enter your email address and complete the "I'm not a robot" action, then click on "Submit." Within a short time you will receive an email with directions for changing your password. Just remember to

write down and secure the new password. Our Website Needs You!



As I meandered our lovely community over the 4th of July week, I was heartfelt to see so many American flags proudly fluttering in the breeze. Unfortunately, I also observed some things which go against our national flag etiquette. No matter the season, it is always a good time to review how to properly adhere to the U.S. flag code to display our patriotism. Our flag is a living symbol and should be treated as such.

According to VFW.org"the American flag has a long history, and VFW members have spent nearly as long defending, as honoring our nation's most iconic symbol of freedom." Some of the notable rules:

1. On the same or different staffs, the U.S. flag is at peak, above any other flag.

2. It is universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset. However, for a patriotic effect, the flag may be displayed twenty-four hour a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

3. Do not display a flag which is torn, tattered, faded or in some disrepair.

4. Flag disposal: contact the local VFW Post for proper disposal.

5. Always allow it to fall free. Do not fasten, tie it back or have it catch on something.6. Do not use the flag as clothing.

7. Never use the flag for decoration. Use

bunting with the blue on top, then white, then red.

8. Do not let the flag touch the ground.9. Do not fly the flag upside down unless there is an emergency.

10. The flag should not be displayed during inclement weather, except an all-weather flag.

11. Display the flag on all national holidays, plus special days as designated in the U.S. Code Guide.



#### **Birders** By JANET MORELLI

SCR Birders will be posting a new Birding Field Trip Schedu1e on its website in August for the 2023-2024 birding season which will begin in mid-September 2023 and end in mid-May 2024. In the meantime, Birders will continue

to birdwatch whenever they get the chance, in their backyards and neighborhoods, on vacations, at parks, outdoor restaurants, or on visits to out-of-town friends and relatives. Many will use the hot weather in the months of June, July, and August to study birding field guides, periodicals, and web sites to sharpen their bird identification skills.

A Cooper's Hawk is a medium-sized hawk that has a long tail with a white terminal band and short rounded wings. It has a block head with a black cap, rust colored horizontal breast bars, and a red eye. It feeds on small birds, lizards, and snakes captured in a surprise attack. It is commonly found near open woodlands and brushland. A Cooper's Hawk usually nests in the fork of a tall tree in a nest made of sticks and twigs. Sometimes, this bird may reuse an abandoned crow's nest. During incubation and the early stages of raising the young chicks, the male bird does all the hunting, bringing food to both his mate and the nestlings. **Garden Club**


We have a Koffee Klatch coming up on August 7th at 9 AM hosted by Steve and Elizabeth Gustafson.

home, not aware that it was illegal to keep that many. In 2008, Dan held the record for catching the biggest trout off the dock there.

Travels took them to the Orient, England, the east coast of America and Hawaii. One of Kathy's favorite



places to visit was Sisters, Oregon, where she enjoyed the beautiful mountain scenery and the local spa where she got massages. She even took a fly-fishing lesson. She smiles when reminiscing about her trips to Sisters. "I've been there 23 times." she says. "I just love it there."

Because of her love for kids, Kathy went back to school at Sierra College to get her teaching credential and began teaching preschool. Because of her love for animals, she began volunteering at Ride to Walk, a pastime that she had for 11 years. Ride to Walk's mission is to enhance the lives of children and adults with disabilities by providing innovative therapeutic horseback riding activities that are recreational in nature and adapted to the individual's needs and disabilities. Kathy's job was to walk next to the horse, guiding it as the rider benefitted from the muscle movement generated by this activity and making sure the rider was safe and didn't fall off the horse. She remembers many gratifying moments working with the handicapped and was so happy when she could see their dramatic improvement as she guided the horses they were riding on. One special moment she has always treasured was the time she watched a young girl, who had been initially unable to walk at all, cross the stage to get her diploma.

Kathy and Dan moved to SCR in 1997. When she first moved in, Kathy joined everything from aerobics and line dancing to golf. And since her house model included a casita, she ramped up her love of quilting by



turning the casita into a quilting studio which still showcases her exquisite handmade quilts. She also joined the Needle Arts club and taught quilting classes to SCR residents for 15 years. A well-known book on quilting featured one of her quilts on its cover and readers bought the patterns she created which were highlighted in the book. When you think about it, she could make a claim to fame as being the Quilting Queen of Sun City Roseville, but she's never been one to exert bragging rights.

When asked about actual "claims to fame," in her lifetime, Kathy said she has two that come to mind. One was working in the auto parts store with Chuck Yeager, a United States Air Force officer, flying ace, and record-setting test pilot who in October 1947 became the first pilot in history confirmed to have exceeded the speed of sound in level flight. In 1983, a movie was made about Chuck and other flying aces called The Right Stuff and Kathy recalls talking to him about it because he had a cameo part in the movie which starred Sam Shepard, Scott Glenn, and Ed Harris.

Her other claim to fame was surviving the hurricane which hit Kauai in 1992. She and Dan were staying at the Coco Palms, the same hotel where Elvis filmed Blue Hawaii, when the island was slammed with winds that got as high as 225 mph. Refusing to go to the basement with the rest of the hotel guests, they stayed in their room which was on the top floor of the hotel, but when the walls starting caving in, they went down into the lobby and rode the storm out. Later, when she and Dan got back home, they were interviewed by the Nevada Union newspaper. She told them that Iniki—which is Hawaiian for "strong and piercing wind"—lasted several hours and sounded like a locomotive. She jokingly said to the reporter, "It was a bad hair day." Kathy found out later that it was the most powerful hurricane to strike Hawaii in recorded history and caused around \$3.1 billion in damage and six deaths, making it the costliest natural disaster on record in the state.

After Dan passed away in 2008, Kathy began slowly withdrawing from golf and many of the other activities she had been involved with here, keeping only quilting as an abiding pastime along with yearly trips to Sisters with close friends. She cherishes the happy memories she made with Dan and tries to live up to the words of Ralph Waldo Emerson who once said: The purpose of life is to be useful, to be honorable, to be compassionate, to have it make some difference that you have lived and lived well.

#### Bridge Club

BY BRENCE DAVIS Bridge Club Spotlight: Bob Cecil, the new vice president of the Sun City's Bridge Club, was born and



raised near Pittsburgh and went to Penn State where he majored in industrial engineering. There he met and married Cynthia, his wife of 53 years.

Bob learned bridge from his parents when he was 11 or 12. His very first bridge hand was more than memorable: There were three passes to him, and his dad asked if he had his bid ready. Bob said, "Seven no trump," and his dad told him he couldn't bid that. He did anyway and put his hand on the table...a lay-down 7NT. He had 29 points!

When he asked Cynthia if she played bridge, she answered, "Of course!" Since she'd never even played a single game, her friends quickly tutored her. However, in their first game together, Bob had more than a clue when she played both the ace and king on the same trick!

The Cecils moved every five years or so when Bob felt he'd given his all to each job–Alabama, Maryland, Michigan, Missouri, Pennsylvania, and then Claremont, California, where he retired. ## Safety First — Scams: Think before you tap the link!

Scammers are always adapting their methods to bilk people out of money. Agrowing method is using text messaging. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has received a large number of reports from people reporting getting texts from scammers impersonating people and organizations they know and trust – such as their bank or Amazon.

Text scams try to get you to act NOW. The most-reported text scam looks like a fraud alert from your bank. It might say there is suspicious activity on your account and tells you to call a number. Or to reply "yes or no" to confirm a big purchase (that you didn't really make). Stop! There is no real problem. They just want your money or personal information.

According to the FTC, these are the five most common text message scams:

1. Copycat bank fraud prevention alerts. People get a text supposedly from a bank asking them to call a number ASAP about suspicious activity or to reply YES or NO to verify whether a transaction was authorized. If they reply, they will get a call from a phony "fraud department" claiming they want to "help get your money back." What they really want to do is make unauthorized transfers or get your personal information.

2. Bogus "gifts" that can cost you. What about those texts claiming to be from a wellknown company offering a free gift or reward? If people click the link and use their credit card to cover the small "shipping fee," they have just handed over their account information to a scammer.

3. Fake package delivery problems. People

may get a text pretending to be from the U.S. Postal Service, FedEx, or UPS claiming there is a problem with a delivery. The text links to a convincing-looking-but utterly bogus-website that asks for a credit card number to cover a small "redelivery fee."

4. Phony job offers. Some scammers are using texts to perpetrate old-school forms of fraud-for example, fake "mystery shopper" jobs or bogus money-making offers for driving around with cars wrapped in ads. Other texts target people who post their resumes on employment websites. They claim to offer jobs and even send job seekers checks, usually with instructions to send some of the money to a different address for materials, training, or the like. By the time the check bounces, the person's money- and the phony "employer" – are long gone.

5) Not-really-from-Amazon security alerts. People may get what looks like a message from "Amazon," asking to verify a big-ticket order they did not place. If you call the number in the text, a phony Amazon rep offers to "fix" the account. But oopsie! Several zeroes are mistakenly added to the "refund" and the "operator" needs the caller to return the overpayment, often in the form of gift card.

So how do you avoid these and other text scams? Do not click on links or respond to unexpected texts. If you think a text might be legit, contact the company using a phone number or website you know is real. Do not use the information in the text message.

If you are a victim of a scam, report it to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov and your local police department.

In a previous "Observations" I noted that I had somehow gotten on the e-mailing list of something called Quora Suggested Spaces. Their e-mails consisted of a question related to elderly people and an answer by someone. Most of the time, the questions were a little inane, such as "Does living alone make you feel lonely?" (I'd say that in all probability the answer is Yes) or of not much interest.

However, sometimes there's a question that does catch my attention and one such was what should elderly people NOT do? As an oldster, I was curious as to what I shouldn't be doing, and I found the answer to be interesting. It was by some lady, and it was that older people should not be moving around too quickly. It goes on to say that when you get out of that chair, do it slowly. When someone rings the doorbell, don't sprint as if the house is on fire. It isn't. You've got all the time in the world and that goes for driving too. And don't lift stuff. Old people should not try to pretend they're training for the Olympics. That ship has sailed.

What this boils down to is that the elderly should recognize that they are just that and accept their limitations, or otherwise they're courting trouble. I think this is wise advice and maybe it struck me as so at this particular time is that I violated what is the cardinal rule for old people, DON'T FALL and not recognizing my limitations was a contributing factor.

Heeding the admonition not to fall, as I'm

sure many Sun City residents will attest to, is not that easy. Almost everyone I know has fallen at one time or another. I Googled and found that about 36 million falls were reported among older adults each year, and these resulted in about 32,000 deaths. Each year, about three million older adults are treated in emergency departments for a fall injury. One out of every five falls causes broken bones or a head injury. And we know that a common result of a fall is a broken hip. All in all, pretty scary stuff, and I'm thankful I seem to have survived my fall with just a few scrapes and bruises.

Another don't for oldsters can be avoided, and that is to not climb on ladders. One statistic I saw is that 43 percent of fatal falls involved falling off a ladder. So, don't think you have to clean out your gutters every year. There are plenty of younger people advertising they will do it and it will be worth the cost.

Aside from these things involving physical activities to avoid another big don't for us seniors is don't fall for scams. According to something called the Elder Fraud Report from the FBI, losses from scams more than doubled from 2019 to 2021, reaching almost \$1.7 billion, a tidy sum. I remember that in my old neighborhood a smooth-talking guy talked a lot of people into some investment that would pay them a lot of money and also save them on taxes. Of course, it turned out too good to be true. Nowadays, I think most scams come through robocalls and e-mails and sometimes I feel that there's a whole army of people out there trying to separate us oldsters from our money. The best thing to do with robocalls, the scam experts say, is not to answer them. If it's the rare real call, let that person leave a message. As for scam e-mails, never click on a link to something and if you're told you've won some kind of reward, you probably haven't.

There are undoubtedly a lot of other don'ts for senior citizens, like don't get too grumpy and ornery and don't expect things to be the same as when we were youngsters. I'd add don't watch the news on television because it's too depressing, but you have to know something about what's going on in the world so maybe watch a little bit and of course don't believe everything you hear, especially from the "experts."

A final don't I'd like to suggest, which applies to youngsters as well as oldsters, is don't become a slave to your iPhone, iPad, computer and other technogadgets. The trouble is that these devices have become so integral to our lives and make things so much more convenient that this is impossible not to do. For example, I'm writing this on my computer and will send it as an attachment to an e-mail. And when one of the technogadgets stops working for no reason, which they have a habit of doing. call upon your grandkids. They'll know what to do.

So, take things slowly, don't climb on ladders, watch out for scammers, and try not to fall.

# **City Council Adopts FY2023-24 Budget Supporting Infrastructure** and Maintaining Services

Roseville's Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget of \$784 million was adopted by City Council at its June 21 meeting.

The General Fund operating budget is \$214 million while the remaining \$570 million in funding is primarily dedicated to the electric, water, wastewater, and waste services utilities.

Public safety, parks, recreation, libraries, public works, and general government functions are included in the General Fund.

The City's Budget in Brief (available at Roseville.ca.us/budget) offers a high-level view of the expenses, revenues and budget priorities in the FY2023-24 budget. Along with our Open Budget data (available at budget.roseville.ca.us), this is part of the City's commitment to providing complex operational and financial data in an open and easy-to-understand format. Open Budget provides a guided view of our budget and a transparent look at how public funds are allocated in Roseville.

General Fund: Where does the money go?

The FY2023-24 budget has been developed to account for the expected rise in labor costs and other unavoidable expenses. It also includes augmentations to maintain the City's service levels and address the City Council's top priorities. The budget aims to ensure the maintenance of necessary capital infrastructure, and the mitigation of unfunded liabilities for the long-term benefit of our community.
