

With extra cash in their pockets, Tombstone's growing number of "lucky strikers" occupied saloons-filled with poker players and whiskey lovers-and became frequent patrons of the Bird Cage Theatre, famous for, let's just say...more than just theater. Of course, handfuls of crooked-minded rogues lusted to seize the fortunes of others. In 1881, Wyatt Earp came to Tombstone to rid the town

He will discuss the current knowledge of the discovery of fossilized clues found in Earthbound meteorites.



We will be proud to honor our own Lavender Friends veterans — and hear their stories — on Nov. 11.

In December, we are looking forward to our 15th annual holiday dinner dance. This is a popular event that brings people from throughout the Sacramento region together for an evening of dining and dancing.

Ed Pandolfino spoke to us for our October meeting. His talk was on sparrows and their songs. To the surprise of many the sparrow family songs range from some of the simplest to other species who seem never to repeat their song.

In November, our all-day birding trip to Gray Lodge Wildlife Area is on the 10th. This state managed refuge is host to migrant waterfowl from geese, ducks, cranes, and raptors. in numbers from the hundreds of thousands to millions. After Gray Lodge, we lunch in Gridley before returning.

A trip to Effie Yeaw Nature Center on the American River was September 29.32 species were spotted, with good numbers of Sandhill Cranes, Bushtits, and Cedar Waxwings. A Osprey with a fish was seen.

There were two birding trips scheduled for October. Our first October trip was to the Lincoln Wastewater Treatment Plant on the 13th. The plant has several acres of safely treated water ponds that attract waterfowl and wading birds. Our four cars-full of birders spotted 38 species, about our average. By the time you read this, more species of ducks and geese should be visible. Our trip to Vic Fazio on the 27th will be reported on in December.

Our programs are held in KS Presentation Hall at 1:30 PM on the second Monday of the month. Most day trips leave from the Orchard Creek parking lot west of the pool at 8:00 AM unless otherwise specified. Make a Difference this Tax Season? Volunteer with AARP Foundation Tax-Aide in Lincoln!

Do you like talking to people, meeting new people, or working on the computer? Are you looking for a rewarding opportunity to make a difference in your community? Each year, April 15 is widely met with feelings of pressure and anxiety. Some people sweat, many procrastinate -and a few simply deny it. Almost four out of five people who turn to AARP Foundation Tax-Aide are 60 or older, and household incomes aren't high. For many of them, a tax refund could mean they won't have to choose between paying for groceries and keeping the lights on. For the past 22 years, volunteers have been participating in the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program in Lincoln. We need additional volunteers to join us to help taxpayers complete their 2023 federal and state income tax returns in Lincoln during the 2024 tax-filing season.

Becoming a volunteer is easier than you think! Volunteers are needed as schedulers to make appointments for our clients. No class is required; however, all volunteers must pass a ten-question ethics test. Schedulers return the client's phone call to set up an appointment time, explain what information to bring to their appointment, and log the appointments into a Google Calendar; schedulers must be computer literate.

Greeters' welcome clients, review and assemble their tax records, make sure they have


brought the necessary information so our tax preparers can complete their returns efficiently, and they manage the flow of clients being served. No computer experience is required to be a greeter!

Volunteers are especially needed as preparers to help the client prepare and e-file their returns. Even if you don't have accounting or tax preparation experience, becoming a tax preparer may be right for you if you have a knack for working with numbers. The free, comprehensive training and certification class for preparers will be held in January, 2024 in Roseville and Lincoln. Computer literacy is required to assist in providing our free e-file service.

All volunteers are asked to commit 4 hours in one day per week during the tax-filing season, February 6th (January 15th for schedulers) through April 15th. Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are welcome; you do not need to be an AARP member or retiree to volunteer.
