Our September meeting featured an oil painting demonstration by Tamsen Armstrong with a return engagement demo at our October meeting on the 17th.


November's Paint Challenge is "Flight," so time to get creative and show us what that word means to you.

#### **Woodcarvers Club**

Woodcarving is an enjoyable hobby by many people here and around the world. The term "carving in the round" is anything caved in three dimensions. Specifically, there is REALISTIC, which are objects carved with absolute realism. Typically, these are birds and fish but can be a human figure or still life. Carving of animals usually entails coloring and painting to create that realistic look. A carved duck that is painted in detail will look like it could fly away. Caricature can describe carvings that have exaggerated features. Western themed carvings of cowboys and horses are common, but any human or animal subjects can be carved as a caricature. These can be painted as well. Stylized carvings are undetailed and smooth in appearance with lines that are smooth and flow in gentle curves. These would be more of a sculpture and are designed to show the beauty of the wood with a clear finish. Novelty carvings are things like chains, balls in a cage, and puzzles. One exception to carving in the round is "relief" carving. This term refers to carving in which the subject is

carved down into a flat piece of wood. The idea is to make the viewer think the carving has more depth than there is wood available. This type of carving can best be displayed as a wall hanging.

Some of these styles of carving can be seen at the Woodcarvers Club. Please drop in and see what we are doing. No carving experience is needed or required, and tools are available. The club meets every Wednesday at KS from 1:00 to 4:00 PM in the Sierra Room.

"This red brick world of Ellis Island was their gateway, a place of almost mythic transformation. Through one door entered Russians, Greeks, Italians, Jews. Through another door they emerged Americans." Vice President Dan Quayle. (1990)

Nearly 12 million people were processed on Ellis Island from 1892-1954. They were welcomed through the "Golden Door." This is the topic of our October 20, 2023 meeting, presented by Valeric Jordan, a retired psychologist who took up genealogy after retirement. This presentation describes the role of Ellis Island between 1892-1924 as the largest US Immigration Station of the time, as well as the forerunner of the US Public Health Service with its extensive hospital facilities.



Carbon Monoxide Alarms

Whyshouldwe have carbon monoxide (CO) alarms? Not only are they legally required, but because CO is DEADLY. It's a colorless, odorless gas that enters our bloodstream and bonds with our red blood cells and keeps oxygen from attaching to red blood cells. Because you cannot see it or smell it, it's called "The Silent Killer".

CO is already in our homes at levels that our bodies can handle. CO comes from gas ovens and ranges, water heaters, furnaces, gas clothes dryers, and cigarettes. But if your gas appliances have a yellow flame instead of blue, get them checked by PG&E. A yellow flame means that the gas is not burning properly, and CO is the result.

When you hear the alarm beeping, what should you do? Get everyone outside, then call 911. Open windows and doors and turn off any gas burning appliances.

The beeps: 1 beep – new battery, 4 beeps – CO detected, 5 beeps – end of unit's life. Some manufacturers use different patterns, so check the instructions.

Maintenance is minimal, but don't ignore the alarm for its 7-10-year lifespan. Every month, press the test/reset button to test the battery, circuitry and speaker. Use pressurized air to remove dust inside the unit and change the batteries yearly. Neighbors InDeed has stickers



available for tracking the date of battery changes. We recommend the First Alert plug-in alarm.


The symptoms of CO poisoning: headache, cherry red lips and nail beds, unconsciousness and death. Even if you survive a significant exposure, it can cause brain damage.

A few folks in our community have removed the CO alarm from their homes because "it was just too much trouble". Do not do that to yourself – install one now.

#### **LH Cyclists**

Bike Path Etiquette — Some of you may know that recently the issue of bikes on our trails came up at a Board meeting. It seemed to many of us it was going to be a "no bikes on paths" pre-determined outcome. However, thanks the knowledge, information and activism of club members and interested parties, the matter was (possibly) permanently tabled.

However, if we riders are going to continue to use the LH paths, we need to practice good trail etiquette. Here are some guidelines. I am speaking to riders about LH paths, not trails such as The American River Bike Trail, which is designed to be used by a different clientele.

First, be courteous. All trail users should be respectful of other.

Riding on our paths is not the time to go for a speed record. The speed limit for bikes on paths is 15mph, but this is often too fast for safety or politeness.

The argument whether pedestrians should be on the right or left is moot because our paths are not wide enough to have a "lane" in each direction. So, when approaching from behind, gently let the walkers know you are coming. Don't wait 'til you are yelling in their ear.

I prefer a "bikes back!" to "On your left (or right)" because the walker will often move to the side on which you intend to pass. Give ample warning so they can make it clear to you where they are going. Ride slowly. If you cannot keep your bike balanced at walking speed, you

probably aren't ready to be on the path.

Technically, anything with a motor is prohibited on our paths. If you are an e-bike rider, you will want to be especially careful and not call negative attention to yourself.

Finally, when you do pass others, say "Thank you". Be an ambassador for cycling.


Beginners can expect to burn between 200 to 350 calories if they play for an hour and advanced players can burn up to 500 calories.


#### **Who Knew Vegetables Could Be So Dangerous?**
