



Former Titian 1-A Missile Site — Next Public Meeting of the Restoration Advisory Board (RAB)

The next public meeting of the Restoration Advisory Board (RAB) for the cleanup of the former Titian 1-A missile site will be held April 24, 4-6 p.m., in Presentation Hall at Kilaga Springs Lodge, 1167 Sun City Boulevard.

Among the items to be discussed will be the the final Remedial Investigation Report, a massive, 2,000-plus-page document that wraps up the investigation phase of the extent of the contamination left behind at the abandoned Cold War-era missile site. The completion ushers in the next step—exploring the cleanup alternatives, including the pros, cons and costs.

Almost as soon as the Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) filed that report, it also released a Treatability Study Work Plan, which deals with ways to evaluate the effects of $remediation \, technologies \, on \, the \, contaminated$ groundwater.

So, there's lots to discuss at this month's public meeting, with time for your questions at the end. Please plan on being there. Nothing says you care more than your presence.

The former military site, located off Oak Tree Lane and adjacent to part of Sun City Lincoln Hills, was home to three underground missiles in the 1960s. While the missiles have long since been removed, the operation left behind trichloroethylene (TCE), which at the time was a commonly used degreasing solvent but is now known to be carcinogenic.

The TCE has contaminated the groundwater, though USACE officials say it does not present an imminent threat to life or property because the water is not being used. The USACE is in charge of the cleanup of this contaminated former military site, along with thousands of others across the country.

You may have seen work crews on the site recently. The USACE and its contractors collected baseline groundwater samples and installed passive flux meters last month. Workers also will be on site the first half of this month.

The RAB includes 11 community members whose job it is to represent and liaison with the public and provide feedback to the USACE as the work progresses. The community RAB also is available to speak to your neighborhoods, businesses, clubs and other organizations about this project. Email us at RABTitan1A@sclhca.com.

With such acclamation, there is no longer a campaign, and all campaign events have been cancelled. Some have websites or campaign materials they can send, or some might schedule meet-and-greets. NOTICE OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION BY ACCLAMATION: Per Civil Code section 5103 and our election rules, as the number of candidates does not exceed the number of open seats, the Association may declare the candidates elected by acclamation

without undertaking the added expense of formal balloting. The Inspector of Elections (IOE) is responsible for verifying that all election procedures, including nomination and notice requirements, were properly followed. The IOE has confirmed that all legal conditions have been met and determined that, because the election is uncontested, the Board candidates may be seated by acclamation during the Annual Meeting on May 15, 2025.

The Annual Meeting remains an important event for our community, providing an opportunity to hear updates, celebrate our progress, and welcome the new Board members. We appreciate all members who stepped forward to serve and encourage ongoing participation in the governance of our community. Sal and Ruth Algeri, renowned swing dancers, will be teaching the West Coast Swing during April. The West Coast Swing emerged when Dean Collins, a prominent swing dancer from the East Coast, relocated to Hollywood to pursue a career in the music industry. His unique dance style significantly influenced the development of the West Coast Swing. While Collins doesn't claim credit for his impact on the style that later became known as Western swing and ultimately West Coast Swing, his contributions to the history of West Coast Swing are undeniable.

Sal and Ruth offer both West Coast Swing and East Coast Swing lessons. The primary distinction between the two lies in their styles

and characteristics. West Coast Swing is a more contemporary form of swing dancing, characterized by an upright posture, smoother movements from a slotted position. The music for West Coast Swing can range from slower tempo to top 40, R&B, and lyrical music.

In contrast, the East Coast Swing is the traditional image of swing dancing associated



with 1920s-1940s swing music. It involves partners moving in a circular pattern around each other. The music for East Coast Swing is generally faster, and it features a distinctive bounce in the dance.





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

Plans are underway for the annual spring luncheon on May 13 and the theme of Flower Power will hopefully encourage members to dress from the 1960's.



Bird Group

On Friday, February 21st, members of the SCLH Bird Group visited the City of Lincoln's Wastewater Treatment Facility looking for birds. We observed 44 species of birds, the most numerous were 160 American Widgeons and 100 Buffleheads in the ponds. Why,

you might ask, are all of these birds swimming around the wastewater treatment facility? Looking for food, of course.



The ponds contain treated wastewater that is then exposed to sunlight, beneficial bacteria and algae that remove remaining pollutants and pathogens - much like how water purifies itself in natural environments. This water is monitored for parameters like dissolved oxygen, pH, and bacteria levels until it is of a quality suitable for discharge into a waterway or reuse for irrigation purposes. In the meantime, birds use algae and small aquatic organisms as a food source. Bird lovers all over the country know that wastewater treatment facilities are excellent places to watch birds.

On March 10th, Gaylene Tupen from Wildlife Heritage Foundation spoke to the Bird Group about the Foundation's stewardship of Sun City Lincoln Hills 487 acres of permanently protected preserves. 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LH Senior Softball League BY HEIDI MAZZOLA






