Chabot College, Michael, knowing he might be drafted, joined the Navy in 1965. While stationed on the USS Bennington, he was a "signalman." Michael served in the Navy for six years, two of them active duty. Once out of the Navy, he returned to work at Pring's, then to a factory in Oakland. He married and had two children, Tami, and Chad. The marriage didn't last, but he remains very close to his children and their families.

Cheryl was born in Alameda, but moved with her parents and younger brother to Hayward when she was two years old. As a young girl, she loved sports and would play games with the neighborhood kids in a nearby park. After graduating from Mount Eden High School in 1966, she attended California State University at Hayward, then transferred to Chabot College. Married in 1967, Cheryl had two children, Kimberli and Kristen. She was a stay-at-home mom until her divorce when she began working for United California Bank, now known as Wells Fargo.

Michael was single for more than four years and Cheryl for eight years by the time they met at the Blue Dolphin in San Leandro. Cheryl had gone there with her cousin who knew most of the members in the band and Michael had gone with his buddies from work. Michael asked her to dance, and they started dating. 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Executive Director Comments

A New Plan for the New Year — Last vear I encouraged you all to take a risk and try something new – get out of your comfort zone and stretch yourself a bit. I hope you tried that, and that you were successful. If you weren't, don't give up - try again, in a new way. If you didn't, maybe this is your year.

Those of us working on making the future of Sun City Roseville better (and there are a LOT of us) are taking stock of the feedback you've given us and making new plans about what to do, where to do it and how to get there. Usually, things don't get done by themselves so the first step in going somewhere is to have a plan.

We all need a plan I think – whether it's for a project or a task or for personal development. A plan allows you to have confidence to take that second, and third steps. It tells you the direction you need to be heading in, and lets you know when you need to course-correct. Plans help you know when you need to take a step onto another path, or which fork in the road to take. And as you take more and more steps on that thousand-mile journey, the plan keeps you focused on the destination and helps make sure you end up where you set out to go, or end up with the result vou wanted.

It's OK if the destination changes - it usually does, at least a few times in your life. Make sure that if it does, you change the plan, too. Because another smart person once said, "If you don't know where you are

going, any road will get you there." (Lewis Carroll). And you probably don't really want

Phase B Update — In the September 2023 Courier I wrote about the membership approval of Phase B, the Fitness Center Renovation and Expansion Project and what our plan might look like. We are now at the point in the plan where one of the most important decisions about the project is behind us. In December the Board met to discuss and approve contracts for both the Architect and the General Contractor (GC) for this work. Now the real work begins. We start with obtaining entitlements from the City, developing the general design so we can generate actual construction documents and using those so the General Contractor can come up with a more detailed cost estimate for bidding purposes.

Once all the bids are gathered (often a 6–8-week task), the GC can then provide the Guaranteed Maximum Price (or GMP) contract for final Board Approval. The final construction start date will depend on several factors such as accumulation of funds in the CAIA (See Treasurer George Porter's article in this edition of the Courier), contractor workload, weather, and/or supply chain concerns. In total the process just to get to the starting line for construction will likely take between 45 and 60 weeks.

For now, we are on track and moving along as planned. I'll provide updates regularly, and you can follow along by watching the Resident Website for news.

A Situation — This Could Happen in Your Neighborhood

One evening in December, Judy was hosting a party. Ann, Judy's friend and neighbor, did not arrive or call. This was completely out of character for Ann. Ann did not answer Judy's phone call and two guests from the party went over to Ann's to ring her doorbell. No response - and Ann's car was in the driveway. Noone had seen Ann, no one had a key to her house and they became worried. They decided to call 911.

The first officer got a quick recap from the neighbors and found a window ajar. The officer radioed that he was entering the house by the opened window. He called out – "Roseville Police! Is anyone here?" No answer. Again, the officer called out when he heard a faint voice from the bedroom. Ann was lying on the floor next to her bed. It appeared she had struck her head on the nightstand and was dehydrated. The officer radioed in for fire and ambulance to respond. The back-up officer arrived and found the Vial of Life in the freezer. The two guests began calling Ann's family to notify them of Ann's situation and offered to feed the cat and lock up.

When the ladies returned to the party

there was some lively conversation regarding the situation. Five of the ladies had no Vial of Life and some had not updated their emergency contacts. The only neighbor that had a key to Ann's house had moved to Reno several months before.

The morals: Never hesitate to call 911 under such circumstances. The police do NOT mind dry runs. Do you 1) participate in Neighborhood Watch? 2) have a trusted neighbor with a key? 3) have a current Vial of Life in place? 4) have current emergency contacts listed in the Neighborhood Watch system? Neighborhood Watch is a valuable program, but is only vibrant and effective when up-to-date information is shared with neighbors.

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
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Creative Arts

This mystery, thriller achieved Oscar nominations for Actor Clifton Webb, Director Otto Preminger, Best Screenplay, Best Interior Art Direction, and won the Oscar for Best Cinematography, black & white. In 1999 the film was added to the National Film Registry.

The Internet movie rating website "IMDB" gave it a high 7.9 out of ten. The website "Rotten Tomatoes" gave an exceptional rating of 100% from 66 critics and 90% from audience reviews. Film critic Roger Ebert wrote of this movie, "Film noir is known for its convoluted plots and arbitrary twists, but even in a genre that gave us 'The Maltese Falcon', this takes some kind of prize."

Happy New Year from the Properties Committee! With the start of a brand-new year, we would like to let you know about the Properties Committee and what we do for the Community. The Properties Committee checks the appearance, maintenance, and care of all Sun City Roseville common areas that are not assigned to the Golf Committee. Our sub-committee groups help Association Staff by conducting monthly inspections to identify areas of concern. A partial list of responsibilities for the various sub-committees are as follows:

Building and Hardscape – inspects sports courts, the facilities for activities like bocce and croquet, buildings such as the Lodge and Sierra Pines, and water features and pumps on a rotating basis looking for items needing replacement, trip hazards, and finding anything that doesn't look right.

Common Area Landscape - looks at all community landscaping (plants, trees, and flowers) on a rotating basis. They inspect School House Park, Demonstration Gardens. all Community entrances, Timber Creek Lodge and Sierra Pines landscape, interior road medians, and parking lots.

Open Space and Riparian - reviews all riparian and environmentally sensitive areas looking for specific plants that are a problem, downed trees, beaver dams, and any other issues that might indicate a future problem.

Resident Concerns - is another important part of our responsibilities. Any resident who sees an issue in any of the common areas may fill out a Resident Concern form which can be found on the website or in the Administration Office. Once a form is received. in the Administration Office it is directed to the Properties Committee who confirms receipt with the resident and sends the concern to the proper department for resolution.

Resident Concerns, as well as all other issues noted during monthly inspections, are logged, and reviewed at monthly Committee meetings until resolution.

The Properties Committee meets the second Thursday of each month at 9:00 AM in the Birch/Cedar Rooms. We invite you to attend any of our meetings.




Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.


Birders

Two field trips are planned for the month of January 2024. On January 4, a trip to 12-Bridges Trail in Lincoln is on our calendar. This will be our first trip to this trail, but we have visited Coyote Pond nearby, many years ago. On January 18, the Birders will be going to Colusa Wildlife Refuge near the town of Colusa. Last year the Birders identified 40 species at this location including Ruddy Duck, Hooded Merganser, Snow Goose, White-fronted Goose, and Black-necked Stilt.

Strenuous – 9 or more miles with significant elevation gains and losses greater than 2,500 feet.





Cornhole




SCR Tennis Club

Safety First-

Have you made a donation to a charity recently? Perhapsyou plan to make a donation to start out the new year. Whether you are making a donation now or in the future, be careful. There are criminals waiting to take advantage of your generosity.

Charity scams take many forms:

Online giving — There has been a lot growth in online scamming over the past years. Many bad-actors are purporting to be charities requesting donations. Even if you receive an email from a recognized and respected charity name, don't assume the request is really coming from them. Take a close look at the name of the sender. Does it really show an email address pertaining to that charity? Charity emails usually end in ".org". If not, it could be from a scammer. Don't click on or open any links on these messages. Doing so may give the sender access to personal information on your computer and in some cases gives the sender control over your computer.

Unsolicited phone calls — Phone scamming continues to increase. It's estimated over 59 million US residents lost money from a phone scam in 2021. Legitimate charities rarely make random calls for donations. The easy way to avoid scam calls is to just not answer calls if you don't recognize the caller ID. Most of these calls are automated (Robocalls) and never leave a voicemail.

House calls and street collectors — It's relatively easy for scammers to go door to door pretending to be collecting for a charity. Some even have fake IDs they show you, knowing that you don't easily have the capability to check if the ID is valid or not. To help deter door-to-door scammers, post a "No Soliciting" sign on or near your front door. If you are out around town and someone is collecting on the sidewalk, don't assume they are a legitimate charity. Check them out on your own before giving money or your personal information.

Tips to follow:

- Don't let any charity rush or pressure you into making a donation, of any kind.
- Look for specifics regarding how your donation will be used.
- Confirm that the charity or organization is legitimate and is a non-profit organization listed with the FTC (www.consumer.ftc.gov/).

• Avoid sweepstakes claiming to exchange winnings for a donation; that's both a scam and illegal.

Taking time to ask questions, gather information, and verify an organization's non-profit status can help make sure that your generous giving will truly go to those that need help. It can also help ensure that your personal information is protected and not compromised by scammers looking for easy targets. If you believe you have been the victim or have had your personal information jeopardized, please contact the Roseville Police Department or file a crime report online.



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
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SSN WRITER...

In With The New

At the beginning of each new year, many of us reminisce about "The Good Old Days". To give you an idea of what "The Good Old Days" were like, here is what I remember about our grooming and fashion habits from top to toe as a high school freshman in 1953:

Hair pins were used to make pin curls. You would then wrap a scarf around your head before bedtime, hope your hair was dry in the morning, and brush it out.

Make-up was pretty basic – lipstick, and then for special occasions perhaps a touch of rouge or face powder. Very seldom did you see anyone who had a part of their body pierced for jewelry.

A very popular item was a cinch belt. It was not a part under the hood of the car or a tool in your dad's workshop. The elastic belt was around three inches wide and came in a selection of colors. You cinched it around your waist, and it immediately shrank to waspish size. It also helped keep our shirttails in.

In attaining "womanhood", we were given two other types of belts that were never exposed to the public eye. There was the garter belt with its dangling straps that held up our nylons, and that other belt to keep another item in place. Years later, after that other belt was replaced with a product more comfortable, the husband of one of my girlfriends made a tie tack from


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






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

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Sites Reservoir Project Receives the Green SUN SENIOR NEWS CLASSIFIEDS **Light for Construction** — *Project will aid* in statewide water supply reliability

A key milestone was recently reached, bringing the Sites Reservoir project—a crucial initiative contributing to California's water infrastructure—closer to construction. The final environmental impact report, officially certified by the US Bureau of Reclamation and Sites Project Authority, paves the way for construction, which is scheduled to begin in 2025 and is expected to conclude in 2030.

"The certification of the final environmental impact report marks a pivotal moment. As we move towards construction, offers a potential solution for storing excess surface water across California, aiming to reduce dependence on existing water storage facilities like Folsom Lake.

Roseville stands to benefit indirectly from this project, as the Sites Reservoir, with a proposed capacity of up to 1.8 million acrefeet, introduces a substantial water source that can be channeled into the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. This redirection is poised to enhance water quality and foster a more conducive habitat for fish.



we are not just building a reservoir but a more sustainable and interconnected water infrastructure that will benefit us and future generations," concluded Bruce Houdesheldt, Roseville Mayor. "It will increase statewide reliability for the environment, agriculture, and urban water users."

Understanding what is at stake, back in early 2017, Roseville opted into the project's initial phase and shares a board seat on the Sites Joint Powers Authority Board with the Placer County Water Agency. Even though Roseville won't directly receive water from this project, the interconnected water systems in California ensure benefits for Placer County and our watershed.

"Sites Reservoir is a crucial step towards ensuring water security in our region," said Vice Mayor Krista Bernasconi. "By diversifying our water sources, we can reduce the impact on existing facilities and enhance our resilience, benefiting everyone in California."

The new above-ground storage facility in Glenn and Colusa counties provides a solution to store extra water, relieving the strain on existing state and federal water supply storage

"As we embark on the construction phase of the Sites Reservoir, we are not merely building a reservoir but investing in a water management legacy," emphasized Scott Alvord, Roseville Councilmember. "This project's forward-thinking design and careful environmental considerations guarantee a reliable water supply that will stand the test of time, reinforcing California's resilience in the face of evolving challenges."

The Sites Reservoir's strategic location

The Sites Reservoir will alleviate pressure on Folsom Lake, the primary water source for Roseville, as less water needs to be released into the Delta for environmental preservation.

"As an above-ground storage facility, this project is valued for ensuring a sustainable water supply for our community and beyond while also making a significant contribution to environmental well-being," said Pauline Roccucci, Roseville Councilmember. "Redirecting water to the Delta for ecological reasons benefits our communities and helps maintain a balanced ecosystem."
