
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Karen Pinomaki — Performer Extraordinaire

"Acting is a sport," said Ralph Richardson, an English actor who dominated the stage for much of the 20th century. "On stage you must be ready to move like a tennis player on his toes. Your concentration must be keen, your reflexes sharp; your body and mind are in top gear, the chase is on. Acting is energy." Karen Pinomaki, a SCLH resident since 2023, would enthusiastically agree with him.

Born in Hanford, California in 1962, Karen grew up with two older brothers in Burlingame. She attended local schools, graduating from Mills High School in 1980. She then attended California State University Fresno where she obtained a BA in Theater Arts and a BA in Communications in 1985.

Two years later she met Russ Pinomaki whom she married in 1990. They moved to San Ramon where Russ worked as a sales manager for Alliance Manufactured Homeswhile Karen was an escrow sales representative until their



children, Deanna and Robby, came along. "Both of the children are getting married this year," says Karen, beaming with excitement.

In 2005, the family moved to Santa Rosa and lived there for 17 years, but multiple evacuations of threatening fires compelled them to seek an early retirement elsewhere. When they visited friends living in SCLH, they knew they'd found just the place. In 2023, with the children now out on their own. Karen and Russ moved here. A year later, Karen moved her parents to Roseville to manage their health. Sadly, Karen's father passed away last year and her mother who suffers from dementia remains a priority.

She is an active member of the Lincoln Hill Players, a club with 150 people in its membership. Karen says, "The support of these friends and the outlet to direct and perform is what is getting me through these difficult times." For his part, Russ helps in the construction of scenery for the Drama Club. Karen was playing Pickleball until her mother's health needed her attention, and Russ






Music Group


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Neighbors InDeed — When The Unexpected Happens

We "Seasoned Citizens" at Sun City Lincoln Hills think we are prepared. Most of us have considered how to cope with occasional power outages, temporary runs on grocery items, stuck garage doors, flat tires and the like. These temporary situations, though annoying, can usually be remedied in

a fairly short time. But what to do if, heaven forbid, you slip or stumble, causing you to pay a visit to ER? After the folks at ER patch you up, you go home and find you still

will be having a

tough time getting around for a while. There is a simple and inexpensive solution-in fact it is FREE!

You can call Neighbors InDeed (NID), and request the loan of a wheelchair, crutches, a walker or a ramp. One of our volunteers will deliver the item to your door at no cost. These items can be used for a month--or at least until you have time to purchase the item/s you need.

Our volunteers respond to your request within 24 hours. Plus, when they deliver the equipment, they will instruct you on how to use it safely. In addition, volunteers clean all equipment after use.

In 2006, original NID member, Jean Ebenholtz, envisioned loaning medical equipment, in addition to assisting with certain household tasks. They started with 12 wheelchairs and 25 walkers, which Jean and her husband, Shelly, kept in their garage. Today, In March of 2025 alone, NID loaned 30 walkers. 9 wheelchairs, and 7 transport chairs from our inventory.





At our May 12 meeting, the SCLH Bird Group hosted Kate Marden of the West Coast Falconry and her avian ambassadors to Kilaga Presentation Hall. The audience not

only learned

about raptors and Falconry but also had the unique opportunity to observe a Red-Tailed Hawk, an Aplomado Falcon and a Screech owl (see photo) fly from Kate's gloved arm to a perch held by Don Fallon!

At our April 14 meeting, Susanne Hutchinson presented a very informative talk about how to use two free apps from the Cornell Lab of Ornithology which most birders use to expand their knowledge of birds: "Merlin Bird ID" and "eBird". The "eBird" app uses the unique knowledge of every birdwatcher to help gather information in the form of a checklist of birds. Users construct their own lists, photos and audio recordings thus joining the world's largest biodiversity-related science project. More than 100 million bird sightings are contributed annually by eBirders around the world. https://ebird.org/about

You may have personally experienced one of the phenomena that eBirders have helped to document - fewer birds visiting your backyard feeders this spring. In fact, since 1970, North America has lost nearly 3 billion breeding birds, a slow-moving extinction crisis that threatens our entire ecosystem. https://www.washingtonpost.com/climateenvironment/2025/05/01/bird-loss-populationdecline/

Why should we be concerned? Birds support habitats and food crops through pollinating, eating destructive pests, and dispersing seeds. They serve as ecosystem engineers, constructing structures like nests and tree holes that are used by other organisms when abandoned by the birds. As a bonus, they are beautiful to watch and a joy to listen to.

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

May was National Tennis Month, and to celebrate it, Sun City Lincoln Hills was again 1



What led her to catching the acting bug? When she was five years old, Karen's parents gave her the, Fiddler on the Roof record soundtrack in her Easter basket. "I would listen to the record over and over. memorizing all the songs and acting out all the parts," she recalls. When the Broadway show came to San Francisco, her parents took her to see the performance. She

remembers sitting on the aisle as she couldn't see over the heads in front of her. To the dismay of the other audience members, she sang all the songs along with the actors. She was so enamored by the production, from then on, set her sights on becoming a stage actress. And, at the age of 6 her first role was in a summer program cast as the Heroine in a melodrama. There was no looking back.

Fair Elections Matter in SCLH

Protecting the Integrity of Our Community Voting Process

A fair and open election process is the foundation of trust in our community. In recent elections, however, some members have grown concerned about our HOA's communication practices. During the 2021 and 2023 board elections—and again in the 2025 special election—official HOA newsletters, emails, and website updates appeared to promote only one side of the issues. Unfortunately, requests to share opposing views equally were not granted. In the end, it's not about who wins or loses—it's about everyone getting a fair chance to be heard.

California law backs up this fairness principle. It requires HOAs to give equal access to all sides if any election-related messages are sent out (Civil Code § 5105). The law also forbids using HOA funds or staff time to influence votes (Civil Code § 5135). If these rules aren't followed, courts can even throw out the election results.

In the 2025 special election, the usual Elections Committee process was not used, and one member's opposing statement was delayed and handled unequally. These actions fell short of the fair and open process our community expects.

In light of these issues, members are asking the Board to take the following steps: 1. Re-run the 2025 special election with

a fair, impartial process.2. Comply fully with state election laws

in all future elections to ensure equal access for all viewpoints.

3. Update HOA policies to align with these laws and prevent such issues from happening again.

As neighbors, we all benefit from trust, fairness, and open communication. By staying informed and working together, we can ensure our elections reflect the values that built our community and keep it strong: integrity, inclusion, and respect.

SCLH Mismanagement

In the April 2025 issue of the Compass magazine, Board member Jack Harris accused a group of residents on social media of spreading "disinformation and untruths." He further claimed there is "evidence that this negativity discourages prospective home buyers." Similar accusations were made by Board member Denny Valentine in 2023 regarding "potential impacts on home values"—yet no supporting evidence has ever been provided... not then and not now.

Board members are free to make statements, whether true or not, fully aware that residents are not allowed to respond in the Compass... not even through a "letter to the editor." As a result, the wider community remains uninformed about the details of the most pressing issues. When the Board denies residents a voice in the Compass or on Enews, they in effect control the narrative for 11,000 residents. This likely impacts the number of residents who might otherwise run for office or serve on committees.

These are some of the key issues that the wider community should be alerted to:

Bullying and Harassment: While social media has its share of disrespectful "bad actors," the Board is not immune to similar behavior.

Some Board members have bullied residents during meetings and then harassed them afterward. No obvious disciplinary action was taken, nor were apologies offered for this behavior. Ms. Donna Fields has posted on social media and reached out to Board members, advocating for communication and conflict resolution training to address these concerns.

Police Involvement and Discrimination Complaints: The Lincoln police were called on residents playing cards, and at a public concert, a resident was arrested and charged with trespassing. The individual was jailed for several hours and eventually the Placer County District Attorney dismissed the charges. This incident, along with related concerns, has led to a lawsuit. Additionally, discrimination complaints were filed with the California Civil Rights Department. These events likely contributed to the sudden resignation of the Executive Director. Once again, Ms. Donna Fields urged the Board to implement mediation and conflict resolution training to prevent similar incidents that could damage our community's reputation and our financial standing.

Mismanaged Expenditures: Thousands of dollars in HOA funds were spent by the Board on legal fees in a failed attempt to deny closed captioning for residents with impaired hearing. More recently, the Board-excluding Gary Kawula—approved a \$500,000 expenditure for cardio equipment without conducting due diligence in collecting data on equipment usage. Fitness Director Deborah McIlvain did not survey gym users at Orchard Creek or Kilaga Springs to determine the most appropriate and user-friendly equipment. As a result, more than \$185,000 has been wasted on unneeded treadmills. At Orchard Creek. cardio equipment worth \$300,000 is set to be installed in the fitness center, despite the fact that the roof has been leaking rainwater for over a decade. Additionally, Ms McIlvain has proposed spending \$60,000 to replace the gym floor, even though the source of the roof leak—and the water seeping up through the floor-remains unclear. Meanwhile, six weight machines remain in disrepair... some since January.

Pool Damage and Extended Closure: An attempt to repair a crack at the bottom of the Orchard Creek indoor pool was unsuccessful, resulting in a large hole. As a result, the entire pool has been drained and will require replastering. Additionally, the delayed replacement of the pool's dehumidifier has led to rust forming on the ceiling structure, which now needs to be sandblasted and repainted. Temporary fixes and deferred maintenance have led to the pool being closed for the remainder of the year and possibly longer. The estimated costs for repairs and replacement of parts range from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

These issues—not social media criticism are the true threats to our community's reputation. A realtor shared that she avoided showing clients the Orchard Creek weight room last winter due to the leaking roof, the buckets on the floor and the warning signs attached to six weight machines in disrepair.

This is part of your legacy, Mr. Harris, Mr. Valentine, and other Board members. Consider

this the next time you contemplate using the Compass magazine to bully residents... residents who are raising valid concerns. Some speak out after being bullied or denied due process, others point to the lack of due diligence and accountability, and many worry about the absence of transparency in the decisions that affect us all.

As previously noted, if more residents fully understood why the pool is closed for the rest of the year, and why significant amounts of money are wasted because of lawsuits and lack of due diligence, and why our HOA dues continue to increase, more would be motivated to run for office or serve on committees to bring about necessary change.

With new Board members and a new Executive Director, we remain hopeful that our community will finally receive the responsible leadership that it deserves.

Plan of Fairness and Transparency

This is my action plan of fairness and transparency for the new BOD effective 5-15-2025 and the new Executive Director, Jessica Sedgwick scheduled to arrive July 1-2025.

4 amendments to be included in any Suggestion Revisions to the Governing Documents and to be placed on any ballot if a Special Election is held.

In the interim these guidelines that I believe should be followed for items 1, 2 & 4,

1. Chairs and members of Committees, Task Forces such as Revision of Governing Document Revision (GDR) Strategic Planning, standing committees etc etc.

Will Require the BOD to solicit from members in good standing, the char and members of the committees, task forces and not arbitrarily appoint members.

• Members in good standing that have not served on committees or Task Forces will be given preference to ensure opportunities for diverse opinions and avoid the recycling of preferred members or the chair with alliances to the BOD.

An appeal process will be provided if a member is denied membership in a committee.

Are You Prepared for the Summer Heat?

There has been a lot of talk about wildfire concerns in Sun City Lincoln Hills. The Association has formed a Fire Safety Team to review wildfire concerns and provide information regarding those concerns. The team is made up of the Chairs of the Architectural Review Committee (ARC), Properties Committee, the Communications Committee (CCRC), Community Standards, Neighborhood Watch and residents with experience implementing fire safety protocols in prior communities.

We believe that residents of Sun City Lincoln Hills should be made aware of potential risks and actions homeowners can take to reduce the risks to our homes and community.

Concerns that have been expressed include but are not limited to:

• Weather in California is getting hotter with higher average temperatures each year.

• Despite abundant rainfall during the past 3 years, drought is still possible.

• Sun City homes are 25 years old and aging.

• Landscapes that were installed 20 years ago are now mature and some have overgrown and unhealthy plants.

• Home insurance has become difficult to get and some insurance companies are canceling their policies.

• Open space concerns.

• Most Sun City residents are unprepared for a wildfire event.

• Senior citizens in Sun City may need more time to react in a wildfire event.

Over the next weeks, the Fire Safety Team plans to provide information to residents about these concerns and recommended actions to improve wildfire safety for our homes, landscaping, and community. You can look for this information in sources such as The Compass magazine, Sun Senior News, and electronic communications.

We also plan to hold meetings periodically when topics are chosen and speakers are available.






2. Nepotism an amendment that addresses nepotism - in that members of the BOD, Committees and Task Forces will be required to sign an agreement stating that they will not vote & will recuse on matters that come before them that a relative, spouse, significant other may have an interest in or advocated for or against. Example if a spouse serves on the Finance Committee and votes for an expenditure then the spouse serving on the BOD will recuse from voting for that expenditure.

3. An amendment that will make the Accessibility add Safety Committee a Standing Committee.

The committee will be known as The Accessibility-Safety Committee and not subject to termination as a Task Force and being sunsetted by the BOD.

4. Association meetings must be zoomed and placed on the Resident Website with at least quarterly 1 meeting being held in the evening or weekend to allow access for homeowners that can not attend during the day. All meetings will be open to the membership with the exception of the Executive Sessions of the BOD which are governed by the Civil Code.

All Association meetings will be placed on the Association calendar on the Resident Website with written hard copies provided to members not using computers or signed up for e-news.
