LH Astronomy Group

The LHAG does not hold meetings or activities during the month of December.

Thomas E. Jones, Executive Director of the California Aerospace Museum is scheduled for a presentation to the LHAG membership on January 3, 2024, about NASA's Neutral Buoyancy Laboratory (NBL).

The Neutral Buoyancy Laboratory (NBL) is one of the world's largest indoor pools and can support multiple large-scale operations utilizing both underwater and topside assets simultaneously. The NBL is utilized for mission planning, procedure development, hardware verification, astronaut training, and refinement of time-critical operations necessary to ensure mission success during spacewalks.

Astronomical Events for January 2024 January 3, 4 - Quadrantids Meteor Shower. The Quadrantids is an above average shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at its peak. It is thought to be produced by dust grains left behind by an extinct comet which was discovered in 2003.

January 11 - New Moon. The Moon will be located on the same side of the Earth as the Sun. This is the best time of the month to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

January 12 - The planet Mercury reaches greatest western elongation from the Sun. It will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky.

January 25 - Full Moon. The Moon will be located on the opposite side of the Earth as the Sun and its face will be fully illuminated. This full moon was known by early Native American tribes as the Wolf Moon because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled outside their camps.

Neighbors InDeed — To Winterize is Wise

BY RICK CARREIRO Now that we are on Standard Time, this

"Winterize". It is wise because it can make you more comfortable, save you money, and most importantly maintain the value and safety of our Lincoln Hills homes.

• Rainfall and Storms: Have your rain gutters and downspouts cleaned as this prevents overflow, which creates flooded areas alongside your home and can affect your foundation. You might also consider having those tree branches trimmed to reduce the gutter debris they create. While you're at it, have your roof inspected for loose or cracked tiles which will worsen with storms and can cause leaks that become very expensive.

• Comfort and Efficiency: A well-insulated attic will not only help retain heat in the winter keeping you comfortable, but also saving you money. It is suggested to have a rating of R-30 for attics. Another addition some use is a reflective but breathable "blanket" to add to this effect. You can also reduce the heat in rooms or areas of the house not in use by closing the room vents a bit. • Additional Winterizing Steps: Sealing windows and doors for drafts will add to your comfort and savings. A little caulk, sealant or weather-stripping easily and quickly improves comfort and saves money. You might consider a programmable or smart thermostat as well, since you can lower the temperature when you're not present by using your cell phone. Multilayered clothing, blankets, and insulating drapes can also keep you warm. Finally, setting your sprinklers to a reduced schedule saves water and money. In the winter it is recommended to turn your sprinklers on about 1 minute perweek to prevent the valves from getting stuck.

• Neighbors InDeed Help: Our Information and Referrals volunteers can suggest needed vendors. Our Handy Helpers can change furnace filters, program thermostats, reset your sprinklers, and provide other helpful tasks.

Market Update

Real estate sales are regionally very integrated. While there are always brighter spots and slower spots within the region, higher demand in some areas and lesser demand in others, there is still connectivity. I suggested a max price of \$675,000, but they competed better at \$650,000. They listed with another agent at \$700,000, that doesn't seem much but they just kept lowering their price. They just lowered their price to \$599,000 because they missed the market and have moved out and need to sell. The lesson; Sometimes it makes sense to see what the highest sales price was in the past 6 months, sometimes that strategy costs thousands.
