


The Songs of Guys & Dolls

For 75 years since the 1950 Broadway debut of Guys & Dolls, it has evoked marquee memories in dozens of productions from New York to London, Chicago, Melbourne, Tokyo...and now Lincoln Hills! Why such popularity? Much of the credit goes to incomparable songwriter-composer Frank Loesser, whose songs and music push the fast-paced, heartwarming story along. Let's look at a few examples.

"Luck Be a Lady" embodies the energetic theme of the musical, with lyrics told through the eyes of a gambler - Sky Masterson (Wayne Sutton) - who yearns to win a bet, and if he's lucky, he'll win the "doll" of his dreams, Miss Sarah Brown (Karen Hardage). For years after its Broadway opening, singers like Frank Sinatra and Jack Jones and others recorded the song, garnering top ratings on the Billboard charts. Why? switches, and outlets), replace furnace filters, lubricate garage doors, unjam garbage disposals, hang a few pictures or mirrors (under 20 pounds), Home Entertainment Systems (diagnose, adjust, and connect), replace light bulbs, turn or rotate mattresses, move furniture or boxes (less than 35 pounds), replace water filter in refrigerator, smoke alarms (install new alarms or replace batteries), replace and/or program sprinkler controllers, and program

entire drip system, enter attics, clean rain gutters, climb on roofs, work on eaves, repair computers, drill holes in exterior walls, health care related tasks, install graph bars, install worther


Painters' Club



But the other side maintained they had simply grown too large for house parties, and it was time they got to benefit from the clubhouses' rooms for social gatherings and for conducting business. And, some said, maybe it's time to stand up and be counted.

In September 2009, the application was filed with the HOA. Some left the group. Those who stayed had begun a sixth-month process to becoming the Lavender Friends Club. The HOA's board of directors gave their stamp of approval in March 2010.

Today's members heard this and more about our history at our Founders Tribute Dinner, held September 28th at Kilaga Springs Lodge. Sixteen founders are still club members, and theywere honored at this dinner with applause, awards of gratitude and much admiration from those of us who came after them. Fourteen were at the gathering; two are RVing across the country.

At one point during the evening, president Sandi Dolbee spoke of one of the missions the original members put into writing in the bylaws as they formed Lavender Friends: to create a legacy for future LGBTQ residents moving into Lincoln Hills. Sandi asked the men and women who were there to turn around and survey the nearly full room. "Mission accomplished," she reported.

This wonderful evening will soon join the ranks of another one that's coming up: the annual holiday dinner-dance at Turkey Creek next month. And guess what? It was a founder who originally set up that venue for us many years ago — and a trio of founders continue to organize it for us today. Just another example of legacy in action.







Bird Group by Sherry Singer

In 1890, 100 European Starlings were release into New York's Central Park by a man who wanted to introduce into the city every bird mentioned in Shakespeare's plays. Every one of the over 200 million Starlings alive today are descendants of those first 100 birds! They are thriving everywhere in the United States as well as parts of Canada and Mexico by outcompeting other birds for food and nesting sites. This is a classic example of the life history of invasive species: non-native species whose introduction is likely to cause harm to the environment. On the Bird Group's October 11th bird walk at Dry Creek Community Park in Roseville, we observed over 200 birds, at least 30 of which were descendants of those initial 100 European Starlings released in Central Park.

At our October 14 meeting, Chris Conard, Natural Resource Specialist at the Buffferlands

in Sacramento County, reviewer for eBird and past president of the Central Valley Bird Club showed us spectacular pictures of birds including birds of paradise, kingfishers and crowned pigeons from his 2022 trip to Papua New Guinea.





water walking was about the only way to get in cardio exercise. It also helped me strengthen my leg muscles and improved my balance."

Make a difference this tax season? Volunteer with AARP Foundation Tax-Aide in Lincoln!

Are you looking for a rewarding opportunity to make a difference in your community? Each year, April 15 is widely met with feelings of pressure and anxiety. Some people sweat, many procrastinate - and a few simply deny it. Almost four out of five people who turn to AARP Foundation Tax-Aide are 60 or older, and household incomes aren't high. For many of them, a tax refund could mean they won't have to choose between paying for groceries and keeping the lights on. For the past 22 years, volunteers have been participating in the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program in Lincoln. We need additional volunteers to join us to help taxpayers complete their 2024 federal and California income tax returns in Lincoln during the 2025 tax-filing season.

Becoming a volunteer is easier than you think! Volunteers are needed as schedulers to make appointments for our clients. All volunteers must pass a ten-question ethics test. Schedulers return the client's phone call to set up an appointment time, explain what information to bring to their appointment, and log the appointments into a Google Calendar; schedulers must be computer literate. Training is provided.

Greeters welcome clients, review and assemble their tax records, make sure they have brought the necessary information so our tax preparers can complete their returns efficiently, and they manage the flow of clients being served. No computer experience is required to be a greeter! Training is provided and all volunteers must pass two ten-question tests.

Volunteers are especially needed as preparers to help the client prepare and e-file their returns. Even if you don't have accounting or tax preparation experience, becoming a tax preparer may be right for you if you have a knack for working with numbers. An introductory session is held in December, and the free, comprehensive training and certification class for preparers will be held in January, 2025 in Roseville and Lincoln. Computer literacy is required to assist in providing our free e-file service.

All volunteers are asked to commit 4 hours in one day per week during the tax-filing season, February 10th through April 15th. Volunteers of all ages and backgrounds are welcome; you do not need to be an AARP member or retiree to volunteer.

Also, please indicate if you are interested in being a scheduler, a greeter, and/or counselor (preparer). We have a need for bilingual speakers. Dedicated translators who can assist our volunteers are also welcome.




