



My research has found that there is a Country Two Step, a Mexican Two Step, a Texas Two Step and Hip Hop refers to a two step. In the ballroom we dance the Nightclub



Two Step. One difference is the Nightclub Two Step is danced in the center of the floor while the other "two step" dances circle the perimeter of the floor.

The origin of many of the "two step" dances are varied. Some say the "two step" evolved from the foxtrot. Another source claims the "two step" developed because a cowpoke got tired of dancing the "one step" on the right foot and added the second step.

The NightclubTwo Step gives credit to a teenager named Buddy Schwimmer who invented the dance in the mid-1960's. He developed the dance while practicing with his sister as he reached for a way to popularize slow ballad music. He noticed that during their high school parties, most of his friends stood still and shuffled in place when slow, romantic songs played. He felt there was a need for a more interesting alternative to dancing to slow music



### **Bird Group**

"Life finds a way." Dr. Ian Malcom, Jurassic Park.

The fictional Malcolm's observation accurately describes organisms that thrive in the Mono Lake Tufa State Reserve where 28 members of the bird group gathered for a rare overnight excursion.

The habitat at the lake is harsh. The water is three times as salty as the ocean thus lethal to fish but is perfect for brine shrimp and alkaline flies. These food sources account for the many migratory birds that stop over to feed.

A unique lake feature are the tufas, normally large underwater formations that are now up to 20 feet above water level due to the diversion of water to Los Angeles. These formations are excellent habitat for cavity nesters such as Violet-Green Swallows and



Great Horned Owls that use the numerous nooks and crannies to create nests. Ospreys make their large nests on top of the tufas so their young will be protected from predators even though they then have to fly dozens of miles per day to fish-filled lakes to acquire food.

We are very fortunate to have much more welcoming habitats in Sun City Lincoln Hills where we can enjoy birds and wildlife.






### **Ladies Golf - 18 Holers**





## Second Public Meeting on Missile Site Cleanup Project Set for July 18

The Restoration Advisory Board (RAB), formed to help shepherd the cleanup of a former Cold War-era missile facility, will hold its second public meeting on July 18 to update the community on testing to determine the extent of the contamination on the 42-acre site

Court and Snapdragon Lane to check whether the cloud-like plume of TCE-contaminated groundwater was moving any closer to homes.

Samples have been taken from both the new and existing testing wells, the results of which should be available by late summer or



located off Oak Tree Lane in Lincoln.

The meeting is set for 4 to 6 p.m. in Presentation Hall, located inside Kilaga Springs Lodge at 1167 Sun City Blvd. It will bring together the full advisory board for the second of its promised quarterly public sessions.

The RAB, which was formed in March, includes 11 residents, along with representatives from the state water board and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The Army Corps is tasked with overseeing the testing and clean-up of the facility, which has been contaminated with trichloroethylene (TCE), a chemical that was widely used as a lubricant and degreaser before it was identified as a carcinogen.

The missile facility was completed in 1962 and consisted of three, 160-foot-deep silos to house the Titan 1 nuclear missiles. Its usefulness was short-lived; the missiles were deactivated after only three years and the site was later dismantled. However, in 1991, TCE contamination was detected in groundwater samples and that began a long journey toward gauging the severity of the contamination and developing a restoration plan.

Last month, the Army Corps announced that five additional monitoring wells were installed near the Sun City Lincoln Hills property line along the eastern sides of Prunella

early fall, and monitoring will continue every six months. Officials hope to have a final report on the contamination, along with a proposed plan of action, next year.

The Army Corps has stressed that the city's water supply source is far from this site and "there is no imminent risk to residents in nearby communities." Groundwater at the project location, it said, is not used as household and drinking water source.

The RAB's community members, which includes retirees with backgrounds ranging from engineering and geology to architecture and communications, have been busy speaking to local groups and individuals to address their questions and concerns, as well as reviewing various documents about the site and researching similar cases across the country.

Ranny Eckstrom, the advisory board's community co-chair, said she is hoping for a good turnout by the public at the July 18 meeting. "It's a good chance to get to know the community members and government officials working on this project and learn what's being done to ensure the public's safety.




