Players to Perform Agatha Christie in June — Two dozen people auditioned for the eleven parts in the June production of Agatha Christie's murder mystery "And Then There Were None." The audition team, Ken Reiss, Sue Villarreal and MaryEllen Vogt (Director), said at the conclusion that they could have cast TWO shows from the auditioners they saw! It was challenging to select from such an impressive array of theatrical talent.

According to Director MaryEllen Vogt, "In an ensemble play, all members of the cast work together for a unified effect, rather than emphasizing individual performances. Simply put, there is no star or lead. Each part is as important as the others and the cast depends on a sense of chemistry and community. Interestingly, in most of Agatha Christie's plays, there was a lead, often Hercule Poirot, a detective who solved the mysteries, as some may recall in the recent production of 'Murder

on the Orient Express.' However, in Christie's 'And Then There Were None,' she included no detective or other obvious character who solves the mystery. Instead, the audience is kept in the dark about the murderer, who could be any one of the play's characters."

Now that the play has been cast, the real challenge begins as all actors begin to memorize their lines, study their characters and develop their on-stage relationships. In addition, the production team will also be hard at work behind the scenes building sets, gathering props, creating costumes and much more. Producing a play requires a team of creative minds and helpful hands!

The ensemble includes, in order of appearance: Bob Tatum, David Africa, Mary Whittaker, Cindy Griswold, Rudy Schneider, Steve Gile, Jeri Chase Ferris, Jane Patton, Julie Africa and Joe Nichols. Congratulations one and all!

We've got the "Lights! Camera! Chorus!" and the songs. So, all we need is you, our audience, for memorable May performances.


Ballroom Dance

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
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Neighborhood Watch

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



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
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Woodcarvers Club





Neighbors InDeed — Garbage Disposal Jams

BY BOB LOEW

First, before doing anything, unplug the unit from the electrical outlet under the sink. Then let's talk.

There will be one of two different conditions: either there is a steady hum with no movement (the usual case) or no sound at all. If there is no sound, the correction may be very simple. On

the underside of the unit is a small square red button. This is a circuit breaker. Push it in and then plug the unit back in and try running it. If that hasn't solved the problem, unplug the unit and follow these steps.

1. With a flashlight, look down into the unit to see if you can locate the obstruction.





If so, reach in with a pair of pliers to try to dislodge and remove it

2. If Step 1 is unsuccessful, the next step is to get the tool that came with the unit, which will be a narrow bar with a hexagonal (six-sided) cross section. Alternatively, get a ½" Allen wrench (it's the same thing). There will be a small hole of the same size

on the underside of the unit.

3. Insert the wrench and use it to forcibly turn the unit. It may take several tries, but this will usually free it up. Then try again to remove the obstruction from within the unit.

If these steps are successful, plug the unit back in and run it.

To avoid future jams, avoid putting fibrous foods or hard items down the unit, and always run cold water when operating it.






Garden Group

On March 28 at 8:30 am, 23 members of the SCLH Bird Group walked along the nearby Wilson Park Trail in a quest to discover as many birds as possible. The path, a mere eight-minute drive from Orchard Creek Lodge, did not disappoint. While it was barely a week after the first day of spring, nature was on display. Many of the birds were already showing signs of mating behavior

appropriate for the season. Over a dozen male red-winged blackbirds were spreading their wings, fluffing their feathers and singing to defend their marshy territories in their quest to pair up with local females. Male and female hooded mergansers (see photo) were swimming together in the nearby ponds and

a solitary pair of cinnamon teals were nestled in the grasses feeding together. In less than two hours we recorded 29 different species of birds less than three miles from Orchard Creek Lodge. The SCLH hiking trails, wildlife preserves, and fitness trails provide a perfect setting for observing the various, beautiful birds that inhabit our area. Ed Yong, a Pulitzer Prize winning science journalist, states that observing birds can be a "balm for modern anxiety". Personal problems and to-do-lists just fall away when your mind is focused on nature. So, if you haven't had a chance yet, grab some water, a good pair of binoculars



and hiking shoes and join us on one of the scheduled walks listed below. You too may see your problems simply disappear!




LH Coyotes 75's



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SUN CITY REAL ESTATE UPDATE



To Mom on Mother's Day

It was a moment that encapsulated so much about our relationship. I was nearing thirty years of age, a father of two young boys, and there was my mother sharing with a group of my friends some misstep I had recently committed. I do not remember my misstep, but I do remember one of my friend's response to her negative critique by saying, "Mrs. Singer, you certainly have a way of putting your son under a pedestal." It was a clever remark, and it evoked well-deserved laughter from the assembled folks including mom. But those in attendance missed the importance of his comment

It was that very trait, my mother's unrelenting truth telling, that makes me miss her so much.

Honesty Is Her Only Policy-

I think about my mother often but especially on Mother's Day. Her greatest strength was her unfailing, clear-eyed commitment to the truth. This approach to parenting created a powerful steadying influence for her oldest, often fearful and insecure, child. When praised I felt the embrace of her sincere support; when criticized I always knew it was driven by her devotion and love.

These attributes were a security blanket that followed me through our time together.

A Personality Forged In Adversity—

Ida Mae Bazman born on March 1, 1920. Seventy-three years later she died from Hodgkin's Lymphoma. During those seven plus decades she endured numerous setbacks. She was the only child of European immigrants neither of whom had advanced past the third grade. But her parents understood the importance of education and strongly encouraged her schooling. She was an exceptional student. Twice double promoted, she graduated from high school three months past her sixteenth birthday. Then came a major disappointment; in the midst of the Great Depression her dream of attending college was not to be.

Instead, she joined the workforce and soon met my father. They married on October 26, 1941. Three months later there was another setback. He was drafted into the Army and was overseas for nearly four years. He finally returned in the fall of 1945, and I was born a little more than nine months later.

I am the poster child of the Baby Boomers. A Startling Discovery—

No one would describe the Singer family as overly demonstrative. We rarely hugged and overt claims of love were rare. What we did do was gather every night as a family of five (I had two younger sisters) to eat dinner together in our tiny kitchen. During these meals we would patiently discuss what we each had done that day, whether it was what happened at school, my father's work downtown or Mom's management of the household. Each of our lives was given equal value. Looking back, those will always be among my fondest memories.

As I grew older, I began to observe how other families interacted. Many seemed so much more overtly "loving". When they would see one another, one would have thought they had been apart for decades rather than days or weeks. At first, I thought something was very wrong in my family until I came to realize that much of their affection was a façade. The lesson was clear—insincere hugging could not replace true caring.

Another moment I grew to appreciate the strength of consistent honesty.

A Quiet Ending—

My mother suffered from a number of illnesses throughout her life. But her greatest battle was with cancer which she fought valiantly for the last seven years of her life. In the spring of 1993, she went into the hospital when she had a particularly difficult flare up. The doctor assured us that she "would be fine within two weeks".

Five days later she was gone.


I will always remember my last day with her. I sat next to her bed in the hospital and realized that despite having spent forty-seven years together, I felt there was nothing I needed to make right, nothing that needed an apology. Likewise, there were no "I'm sorry for..." due me. Nearly a half a century of honesty and openness allowed our last moments together to focus only on us.

I thanked her one last time and then said goodbye.

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


