Ada Hale — From Striving to Thriving

"If you go to karaoke at Timbers Lodge, you might have seen me singing "It's All About the Bass by Meghan Trainor," says Ada Hale, one of our more active and vibrant residents at SCR. She even has a fan club present in the audience, backing her up on the song.

Ada was born in 1943 and raised in Dubuque, Iowa. She and her older sister Jackie had a fabulous childhood, she recalls. While her dad, John, was away serving in the Army, her mother, Dorothy, always sang songs as she cooked and did housework. Ada thought everybody's mother did that. Every Christmas her mother would sit with her children as they leafed through "wish books," Sears and Penney's catalogs. And on Christmas morning they were always amazed that Santa gave them exactly what they wanted.

When her father came home, the family expanded to three additional daughters. When they went on Sunday rides in their black 1937 Hudson Terraplane, Ada always sat behind her

dad, her sister, Jackie, sat behind her mom and sometimes mom would give each a half a stick of Juicy Fruit gum. What a treat! And the ride was the event. On rare occasions, they stopped for chocolate ice cream cones.

One winter day, Ada accepted a ride home from junior high school from her sister Jackie. As she climbed into the back seat of the two-door coupe, she was introduced to the driver, Clayton Specht, and, looking into his deep brown eyes, immediately thought, "I'm going to marry him." And four years later, she did just that. She was 17 and Clayton was 19.

The couple had three daughters, Terry, Cindy and Laurie, and enjoyed a happy life until a tragic motorcycle accident took Clayton's life. Ada, devastated, became a widow at 21, having lost the love of her life.

She thought her life was over. God had other plans. Timed passed and she did marry again. Her second husband, David Knepper, was a farmer and he loved those three little girls. They lived on 350 acres, which had a small river running through it. They had two boys, Steven and Ronnie, completing their family. Ada would get into the wagon with the five kids and David would hook up the tractor and drive them all over their land. They picked walnuts, cut down their own Christmas trees, and had picnics by the river.

Four years later, tragedy struck again. David suffered for years with manic depression, which required hospitalization. One night, (cont' on page 27)



Executive Director Comments

Congratulation to the new Board of Directors, who were elected on July 18th and who were installed by City of Roseville Mayor Bruce Houdesheldt on August 3rd at the Annual Members Meeting.

Also on the same ballot, the community has voted overwhelmingly (85.1%) in favor of the proposed Phase B planned expansion and renovation of our Fitness Center. This project will not be paid for with your assessments, or a bank loan, or a special assessment, but with funds raised from the Special Use Fee and from unallocated excess business revenues generated mostly through our Golf and Food and Beverage operations. Now, how do we get this project off the ground?

The first thing we will need is to decide who will do the work. There are two main contracts that we will undertake, one for the Architect/Designer and one for the General Contractor (GC).

First, we start with the Architect who will review the preliminary schematic design and lead the process of obtaining entitlements from the City, a process that can take 3-4 months. Once the entitlements are close to being completed, design development starts and a cost estimate is generated, taking another 4-6 weeks.

Then the real detailed work begins as the construction documents are developed along

with cost estimates, with the GC providing input regarding constructability and cost decisions. Various city agencies undertake the required plan review, revisions are made and finally, a permit is issued (after all the fees are paid, of course!). This part of the process can take up to 6 months or longer, depending on how long the reviews take or how many revisions need to be made.

Now comes the General Contractor part. Once the construction drawings are finalized the contractor will understand what work needs to be completed and can go out to find all the subcontractors that will be needed to work in the various different fields. Bidding a larger contract such as this can take time as we require the GC to get several bids for each specialty in order to ensure we are getting the best quality for the best cost. Once all the bids are gathered (often a 6-8 week task), the GC can then provide the Guaranteed Maximum Price (or GMP) contract for final Board Approval. The final construction start date will depend on several factors such as accumulation of funds in the CAIA, contractor workload, weather, and/or supply chain concerns. In total the process just to get to the starting line for construction will likely take between 45 and 60 weeks.

Creative Arts Club

Raku-Fired Pottery Workshop — Last July I took two one-week workshops conducted by Randy Brodnax and Don Ellis, at Sierra Nevada College in north Lake Tahoe (now the University of Nevada, Lake Tahoe campus).

Both workshops focused on a variety of

alternative raku firing techniques and glazes, including post-fire fuming, copper matte alcohol reduction, stannous chloride fuming and color crackle glazes. We brought bisqued pieces ready for applying glazes. Many of the pieces were fired in a gas kiln to 1800 degrees, taken out one by one and sprayed with stannous chloride and then transferred to a table-top sand-pit. Each piece was quickly placed on a piece of newspaper, covered by a metal can, and then oxygen was prevented from entering the can by pushing sand around the can, allowing each piece to oxidize.

My favorite decorating technique was using horsehair to produce delicate designs on a raku fired pot by gently holding strands of horsehair against a hot piece of pottery from the kiln. The horsehair "melts" creating soft black linear designs with smoky patterns and trails. Feathers were used to create additional effects. Small amounts of sugar were also thrown on the pot to add additional effects.

Another process involved wrapping a bisque-fired piece in aluminum foil sprayed with copper sulfate along with color enhancers (seaweed, coarse salt, pieces of copper from a pot scrubber). The foil saggar package was then wrapped tightly and crumpled to allow some foil to touch the piece. Packets were stacked in the gas kiln and fired to 1200 degrees. The foil burnt to tissue paper ash leaving a variety of muted earth tones.

Yet another technique involved finishing firing by literally blow torching pieces after watching the gorgeous colors from the glaze to develop under a Pyrex bowl!

Home safety tips for seniors — With a growing number of older adults living independently, it's increasingly important to make sure that they're safe at home. Falls, burns, and poisonings are among the most common accidents involving older people. Older adults who live alone may also become the victims of criminals who target older people. If you're an older adult living on your own, or care for an older person living alone, here's what you need to do to stay safe.

Keep emergency numbers handy,

Always keep a list of emergency numbers by each phone.

- 911 Poison Control: 1-800-222-1222
- Family member or friend to call in case
 - Healthcare provider's office Prevent falls
- Don't rush to answer the phone. Many people fall trying to answer the phone. Either carry a cordless or cell phone or let an answering machine pick up.
- When walking on smooth floors, wear non-slip footwear, such as slippers with rubber/ no-slip bottoms or flat, thin-soled shoes that

Protect against fire and related dangers

- If there is a fire in your home, don't try to put it out. Leave and call 911. Know at least two ways to get out of your home.
 - When you're cooking, don't wear loose

clothes or clothes with long sleeves

- Replace appliances that have fraying or damaged electrical cords.
- Don't put too many electric cords into one socket or extension cord.
- Install a smoke detector and replace the battery twice a year.

Protect Yourself:

- · Keep your windows and doors locked
- Never let a stranger into your home when you are there alone.
- Talk over offers made by telephone salespeople with a friend or family member.
- Do not share your personal information, such as social security number, credit card, bank information, or account passwords, with people you do not know.
- Do not let yourself be pressured into making purchases, signing contracts, or making donations. It is never rude to wait and discuss the plans with a family member or friend.





Birders

On September 21, Birders will be going to Veterans Park/ Pleasant Grove Creek Trail and the next trip, on October 5, will be to Ferrari Ponds in Sun City Lincoln Hills.

SCR residents who have had their email address added to the Birders' mail roster will receive an email approximately one week before each trip informing them of the meeting place and time, estimated duration of the trip and walking distance to be covered plus other information regarding carpool and refuge/park entrance fees and lunch arrangements (if any). The Yellow-billed Magpie, a noisy member of the crow family, has the distinction of not being found in any other part of the world but in California's Central Valley and some coastal valleys. Black-billed Magpies, on the other hand, are found in places throughout the world except for ranges occupied by the yellow-billed species.

Other than its yellow bill, this black/white

bird has a yellow patch of skin surrounding its eyes, an unusually long, sometimes iridescent green tail, and a white belly. It feeds primarily on the ground with members of several colonies, eating insects,



but also enjoying fruit, nuts, bird eggs and carrion. It nests in loose colonies with one domed communal nest, made with sticks lined with mud and finer materials placed 45-60 feet high in a tree.

Yellow-billed Magpies have managed to survive a recent extinction threat: the West Nile Disease. In the early 2000's, spread by mosquitoes, the disease killed half of all species members. Fortunately, their numbers have been increasing each year since then.

This would include topspin, backspin, right sidespin, left sidespin among others.

The machine also has a net in the opposite direction for catching the returning balls for play.

Ada was awakened by a phone call from the hospital. She went downstairs and looked out the window at the beautiful falling snow. Her five children were asleep upstairs. The voice on the phone said, "Your husband took his own life." She buried her husband on Christmas

Years later, the same horrific illness took her son, Steven. "My heart goes out to any and all families who have ever experienced this debilitating and deadly disease," says Ada. "No one should ever lose a child." When her son died, Ada reflected, "I thought I knew what pain was, but I didn't. I didn't want to

recover from this loss. But God had other plans. My four magnificent children saved me."


Ada's way of coping with grief and pain was to reach out to others. She started a support group

for families who suffered similar losses. She also did volunteer work answering hotlines at suicide prevention phones in Burlingame.

Always working on herself, she read dozens of self-help books by favorite authors like Louise Hay, Wayne Dyer, Melodie Beattie,

and Don Miguel Luiz who wrote the Four Agreements. She also spent many hours in Twelve Step groups and attended numerous self-awareness workshops on weekends. Today she treasures every hour she spent attending these meetings and reading these books because they helped her truly love herself.

Ada and her family moved to Menlo Park in 1976 when she went to work for the Menlo Park Chamber of Commerce as an office manager. After a few years, she was approached

"The Sister Act" which, was filmed in San Francisco. She also became a print model and even landed a national television commercial for Sine-Aid headache tablets.

With her flexibility in commission sales, Ada was able to do quite a bit of traveling. She went to New York and saw The Lion King and to the UK where she took private tours of each theater. For her 50th birthday, she spent a month in Trinidad and Tobago, and even went to Brazil with a group led by editor-

in-chief of Essence magazine, Susan Taylor. Part of the trip was to deliver school supplies to children. The other part was attending a surprise workshop given by Iyanla Vanzant, an inspirational speaker, author, life coach and TV personality.

When she lived in Menlo Park, she had bought a beautiful custom-built home. "It was the best single investment I ever made," says Ada. "It allowed me to retire at age 59 and move to Sun City Roseville."

During her first three years here, she worked for Home Instead, where she did homecare for two clients in SCR. One of her favorite patients had Parkinson's disease, so when his wife went shopping, Ada would pull his wheelchair next to her chair and they'd follow an exercise tape on TV together. "He taught me how to bet on horses," she recalls. After that, she went on a bus trip to a horse race and, using what he taught her, won a trifecta.

Ada dove right into living an active life at SCR. During her two terms serving as a Sun City Ambassador, she participated in the SCR fashion shows as a model. She spent several years singing and performing with the Sun City Singers. She also found "her jam," water volleyball, three times a week. "The regular players call it laugh therapy," she says. Always going full blast, Ada also attends water aerobics and Pilate classes twice a week.

Fortunately, Ada's daughters live nearby, and she is close to her four surviving children, nine grandchildren, and fifteen greatgrandchildren. "I like to say I have a tribe," she says. She turned 80 years old this year and thinks it's the best decade so far. "I had every reason to be bitter and angry at the world," she says. "What saved me was my willingness to grieve and do the work on myself to not only survive, but to learn to thrive."

Ada is a joy to know and have as a friend because she is upbeat, inspirational, and willing to share her life experiences with others. "I'm aware that we all are the sum total of all that we have experienced in life," she says, "and we get to choose every day. And I choose to be happy,"

Safety First —

Have you been bombarded with robocalls? Not only are they annoying, but they're often pushing scams. You know the ones, like fake auto warranties and credit card debt relief programs.

Didyou knowyou can help Roseville Police, other law enforcement agencies, and the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) by taking action to stop them? The FTC and its federal and state law enforcement partners recently announced Operation Stop Scam Calls, the latest joint effort in the fight against illegal robocalls. This operation's goal is to stop multiple dishonest telemarketers, the companies that hire them, and Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) service providers that supply the technology for telemarketers to make millions of scammy robocalls.

Here's how you can help:

- Know your rights. A robocall trying to sell you something is illegal unless the company has your written permission to call you that way.
- Spot the scams that use illegal robocalls. Many illegal robocalls lead to scams. They might try to convince you the call is from the government, tech support, or your autowarranty company, but it's not. It's a scam.
 - Hang up on phone scams.
- Report scams and illegal robocalls. Reporting helps law enforcement and investigators stop scams and illegal robocalls.
- If you are a victim of a scam, report it to your local police department.
- Report any attempted scams at ReportFraud.ftc.gov and report illegal robocalls at DoNotCall.gov. For more advice on how to stop unwanted calls, check out ftc.gov/calls.

Market Update

The only constant in Real Estate sales is change. It is as common to have an upswing in values in the first 6 months of the year as it is to have a decline in the last 6 months of the year. Simply there is generally more demand from January to June then there is from June to December. It's not 100% correct but I believe this year will be no different. Looking through the number of days on the market for properties in Sun City gives an overview of the market conditions and what we are witnessing is longer times on the market. What that means to a seller is this, properly price your home for sale at the outset and you will end up with a higher return than over pricing your home and then reducing that asking price, as the extra time on the market reduces the amount offered by buyers who feel no competition after 45 days on the market.
