### Jean Saunders — Gets an "A" for Adventurous

Living a life of adventure means riding a camel in Egypt, watching a snake charmer on a street corner in Delhi, floating in the Dead Sea, reveling at the running of the bulls in Pamplona, shooting the rapids of the gorges of the Zambezi River in Zambia, hiking the trails in the Rain Forest Preserve of Costa Rica, riding an elephant in Thailand, and posing by the Great Wall of China. That's just a short list of the many exotic adventures Jean Saunders has had throughout her life as a worldwide traveler.

Born in Oklahoma in 1935, Jean and her family, which included Betty, Don, and Sue, moved in 1944 to Los Angeles then on to Chico where Jean graduated from Chico High School in 1952 and then attended Chico State University. She was first runner-up in the first Miss Chico Pageant, performing a dramatic reading as her talent.

In May of 1957, when she was walking the beach in Waikiki, she met a man who was



a crew member on the SS Mariposa (Matson Line) who, after an evening of dinner, drinks, and dancing, invited her aboard for a grand tour of the ship. "There were lots of happy people all around, shouts of bon voyage, and 'all ashore who are going to shore' ". Soon we were sailing out to sea!" she recalls. Now a stowaway, Jean was locked in a room until ship personnel determined it wasn't intentional and moved her to a stateroom. Eventually, she was transferred to the SS Monterrey and returned to Honolulu. The good news was that she was cleared of any federal charges. The bad news was the Matson Line charged her \$415 for her return to the island. Ironically, 30 years later, she became an Accredited Cruise Counselor and went on cruises all over the world, including to places such as the Greek isles, Glacier Bay in Alaska, the Caribbean, Tahiti, the Mexican Riviera, St. Thomas, and Puerto Rico, She's even cruised rivers such as in 1983 when she cruised down the Nile in Egypt.

In 1958, Jean became a TWA hostess, offering TLC to passengers flying during thunderstorms and hobnobbing with celebrities (cont' on page 25)

### **Neighborhood Watch/Citizen Patrol**

Scammers are some of the busiest people around-they're always looking for new ways to commit classic scams, like stolen checks, fake sweepstakes, stolen identities, and made-up emergencies. This fraud prevention update focuses on new twists to old scams.

Check out 4 ways to protect yourself in 2024

1. Don't give out personal financial information.

Your online banking password, card PIN, card security code (CVV), and onetime passcodes (for transactions / logins / registration) are NEVER okay to share, and your financial institution will never ask for them. Giving out personal financial information is still the quickest way to fall victim to a scam-and this won't change in 2024.

What to do instead -

If someone claiming to be (your financial institute) is asking you for something that doesn't seem right, hang up, delete the text, and call them back on their provided 800 number.

2. Don't use checks when you can use another payment type.

In addition to giving you fake checks, fraudsters also love to steal real checks. Check washing - where a stolen check is "washed" and written out to the scammer is still popular - but now scammers are also snapping photos of stolen checks and then altering them to deposit via mobile deposit.

What to do instead —

Use alternate payment methods (credit cards or paying online or autopay) when you can. If you must use checks, take them to the post office to mail. Mailboxes still get broken in.

3. Don't answer calls from unknown numbers.

Popular scams rely on phone calls and texts. When answering these unknown numbers, thieves can capture your voice to be used to impersonate you.

What to do instead —

Let them leave a message – if you know them then call them back.

4. Don't send "emergency" money before contacting someone.

If you get a call from a "family member" claiming to be in trouble, don't panic. Instead, after you've finished talking - and before sending money - call the person at their personal number to check first or call another family member to verify.

Take action and report the scam.

Fraud and scams need to be report to the authorities. Visit usa.gov/where-report-scams.

Finally, plan to attend the April Neighborhood Watch Meeting, April 8th at 10:00am in the Timbercreek Ballroom.

### Safety First — Watch Out for this Form of Identity Theft

It's official. The 2024 tax season has arrived. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) started accepting paper and electronic tax returns on Monday, January 29, 2024. If you're looking forward to getting your tax refund this year, be careful, as tax identity thieves may want to get your refund, too.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, tax identity theft happens when someone uses your Social Security number to get a tax refund or a job. You might find out it has happened when you get a letter from the IRS saying more than one tax return was filed in your name, or IRS records show you have wages from an employer you don't know.

The IRS uses your Social Security Number (SSN) to make sure your filing is accurate and complete, and that you get any refund you are due. Identity theft can affect how your tax return is processed. An unexpected notice or letter from the IRS could alert you that someone else is using your SSN. Remember, the IRS never starts contact with a taxpayer by sending an email, text or social media message that asks for personal or financial information. If you get an email that claims to be from the IRS, do not reply or click on any links. Instead, forward it to phishing@irs.gov.

If someone uses your SSN to file for a tax refund before you do, the IRS might think you already filed and got your refund. When you file your return later, IRS records will show the first filing and refund, and you'll get a notice or letter from the IRS saying more than one return was filed for you.

If someone uses your SSN to get a job, the employer may report that person's income to the IRS using your SSN. When you file your tax return, you won't include those earnings. IRS records will show you failed to report all your income. The agency will send you a notice or letter saying you got wages but didn't report them. The IRS doesn't know those wages were reported by an employer you don't know.

If you want to avoid becoming a victim this tax season, The FTC has these tips to fight tax identity theft:

• File your tax return early in the tax

season, if you can.

- Use a secure internet connection if you file electronically, or mail your tax return directly from the post office.
- Respond to all mail from the IRS as soon as possible.
- If tax identity theft happens to you, visit IdentityTheft.gov to report it to the FTC, file an Identity Theft Affidavit with the IRS electronically, and get a personal recovery plan.

Now is prime time for tax identity theft, as millions of individuals file their personal tax returns leading up to the April 15 filing deadline. However, protecting your identity is a year-long endeavor. Your personal information is valuable. By securing your identity today, you can minimize your chances of becoming a victim of identity theft.

That isle of hunger, isle of pain, isle you'll never see again. But the isle of home is always on your



### **Executive Director Comments**

The Economy is Better Than We Thought But We Still Need Responsible Budgetin

In the ever-shifting landscape of today's economy, maintaining financial stability within our HOA is paramount, not to mention one of top Board Goals for 2023-24. As we navigate through periods of uncertainty, such as the fluctuations in market conditions, strong jobs growth, low unemployment and unforeseen challenges like the recent global pandemic, a responsible budgeting process emerges as a cornerstone of financial resilience and long-term sustainability.

For any HOA, whether small or large-scale, the budget serves as a roadmap for financial decision-making. It not only outlines projected expenses and revenue but also reflects the values and priorities of the community it serves. In the current economic climate, characterized by potential volatility and some degree of unpredictability, the need for a robust budgeting process becomes even more apparent.

One of the primary reasons why a responsible budget process is crucial in this economy is its role in ensuring financial stability. By carefully analyzing income streams and expenditures, HOA boards can identify potential risks and take proactive measures to mitigate them. IN our case, this involves keeping reserves funded at close to 100% to cushion against economic downturns or material cost increases, and adjusting spending

priorities to align with current needs. For the last few years, expenses have grown faster than revenues can (in part, due to our emphasis on limiting assessment increases and balancing access to amenities in favor of our members).

Moreover, a well-thought-out budget fosters transparency and accountability within the HOA. When residents have a clear understanding of how their assessments are being allocated and managed, it enhances trust and confidence in the association's leadership. Open communication about budgetary decisions also encourages community engagement, allowing residents to provide valuable input and feedback. As you read this, we will have already hosted our Annual Budget Town Hall – I hope you had an opportunity to attend in person, or view it online. We are committee to keeping this process in the light. During March (18-22) we will host a series of open Budget Meetings to review prospective Departmental Operations, Reserves, and New Capital purchases for the year.

Prudent financial planning is essential to safeguard the interests of all homeowners. By incorporating contingency measures and regularly revisiting budget projections, we can adapt to changing circumstances and maintain financial health. This flexibility is particularly crucial when faced with unexpected expenses or revenue shortfalls, enabling the association

to navigate challenges without compromising its long-term viability.

Responsible budgeting promotes financial sustainability by fostering a culture of fiscal discipline and restraint. It encourages prudent spending practices and discourages reliance on debt to finance operations or capital projects. By living within its means, an HOA can avoid the pitfalls of excessive debt and ensure that financial resources are used wisely for the benefit of the entire community. Our promise to fund New Capital and Improvement projects without using regular or special assessments or loans has worked well for us historically.

Another aspect of responsible budgeting involves prioritizing spending that enhances the quality of life for residents and preserve property values. This may include funding for maintenance and repairs, community amenities, and landscaping improvements. By allocating resources strategically, HOAs can create an attractive and desirable living environment that enhances the overall appeal of the community. Our goal of "Continuous Improvement" requires careful oversight and targeted spending. Setting aside funds for major capital improvements and planning for the future will ensure that the community remains vibrant and resilient for generations to come.

Every summer, a group of SCR Birders sits down to draw up a field trip schedule for the upcoming bird watching season (mid-September of the current calendar year to mid-May of the next year). Every year, we congratulate ourselves for doing such a fine job, only to be disappointed six months later when we face dense fog, wicked winds, or "atmospheric rivers" on a scheduled field trip day. Those days are few, however, and we have many more perfect weather days than disappointing ones

On January 18, Birders travelled to Colusa Wildlife Refuge on a perfect bird watching day. A total of 39 species were identified, including the White-fronted Goose, Northern Pintail, Snow Goose, Black-crowned Night Heron, American Pipit, and Common Gallinule.

The Nimbus Fish Hatchery on the American River in Folsom will be the Birders planned destination on March 7 where we expect to see Double-crested Cormorants, Ringed-billed Gulls, Common Goldeneyes, Northern Pintails, and Belted Kingfishers. On March 21, the Birders will be visiting Woodbridge Ecological Preserve and Staten Island near Lodi. There we expect to see Sand Hill Cranes, Snow Geese, Western Meadowlarks, and Red-winged Blackbirds.

Every year the Birders go to Sierra View Country Club in Roseville but have to wait until the next calendar year to arrange a date for a field trip. This year's date will be March 25 which is a Monday when the facility is closed. We will have access to the golf course to search for birds as long as we do not interfere with the groundskeepers. It is a beautiful course with a wide variety of trees and home to many birds.







Have You Joined "Sun City Roseville Club Now"?

In February, Sun City Roseville (SCR) residents were notified via an Association email and with a posting to the Resident Website, www.scres.org, that the new associated website "Sun City Roseville Club Now" had become available. This website is our destination to book tee times, to register for activities and events, and to make dining reservations. A button to access this new site was added to the bottom of Resident Website's home page. It can also be reached from https://scrmember.scres.org.

Should a resident have a problem accessing the "Club Now" website, they should email Nona Weintz, at nonaw@scrca. org, from their correct email address, asking for an update.

Do You Receive the Association's Email? In today's world of Internet technology, the Resident Website, www.scres.org, is the main method to provide current information to our residents. The Resident Website's Home Page is like the front page of a newspaper, continually updated with the latest information. It is a "living" website.

Another method is via an "eBlast," which is an Association email sent to all residents. Some residents have indicated they do not receive these eBlast emails. There could be several reasons for this.

1. The resident has not completed

the "Electronic Mail Consent Form" and submitted it to the Administration Office for their email address to be added to the Resident website's database. The form can be accessed from the link below the "Announcements" area.

2. On the resident's internet device, the email application may be out of storage space, because the "In Box", "Trash", or "Sent" files have reached capacity and need to be emptied. Lack of capacity will block new emails from being downloaded.

Like any filing system, there comes a time when it is necessary to eliminate files that are no longer needed, and to confirm that the Trash file is emptied either manually or at a pre-set time.

3. The resident has not supplied a valid email address for the Association's database. To correct this, send an email from the correct address to the Association requesting that your email address be verified. (See "Need Assistance?" information below).

March On SCR

The definition of the term "march on" is to move forward or progress. As this is the month of "March", it is particularly significant for SCR. Our community has certainly moved forward as it takes action to remain attractive to new home buyers and satisfy the needs of current residents. 

like Cary Grant who helped her with trays in the galley one night, and author Rod Serling with whom she played gin. One embarrassing incident happened when Jean was making sure that non-English speaking passengers had someone nearby to translate instructions in English for them in case of an emergency. When she overheard a passenger speaking Italian, she asked the woman sitting next to her if she spoke Italian. "Yes, I speak Italian,"

answered the actress, Gina Lollobrigida, who icily informed her that Jean had previously overheard Gina's maid speaking.

In May of 1959, on a flight to New York, she struck up a conversation with a handsome young Englishman who asked if she had any plans when they would land in NYC. She told him she would like to see Flower Drum Song but understood that the tickets were hard to come by. He promised to get her a ticket because he knew a few people in the business. She asked what he did, and he replied, "Well, I'm a bit of an actor." "Oh, what's your name?" asked Jean. "Richard Burton." He and Jean spent the rest of the flight reciting poetry to each other. "You haven't lived until you've spent a night on a 707 at 31,000 feet with Richard Burton quoting love poetry to you,"

Two weeks later, Jean was Richard Burton's guest to see Camelot on Broadway. She was thrilled to meet his co-star, Julie Andrews, backstage after the show. Throughout her career, Jean met many other celebrities including Marlon Brando, Paul Newman, Red Skelton, Danny Kaye, and the singer Fabian. And she took in many plays such as Gypsy, Sweet Bird of youth, and Singing in the

Rain. One highlight was seeing Carol Burnett in Once Upon a Mattress at an off-Broadway show that catapulted Carol into stardom.

Throughout her airline career, Jean received many accolades and gifts,

such as Broadway theater tickets, f r o m passengers impressed h e r b v outstanding service.

"Every flight was an adventure," she says.

Jean met her husband, Bob Saunders, when she took flying lessons at the Marin Airport and married him in 1962. "I didn't get my pilot's license," she says, "but I got him." The couple had two sons, Tim and Brad.

After he was furloughed from Flying Tiger Airlines, Bob signed on with Japan Airlines and the family moved to Japan. "For me, moving to Japan was a wonderful experience—highlighted by the World's Fair in Osaka," Jean remembers. "We lived in Hayama, near the emperor's summer palace. You could see Mt. Fuji on a clear day. Luckily, American boys throwing rocks in our neighbor's koi pond did not cause an international incident."

After leaving the airline industry behind, Jean immersed herself in the travel business. In 1960, she took in the highlights of Europe: The Trevi fountain, Buckingham Palace, the English Channel, and an art museum where she fell in love with Monet's "Water Lilies." Jean, Bob, and their sons vacationed in Tahiti and when Bob was away flying, her sons accompanied her Jean Saunders with her two sons Bradland Tim, 1979.





#### **Manufacturing Innovation is Driving Economic Growth**

From electric vehicle technology to medical devices, manufacturing plays an important role in the health of Roseville's economy.

Over the last year, Roseville's manufacturing industry grew by 17.9% to approximately 2,900 jobs.

Because the manufacturing industry has the highest multiplier effect of any economic sector, it's beneficial for driving economic growth. That means for every \$1 spent on manufacturing, another \$2.69 is added to the economy (National Association of Manufacturers).

Powering the future of mobility

Bosch is a recent example of Roseville's expanding manufacturing sector. The company's move toward investing \$1.5 billion in the former TSI Semiconductor site is anticipated to spur growth in related businesses and suppliers.

Locally manufactured silicon carbide chips are critical for the expanding electric vehicle market, providing significant improvements in efficiency, range, and battery size. The worldwide market for silicon carbide devices is estimated to climb from \$2 billion to \$14 billion in value by 2030.

Roseville is Bosch's first chip manufacturing location outside of Germany, joining plants in Dresden and Reutlingen. The first chips are estimated to be ready by 2026.

Following the most significant



semiconductor deal in 30 years, manufacturing and technology investments from additional companies will further elevate Roseville as one of the best places to do business in California.

## Anticipating the Future: Get Insight into City Planning and Development

For more than 35 years, the City of Roseville has strategically planned for long-term growth, using a master-planning process called a Specific Plan.

A Specific Plan looks at a multi-acre, undeveloped geographic area and creates a blueprint for

all the roads, parks, schools, residential neighborhoods, and commercial centers. This comprehensive plan is designed in collaboration with the public over several years. The community's needs are carefully considered to strike the right balance of land uses and establish a long-term vision for the next decades of development.

Specific Plans also determine funding for the construction of new infrastructure and set what are called impact fees. These fees are paid by private land developers to account for the impact of their development on the city. Before construction can begin on roadway widening, building a new park, or other public facilities, sufficient funds must be collected through these fees. This ensures that development pays its own way and has a positive fiscal impact on the City.

Our long-range planning also addresses utilities, public safety, and other municipal needs to ensure they're available as we grow.

#### **Observations on San Francisco in the Rare Old Times**

Having a son in Ireland, I've become interested in Irish pub songs and one I like is called "Dublin in the Rare Old Times." And being an old codger who likes to recall when he was younger, I've been thinking back to my days in San Francisco and, considering what that city has become according to the latest reports, I would call them San Francisco in the rare old times.

I was still in my twenties when I came out to San Francisco from New York, so this was way back in the 1950s. The Korean War was going on in those days, so after graduating college I spent two years in the Army and then almost two years in New York before heading West. What made me leave New York for San Francisco? For one thing, New York was expensive, too expensive for me to have a place of my own, so I lived with my parents in the Bronx. I took the subway to my job in Manhattan, not the most pleasant type of commute. The city seemed crowded, noisy and, as I've said, expensive. I was ready to leave.

Why San Francisco? One thing was that while in the Army, in Stuttgart, Germany, I'd met Ron F---, who was a Cal Berkeley graduate and who thought San Francisco was the finest place in the world. Come on out, he kept urging me and although my parents didn't approve, and some friends thought I was crazy, I did.

Ron and three other Cal grads were renting a house on San Francisco's Telegraph Hill, so during my first few weeks there I stayed with them, sleeping on a sofa bed. Then I got a job and found an apartment I could afford, \$60 a month. That seems unbelievable now, but this was San Francisco in the rare old times. I moved in and, for the first time in my life, had my own place. A landmark day. I thought I might need a car for my job (it turned out that I didn't) so I took three lessons at a driving school and then got my driver's license at the DMV. I think the driving school had a deal with the DMV to give their graduates a license, no matter what. I then bought a second-hand Chevy and proceeded to learn how to drive.

My \$60 a month apartment was within walking distance (I was young then) of downtown, so I was able to walk to my office, a big improvement overriding the subway. On Fridays after work, I would meet Ron and other friends at a bar called The Office. If someone's wife called, he could say he was at the office. Almost always, someone knew of a party that was going on, either that or the next night and usually on both nights.

On the day after the party, the "gang" would usually meet at the Buena Vista near Fisherman's Wharf and have Irish coffees. The Buena Vista claimed Irish coffee was invented there; the Irish didn't agree. Then

we'd do something for the day. Often, we'd go over the Golden Gate Bridge to Marin and have lunch at Sam's in Tiburon. If it was foggy in San Francisco, it would be sunny in Marin, and we'd have Samburgers for lunch while sitting outside and enjoying the view of San Francisco across the Bay.

San Francisco, then, was a small city. You learned what was going on there by reading Herb Caen's column in the daily Chronicle. You felt you could meet someone mentioned in Herb Caen's column if you stopped into a bar, like, say, the Buena Vista. You felt you a part of the city's activity.

Not only were apartments cheap at that time, but so were restaurants and besides being inexpensive, the food was good. North Beach was filled with cheap and good Italian restaurants. My Chinese laundryman told me of a Chinese restaurant where I could get a five or six-course dinner for a couple of dollars. There was Tommy's Joynt, famous for its beers from all over the world, where you could get a great roast beef meal.

There was always something you could do or some place you could go to in San Francisco. You could go to Golden Gate Park, visit the aquarium or the DeYoung Museum. You could drive out to the ocean and maybe have a clam chowder at the Cliff House. You could even go to Fisherman's Wharf and mingle with the tourists and have

a meal at one of the many good seafood restaurants there.

Yes, it was a good time and a good place to be young in San Francisco in those days, the rare old times. And the best thing that happened to me there was meeting Beverly. On our first date, I took her to Tommy's Joynt, and we sat with a group of Irish guys who treated us as if we were an old married couple and bought us Irish coffees. Maybe they knew something.

I haven't been to San Francisco for a long time and maybe that's just as well. I can look back and remember the way it was in the rare old times.
