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Bill and Anna Woods — Quiet Strength, Opposites Attract

Anna recommended Bill to be featured in the paper. This speaks to both his quiet strength and her opposite extroversion. When I went to meet with the couple, I found they both have amazing stories to tell. Anna is a Jew who converted to Christianity because of Bill's influence. Bill is a weightlifter who at the age of 81 is seriously thinking about competing for a world record in his age group for bench pressing.

Bill has been weightlifting for sixty years now. He can be seen at the local Sun City gym several times a week doing "reps" of 250 pounds. He doesn't always feel like going, but he has lived to see the changes it has made in his life, and he loves to help others learn how to safely lift weights if they are interested. Others have stated "Bill's in the house" when they see him working out. His blood pressure is a perfect 120/60. Suffering a shoulder injury years ago because his technique was not the best, he loves to encourage anyone interested in good technique so they can avoid injuries. One of the secrets is keeping the arms close to the side of the body. He lifts more than



anyone else in Del Webb. When he was in his late forties, he won the world record by bench pressing 365 pounds. He would like to repeat that win for his current age group and would need to bench over 325 pounds.

When he started lifting weights six decades ago, he wanted to have big biceps to "show off for the girls." Now, both he and Anna, a line dance teacher in Lincoln Hills, found the activities which "keep their body moving." They want others to discover the benefits of movement in their golden years.

Bill had time when not weightlifting in his younger years to marry his first wife and they had two children together. Bill is still close to both of his sons. They live nearby—one lives in Folsom and one in Roseville. Before his marriage, he had grown up in Southern California in La Habra. It was in La Habra that he was hired to help groom horses, starting a lifetime attachment to equines. His family moved to Loomis when



A well-thought-out strategic plan will not immediately answer every question or solve every problem, but it will help SCLH navigate the complexities of today's changing world and position SCLH for sustained success.

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
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SCLH Elections Committee BOD "Candidate Information Session"

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

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


Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.

8:45 AM I review my list of Handy Helpers (HH)—who is available today? I start


1:30 PM OH no! Another "Chirping Alarm" call, and an HH to steps up to the plate.



At the beginning of each new year, many of us reminisce about "The Good Old Days". To give you an idea of what "The Good Old Days" were like, here is what I remember about our grooming and fashion habits from top to toe as a high school freshman in 1953:

Hair pins were used to make pin curls. You would then wrap a scarf around your head before bedtime, hope your hair was dry in the morning, and brush it out.

Make-up was pretty basic – lipstick, and then for special occasions perhaps a touch of rouge or face powder. Very seldom did you see anyone who had a part of their body pierced for jewelry.

A very popular item was a cinch belt. It was not a part under the hood of the car or a tool in your dad's workshop. The elastic belt was around three inches wide and came in a selection of colors. You cinched it around your waist, and it immediately shrank to waspish size. It also helped keep our shirttails in.

In attaining "womanhood", we were given two other types of belts that were never exposed to the public eye. There was the garter belt with its dangling straps that held up our nylons, and that other belt to keep another item in place. Years later, after that other belt was replaced with a product more comfortable, the husband of one of my girlfriends made a tie tack from

its metal grip and wore it to a New Years Eve party. The fellows thought it was hysterical and the women rolled their eyes.

During this time period calf-length skirts were in vogue. If it was a straight skirt, the kick-pleat opened up to the back of your knees. If it was one of the full skirts with layers of crinoline, going through doorways or sitting in one of the classroom desks could sometimes be a challenge.

Quite a few girls in my class wore red-soled suede oxfords. To keep them pristine white, you would apply a paste on the uppers, and then use a fine metal brush to remove the layer of chalk that had dried overnight. The best place to do this was in the backyard since the chalk blew all over the place.

The Good Old Days are past, with perhaps a bit of nostalgia thrown in. I wonder what the future generations will think about our current fashions. Only time will tell.

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
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Thank You! From Kiwanis Club of Lincoln Foothills







We play bocce ball year-round each Thursday morning, and usually have anywhere




Author Lecture Series

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
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
