
Players — "Old Hams" to play in June



Member Issue Statements are relevant for SCLH Board of Directors Election. Currently, SCLH has an election going on for 3 director positions on the Board and 1 amendment.

I hear and read about the importance of homeowners living at Sun City Lincoln Hills being involved.

I agree it's important to be involved. I do not feel my activism and involvement is valued during this election period. Other members feel the same. Equal access to express our point of view must meet the requirements of California Civil Code 5105 allowing equal access to Association Media, websites and common areas.

In the past, members like me had our member issue statements displayed similarly to Candidate Member Statements. This year statements of Candidates running for election are on tables with tablecloths with individual spaces in the lodges.

This year, member issue statements are

relegated to a dark metal bin with drop files with no tags to identify the individual member's statements. The bin is on a table next to the individual candidate statements. There is no way to enhance the bin to make it more noticeable.

The visual difference of how the Candidate statements is displayed vs mine as a member says it all. The contrast clearly shows on how important our involvement as members is taken by our Association.

Other examples, in years past members/ homeowners have been allowed to be videoed and our statements placed on the SCLH Resident Website and participate in election forums. This year the opportunity to participate in Candidate Forums and record our issue statements has not been provided.

I believe I have I made my case based on the above, that members advocating a point of view are not being valued and afforded equal opportunity during this SCLH Election period. Donna Fields

welcome everyone to this harborage of enjoyment.


I am highly disciplined and expert in making money and building people. I retired at age 54 and have not had a house payment since 1990. I live off interest income and my net worth increases every year.

Support Lincoln Public Library on May 2

If you're a fan of the Lincoln Public Library, mark your calendar for Thursday, May 2, the Big Day of Giving (BDOG). Library Director Kathryn Hunt and her able staff have identified three programs and events that touch the lives of every Lincoln resident. The Friends of the Lincoln Public Library (FOLL) want to make the library's wish list come true on the Big Day of Giving.

Read Across Lincoln - The Lincoln Public Library launched this program in 2022. Last year the library provided a free children's book to all 700 first graders in our community. Read Across Lincoln is popular with students, schools, and families. FOLL pays for this program with BDOG donations, and provides volunteers to assist library staff during school visits.

Family Art Night - Last year FOLL teamed with the Lincoln Public Library to feature art projects for the whole family. Over 500 budding artists of all ages joined to create small art pieces from kits furnished by FOLL. Events included face painting, a caricature artist, hands-on art projects, cello music, a showing of tiny art results, and exhibits by local artists. Response to this event impels us to stage this very successful interactive happening for the public again in 2024.

Teen Engagement and Leadership - FOLL supports Lincoln Public Library's innovative slate of teen activities, intended to encourage teen engagement and foster development of leadership skills. FOLL will continue to support the popular Youth Writing Contest with BDOG funds. Winning entries are published in book form. Last year's book, Across the Universe, is available on Amazon. FOLL also funds the library's free book giveaways and similar efforts aimed at helping teens on their educational journey.

None of these special programs would be possible without funding from FOLL. We hope to raise \$36,000 through the BDOG campaign this year. Big Day of Giving donations make special projects possible, and are part of over \$60,000 in funding that FOLL provides to the Lincoln Public Library each year for programs and literacy events.



In watching and recreating movement patterns, we develop an enhanced sensory awareness. As our physical capacity grows, so does the range of patterns we are able to share and express and so does our enjoyment of dance (LaMothe, 2023).



LHAG member, Ron Yelton, will follow up his January 2024 presentation on astro image processing where he demonstrated image processing of a galaxy in regular, visible light (LRGB).

Thispresentationwillfocusonnarrowband imaging which uses hydrogen, oxygen and sulfur (HOS) filters to process galaxy NGC 2264. Using just these three filters he can reveal at least 24 different color combinations to display the galaxy's elements.

NGC 2264 is an emission, reflection and dark nebula within the constellation Monoceros (the Unicorn), NGC 2264 actually refers to two objects within the nebula - The Cone Nebula and the Christmas Tree Cluster.

LHAG Cosmology Interest Group (CIG). The meeting is scheduled for Monday, April 15, 2024, at 6:45 PM in the Orchard Creek Lodge Fine Arts room.






Neighbors InDeed

A Significant Emotional Event — It was a rainy night in February, we were just finishing washing the dinner dishes and getting ready to settle in for an evening of streaming TV. There was a loud "bang!" and then the sound of rushing water – a lot of rushing water. We ran into the bathroom and saw a geyser coming from behind the toilet! I quickly braved the torrent, reached in and turned off the valve. It took a large pile of towels to soak up the water. Within a half hour or so we had the water cleaned up. We are very grateful that we were home when this nearly catastrophic event occurred.

How did this happen? Careful investigation revealed that the fitting on the toilet supply line had ruptured. The plastic connector had split! I had never heard of this happening, so I asked a few questions of a plumber I know. He was coming over to replace the supply lines anyway. He told me that failure of the plastic connector happens occasionally. He has seen it many times. The older the supply line, the more likely it is to fail. I checked the label on my old supply line, it was manufactured in 2003! It lasted 21 years! Plumbers will tell you to replace your supply lines after 10 years. This is an easy item to overlook but it should be added to your routine maintenance items.



Take a shower before entering the pool or hot tub.

If you use water shoes, save them for the pool, not the walk from your car to the pool. Food and beverages are allowed in the

outdoor area, but not in the pool. Children are allowed in the OC pools daily from 2-4 PM. Kids are noisy and like to

splash. If that doesn't work for you, choose another time to use the pool. Our KS pool has five lanes; three can be

reserved for swimming and water walking.

area of the pool does not need a reservation but can get busy during the late afternoon hours. If you are walking and socializing with several people, consider breaking up 'the line' and allowing others to have a clear path. If you see someone with a special need, please try and accommodate. Shorter walkers may need the lane closest to the edge of the pool. Some feel more comfortable in the water if they grab an edge.







Louis is survived by three sons and their partners, seven grandchildren and many loving friends.




