Rob and Susie Harper — Enjoying the Dance of Life

Wayne Dyer once said, "When you dance, your purpose is not to get to a certain place on the floor. It's to enjoy each step along the way." When you meet Rob and Susie Harper, that's the first impression you'll get. They are really enjoying the dance of life throughout its various phases: marriage, family, and career.

Born in 1952, Susie grew up in Concord, California, and her siblings included two brothers and two sisters. At age four, she started dancing lessons at Maggie's Dance Studio in Castro Valley, learning ballet, tap, jazz, and acrobatics. "As long as I could remember, dance has always been my passion," she recalls. Throughout her younger years, she was part of the recitals and shows performed by Maggie's dance students as well as performing with Maggie's professional dance line known as the Marian Marlon Dancers. They performed all over the San Francisco Bay area, including the Presidio, the Alameda Naval Air Station and the Oakland Auditorium.



Rob was born in 1950 in Vallejo, California, the oldest of four children and the only boy. When Rob was five, his family moved to Pleasant Hill, California, where he went to school and college (DVC). In 1970, he joined the Army Reserves (Corp of Engineers) and was trained in heavy equipment.

The couple met through a mutual friend when they were teenagers in high school. When Rob got back from basic training in the Army Reserves, they talked about the possibility of

marriage. Secretly, Susie's mother offered Rob the diamond ring from her marriage to Susie's father, so he used those diamonds to have a custom ring made and proposed. The couple were married at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Pleasant Hill, February 27, 1971. Susie remembers borrowing a wedding dress so she could afford to hire a band to dance to at their wedding reception.

They celebrated their 52nd anniversary this year. When asked their secret for a long marriage, they like to quote Rob's greatgrandparents who during a celebration for their 70th anniversary said, "When one throwed fire, the other throwed water."

Susieworked for Shell Chemical Company after graduating from high school, but she couldn't resist the urge to start her own dance studio. So, the Susie Harper School of Dance was launched in Benicia in 1972, offering ballet, tap, jazz, acrobatics, and tumbling classes.

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
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

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Executive Director Comments

Happy Holidays to everyone!

As we wind up the calendar year, staff is already hard at work looking into the future and planning for the events and projects that we know are coming up. New Fitness classes and events, new bus trips and activities, concerts and shows – the new year holds so much promise!

Some projects take a long time to plan, and our Phase B expansion of the Fitness Center is one such project. Now that the community has voted to move forward with the improvements, the planning has started. It's a complicated process so staying organized, keeping the momentum going and getting a jump start on the many tasks that make up the whole piece is imperative.

Well, I'm glad to report that we've started that process already. The Strategic Planning and Implementation Work Group (SPIWG) formed a Subcommittee to review the vendor selection process, and, by the time this article has been published, will have presented their report to the full Work Group in late November. We've opened up discussions to form a scope of work, consider which experts we will need to consult and get some sample proposals that reflect the estimated costs and timelines. We expect to have much of that information available to discuss with the Work Group at the next meeting.

So far, we've been encouraged to find that the Pre-construction costs (contracts, entitlements, permits, design and construction drawings), the General Conditions Construction costs (subcontractor bidding process, contractor personnel costs, scheduling, site prep and safety) and the Construction Fees (overhead and profit) are all in line with the rates, fees and costs established for the Phase A projects some 4 years ago. At this time the general consensus is that the Phase B project will take about 8 weeks longer than the recent A-2 project.

There is still a long way to go before we are ready to put the first shovel in the ground. There are many months of meetings, drawings, product reviews, opinions and arguments (we like the word "debate") ahead of us. We encourage you to keep up on the latest progress by Watching for updates or attending meetings (SPIWG, Board Planning or Monthly Board Meetings). Input is encouraged!



The information it contains is current, as it is continually updated, and will contain an email address, if the resident provided one. The SCR Directory can be searched for a resident by name (first or last), address, phone number, even street name. When found, the resident's name will be displayed in "green text". Green text on the Website is used to indicate a clickable link. From this link, you have access to the resident's name, primary phone number, email address (if provided), address, city, state, zip code. This feature may help you with your holiday mailings.

Holiday Activities — Many special

events have been planned by the Activities Department for this festive time of year. The second link in the "Community" menu, is "Activities Department". There is also a "Activities" button at the bottom of the Website's Announcement webpage.

On the Activities webpage, "Activities At-A-Glance" are listed down the right side of the screen. The "green text" is a link to details for these upcoming events. To see all scheduled future events click on "Activities Calendar" just above this area. At the right side of the Activities Calendar screen, if you click on "Switch to List View", you can see the posters for the events.

In December we may be so busy shopping, decorating or baking there isn't enough time to prepare a meal for family or guests. Our community is fortunate to have great choices that are close at hand. The menus and serving times for Sierra Pines Deli, Timbers Restaurant, and the Lounge can be found in the Website's "Amenities" menu by selecting the "Timbers at the Lodge Restaurant" link. 

Open At Last! After a few ups and downs, we are (more or less) finally open! There are still a number of things to be finished, but our new, improved larger space is finally done. At the last minute we were able to use the room for the Holiday Craft Faire, which was a great success.

Twenty-four new lockers were installed, and all the existing lockers got new doors, so there is a uniform look to the room. New keys have been distributed to members, so we are finally able to access the personal tools left in our lockers, and most important, the new kilns have been installed and tested. Our crew of three designated members has been trained by the experts at Alpha Fired Arts. The kilns are hard-wired into the new kiln room, so we are ready to fire away.

The new extra worktable in the added

space was moved and assembled during the final week of construction, giving members so much more room to work on their creations. What was the old kiln room has been transformed into a space to store glazes and house new pieces of art awaiting firing. We won't have to juggle pieces on a small shelf anymore!

The major hiccup came as we were nearing completion. A break in a water pipe from the Activities space next to the Creative Arts Room, which ran right under the middle of our room. This necessitated digging down through our floor, repairing it, pouring concrete to cover it and then re-tiling. This still needs to be completed by a professional.

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


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

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

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Neighborhood Watch/Citizen Patrol Shop Safely Online this Holiday Season

As we head into this bustling holiday season, we'd like to share some precautions you can take to protect yourself, your information and your packages.

While shopping online:

- Create strong passwords that are difficult to guess. Include numbers, capital letters and special characters like "!?&@". Additionally, don't use the same password for all your logins. If you have to write them down to remember, keep the list locked away somewhere at home.
- Only shop and pay at secure, reputable sites that have a URL starting with https://.
- Never use a debit card to shop online. Credit cards have more added protections.
- Validate emails and who sent them. If you click on the sender's name, you'll often see the email is actually not from Target, Walmart, or Amazon.
- · Avoid opening emails that suggest you've won a prize. You haven't. Never click to open a file from someone you don't know. It could contain a virus that takes your personal information.
- · Watch for pre-checked boxes. They may sign you up for a product or service or add your name to a mailing list.

- Carefully review your order before completing a transaction. If something was added that you don't want, remove it.
- Make sure you check and keep any emailed order confirmation to ensure it's for exactly what you intended to buy at the correct price.

Protect those packages:

- Once you've ordered items, make sure they're not stolen from outside your door.
- Track your packages and ensure that you provide a hidden space for packages to be left.
- If you're going to be out of town, don't order items to sit on your front steps, have it delivered to a trusted neighbor or use a service like Amazon locker.
- If you're away from home for an extended amount of time, ask USPS to hold

If you believe you're a victim of package or mail theft, file a report on the Roseville Police Department website: www.roseville. ca.us/police

It's important to frequently check your bank and credit card accounts. If something appears in your account that you don't recognize, immediately call your bank or



Grants Advisory Commission.

California passed the "Voter Choice Act" (VCA). Placer County is implementing it in the 2024 elections. The traditional precincts polling locations will be replaced by 29 voting centers. This provides a more flexible way to vote, plus it includes some two weeks of "early voting" in person. All CA registered voters receive a "vote-by-mail" ballot. They have three ways to vote: vote by mail, no postage required; vote in person, at one of 29 voting centers; or drop the ballot at nearby official drop boxes.

Up to the first birding trip scheduled for November, birding was a challenge because the deciduous trees had not lost their leaves and most of the birds were finding cover in the trees. Despite the camouflage, the birders were able to identify 28 species at the Dry Creek Trail in Antelope. The most exciting find was dozens of Yellow Billed Magpies, a species that was nearly decimated by the West Nile virus in the early 2000's and are now making a comeback.

With summer fading into fall, on our recent hikes we saw the leaves changing colors. This occurs when the chlorophyll breaks down and the green fades away, letting the yellow/orange carotenoids blaze forth, giving autumn its wonderful colors. At the same time, other chemical changes occur, giving rise to more pigments which vary from yellow to red to blue.



(CT.gov) We observed fewer wildflowers, but a multitude of mushrooms.

Some facts about mushrooms: All mushrooms are fungi, but not all fungi are mushrooms (eol.org). Mushrooms aren't really plants; they are types of fungi that have a "plantlike" form - with a stem and cap (they have cell walls as well). This is really just the "flower or fruit" of the mushroom - the reproductive part which disperses the spores. The larger portion of many fungi is underground, and can be acres in size! Mushrooms aren't plants because they don't make their own food (plants use photosynthesis to make food). The underground part of the fungus uses enzymes to "digest" other substances that it can use as food. Mushrooms and other fungi often grow in association with plants - perhaps attaching to the side of a tree, or growing out of a dead log as it decays. They are important in helping to ``recycle" nutrientsand break down dead plant materials. (nps.gov)

SCR Table Tennis Group

Table tennis, also called Ping-Pong, is played on a flat table divided into two equal courts with a net fixed across the middle. The object is to hit the ball so that it goes over the net and bounces on the opponent's half of the table. The lightweight hollow ball is propelled back and forth across the net by small paddles used by the players.

A match consists of the best of 3 games. The player(s) who first reaches 11 points wins the game. Service changes hands after every two points until 10-all is reached, then it changes after every subsequent point. In a tie at 10 points, two clear points must be scored to win.

Table tennis equipment is relatively simple and inexpensive. The playing table is rectangular, 9 by 5 feet. The playing surface is at a level plane 30 inches above the floor. The net is 6 feet across the table's middle surface. The ball, which is spherical and hollow, was once made of white celluloid. Since 1969, a plastic similar to celluloid has been used. The ball, which may be colored white, yellow, or orange, weighs about 0.09 ounces with a diameter of about 1.6 inches. The blade of a paddle is usually made of wood and may be covered with a thin layer of ordinary stippled, or pimpled, rubber, which may be laid over a thin layer of sponge rubber and may have the pimples reversed. Whatever combination is used, each of the two sides of a paddle must be different in color. The paddle may be any size, weight, or shape. 

We also want to wish Happy Holidays and a Happy New Year to all of our members!


Golden Niners

a set where Mark Hamill and Carrie Fisher were filming a scene for the second Star Wars movie, The Empire Strikes Back. He also got a chance to observe how the special effects in the movie, Poltergeist, were done one of the sound stages. He also witnessed the construction of



of her former students, Austin Scott, perform in the Broadway show, The Girl from the North Country, in New York City.

While Susie was busy adding students to her dancing classes, Rob gravitated to the plumbing industry where over a ten-year period he learned the trade, how to estimate, and the business knowledge required to be a plumbing contractor. He earned his California State C-36 Contractor's License and went into business for himself in 1984.

In 1997, after thirteen years in business, Rob decided to make a change when he was offered a position with Kruse Company, a highly regarded, 4th generation, family-owned plumbing company based in Berkeley. In 1973, they welcomed son Denny, who is married with two children, Jayden and Danica, and lives in Fremont. In 1977, their daughter Robyn was born. She is married with two children, Tobey and Parker, and lives in Granite Bay. When the kids were young, summer vacations were spent on a houseboat on Lake Oroville, water-skiing and entertaining family and friends. Denny and Robyn also danced and performed for Susie's studio while Rob was her production manager, coordinating sound, video, lights, and stage decoration. In later years Susie and Rob were thrilled to have all four grandkids perform in the recitals.

In 1957, Rob's grandmother started a very important tradition of knitting family Christmas stockings. Susie was honored to be the first to receive her stocking before she and Rob were even engaged! In 1988, Susie asked Rob's Gram to teach her how to make the stockings, so she could carry on the tradition. So far, Susie has made 45 stockings.

Rob and Susie's travel experiences include cruises to Alaska and the Caribbean, trips to Ireland, Rome, Singapore, Bali, and Hawaii. They both share a love of theater and have enjoyed opportunities to go to New York

to take in plays and musicals.

Susie sold her dance studio in 2015 but continued to work for the new owner for a year before retiring in 2016 when she and Rob moved to Roseville. Rob continued to work until 2018 when he retired from UA Local 159. They love living in Sun City and have enjoyed making friends in the Dance Club, Bocce, and Boomers. 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
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Safety First-

Scammers often target seniors — While people of all ages can and do fall for scams, scammers often target seniors. Scammers know that many seniors have money to spend and are from an older generation that trust others and are polite to strangers. If you have older relatives or loved ones, they may not be as cautious or savvy when it comes to scams. Here are a few ways you can help protect them and other vulnerable loved ones from getting scammed.

- Knowledge is power. According to the AARP, people who know about a particular scam are 80 percent less likely to engage with it, and if they do engage, they're 40 percent less likely to lose money from it. So help spread awareness! Share interesting articles and social media posts (from trusted sources, of course) about prevalent scams with your family—it's a good way to share information and talk about scams in general, without putting anyone on the spot.
- If your senior family members are on Facebook, encourage them to follow trusted organizations that provide information about scams and other forms of elder abuse. A great local Facebook page to follow is Placer PROTECT, run by Placer County's multidisciplinary elder abuse task force.
- If they use email, encourage them to sign up for fraud alerts from the Federal Trade Organization (FTC). The FTC's scam alert

website is a fantastic resource for people of all ages. It offers many well-written articles about current scams, and an easy-to-use portal to report fraud. Check it out at the FTC Consumer scam-alerts page.

- If you're the techie in the family, help the rest keep their technology up to date. Ask family members if they need help upgrading their mobile phones and computers with the latest versions of operating system software—most updates contain important security patches. Encourage them to use good virus-protection software. If they have a wireless router, make sure it's set up well with good security and privacy controls in place.
- Push the use of caller-id. Help enter family, friends and frequent business contacts into their phone contact list, and suggest they only answer calls from people they know. Remind them that it's OK to let an unknown caller go to voice mail--legitimate callerswill leave a message and a call-back number.
- Many scam victims feel lonely and isolated, and embarrassed to admit they've been scammed. Stay in close touch with loved ones, keep the lines of communication open and keep an eye out for red flags. If you find out they've been scammed, let them know it's nothing to be ashamed of—it happens to many people, and it's the criminals who ought to be ashamed. Help them slam the door on the scammers and report it.





Roseville Utilities' Meter Upgrade Project **Underway**; Work to Begin in Sun City in December

Like many utilities throughout the United States, Roseville has embarked on a meter upgrade project. This upgrade includes industry standard meters, which wirelessly send readings and important service information to both our water and electric utilities.

As part of the project, Roseville is replacing older electric and water meters with new ones. As these meters come online, City employees will no longer need to physically visit homes or businesses to read meters and can send commands through the network to connect service and perform maintenance virtually. In the end, it will yield faster customer service resolution and smarter billing information for both the utilities and our customers.

Phase one of the project kicked off in March 2023 and full implementation began in July. This second phase of the project should take 12-14 months to complete.

Installation in Sun City is scheduled to start in December and will continue in February-April 2024. You will be notified ahead of time regarding an installation at your home. Customers will receive a postcard in the mail as well as a door hanger prior to your meter upgrade. Roseville Utilities, with the help of our contractor, will install the new meters. They will also knock on your door to introduce themselves before beginning work.

- Grease the wheels: If you're cooking turkey or bacon-infused stuffing, avoid pouring fats, oils and grease down the drain to prevent clogs. Instead, store them in a sealable container like an old mayo or peanut butter jar, and the City will pick it up for free. Call 916-774-5780.

Market Update

Real estate sales are regionally very integrated. They just lowered their price to \$599,000 because they missed the market and have moved out and need to sell. The lesson; Sometimes it makes sense to see what the highest sales price was in the past 6 months, sometimes that strategy costs thousands.
