


Remember the Andy Griffith show from the 1960's? 
But what happens when we are asked to play a song that many haven't heard before? That's when one of our Harmonicoots will

Executive Director Comments Board Elections and Other Important Stuff

The Sun City Roseville Board election process is well underway! The Election Committee mailed their "Call for Candidate" letter on January 17 this year, and prospective applicants have until April 18 to get their applications submitted to the Administration Department if they intend to run in the election. There are two openings for the Board, and our Elections guidelines call for two potential candidates for each open position by the filing deadline. If this number is not attained, then the Board President will activate the Nominating Committee (appointed at the February Board Meeting) in an effort to secure additional candidates. We would need at least 3 Candidates to hold an actual election so act now if you are considering running for the Board. For those interested in running, there is a Prospective Board Candidates Information Meeting scheduled for April 4th at 2:00pm in the Solarium.

At the February 22 Budget Townhall Meeting, the panel, which included representatives from the Board, the Finance Committee and staff, projected increases to the monthly assessments over the next five years and outlined the reasons influencing the expected increases. A possible range of \$12 to \$15 per month increase for next year was discussed, but at the time I am writing this article, staff has worked hard to reduce that range down to between a \$10 and \$13 increase per month. The Board will host a final open meeting on Tuesday April 9 to listen to additional input from the community prior to approving the final budget at the regular Board Meeting on April 26.

Staff presented the 2024-25 draft budget to the Finance Committee in the week of

March 18 with three days of departmental budget presentations. On the fourth day, staff presented proposed Reserve equipment and project expenditures as well as New Capital and Capital Asset Improvement Account proposed projects.

Work on various projects around the community continues. Work is continuing on the Landscape Master Improvement Plan around the community with several projects around the Lodge coming to completion. Work will continue through April and May and represents our ongoing efforts to revitalize our common area landscape throughout the community. Depending on the final budget approval, additional landscape staff may be added to assist in the community enhancement projects. The MIP for Golf, which includes important work on bunker removal and renovation, turf reduction and irrigation repairs, is also in progress.

After a short pause to organize and begin the process of updating the 10-Year Strategic Plan, the resident-approved Phase B preconstruction work will get underway at the beginning of this month and continue into the fall. This part of the Phase B project will tackle the entitlements, design and construction drawings and permitting processes in advance of undertaking the actual construction phase in the future. Please attend an upcoming Strategic Planning Work Group meeting to learn what the community's next building project(s) will be.

It's a busy time of the year as we look forward to Spring and all the opportunity for continuous improvement it offers!

Neighborhood Watch/Citizen Patrol

Below are a few Scams that you should be aware of:

IRS —

The IRS will never:

• Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. They do not call – the generally will mail a bill to any taxpayer who owes taxes.

• Threaten to have you arrested for not paying.

• Demand taxes be paid without giving taxpayers the opportunity to question or appeal the amount owed.

• Call unexpectedly about a tax refund. Social Security —

Social Security will never:

• Suspend your Social Security number.

• Claim to need personal information or payment to activate a cost-of-living adjustment

(COLA) or other benefit increase. • Pressure you to take immediate action,

including sharing personal information.Ask you to pay with gift cards, prepaid

debit cards, wire transfers, or by mailing cash. • Threaten to seize your bank account.

• Offer to move your money to a "protected" bank account

• Direct message you on social media. Grandparent —

• The scammers call and impersonate a grandchild – or another close relative – "Hello

Grandpa??" in a crisis situation, asking for immediate financial assistance.

• Sometimes these callers "spoof" the caller ID to make an incoming call appear to be coming from a trusted source.

• Scammers often bully victims into transferring money by wiring money, or by purchasing gift cards or money orders. Some may even want to meet to receive money in person. Hang up immediately when receiving a call of this kind and report to the local police department.

Tech Support —

• Receive a phone call, pop-up, or email telling you there's a problem with your computer.

• Scammers pretend to be from a wellknown tech company such as Microsoft. They use lots of technical terms to convince you that the problems on your computer are real. Do Not Give Them remote access!

• They may also try to enroll you in a worthless computer maintenance or warranty program.

• Don't fall for Tech Support on your computers or phones unless it is a trusted source – someone you know or who you have been referred too to help you with your technical issues.

Scammers are getting more brazen every year so watch out!

The "Who" is the author of this article, a Sun City Roseville (SCR) resident for 27 years. The "Why" is because my past career made me aware that computers would be important in the future. Twenty years ago, I joined a group of residents, who were working towards the creation of SCR's Resident Website, www.scres.org. Recognizing that our community would constantly need Website tips and updates, I began writing this monthly Courier article.

Ever since the Resident Website was activated, residents have suggested it should permit (1) registering for Activities' events, (2) scheduling Golf Tee times, (3) making reservations at Timbers Restaurant, and (4) paying monthly assessment online. It took a while, but features (1 & 2) are now available on an alternate website called "Sun City Roseville Club Now" at https://scrmember.scres.org. Item (3) is being worked on and item (4) is being consider for the future.

We emphasize that the RESIDENT WEBSITE (www.scres.org) is not going away. All the features of the Resident Website will remain available. However, the new Association computer system requires this alternate website to provide those new features. The icon, to access "Sun City Roseville Club Now" (scrmember.scres.org), is on the Resident Website's Announcement page, bottom row, far left.

To login to "Sun City Roseville Club Now":

1. On a Smart Phone or Tablet, to access "Sun City Roseville Club Now" you may need to download an "App" by searching for "Sun City Roseville Club Now". The App is available for Android devices on Googleplay Store and for Apple devices in the Apple App store.

2. When you sign in for first time, use the email address that you have on file with the

Association. (Reminder: your email address should be all lowercase letters.)

If you do not have an email address on file, please contact Nona Weintz, in the Administration Office, nonaw@scrca.org or phone 916-774-3820.

3. The first time you log into the Sun City Roseville Club Now Website your password will be your last name, all lowercase letters. Then, you will be asked to change your password.

On the Resident Website.... About the Classified Ad Feature

Each month the Resident Website's "Classified Ad" feature proves to be the most popular of all the Resident Website features.



Governmental Affairs Committee

The Governmental Affairs Committee (GAC) is one of ten resident-led committees within the Sun City Roseville Community Association (SCRCA). GAC members, on behalf of the Board of Directors, and working closely with the Executive Director, identify emerging federal, state and local governmental matters that may affect SCRCA operations or finances. The Committee is also a conduit of information for Sun City residents.

What si unique about the GAC? The other nine committees focus on concerns arising within Sun City. Several committees literally inspect Sun City properties on foot every month. The GAC

focuses on information arising beyond the borders of Sun City.

For example, the GAC has monitored legislation concerning Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) ni

California for several years. Assembly Bil 1033 (Ting), signed into law last fall, proposed a new

option for local governments to allow landowners to convey ADUs separately from the primary

dwelling, by creating a new lot and making the accessory unit a new primary residence. The

GAC members monitoring the bill considered mitigating measures. The Community

Associations Institute (CAl), which the SCRCA joined last fall, successfully lobbied for a late

concession that added authority for Homeowners Associations to decide independently on

separate conveyance even if the pertinent local government supports it. Sun City Roseville therefore has the power to reject separate conveyance of ADUs in our community.

Does the GAC make a difference? Last year, the City of Roseville released an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for a major industrial warehouse project at the west end of Blue Oaks Boulevard. The GAC immediately alerted the Board of Directors, which gave the Board time to send a comment letter on behalf of the SCRCA. Sun City's objections were added to those of neighborhoods closer to the project site, and the city and the developer have suspended the project. The GAC continues to monitor the project's status.

The monthly GAC meeting usually includes briefings by staff from the offices of our state and federal legislators, and by staff from the City of Roseville. The committee also hosts presentations on topics such as Placer County's transportation planning, Roseville's new regional soccer park, the City of Roseville smart meter program, California Highway Patrol senior safe driver awareness, new policy initiatives of California Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara, and town hall style updates with our local elected representatives. The GAC is seeking up to five new members. Prior experience in government service is helpful, but not required. The deadline to submit an application is March 8 at 4:00 pm. SCR Birders were scheduled to go to the Davis Wetlands on March 1, but decided to substitute a trip to Monte Verde in Rocklin when they learned that the Wetlands were only open to hunters until February 15. Then on March 1, the trip to Monte Verde was cancelled due to rain that day. Birders had better luck on the next scheduled field trip on February 15, to Gray Lodge near Gridley, where sunshine allowed them to identify 41 species. Among those were many Tundra Swans, Snow Geese, Greater White-fronted Geese and a lot of ducks: Teals (Green-winged, and Blue-winged), Northern Shovelers, Northern Pintails, Buffleheads, and even a Bald Eagle.

Another scheduled field trip, the one to Yolo Bypass, was cancelled on February 29 due to flooding. This time the Birders decided to substitute the Monte Verde trip again and hope for dry weather. It worked and the Birders identified 21 species in the marsh-like environment. Those identified included the California Towhee, Song Sparrow, Marsh Wren, Northern Flicker, and California Thrasher.

Scheduled field trips for April are Turkey Creek Golf Club in Lincoln on April 4 and Linda Creek Trail in Roseville on April 18. An eBlast is sent to all SCR residents on the Birders email roster about a week before the scheduled trip describing the meeting place and time, duration of the trip, how much walking is involved, and what to bring with you on the trip. By the time you read this, spring will have sprung and warmer temperatures will beckon us to explore the outdoors where verdant landscapes and blooming flowers are welcoming us. Now is a great time to give hiking a try and enjoy the outdoors along with like-minded folks. You don't have to be an athlete to hike, though you should be in reasonably good shape to walk a few miles at a comfortable pace, at times on uneven terrain. Photos from recent hikes can be viewed on the SCR Hiking Group photo gallery, expertly



curated by William Haley.

Our April hikes range from easy to moderate and all are within about 30 miles from Sun City. A special treat will be the April 18 visit to Harvego Bear River Preserve (http://placerlandtrust.org/harvego-bearriver-preserve). This hike will be led by Placer Land Trust docents who will share the rich history of this area which includes 1,778 acres of blue oak woodland and riparian habitat and a working cattle ranch.

Below is the April schedule, subject to change depending on weather and trail conditions. Note time change: We now meet at 7:45 am in the parking lot near the tennis courts for carpooling. I also feel we gravitate to our interests here as we did to on-campus clubs, sororities, and fraternities back in college. Good memories."

Both Anna and Neil relish the lifelong friendships they've made here. "In retrospect, we feel that choosing to live in Sun City has given us the opportunity to create irreplaceable friendships," Anna says. And both look forward to continuing to bask in the warmth of their own version of Mayberry.




