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
Anne Becker — On the Road Again

SCR resident Anne Becker's life seems to be reminiscent of Willie Nelson's song, "On the Road Again." She calculates that she's moved twenty-two times—living in six states and five countries.

Anne was born in Utah during WWII. Her father was in the Navy, so every time he was reassigned, her family moved. When the war ended, her father was hired by United Airlines, necessitating a move to Cheyenne, Wyoming, where Anne attended grade school through high school. "After those many years in Wyoming," she recalls, "there's definitely a lot of cowgirl in my soul."

Her parents separated and her mother decided it was time to fulfill her dream of living in Mexico and studying art. Anne, then a sophomore at Mills College in Oakland, having always had an interest in travel and languages, moved with her mother and two sisters and transferred to Mexico City College. Her mother bought a baby blue Impala convertible,



and the ladies were off on their adventure.

While in Mexico, Anne met and married her first husband—a gringo—and following their wedding, moved to Medellin, Colombia, where he had a short-term job assignment. There she had her first exposure to foreign language instruction, teaching English to adults.

"I found it was an absolute natural for me," she says.

When the couple returned to the United States, they settled in New York City where their son, Scott, was born. After five years, there was a job opportunity in California, so they headed West for San Mateo. A ten-year period of calm and normalcy ensued, during which their daughter, Kristin, was born. Then a job transfer took them back to the East coast where they lived in New Hope, Pennsylvania.

Their marriage fell apart and Anne moved back to California, got her real estate broker's license, and began a new life. One of the new activities she pursued was ballroom dancing and it was in a dance class that she met the man who'd become her second husband, Bill, a civil engineer. Six months after their wedding, Bill's company sent him on assignment to work on a copper mine in Kitwe, Zambia, in Africa.

Anne's first impression of Africa was from the window of a small single prop plane that took them from the international (cont' on page 23)

As we head into the holiday shopping time of the year, here are a few things to keep in mind to keep you and your loved ones safe.

Did you know that parking lots are where most mall-related crime occurs?

Drivers and walkers navigating the lot are vulnerable to theft, and unattended vehicles loaded with packages are often open invitations for break-ins. If you plan on going to the mail for some holiday shopping, here are a few tips to keep in mind:

- Stay Focused people walking through the parking lot are often distracted with their cellphone. Reduce your chance of becoming a victim: look to your front, side, and rear when walking to and from the store. Be aware of your surroundings.
- Assume You're Watched-criminals watch for shoppers who put purchases in their car or trunk, then walk back into the store. Once you're gone, it can only take moments to break in and grab items. If you need to stow packages while shopping-reparkyour car in a different location away from your original spot.

- Don't Dally Walk to your car like you have a purpose. Don't wander around even if you are not sure where you parked. Always have your keys in hand when leaving the store. Once in your car, lock the doors before starting your engine. Driving away as soon as possible to lessen your chance of being a target.
- Beware of Stranger Danger If you are approached or chased, yell or scream t o get attention or go back into the store and alert security. If you are followed while driving, go to an open gas station or a populated area with plenty of light. Get on the phone and call 911.



Creative Arts Club

A different technique for creating a pot — One of the Sunday classes presented by the Creative Arts Club (CAC) in September focused on a technique to create what is known as a Wad Pot. Rita Zanzinger learned this technique at Monterey Peninsula college, near where she lived prior to moving to Sun City, and wanted to share with members.

Using a bowl or other shaped container as a mold lined with a paper towel, makers press thumb-sized pieces of clay into the mold, joining the clay together by pressing each new piece close to an existing piece to create

a join. Gradually building up the pot with successive pieces of clay, the inside will show the placement of the small pieces of clay while the outside will have a nice textured appearance showing the lines and cracks where each piece of clay has been added.

Sometimes called, press molding, this technique is an alternative to lining a mold with a smooth slab of clay, where no joins are visible, and any texture is added after the piece has been created.

Pam Jacobson then gave a presentation on a variety of finishing methods, such as oxide washes and glazes particularly appropriate for the wad pots or other items with a lot of nooks and crannies where the glaze can seep in, helping emphasize the design.

Information: Before having work done to your home, check the contractor's license number online at www.cslb.ca.gov or call 800-321-2752. Get a written contract and never pay more than 10% down or \$1,000, whichever is less. Avoid paying in cash. Always get multiple

bids. Beginning in 2021, those 65 or older have a 5-business day right to cancel a home improvement contract; for all others, it is 3-business days. This information and more may be found on the State of CA, Contractors State License Board website, www.cslb.ca.gov

If you have enjoyed Osman's Thursday Murder Club series, you might want to try the first mystery in his new series, We Solve Murders. of electors as it has Congressmen, plus two Senators (535). The District of Columbia has three electors. Each Presidential candidate has their own slate, generally chosen by their political party. State laws vary on how the electors are selected. Most States have a "winner-take-all" system; this awards all electors to the candidate who wins the State's popular vote. However, Maine and Nebraska each have proportional representation. After the election, the State's Executive prepares a Certificate of Ascertainment showing the number of votes each candidate received. The electors, for the candidate receiving the most votes, meet and certify the election. This certification is then sent to Congress to be counted.

Why have an Electoral College, at all? A controversial subject, no doubt. The short answer is it's in the Constitution. The Northern industrial states had a larger voting population then the Southern Agricultural States, which had non-voting slaves. The Southern States feared their interests would be drowned out by the more populated areas. So, the founding fathers made this the compromise for the ratification of the Constitution.

We honored former President Jimmy Carter's 100th birthday in September. A personal birthday card signed by many members was mailed.

The Sacramento Valley is known as a fly-way and stop-over place for millions of birds moving to warmer climates or later returning to their former range or temporary breeding range. These visitors add to the wide variety of species that birdwatchers living in this area can see and enjoy.

SCR Birders' scheduled field trip in early October was to Ferrari Ranch Trail located east of Lincoln. Twenty-five species were seen including the Ring-necked Pheasant, White-crowned Sparrow, Green Heron, Common Gallinule, and Red-tailed Hawk. Field trips planned for November are to Traylor Ranch in Penryn on November 7 and Nimbus Fish Hatchery on November 21. A Common Gallinule (formerly known as a Common Moorhen) is a duck-like water bird that is usually found on shallow fresh water ponds with enough water for swimming. In general, the bird is dark grey-brown, with white stripes on the sides, gray underparts, and long yellow legs with large lobed toes. For most of the year, this bird is easy to identify by its bright red bill and forehead shield that turn brownish in winter. When swimming or walking around the marshes, it bobs its head back and forth with movement. It eats insects, snails, berries, worms, seeds, and tadpoles gleaned when swimming or walking.

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



airport in Lusaka, the capital of Zambia, to a local airport near the small town of Kitwe that was to be their home for the next year. "From the plane, Africa looked just like it does in movies and books, minus the animals," she says. "Any animals that had not been protected in the game parks had been consumed!"

Life in Zambia was very basic and simple. Their house was on the edge of town-a small brick structure with concrete

floors and walls and a metal corrugated roof. Because of the extreme poverty in the area, the national past-time was theft, so their house was surrounded by a tall chain link fence and they had 24-hour guard protection.

Putting food on the table was a real challenge. One scrawny chicken could make two small servings of curry. Milk was obtained from an open trough and scooped into a container Anne would have to boil the milk and let it cool to remove the scum. It was used for cooking and putting on cereal, but definitely not for drinking. She had to boil water to drink, then set it aside for the silt to settle to the bottom. During their first three months there was no flour in the country. so they had no bread products until a flour shipment arrived from Canada.

There were no paved roads, and it was rare to see a vehicle. "In our small town, folks walked everywhere including me!" Anne remembers. She volunteered to help two days a week at a $near by \, elementary \, school. \, She \, would \, distribute$ ballpoint pens and used computer paper from her husband's work to children she would meet on her walks. Soon word got out and each morning groups of young children would gather outside their gate, hoping to receive a

handout from her.


Anne and Bill had the use of a company car, so one weekend they drove to a game park for their first safari. As they traveled in the bed of an open pick-up truck, their first glimpse of an animal was the rump of a very large hippopotamus heading into the bush. Not long after that at an open-air market, Anne came upon a wood $carving\, of\, a\, hippo\, which$ she found absolutely endearing. "That was the beginning of my

precious collection of hippos," she says. "I have one from almost every country we've visited."

After that assignment, the couple took a few months off to travel extensively in South Africa, Kenya and Egypt before returning to Palo Alto, California. They had been home for about four years when Bill was assigned to an oil refinery in Caracas, Venezuela. Anne's primary focus became languages. During the morning, she attended schools to advance her Spanish studies, and in the afternoon, she taught English to executives at Petroleos de Venezuela, the national oil company.

Personal safety became their immediate concern. "Lawlessness was rampant, accompanied by an utterly apathetic police force," Anne recalls. Traffic lights were just a suggestion. Speeding motorcycles were everywhere. People took their life in their hands just trying to cross the street. Anne and Bill were in Caracas when Hugo Chavez attempted a coup to overthrow the government. Chaos ensued for a short time before he was arrested and sentenced to prison.

When it was time to retire, they moved to Granite Bay and spent the next 25 years traveling, grand-parenting, gardening, and pursuing their various personal interests.



Eventually, Anne began teaching Spanish at Sierra College, Lincoln Hills, and Lake Tahoe Community College. She also became a certified reading instructor to children with dyslexia.

Since they'd met at a dance class, ballroom dancing became a regular part of their lives again. In high school, Anne had been a member of the girls' rifle team, and Bill was a competitive shooter, so shooting was a shared interest as well

Their primary mutual passion, though, was traveling the globe. They visited 44 countries, spending at least two to three weeks in each. In China they spent the night in the home of a small-town villager. In Morocco, they slept in tents in the Sahara, climbed sand dunes at dawn, and had tea in a nomad's tent. They dined on tilapia on the Sea of Galilee and followed in the footsteps of Jesus along the Stations of the Cross in Jerusalem.

In February of 2020, Bill suffered a fatal cardiac arrest when they were staying in Todos Santos, Mexico. Anne's Spanish came to the rescue as she navigated the many government offices and Mexican bureaucracy to get them both back home.

Anne moved to SCR in 2020 and had to wait until the Covid shut-down ended to become active in the many groups and activities offered here. "Sun City is the ideal place for me to be," she says, "although building a new life from scratch is definitely a challenge." There's no doubt she'll be up for that challenge.

SUN CITY REAL ESTATE UPDATE

2023 was the lowest sales year volume wise since 2008 regionally. 2024 will have a slightly higher volume than 2023 but only by a few hundred homes. Inventory of homes for sale has been at a historic lows and falling in September. This low inventory is masking the fact that there are not a lot of buyers in the market in comparison to 2015-2022. What that means for

How did we come up with these dates? You might know that daylight is longest on the Summer Solstice (about June 20 each year) and shortest on the Winter Solstice {about December 21}. Also, day and night are equally long on the Autumn Equinox (about September 22} and the Spring Equinox (about March 20). To maximize our comfort (on average), we switch our time from 9:00 to 3:00 midway between the Autumn Equinox and the Winter Solstice, and we switch back to 9:00 midway between the Spring Equinox and the Summer Solstice. Whenever we play, you're welcome to join us.



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



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Observations Looks Back: NYC "Street Games"

In recent months, "Observations: has looked back at those radio programs we watched before television and then at the early television shows we watched. But, for kids in the 1930s and 40s (I know, that's way back when) radio and television were not the major things in life. For me, growing up in the Bronx, it was, after coming back from school, running down from our tenement apartment to the street to play. There was nothing organized about it but in the street, there was always the "gang," and somebody always had a ball and, although we may not have known it, there were always the New York City "street games" to play.

The best-known NYC street game is probably stickball, the street's answer to baseball. In that time there was no such thing as Little League with its uniforms, equipment and regular ball fields or, if there was, we kids weren't aware of it. Our bat was a broomstick. Our ball was a pink rubber ball made by the Spalding Company and known to everyone as a Spaldeen. Home plate was a sewer cover and possibly second base was, too. First and third bases were chalked on the street or, if they were parked in the proper places, parked cars. A good hitter was someone who could hit the ball three sewers. Oh, there was no pitcher. You threw up the Spaldeen and could hit it with or without a bounce.

I recently saw on television a clip of Willie Mays playing stickball with the kids in Harlem. He was at least a four-sewer hitter. I was pretty young in my stickball days, under ten, and couldn't hit the ball very long, so tried to pull the ball into a building cellar. That was a ground-rule double. The big stickball games were played on weekends by the teenagers and young guys and our street would play against another street for money. How much I don't know, but in those Depression days even a little money was a lot.

There wasn't much traffic on our street. but occasionally a car would come driving by and that interrupted the game. Also, stickball wasn't strictly legal and every now and then a cop car or policeman on foot would appear and someone would cry "Chigee, the cops" and someone would take the broomstick and run with it up onto a roof. If it was too late, the cop would put the broomstick into a sewer cover hole and break it off. That meant getting another broomstick. Stickball was only one of the street games we played. Some of the others were slug ball box ball, curves, off the wall, and stoop ball. All of course involved a ball, the good old Spaldeen. In off the wall you threw the ball at the molding of a building and if it came off so you could catch it that was an out. If it bounced once before you got it that was a single, twice a double, etc. I don't know if the people who lived in the front apartments above the molding appreciated us kids playing this game. Stoop ball was the same although. as the name indicates, you threw the ball at the building stoop. The danger in stoop ball

was that if you had to go out into the street to catch the ball you might get hit by a passing car, as did happen to me once. The car must not have been going very fast because I wasn't hurt. Just a little scared and surprised. As for the other ball games I'll leave it to the reader to look them up.

Then there were the seasonal games, marbles and scully. The distinctive thing about these was that there was a marbles season and a scully season. I don't know how it was determined but at a certain time in the year we all got out our marbles and that was the big game at that time. The same was true for scully. As I remember it, you drew a scully board on the sidewalk which had boxes at each corner and maybe some other places and there was a final box in the middle. The idea was to shoot a bottle cap around the numbered boxes and into the final box. But if you landed in the open space, you were in scully and that was bad, like being in jail in Monopoly.

I don't know how many, if any, of these New York City "street games" of the 1930s and 1940s are still around, probably none, but at the time they gave us Depression-era kids an opportunity to play and to socialize while using the things we had available and without having to leave our street. They also enabled us to be kept under the eyes of our mothers, those who lived in the front apartments. At a certain time, when it was getting dark, one of these mothers would call down to have her kid come up for supper and that was the signal for the day's play to end.

Truck is on the road and helping Sun City residents. Our Home Maintenance Service Program is staffed by 30 SCR Residents who volunteer their time and expertise. Through September we have completed 646 house calls which amounted to 834 individual actions. One of the most requested services is, replacing "chirping" smoke detectors. To date, we have replaced approximately 200 at \$30 each. When we perform this service, we replace all existing smoke detectors with new 10-year battery detectors. We replace 4 to 6 detectors per home. With the rising costs, we are averaging about \$120-\$180 per home. The truck is stocked with many bulbs and replacement parts for our other services,

thanks to your generous donations and your participation in the fundraising activities we $hold\,throughout\,the\,year.\,If you\,need\,to\,request$ service, complete the form near the monitor's desk, visit the website (www. scrfoundation. org), or call the helpline at 916-774-9040.

Safety First — Don't Take the Bait on Phishing Scams

Have you ever received a text or email warning you that something is wrong with one of your online accounts? Maybe it says your streaming account is about to be suspended unless you take action immediately. It might even include a link that claims to help fix your account's problems. The message seems urgent and real. But is it?

Your first instinct may be to click the link to resolve the issue quickly. Don't click. There's probably nothing wrong with your account. In fact, it's likely a phishing scam. Phishing occurs when scammers impersonate legitimate companies through emails or texts to trick you into giving up sensitive information.

Common Signs of Phishing Scams:

A phishing email or text might:

- Claim suspicious activity: It says there have been log-in attempts you didn't make but there haven't been.
- Report a problem with your account: It claims there's a problem with your account or payment information — but there isn't.
- · Ask for confirmation of sensitive information: It asks you to confirm personal or financial details — but you don't need to.

What Real Companies Won't Do

While legitimate companies may contact you via email or text message, they won't send links asking you to update payment information or account details through a link. Only scammers use these tactics. Even opening a suspicious link without entering any information can put you at risk, as scammers may install harmful malware on your device.

How to Stav Safe

- Don't click on links in unexpected emails or texts. If you're worried something might be wrong with your account, contact the company directly using a verified method, such as a link or phone number you know is legitimate.
- Report phishing: If you think you've accidentally shared sensitive information, take action quickly. You can:
- o Report the incident at IdentityTheft.gov and get a recovery plan.

o If you clicked on a suspicious link, update your security software and run a scan to look for viruses and malware.

Where to Report Phishing Scams

- Report the phishing attempt to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.
- Forward suspicious text messages to SPAM (7726).
- Forward suspicious emails to the Anti-Phishing Working Group at reportphishing@apwg.org.

By staying alert and knowing the warning signs, you can avoid phishing scams and protect your sensitive information from cybercriminals.
