
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And Much More

She's been a secretary, a realtor, a nurse, a cocktail waitress, a photography model, an internationally recognized ballroom dancer, and an admired Red Cross volunteer. She's hitchhiked all over Europe and has lived in England, Canada, Saudi Arabia and the United States. And now, Jill Aggersbury is a successful retiree living in Sun City Roseville since 2021.

Jill was born in 1943 in war-torn London where air raid shelters were prevalent and multiple buildings were in ruins. Both of her parents were on active duty, and Jill recalls she didn't meet her father until she was five years old when the war was over, and he came home. He was a mechanical engineer while her mother, a housewife, looked over her and her three siblings, one sister and two brothers.

After completing secondary school, Jill worked as a secretary in London's West End. To overcome her shyness, she had taken ballroom dance lessons in her early teens and entered dance competitions, becoming a silver medalist

in International Ballroom Dancing. Also, to give herself another boost of confidence, she decided to become a photography model. But her abiding interest was always in nursing. After three years of study, Jill graduated from St. Mary's Hospital in 1966 and entered the nursing profession.

That goal having been met; Jill decided she wanted to go the U.S. by way of Canada.

This was when she became a cocktail waitress in the club room at the Calgary Stampede and Husky Tower. She also worked in Banff where there were lots of Brits and Aussies skiing. Eventually, she drove to San Francisco and landed a nursing job, working for a doctor in Union Square. She saved up \$1500 to buy a house, but when she was short of money for the down payment, the real estate lady she was working with loaned her the rest so she could put 20% down on her house.

This first house was pretty much a real "fixer-upper," so Jill decided to write to the editor of Sunset Magazine for pointers on how to redo her bathroom. As luck would have it, the editor actually showed up one day at her door with his photographer and did a story on her remodeling project. The article, which appeared in the November 1973 issue, started with the headlines "New Bathroom-She rebuilt it herself."

In 1975, Jill, who has been a jazz enthusiast since her London days, decided to organize a "Jazzboat." She had been a member of the New Orleans Jazz Club of Northern California (cont' on page 21)

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A Different Kind Of Doctor

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All Tuned Up

July brings themes of the USA and patriotism. At ATU, one of the selections in our song book is a medley of Yankee Doodle Dandy, You're a Grand Old Flag, and God Bless America. So, I decided to consult Professor Google about the origins of these songs.

The story goes than the term Yankee Doodle was created by a British doctor in 1755, as a way of insulting the colonists as crude and cowardly. Legend has it that during the Revolutionary War, the colonial militiamen sang Yankee Doodle to retreating British armies to throw the insult back at the British, and soon Yankee Doodle became the anthem for the Continental Army. The song Yankee Doodle Dandy was written by George M. Cohan in 1904. The most famous rendition of the song is from the 1942 movie "Yankee Doodle Dandy" sung by James Cagney.

You're a Grand Old Flag is another George M. Cohan song from his 1906 musical "George Washington, Jr.", and also made famous by James Cagney starring as George M. Cohan. (Prior to the 1942 movie, Cagney was mainly known for playing tough guys and gangsters. He broke out of the typecasting singing and dancing as Cohan, for which he won the Oscar for Best Actor.).

God Bless America was written by Irving Berlin in 1918. In the run up to World War II. with the rise of fascism, he revised the lyrics to the song we know today. It was introduced on Armistice Day in 1938 by Kate Smith on her radio show. Berlin also provided an introduction to the song in the nature of a hymn, which Smith always used, but is rarely heard today.

Fine Arts Club



Your Neighborhood Watch office sends informational emails to these communicators approximately every 6-8 weeks in an effort to maintain a communication link among neighbors.

This can be as easy as having your neighbors over for a donut and morning coffee. Others join with another team to have a potluck at Sierra Pines where the room is free. Give it a try.

• Unusual noises that cannot be explained,

• Someone loitering in a neighborhood on foot or in a vehicle when there is no apparent purpose or destination.


Become an active member in your neighborhood when asked. If there isn't a Team Link in your area, the communication link is broken. Will you get involved as a Team Link when asked?



The Ash-throated Flycatcher is a somewhat secretive bird normally perching

on twigs within the middle to upper branches of trees, rarely seen in the open. It has a pale grayish throat and breast, a grayish-brown bushy crest, and pale-yellow underparts. In flight, it shows a bright cinnamon tail and wingtips. These flycatchers catch insects in flight and also on the ground. It is found in the foothills' chaparral and oak woodlands of California's Central Valley and often nests in tree cavities

Pickleball Club



and thought it'd be a great idea to have a jazz band circle the San Francisco Bay, playing jazz on a boat for two hours. This event, of course, was a hit.



Jill continued dabbling in real estate and worked at the U.C. dialysis unit, until, in 1978, the Mayor and Harvey Milk were killed and there was a mass suicide of the congregation of Peoples Temple in San Francisco. Jill recalls, "It was a miserable place to be in." So, she sold her house, moved to Orange County and decided to go into real estate investing. She completed her certification as a certified financial planner at USC, got her stockbroker license, and worked with real estate investors until her ever-present wanderlust urged her to quit that job and travel throughout the South for a year.

The next few years had her traveling back to England for a few months, then to Canada for a while, then back to California. In October of 1982, there was a disastrous fire in Anaheim which displaced 2,000 people. Over 1,000 had lost their homes to the fire. At the time, Jill was the volunteer supervisor with Red Cross' Emergency Services for Orange County and was very involved in getting food, supplies, and support for the fire victims. Because of her intervention. Jill received several letters of



commendation. One letter from the mayor of Anaheim, Ben Bay, stated, "We will treasure for years the very valiant and selfless role you played in assisting us in this disaster." Another letter from the American Red Cross said, "Please accept our since thanks on behalf of the Disaster Services Committee for the outstanding support given."

The following year found Jill back in healthcare, this time in Colorado Springs, which didn't last long before her travel urge kicked in and she ended up in Saudi Arabia. She had two contracts to work as a hospital nurse, one in Riyadh, the capital of Saudi Arabia, and the other in Al Khobar which was on the Arabian gulf. "It's beautiful there," she recalls. She was able to learn Arabic very quickly, not enough to hold a long conversation, but just enough to speak to her patients.

When her contracts were up, she returned to England, working at a London hospital on Harley Street where all the exclusive clinics are. One year later, she returned back to San Francisco where she worked at the California Pacific Medical Center. This turned into a permanent job. She bought a house in Novato and worked to remodel it, a project which took five years.

For many years, Jill has been interested in dancing. She's performed in Argentine Tango shows in the bay area and traveled three times

to Buenos Aires to tango. She even danced in the San Francisco's Waltzing Society event.

In 2020, as a longtime member of the Marin Medical Reserve Corps, Jill learned that the public health department needed help to set up clinics and organize contact tracing to help stop the spread of COVID. She and her 70-person team were featured in a September issue of the Pacific Sun which highlighted the work they did to help stop the spread of the virus. The article cited a "dramatic reduction of new virus cases in Marin from July, our worst month of the pandemic, to August, where we saw a flattening of the curve."

After retiring and doing extensive research into senior living communities, Jill moved to Sun City in 2021. In the past three years, she's been a member of the Bocce club, Needle Arts, Newcomers, Solo Friends, the Governmental Affairs Committee, Water Aerobics, Healthcare Professionals and the Second Act Studio Drama Club. Why Sun City? "It has everything I need, and I enjoy it," she says.

Earlier this year, Jill traveled with a Sun City friend to England where she showed him many of her favorite places, like the Lake district, London and Wales. They visited her brother in Manchester and went on the "chunnel" to France to check out the Eiffel Tower. Although she has been to most of the States, her future travels plans will be to revisit many of the beautiful areas in the United States, and particularly back East.

Looking back over her life with its diverse paths and choices, Jill considers herself to be very lucky. She's always believed that we should never go into retirement regretting things that we didn't get to do. "Don't wait until you're sixty-five to do what you want to do," she says. This philosophy echoes that of Sarah Ban Breathnach who once wrote, "Regret is the only wound the soul does not recover from."





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
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City of Roseville Releases Proposed FY2024-25 budget

The City of Roseville is pleased to present the Fiscal Year 2024-25 proposed budget for public review. This expenditure budget totals \$768 million, with \$229 million allocated to the General Fund operating budget and \$539 million primarily dedicated to utilities such as electric, water, wastewater, and waste services. Revenues citywide total \$799 million.

The General Fund budget encompasses essential services including Police, Fire, Parks, Recreation & Libraries, and other City government functions. The FY2024-25



General Fund operating budget includes \$229 million in revenues and expenditures.

Budget priorities

The FY2024-25 budget accounts for rising labor costs and other unavoidable expenses. It prioritizes maintaining current service levels, addressing City Council priorities, and ensuring adherence to state and federal regulations. The budget includes funding for:

• Strengthening Public Safety: Bolstering the Police Social Services Unit and Threat Assessment Unit.

• Sustaining Fire Department Operations: Conducting a fire academy to maintain staffing levels.

· Enhancing Park Maintenance: Insourcing park maintenance services for improved upkeep at reduced costs.

• Ensuring Environmental Compliance: Increasing Environmental Utilities staffing for state regulations.

• Improving Traffic Management: Boosting Traffic Operations Center staffing for better monitoring.

• Investing in Infrastructure: Funding capital projects including electric substations, parking improvements, park amenities, streetscape improvements, and roadway resurfacing.

· Addressing Financial Liabilities: Paying

down unfunded liabilities for fiscal health.


· Securing Financial Reserves: Fully funding General Fund reserves for stability.
