If you've visited the Lincoln Museum, you may have seen a military coat liner with many colorful patches hand-stitched on it. Come hear Betty Brown's story. She was a Lincoln resident and former US Army nurse who served during WWII. Written by award-winning author and historian Anne Constantin Birge, Betty's Coat of Many Colors tells of the history of that coat, its patches, and Betty's life. Many of the US Army Veterans for whom Betty cared for gave her a patch from their division in gratitude of her nursing skills before they returned home. Players — From Audition to Performance



Perhaps you have attended a Lincoln Hills Players show and wondered how the actors memorize all those lines? Let's look at the process from audition to performance—from an actor's point of view.

Once a play and director are selected, the process begins with auditions. If you choose to audition, prepare by reading audition scenes and deciding which roles appeal to you. At auditions, you'll be able to read several times in a variety of different roles. Shortly thereafter, the cast is announced!

Then, actors receive scripts and a rehearsal schedule (usually - 10 weeks, three evenings/week). With scripts, they familiarize themselves with lines, their character, and get a sense of the whole play. At the first rehearsal, the cast meets for a "read-through."

During the weeks of rehearsals, the director works on "blocking" (where and how to move during each scene), character development, and a gradual familiarity with lines. Actors work at home memorizing lines and blocking, and about a month into rehearsals, you're ready to go "off book" (performing scenes without scripts, while a



prompter stands ready to assist). Sometimes the director meets with certain actors to finetune specific scenes. Musicals (with singing and choreography) are more challenging and time-consuming than plays).

Along the way, cast members are costumed, sets are built and the technical crews prepare props, sound and lighting cues. Amazingly, after repeating the scenes over and over and studying at home, the cast is nearly ready to perform.

The final week arrives! The "tech and dress" rehearsals now include costumes, sets, (cont' on page 5)

Winter's Wonderland — Well, it's that time of year again, a time to be informed about the winter needs for our homes and property. At this writing, the rains have started again and many of us have to be aware of the effect it has on our homes. Clogged gutters can lead to overflow which is bad for the foundation of our homes. It is necessary to make sure your gutters are cleaned from the abundant leaves now falling in. Make sure your downspouts are draining properly also. Not just flooding water, but wind can also cause damage, so have your roof tiles checked. Check the seals on your windows, as well as the drip or drain holes at the outside bottom. You can also check the seals on all your exterior doors, as they help keep your home dry and warm.

Filters not only keep your interior air clean, but also allow your heater to operate more efficiently which can save you money. In addition, the effective

operation of your thermostat provides warmth and can reduce heating costs. Some owners have had their air ducts "cleaned" but please use only a reputable well-known company. Our I&R service at NID can give you names of companies that other residents have recommended for all these previous services.

Next, replacing lights is an important issue, since it is darker sooner and longer. It is recommended to replace lights with longer life LED bulbs for safety and convenience.

Another area of concern is your sprinkler system. This is the ideal time to cut back on the programmed watering schedule. By reducing the hours and days you will save on water costs. Please be aware, shutting the system completely off for an extended time can affect the main sprinkler valves.


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Lavender Friends


Both Doug and Bob are U.S. Air Force retirees and have served in leadership positions

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

Prior to the turn of the 20th century, hunters engaged in a holiday tradition known as the Christmas Side Hunt. They would choose sides, shoot as many birds as they could and whoever brought in the largest number of dead birds was, remarkably, declared the "winner"!

Fortunately, beginning on Christmas Day 1900, an ornithologist with the nascent




Audubon Society, Frank M. Chapman, proposed a new holiday tradition — a Christmas Bird Census that would count birds during the holidays rather than kill them.

As a result, from December 14 through January 5 each year tens of thousands of volunteers throughout the Americas brave the elements to participate in the Christmas Bird Count. On December 26, volunteers from our own SCLH Bird Group participated in this citizen-science endeavor, as we have since 2009, collectively citing 56,000 total birds. Audubon

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

and other organizations use data collected in this long-running wildlife census to assess the health of bird populations and to help guide conservation action.
