Tap Company



Hearing Support Group

At our August meeting, we discussed three items of interest. The first was regarding a new research project at Columbia University Medical School which is studying the ability of cochlear implant users to hear and appreciate music. The doctoral candidate doing the study was a Broadway musician before deciding to pursue a career in medicine. The second item was a report on new research being conducted by MedEl, one of three suppliers of cochlear implants. They are working on improving electrode frequency in implants by sending signals directly to the auditory nerve, bypassing the cochlea entirely. This will eliminate the presence of echo, which is a common complication of implant use. They have completed working with animal models and are ready to test the devices in humans.

Finally, we revisited the FCC's newly established requirement that all captions must now meet accuracy standards of 95-98%, regardless of whether they are an accommodation or routine technology.

Our next meeting will be in the multipurpose room at OC on Friday, Oct 6th at 10AM. We will not meet on the Friday before Labor Day weekend.






Perhaps this topic could be an item for your reader thoughts, viewpoints and discussion. I believe same will receive an appreciable reader response factor.




