
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Players—*Guys* & *Dolls* Coming Soon!





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

Former Missile Site

The results of these first tests were announced July 18 at the quarterly public meeting of the Restoration Advisory Board (RAB), a consortium of federal and state officials, along with community members appointed in March by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Working together, they hope to decide on a plan for cleaning up the former Titan 1-A missile facility that housed three missiles in underground silos for three years in the 1960s.

"If the next rounds of tests show the same results, it should reassure homeowners' concerns," said Ranny Eckstrom, a retired engineer and community co-chair of the RAB. "I welcome the good news, which replaces speculation with facts."

TCE was used as a degreaser and cleaning solvent at the former missile facility. It also was a popular additive to foods and even used as an anesthesia until it was banned for food and medical uses in the 1970s. TCE was first detected on the property in 1991 and remediation work removed some of the contaminated soil until the work was stalled for 10 years over who was responsible for the contamination. The goal now is to gather updated and accurate information about the extent and the location of the TCEcontaminated groundwater before agreeing on a restoration plan. Butthenews about the TCE findings was overshadowed by another announcement: low levels of

benzene, another cancer-causing substance, was detected by two soil vapor probes near SCLH and and three others probes near the the parking lot at nearby St. Joseph Catholic Church. It is not known where the benzene came from, though it is found in a variety of products, from gasoline and glues to cleaning products and paint thinners.

Several residents were obviously upset by this discovery, though more than one official from the state water board explained that it was too soon to be alarmed because the levels are low and benzene rarely travels to the surface and quickly dissipates when it does.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is tasked with the responsibility for the clean-up of this site, as well as the other former Cold War-era missile sites across the country that left behind chemicals and other pollutants that we now know are health hazards.

The next quarterly public meeting is tentatively scheduled for Oct. 24. Details will be announced closer to the date.

Basically, he takes ordinary photographs and transforms them into something quite spectacular. 





the entertainment. We had a hula dancer, Jaye Tinloy, perform to music.





Amateur Radio Group BY DAN LEHRER, KN6DRN

Several members drove to Roseville to view the world's largest steam engine known as "Big Boy." Big Boy weighs 1.5 million pounds and 24 wheels! John, NQ6Q brought his VHF/ UHF portable antenna which impressed all with its small size yet great performance. Dan, KN6DRN shared propagation information. Research shows that the "summer doldrums" degrade HF signals as the ionosphere is heated and expands, making it less reflective. In addition, during the summer the ionosphere is less dense as it expands. This reduced density



also weakens its ability to reflect radio waves. However, of late, the SFI index has been very high. This measures the amount of charged particles in the ionosphere. More charged particles creates an environment of farther radio wave coverage and QSO's reaching greater distances.

Meetings are held at the South Tower every Monday night at 6:30 PM. Our club conducts a weekly radio network at 7:00 PM every Monday on the W6LHR Repeater at 147.030 MHz, 167.9 PL. Swimmer Hugh Wilder, recalls his training days and says, "In my prime in college I trained six days a week, often twice a day. As a masters swimmer (age 40-74) I trained once a day, five-six days per week."

As we watched the outstanding feats of our swimmers during the Olympics, the question has been posed – how do Olympic swimmers train?

According to multiple sources, Olympic swimmers train more than other athletes, with multiple swim sessions per day, six days a week. They are usually in the pool five-six hours per day, and they also do dry land training.

Swimmer Michael Phelps, the most decorated Olympian in history with 23 gold medals, swam at least 8 miles a day, six or seven days a week. He swam about 50 miles a week!

Kathleen Ledecky, the most decorated Olympic female swimmer in history, told Eating Well, that she trains 26-30 hours a week, about 20 hours in the pool and the other 5 to 10 hours in the gym.

We applaud these outstanding swimmers and think that we emulate them in our own life. Keep up that swimming and water walking, everybody. We have a healthy water activity that continues, after the glory is gone, and we can swim and water walk within our own goals. This is a salute to all who use our Lincoln Hills pools. Suspensions and Discrimination

Recently, the President of the Board at SCLH highlighted the importance of sharing our limited facilities in the July Compass magazine. However, the current rules regarding the lap lanes at our pools contradict this principle. For instance, at the Kilaga pool, there are two non-reservable lanes but they are off-limits to swimmers when a water walker arrives. This situation raises the question: where is the sharing? Families pay almost \$2000 a year to access our amenities. One group of residents should not receive preferential treatment.

Prior to Covid, shared drop-in lanes existed for over 20 years but now swimmers face arbitrary and discriminatory rules. However it doesn't stop there. If a resident reserves a lane and forgets to cancel three times, they can be suspended from making future reservations for months at a time. Meanwhile, some residents reserve a lane, check-in, but never show up, facing no consequences. This discrepancy highlights another example of discrimination.

Our pool is the only amenity where residents are tracked every time they make a reservation. This tracking system can lead to suspensions. Targeting one group of residents for special treatment is a form of discrimination. At our attorney's request, we surveyed nearby HOAs to see if any have a punitive reservation system like ours. Thus far, we have found none.

Despite the flaws in the reservation system, we proposed a combination of reservations and drop-in lanes. This model has been successfully used in pickleball, which has both online reservations and drop-in courts every day of the week.

Despite our appeals, the Board has ignored the many residents who voted for drop-in lanes. Almost 40%... 212 out of 560 respondents voted yes to drop-in lanes. And there would have been more yes votes if the survey questions had not been manipulated.

Additionally, we are dismayed by the administration's insensitivity toward residents who are less fortunate than most. I am referring to residents with serious health issues who need

the flexibility of a drop-in lane when they feel well enough to swim. This flexibility is also important to residents who care for family members who are very ill or elderly. For them it makes no sense to make advanced reservations. These caregivers need the flexibility to drop-in whenever their schedules allow.

Madam President we agree with your conclusion that: "it's critical that we SHARE". Now it's easy to talk-the-talk but we need

a Board that can walk-the-walk. We again appeal to the Board to

we again appear to the Board to implement a fairer system that truly promotes sharing. We need a system that will insure fair and equitable access to our pools for ALL residents.




Figure 1: Notice the very small blood vessels surrounding each nerve.




Figure 2: When blood vessels become diseased, they shrivel and are no longer able to provide nourishment to the surrounding nerves.
